

HISTORICAL DATA

THE GEORGE LAUDER CARNEGIE PERIOD, 1898-1922

George Lauder Carnegie and Margaret Thaw Carnegie were married in 1898 at the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He was 22 years old, one of nine children of Thomas Morrison (d. 1886) and Lucy Coleman Carnegie. She was the daughter of the Pittsburgh railroad magnate William Thaw (d. 1889) and had formally entered Pittsburgh society the previous year. Reporters covering the union described Margaret Thaw as tall and fair. Next to her George Carnegie appeared "almost diminutive."¹ The marriage, as one newspaper put it, "unites a great deal of wealth."²

Following the wedding the couple traveled to Cumberland Island where they planned to make their home. As outlined in the following chapter, they spent just over a year building their home, Plum Orchard, moving in around October 1899. During some, if not all, of the construction the George L. Carnegies lived in Lucy Carnegie's mansion, Dungeness. Newspaper coverage of Thomas Morrison Carnegie II's marriage in October 1898 reported that the brides of both brothers would be at Dungeness that winter.³

Like the other island houses that she built for her children, Plum Orchard was constructed by Lucy Carnegie but apparently furnished mostly with Margaret Thaw Carnegie's own means. It was the George Carnegies' primary winter residence for almost 20 years.

Only fragmentary records survive of the couple's comings and goings. Letters to and from island manager William Paige during the years 1915 to 1917 place their arrival at various dates between November and January.⁴ The absence of such letters in earlier years may indicate that the couple was living at Plum Orchard year round. They were probably in residence throughout much of 1904 and 1905 when numerous large shipments of furniture and hardware arrived at the house. George Carnegie spent time at the family resort at Raquette Lake, New York, during the summer of 1912, and Raquette Lake probably offered a regular summer retreat to the couple.⁵

One of the best sources on the George Carnegie years is Dr. Coleman Johnston (1906-1983), George's nephew, whose mother Nancy Carnegie Johnston took over Plum Orchard following George's death. When interviewed in 1982, Johnston retained vivid images of his Uncle George and Aunt Margaret at Plum Orchard.⁶ Johnston considered his recall strongest from about 1913 on when his parents began to spend a lot of time on Cumberland Island.

Sport dominated island life early in the century and Coleman Johnston described his uncle as a skilled horseman, polo player, and hunter. The island was renowned for wild game hunting. William Paige, in fact, received many requests from off the island for permission to hunt.⁷ The fact that the family printed and distributed game laws governing island hunting points to the popularity of the sport.

Before 1920 wild turkeys were actively bred on Cumberland Island. George Carnegie's, and later Marius Johnston's, friend Harry Whitney twice requested live turkeys with which to launch his own breeding program. Responding to one request Paige explained that he was unable to trap turkeys because the

island hogs were stealing all the bait.⁸ In 1922 Margaret Carnegie expressed a desire to renew the wild turkey breeding program, which must have been abandoned sometime prior to this.⁹

One of Coleman Johnston's strongest childhood memories was of the pair of black bear cubs brought to the island by George Carnegie. They survived for several years, although they did not propagate as George had planned. About 1925, after the Johnston family had moved to Plum Orchard, one of the bears returned to the Plum Orchard outbuilding where it had been raised. Coleman Johnston's brother Marius, alarmed by a bear standing full length on its hind legs in the kitchen of the "center house," shot and killed the animal. "It was kind of a sad affair," Coleman Johnston said.¹⁰

All of the family had horses. George and Margaret maintained a "big stable," while the rest of the family kept their horses at the Dungeness stables. In 1921 Oliver Ricketson (George's nephew) imported some 30 mares to the island from Arizona. These, bred with a Kentucky thoroughbred brought in by Dr. Johnston, produced horses that were larger than the mares and that had more common, or "junglewise," sense than the native island horses. They made excellent polo ponies.¹¹

Everyone spent time on the beach and Johnston remembered his uncles, including George, racing the two island beach boats.¹² Family photographs show these sail-driven sand boats on wheels (fig. 9).

The George L. Carnegies had no children of their own, but they often invited the Johnston children to Plum Orchard to spend the day and stay overnight. Coleman Johnston had very fond memories of Margaret Thaw Carnegie who was also his godmother. She, too, was a skilled horsewoman and would take the children horseback riding or for a ride in the electric car. In addition to the electric car, Johnston remembers that his Uncle George had the first gasoline powered car on the island.

Dinners at Plum Orchard were formal affairs, particularly in the eyes of children. Two butlers dressed in green livery attended family dinners. Coleman Johnston's sister Lucy Graves recalled with horror eating strawberries at Plum Orchard with a silver spoon pierced with holes. The George Carnegies' "exquisite" French cook even designed special confections for the children. The highlight was a spun sugar basket holding a life-size ice cream hen.

Margaret Thaw Carnegie grew up in a formal life-style, and Plum Orchard reflected this. But despite this formality Plum Orchard's mistress was, to her nephew, down to earth, "a very human sort of person." She was also a perfectionist, and the house was "always immaculate and beautifully cared for."¹³

Johnston childhood memories maintained an impression of lively parties at Plum Orchard although few specific events are documented. Photographs survive showing a large Thaw family wedding at Plum Orchard in 1913.¹⁴ Clearly, the house was designed and staffed to accommodate large numbers of guests, and George and Margaret Carnegie must have hosted winter house parties such as those recorded at Dungeness.

Such activities required a sizeable support staff, and managing the estate was Frank McLaren. McLaren served Plum Orchard from as early as 1905 until 1922 when he was promoted to island manager upon the death of William Paige.¹⁵ McLaren, who always spoke with a "good Scottish brogue," had his own house on the Plum Orchard property.¹⁶ He ordered supplies and probably hired most of the staff. Occasional confusion arose between his and William Paige's duties such as Margaret Carnegie's 1915 request to each man to order oats, resulting in a double order.¹⁷ In 1918 Paige wrote Andrew Carnegie II about a big dinner at Dungeness that McLaren had supervised.¹⁸ Clearly, the competence of Plum Orchard's manager was apparent to other family members.

Exactly how many people it took to run Plum Orchard is unknown. A 1905 letter from Paige advising Margaret Carnegie on feeding the "colored hands" indicates a sizeable force of "house and stable boys":

I think the enclosed will be a sufficient indication to you and to McLaren of a proper ration for your colored hands. House and stable boys make up a considerable portion of your force, and with two or three other of your hands cannot be fed as roughly as we feed the great majority of our hands. The things I suggest will come a good deal cheaper when cooked and served to the whole crowd than the arrangement which has obtained hitherto.

The way beef is managed here, odds and ends of fresh beef can be used to advantage at times in place of bacon which is very expensive at present....

We issue to our colored dining room [at Dungeness] the following supplies: Coffee, Bacon, Grits, Flour and Molasses in such quantities as are required daily. Corn Meal for use every second day. Three or four times a week the fat fringes and trimmings of beef. In addition to this, for the small colored dining room, we issue Butter, Ham for one meal a day, Canned Milk and a Canned Vegetable twice a week when there are no fresh vegetables. We issue fresh vegetables such as greens, onions etc., whenever we have a surplus.

Suggestion for supply list in the Plum Orchard colored kitchen as follows.

Heavy Bacon, Grits, Flour, Coffee and Syrup daily. Sweet Potatoes and some other coarse vegetable daily when possible. Ham Sundays and one other day. Corn Meal every second or third day. Skimmed milk daily or when it is to be had.¹⁹

Working inside the house were, at minimum, a housekeeper, cook, and two butlers, and probably one or two chambermaids. In addition to the colored hands, there were several special posts outside. A captain was always associated with the Plum Orchard yacht. Paige remarked that the new boat captain George hired in 1916 was more promising than any he had had previously.²⁰ And a trainer who also ordered stable supplies is documented in 1905.²¹ This too was probably an on-going function of the estate.

No doubt, life at Plum Orchard during the George Lauder Carnegies' period offered all the opulence and formality that characterized high society in America before the First World War.

By 1917 George and Margaret Carnegie had virtually stopped coming to Cumberland Island. In March 1917, Margaret Carnegie shipped three boxes of furniture from Plum Orchard to the Library Bureau in Boston.²² This furniture removal probably indicates that the Carnegies were preparing to abandon Plum Orchard as a permanent winter residence.

George's failing health apparently precipitated the change. Sometime between 1913 and 1915 George Carnegie was seriously injured. He appears in health in 1913 photographs of the Thaw family wedding, but in December 1915, island manager William Paige described George as "sorely disabled."²³ The cause of the injury is unknown but George L. Carnegie spent the rest of his short life in a wheelchair.

Beginning in 1919 George Carnegie traveled almost continuously in an apparent effort to regain his health. Every few months he would move among such spots as the Greenbriar in White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia; the Breakers in Palm Beach, Florida; Hot Springs, Arkansas; and Santa Barbara, California. Home base at this time for both George and Margaret was the Plaza Hotel in New York City.

George Carnegie's passport places him in Ecuador in October 1919. During the next year he traveled to Chile, Peru, Panama, Italy, and France.²⁴

In June 1920, George wrote William Paige from the Greenbriar that he would depart New York on August 7 for a 14-day sea voyage to the ports of the Azores, Lisbon, Palermo, Naples, and Marseilles.²⁵ His passport was last stamped in Chile in October 1920.

Margaret traveled with her husband to many of the American resorts. After 1920, however, mostly nurses accompanied him. In 1920 and 1921, George traveled with two nurses and two valets. One of the nurses wrote that the turnover was great, "no one was there very long."²⁶

George's last documented visit to Cumberland Island was in 1917.²⁷ In May 1920 he made plans to spend the coming winter at Dungeness, instead of Plum Orchard, as his nurse explained to William Paige:

[George Carnegie] will surely be on the island this winter and would like you to tell him...how much it would cost to open up Dungeness and what you think his expenses should be to run it each month. He would use only the large room up and downstairs that was his mother's and not use the 3d floor at all. The two valets could sleep in the quarters — being colored and his two nurses...would be much better off in every way at Dungeness and more apt to stay all winter than at Plum Orchard.²⁸

But January 1921 found George in Palm Beach instead of at Dungeness. His nurse had written the previous month to say that her employer "has his heart set on the island and I hope some day he can return there."²⁹

George Carnegie died on November 15, 1921, at the Plaza Hotel in New York. He was buried in the family cemetery at Dungeness on November 19.

George's mother Lucy Carnegie had died five years earlier, on January 16, 1916. She left all her Cumberland Island holdings, including Plum Orchard, in trust to her children.

My property in the State of Georgia known as Cumberland Island I direct my said Trustees to hold during the lives of my children and of the survivor of them maintaining the same out of the entire income of the trust and permitting such of my children as desire to do so, to occupy the same free of rent. The children so occupying the Island shall pay all expenses of the household and stable it being my intention that the Trustees shall pay only the expenses of maintaining the real estate and improvements thereon with the taxes and insurance.³⁰

William Paige executed George Carnegie's estate. When Paige died in 1922 this function was transferred, at Margaret Carnegie's request, to George's brother, Thomas Morrison Carnegie II.³¹

Except for questions surrounding the legality of George Carnegie's will, his small estate was settled with little complication.

Plum Orchard remained the property of Lucy Carnegie's estate. George Carnegie's personal estate totalled a little more than \$14,000, much of which was used to cover funeral expenses. The balance went to Margaret, George's sole heir, under the terms of Lucy Carnegie's, not George Carnegie's, will. In addition to a few stocks and bonds the estate records contained an itemization of George Carnegie's personal property both on Cumberland Island and in New York.³² When William Paige asked Margaret to itemize her husband's property she responded:

I am quite at sea about the value of George's personal belongings. He had practically nothing at Plum Orchard except books—many of which now at Plum Orchard were his own—but I should be at a loss to say which were his and which mine...the guns are his, with the exception of my little Parker gun.³³

A list, nevertheless, was drawn up and consisted largely of books, guns, and saddlery (this inventory appears on pp. 27-28).

George Carnegie's estate papers were never actually filed and his will was ultimately declared invalid. He had failed to sign the original will and no witnesses' signatures appeared on the copy, which did, however, bear George's

handwritten note, "This is a copy. Mr. Page has original. Hope you all do as you would have me do by you. Be good to Margaret. George."³⁴

Margaret inherited only the \$10,000 annual annuity left to her husband by his famous uncle Andrew Carnegie, who had died in 1919.³⁵ George's defective will had no effect on this inheritance, which was already directed under the terms of Andrew Carnegie's will.

Throughout her life Margaret Thaw Carnegie maintained contact with her husband's family and returned to Cumberland Island on occasion. During the year following George's death she traveled extensively, corresponding with William Paige from Paris and once from Cairo.³⁶ Until 1924 she remained the mistress in charge of Plum Orchard. Plans to rent Plum Orchard for the 1922 season were disclosed in a letter from Thomas Morrison Carnegie II to Paige in which he wrote that he had assured Margaret "we'd all be glad to see it rented."³⁷

In September 1922, she wrote her brother-in-law:

I only want "a lick and a promise" in the way of facilities at Plum Orchard—just enough to keep the house from [?] and to make it look a little more presentable.

Someone would need to keep the accounts, "payroll checked and paid and supplies ordered as required." William Paige had been replaced as island manager by Frank McLaren. Because McLaren was so familiar with Plum Orchard, Margaret thought he could easily direct the needed work.³⁸

In December 1922, Margaret made plans to reoccupy Plum Orchard for the coming winter and McLaren arranged to get in coal from Jacksonville:

Mrs. George L. Carnegie expects to open her house at Plum Orchard this season, please let us know how soon you could make the following shipment for this place:

30 tons Furnace Coal³⁹
10 tons Stove Coal

But Margaret changed her plans and two weeks later McLaren cancelled the coal order, explaining "As the House won't be rented this year it won't be necessary to order the coal for Plum Orchard."⁴⁰

In 1924 Margaret divested herself of any remaining interests in Plum Orchard. She hired J.P. Silo, who was probably an auctioneer, to remove her property from the house. A February 1924 receipt survives, which reads:

Received of Mr. T.M. Carnegie the sum of One thousand and fifty dollars in full settlement for balance of furniture etc. left by J.P. Silo in main house and out buildings at Plum Orchard Cumberland Island Ga.

Thomas Morrison Carnegie apparently purchased the remaining pieces for Lucy Carnegie's estate, either leaving what remained at Plum Orchard or using it in one of the other island houses.⁴¹ In March Andrew Carnegie II wrote the insurance brokers that all contents of the house had been removed. Thereafter Margaret wrote from Spain apologizing for any inconvenience caused by the "Silo people," adding that she feared "it may have been a mistake to let everything be sold so suddenly—[illegible] no time to consider what might be the best way to dispose of it."⁴² Margaret's sense of urgency stemmed from her recent marriage in November 1923 to Roger de Perigny. She was making a new home in Paris as the Comtesse Thaw de Perigny.⁴³

In April 1924, Margaret signed a quit claim releasing any interest that she maintained under the terms of Lucy Carnegie's will in real or personal property at Plum Orchard.⁴⁴

Margaret returned to Cumberland Island with her second husband at least once, and perhaps other times. In June 1924, she thanked Thomas Morrison Carnegie II for the use of the cottage on their coming trip to the islands.⁴⁵

At some point she and her husband moved to Africa. The 1942 Pittsburgh Social Register locates the couple at Kongoni Farm, Naivasha, Kenya.⁴⁶ Coleman Johnston continued corresponding with his aunt to some extent. When interviewed, he regretted never accepting her invitation to visit in Kenya.⁴⁷

CONSTRUCTING AND FURNISHING THE PLUM ORCHARD COMPLEX

Summary: A series of drawings, mostly undated, prepared by the mansion's architects, Peabody & Stearns, and related correspondence outline the evolution of Plum Orchard and its supporting structures.⁴⁸ This correspondence forms a valuable supplement to the drawings, documenting design and construction dates for each phase of the project. It also illuminates many of the George Lauder Carnegies' intentions and expectations for Plum Orchard.

Lucy Coleman Carnegie first hired Peabody & Stearns in 1896 to design an addition to her island home, Dungeness.⁴⁹ The collection of letters surviving between the Carnegies and the architects indicates that Peabody & Stearns fulfilled every major architectural commission for the Carnegies' Cumberland Island homes from 1896 to 1907 when this correspondence breaks off.

Plum Orchard evolved in three distinct stages, roughly encompassing the years 1898-99, 1902-04, and 1906-07. Peabody & Stearns submitted preliminary designs for the house in July 1898. In November 1898, a contract was signed for the design work, which continued to evolve through March 1899. Construction was probably under way late in 1898. A house bell inscribed "Carnegie/Plum Orchard/October 6, 1898/Ring in Joyous Remembrance" (CUIS #2430) may, in fact, commemorate the ground breaking for the house. Regular ice deliveries to Plum Orchard began in October 1899, indicating that the house was occupied. Interior painting, however, was not completed until December 1899. Not until March 1900 did the architects inquire "Is the house for Mr. George Carnegie entirely finished and has it turned out well?"⁵⁰

In 1902 the George L. Carnegies began planning major additions to their house on both the east and west ends. This construction phase included the addition of the swimming pool building. These additions, resulting in a much enlarged Plum Orchard, were largely completed by May 1904. A second, less major, addition was added in 1906 and 1907 and was undertaken primarily to expand the service wing of the house.

Peabody & Stearns provided final designs for each phase of the construction process. The firm was paid 5 percent of the total cost of each job. The cost of the original house totalled \$10,936.75. The 1902-04 additions cost \$38,000 and the 1906-07 work cost \$15,599.74.⁵¹

In addition to designing Plum Orchard, Peabody & Stearns also secured bids for supplying exterior and interior finish work. Resulting from Peabody's & Stearn's efforts, the Boston offices of David P. Page supplied the clapboard and finish work. Page was paid, however, directly by the Carnegies.

Surviving correspondence indicates that the architects never saw the house, either during construction or when completed. The supervisor for all phases of the construction was clearly someone in the Carnegies' employ and may well have been William E. Paige, Mrs. L.C. Carnegie's trusted island manager. Paige paid the bills for each step of the work, and while the George Carnegies communicated directly with Peabody & Stearns on many aspects of the job, endless details were resolved in letters between the architects and Paige. Paige even traveled to Boston once to confer with the architects.

A Pittsburgh society page description of the work under way on Plum Orchard stated that workmen were housed in the stables, which was completed first expressly for that purpose.⁵²

1898-99 Construction

A July 1898 transmittal of preliminary sketches from Peabody & Stearns indicates that George L. Carnegie first envisioned a "simple" house built of concrete and priced in the \$10,000 to \$12,000 range.

When Mr. Page was here we made various attempts at a more picturesque or varied exterior, using some gables or Mexican details but Mr. Page assured us that you wished everything absolutely simple and we have tried to catch the spirit that he told us you wished.

They also advised their client that the house size he required would probably exceed his cost estimate.⁵³ George Carnegie was delighted with the preliminary designs, replying "you have got my idea exactly."⁵⁴

Subsequent exchanges reinforce the fact that George L. and Margaret Thaw Carnegie built Plum Orchard to their own needs and tastes, which departed in several areas from those of the classically schooled firm of architects. Throughout Plum Orchard's development client/architect differences recurred concerning the amount of decoration, particularly on the exterior, and the overall symmetry of the house.

The G.L. Carnegies considered a tabby exterior for the original house, but they quickly settled on unadorned clapboard, and the architects began their letter campaign for adding ornamentation to the exterior. “We hope you will finally use the relief work on the front elevation as we believe a modest amount of it, as indicated on the drawings, will add a good deal to the dignity of the building. It will look a good deal more commonplace if you simply clapboard this place.”⁵⁵

In March 1899 a contract for the exterior finish was signed with David Page of Boston, but the ornamentation issue was still unresolved in July 1899, when the architects again urged their clients to adopt some exterior ornamentation as well as arched-topped, instead of square, windows.⁵⁶ Photographs of the first house show that Peabody & Stearns prevailed in both areas.

Figures 33 and 34 show the Peabody & Stearns floor plans, presumably as built, for the original house. Incorporating clear room designations, these plans provide a layout of how the Carnegies used Plum Orchard. Further room designations are provided in the interior finish bids, which were submitted to the following specifications:

On October 10, 1899, Peabody & Stearns reported that David Page was shipping the last of the finish that week and would ship all the floors the following week. The letter apparently refers to the interior finish, indicating that Page received this contract as well as the exterior finish contract.⁵⁸ In addition, the same Page provided an estimate to construct a gun case for the house.

The Boston firm of Irving & Casson supplied interior mantels:

Whether Irving & Casson provided the rest of the Plum Orchard mantels as well is unknown.

W.H. Kay of Jacksonville painted Plum Orchard inside and out. Exterior painting took place in July and August 1899, and interior painting occurred in October and November 1899.⁶⁰

Regular ice deliveries to Plum Orchard began in October 1899; 3600 pounds arrived every three to four days.⁶¹ In December 1899, Margaret Thaw Carnegie was billed for a "Hotel #2" refrigerator.⁶² Apparently, the George Carnegies were finally in residence at Plum Orchard.

1902-04 Additions

In 1902, about two years after Plum Orchard's completion, the Carnegies advised Peabody & Stearns of major additions they intended to make to their house.

Architectural drawings and correspondence related to the changes indicate that the George L. Carnegies' primary intention was to greatly enlarge the public, or entertaining capacity, of their house. On the east end they added a swimming pool and squash court and gave new emphasis to the eastern approach to the house. They reorganized the former living room/gun room combination into a large library and added a spacious "Men's Room" to the west end of the house. The dining room remained in its former location but was slightly enlarged. The service stair hall was redesigned and an elevator added, and bedrooms on the second story multiplied. Finally, the clapboard exterior was replaced with tabby.

Late in April 1902, Peabody & Stearns submitted plans for the changes, which the Carnegies reviewed in detail over the summer, and more or less finalized by December 1902. Two particularly informative accounts of the plan's review are fully cited in appendix II.

Architect/client exchanges during the design phase of the additions concentrated on the exterior symmetry of the house. On November 10, Mr. Paige advised the architects, "Mrs. Carnegie wants to break up the symmetry which was preserved in the sketches you forwarded herein this summer." He suggested that "some irregularity in treatment of openings in the south side will give variety to the front elevation." Peabody & Stearns regretted their clients' wish to "entirely disregard symmetry," especially in a "house so formal as the original."⁶³

Mrs. Carnegie's rejection of a fully symmetrical Plum Orchard stemmed primarily from functional, not aesthetic, considerations. Paige explained:

They appreciate that the scheme you propose...makes a better building, but the arrangement of the east wing is impossible for their purpose. The addition shuts the air away from the rooms at the east end of the house, cutting off the prevailing breezes in the warm spring season. They also believe that the general appearance of the house will be better suited to the grounds if scheme A is followed with some minor changes....⁶⁴

While the front elevation still faced south, correspondence reveals a conscious attempt to place new emphasis on Plum Orchard's east elevation. In fact, a new entrance road from the east was either planned or had already been created.⁶⁵

The swimming pool, as planned, was fed by artesian water. A "bank of seven or eight pipes...laid around the pool, near the bottom" heated the water for both summer and winter use to a constant temperature of 76 degrees. Because sulphur fumes from the artesian water caused paint discoloration, the pool house walls were left unpainted.⁶⁶

For other interior finishes Paige wrote, "It is proposed to finish the west addition in the first story in oak or other hard wood, and the second story in white wood or white pine painted white."⁶⁷ He elaborated on the men's room scheme in a subsequent letter:

Mrs. Carnegie wishes the hall and men's room in the west wing finished in a very dark oak. In the hall the ceiling will be plain plaster, and there will be no wainscoting. In the mens' room there are to be heavy plain ceiling beams and a high wainscot. Mrs. Carnegie is undecided whether the wainscot should be (say) about five feet high, ranging with the mantel shelf, or considerably higher, leaving only a frieze of plaster about the room, and wishes suggestions on this point.⁶⁸

Plans for altering the back, or service, stair hall and installing an elevator underwent several revisions. As first designed, the passages were too narrow and the elevator too small to satisfy the Carnegies' intention "to separate the servants' corridors entirely from the family portion of the house."⁶⁹

The Plum Orchard elevator was probably supplied by the Jacksonville firm of A.A. Kind, which fulfilled numerous electrical needs for all Carnegie houses on the island.

Paige first contacted Kind about the Plum Orchard elevator in 1903 to request specifications for a five to six person passenger elevator as well as a hand-operated freight elevator. In May 1903, Kind sent Paige catalogs for both types.⁷⁰

Late in the design stage for these additions Mrs. Carnegie decided to change Plum Orchard's exterior finish from clapboard to tabby.⁷¹ No doubt she realized the impracticality of a wood-sided house in the hot and humid island climate. Likewise, all porch floors, new and old, were laid in cement because "the wooden terrace in front of the old house is a failure. The sun is so hot that it draws the most carefully laid flooring out of position."⁷²

In March 1903, after all design details had been worked out, William E. Paige relayed his intention to "build these additions very fast." Because the George Carnegies were in residence he wanted to cause as little disruption as possible. Paige planned to frame the east wing first, then the west wing, moving the family from one end of the house to the other to facilitate the work.⁷³

By December 1903, the additions were nearly complete, and the Carnegies settled their account with the architects in April 1904, in the amount of \$1900, or 5 percent of the cost to build the additions.⁷⁴

Only interior painting remained unfinished. Completed between June 1904 and January 1905, the painters charged more than 6000 hours to the Plum Orchard job.⁷⁵ At the same time the painting was taking place, large shipments of furniture and other pieces were arriving at Plum Orchard, indicating that a major interior redecoration occurred with the 1902-04 additions.⁷⁶

William Paige wrote to the architects in May 1904 to report complete satisfaction with the additions. Regarding any lingering doubts about the asymmetry

produced by the changes, he commented, "In a way the house is not technically as perfect as at first, but on the whole is, I think, even more attractive than at first."⁷⁷

1906-07 Additions

In February 1906, William Paige wrote Peabody & Stearns "Mrs. George L. Carnegie wishes to enlarge the service part of Plum Orchard House." The Carnegies wanted to replace the L shaped kitchen and service rooms built as part of the original house with a service wing nearly double the size. By filling in the L they would restore some of the symmetry of the original house.

The new work is to take the place of the present L, and to fill the space between the main house and the west line of the Squash court. The front of the addition can be made symmetrical with the addition at the west end. The roof of the addition can be managed by using a big deck in the centre, which can be fitted with skylights to admit light to the corridors and hallways.

The east front of the house is more or less visible from the Tennis Courts, and will be helped in appearance by the porches indicated.

We propose to take away the present L, and all of the old building which is between the dining room and the swimming pool. We shall want to use the sash, doors, pantry cases, etc., and as much of the old material as possible in the new work. The dining room chimney and the kitchen chimney can be left standing.

Paige wanted to begin the work about May 1 for "occupation next Fall."⁷⁸

The architects got right to work on the plans and on March 10 submitted their recommendations, which required rebuilding the kitchen chimney. On March 24 Paige responded that Mrs. Carnegie preferred her own scheme for the addition; evidently her wishes prevailed because the original kitchen chimney survives.⁷⁹ The architects submitted another set of corrected drawings on April

12, requesting final changes from their clients. Containing numerous questions about the as-built configuration of the house, the April 12 submittal reinforces the fact that Peabody & Stearns were working at a disadvantage without having seen Plum Orchard.⁸⁰

The structural changes must have been nearly complete by August 1906 when interior fixtures began to arrive. The J.L. Mott Iron Works of New York installed tile floors and wainscoting in the kitchen, kitchen pantry, butler's pantry and guest's bath, and a tile floor in the pantry annex.⁸¹

Thirteen polished marble slabs, more than five hundred feet of radiators, an expensive new Henderson Thermo Water Heater (@\$195), and a freezer arrived in subsequent months.⁸²

The service wing additions incorporated all the service functions of the original house although each was now greatly expanded. A storeroom was added, and the butler's pantry was doubled in size with an extension just for china storage. The addition of a housekeeper's office and a separate upstairs bathroom for the "housekeeper's exclusive use" may indicate increased responsibilities for the household staff.⁸³

Support Structures and the Yacht *Hornet*

Through the years the Carnegies built a number of secondary structures to support the Plum Orchard operation.

One or more cottages may have been built early on. In an 1899 letter Peabody & Stearns referred to a proposed cottage: "We should be very glad to make sketches for the small cottage house to which you refer; if you will send us the details of what you need, we will send you the drawings."⁸⁴ No subsequent references to the structure survive except in a rather enigmatic 1906 bill for insurance listing a "dwelling" that is distinct from the main house.

A likely interpretation of this bill is that the "cottage" listed here actually refers to the main house, which was triple insured to provide adequate coverage and that the "dwelling" is a separate structure.⁸⁵

According to a previously cited article a stable was erected on the property in advance of the main house to house workmen.⁸⁶ In 1902 a new stable was discussed with the architects Peabody & Stearns, but the commission was abandoned in favor of a more "home-made" version. William Paige explained this decision as follows:

In regard to Mr. George Carnegie's stable. When Mr. Carnegie asked you for drawings of a stable, his plan was to place his stable in full view opposite his house. An estimate on your plan even after making large deductions for simplifying the detail of finish, was almost twice as large as Mr. Carnegie was willing to pay; in fact to build a stable large enough for his purposes, and of proper character for such a situation, would involve too much cost, so the scheme was given up and Mr. Carnegie will content himself with a home-made "Barn" buried in the woods out of sight.⁸⁷

George Carnegie, on the other hand, explained the stable decision differently. "Mr. Page thinks the stable unsuitable for the place so I will not build it."⁸⁸ In any case, by December 1902 a stable stood "some 200 yards" from the east facade

of the house.⁸⁹ Whether this was the original stable or a 1902 replacement is unknown.

Tennis courts were present on the east end of the house by 1906, if not before. Discussing the 1906-07 additions to the house Paige wrote, "The east front of the house is more or less visible from the Tennis Courts..."⁹⁰

Plum Orchard acquired its own powerhouse equipped with two gasoline powered electric lighting sets in 1913. The Dungeness powerhouse, located eight miles away, was established as early as 1903 to serve all the Carnegie houses on the island. In 1903 Paige wrote that Plum Orchard was wired for direct current lighting. He was considering rewiring the house for alternating current instead of installing another powerhouse on the island.⁹¹ Maintaining service, however, to the distant Plum Orchard never proved economically satisfactory. With 480 lamps in 1903 and 1904, Plum Orchard's use of electricity was second only to Dungeness with 1200 lamps. A 1911 electrical inspection identified only 250 lights at Plum Orchard and 350 at Dungeness.⁹²

William Paige described the Plum Orchard powerhouse and accompanying engineer's, or electrician's, cottage as follows:

The powerhouse at Plum Orchard, Mr. George Carnegie's place, is a frame building about 24 feet by 28 feet, plastered with concrete on metal lath inside and outside and shingled with asbestos shingles. Two General Electric gasoline lighting sets are installed in the building, which, with accessories, cost about \$12,000. in 1913. Gasoline supply tank is buried more than 30 feet from building. The nearest building to the powerhouse is the engineer's cottage, of similar construction, about 75 feet away.... The powerhouse has only one story.⁹³

A new quarters building was constructed in 1917 and replaced an earlier dormitory. In 1919 Paige cited the quarters construction date as 1916, but

Paige's 1917 correspondence with Mrs. G.L. Carnegie indicates that the building was just then under way. Paige's letters to Margaret Thaw Carnegie indicate that one of her primary purposes in constructing the new building was to provide a sanitary environment for the Plum Orchard staff:

Your building, of reinforced concrete, vermin proof, with sanitary walls and floors, and, I believe embodying every one of your suggestions, can be built for \$9,000. Mr. Dankins preliminary figures for the building proper, iron sewer to connect with present sewer, and old building removed, are \$8,492. \$500. is an ample amount for transportation of material from Fernandina, for odds and ends of furnishings not belonging to the building and for cleaning up.⁹⁴

The completed building was described as follows:

The colored quarters is one building, about 35 feet by 60 feet, 2 story, built of reinforced concrete, excepting that the second floor joists and flooring and the frame of the roof are of wood. The roof is covered with asbestos shingles. The building cost about \$8,500. in 1916.⁹⁵

Margaret Thaw Carnegie contributed at least \$3,000, and possibly more, of the construction funds for the quarters building.⁹⁶ In 1919 William Paige summarized the buildings located on the Plum Orchard property for insurance purposes.

The list of outbuildings, excepting stable, which have been heretofore insured for Mr. George L. Carnegie, is:

One boat clearly associated with Plum Orchard was the Yacht Hornet. George L. Carnegie's mother presented the yacht to her son and his bride as a wedding gift in 1898.⁹⁸ Major repairs to the Hornet are documented in 1904.⁹⁹

Interior Furnishings

Sources of Plum Orchard's interior furnishings include newspaper accounts of wedding gifts to George and Margaret Carnegie, Lucy Carnegie's will, and financial records maintained by William Paige. Including a few invoices for object purchases, these financial records are dominated by freight bills for shipping household furnishings to Cumberland Island. Most informative are three photographs that survive of the George Carnegies' entrance hall, dining room, and men's room probably dating to the 1915-20 period (figs. 5, 6, and 7).

George and Margaret received lavish wedding gifts, which were displayed at the reception; several were enumerated in Pittsburgh newspapers. Since Plum Orchard was to be the couple's primary residence, they probably transported many of these gifts to Cumberland Island. In addition to the yacht from George's mother, the couple received from Mrs. Thaw a complete set of flatware from Tiffanys. Andrew Carnegie established a \$10,000 credit line at Tiffanys where Margaret selected a monogrammed, gold-lined silver tea service. Bowls matching the tea service came from George's brothers.

Among other things were quantities of cut glass, a complete punch set being one of the handsomer gifts coming from the Thaw side of the family. Many pieces of heavy silver plate, two tall brass candlesticks with huge tallow candles, the entire pieces being almost as tall as an old-fashioned clock of rosewood, on each side of which they stood. Another noticeable piece was a great antique silver loving cup. Many smaller pieces of silver and china and glass, with pictures, furniture and books, were among the tokens of friendship.¹⁰⁰

A 1912 codicil to Lucy Carnegie's will enumerated bequests to her survivors. Margaret Thaw Carnegie was to receive a set of china painted by Angelica Kauffman and George a "water color marine by Richards."¹⁰¹

Representative examples of Plum Orchard pieces documented by invoices and freight bills are itemized in appendix III. They include a wide range of material from books, statuary, and furniture to exterior awnings and tennis and stable supplies. The few surviving purchase receipts indicate that Margaret Carnegie purchased appliances, like a refrigerator and water softener, in Fernandina, Florida. She probably imported furniture and decorative pieces from farther away. Most of this material was shipped to the island from Brunswick, Georgia, via the Cumberland Route of the Brunswick & Florida Steamboat Company. Large shipments arrived nearly every month between October 1904 and December 1906. These shipments coincide with the completion of the 1902-04 additions to the house.

When photographed around 1915-20 (figs. 5, 6, and 7), the interiors had probably changed very little from their appearance in 1904-06 when the Carnegies redecorated Plum Orchard following the large addition. The photographs show high style furniture of the period, fine stained glass, and, in keeping with the sporting life on the island, a marked presence of mounted trophies and bear skins.

As previously mentioned, in 1917 Margaret Carnegie moved three boxes of furniture to the Library Bureau in Boston, probably in preparation for abandoning Plum Orchard as a primary residence.

Following George Carnegie's death in 1921 an inventory was taken of his personal property at Plum Orchard. Most of the furnishings were Margaret's. As she wrote William Paige, "he [George] had practically nothing at Plum Orchard except books." George's belongings were listed as follows.

By April 1924, when Margaret relinquished her interests in Plum Orchard, she had removed most of the contents. Her brother-in-law Thomas M. Carnegie II bought the remaining contents for \$1050.

THE JOHNSTON PERIOD, C.1924-73

With George Carnegie's death Plum Orchard became the island home of George's younger sister Nancy and her husband Marius E. Johnston, a doctor from Lexington, Kentucky. Nancy was the only child of Lucy Carnegie without her own home on Cumberland Island. She apparently met Marius Johnston when Lucy Carnegie employed him as the island doctor. Nancy Carnegie and Marius Johnston were married sometime prior to 1913. She brought to the marriage four children from a previous marriage, and they had a fifth child together. Exactly when the Johnstons occupied Plum Orchard is unknown although they probably moved in soon after Margaret Thaw Carnegie's divestiture of the property in 1924. The Johnstons had already spent many seasons on Cumberland Island. For four years prior to moving to Plum Orchard they stayed at Greyfield, the Ferguson family home.¹⁰³ Family tradition holds that the Johnstons furnished the house mainly with furniture from Dungeness plus some pieces brought from Lexington. These would have supplemented what few pieces Margaret Thaw Carnegie left at Plum Orchard. Since Lucy Carnegie had died in 1916 Dungeness was no longer in full operation. Maintaining any level of operation at Dungeness eventually drained the island resources and the

family effectively closed the mansion sometime between 1925 and 1930. It burned to the ground in 1959.¹⁰⁴

For the Johnstons the move to Plum Orchard was the beginning of a long and happy relationship with the property. When the National Park Foundation purchased Plum Orchard in 1973, three generations of Johnstons had raised their families there. The fourth generation were children at Plum Orchard in the 60s and early 70s.

The Johnstons used Plum Orchard on a seasonal basis only. Home base was Marius Johnston's native Lexington.

Family members recall that Nancy and Marius Johnston sometimes visited Cumberland Island during the winter months and sometimes in the spring.¹⁰⁵ Coleman Johnston said his parents arrived for Easter and stayed through Derby Day. Dedicated horsepeople that they were, Derby Day never passed without celebration at Plum Orchard.¹⁰⁶

Around 1937 Marius and Nancy Johnston were in a serious car accident as they were driving to Cumberland Island. They recuperated at Plum Orchard although neither fully regained their former vigor. After this time visits to the island were less frequent and, in fact, they never returned following the long interruption in island use caused by World War II.

From the mid-thirties to America's entrance in the war, the primary occupants of Plum Orchard were Nancy and Marius Johnston, their children and their families. These were Margaret Johnston Wright, Coleman C. Johnston, Lucy C. Johnston Graves, Thomas M.C. Johnston, and Marius E. Johnston Jr. Margaret, or Retta, Wright, the oldest and a highly organized and methodical individual, tended to manage the house during this period.

The years before the war were perhaps the most heavily used period during Plum Orchard's history. Often, several families came at once. Lucy Johnston

Graves' son, Joe Graves, whose memories of Plum Orchard begin about 1935, remembers being there together with Retta Wright and her husband as well as Coleman Johnston.¹⁰⁷ In fact, because organizing the household operation as well as all the attendant island activities required staff both inside and out, opening Plum Orchard for only one family was often not worth the trouble and expense. The Graves family came mostly in the spring. Joe remembers missing a lot of school in the spring when they visited the island; he frequently attended summer school in Lexington to make up the missed time.¹⁰⁸

The Johnstons' life-style at Plum Orchard is characterized by far less formality than that which surrounded the George Lauder Carnegie years. In contrast to the George Carnegie period, Coleman Johnston remembers no big formal dinners during his family's occupancy.¹⁰⁹ Like George and Margaret Carnegie, the Johnstons maintained a household staff, but it was considerably reduced from the earlier period. What had been servants' quarters in the second floor east wing now became a nursery and children's rooms.¹¹⁰

Records apparently kept by Retta Wright in 1941 outline a house staff of nine. It included Wihelmina Randolph, cook; Julian Bailey, butler; a chambermaid; two laundresses and four additional servants, two male and two female. Actual staff in Plum Orchard at any one time was probably somewhat smaller. In her accounts Mrs. Wright also noted people who took laundry in; the laundresses identified as staff may not have actually worked on the property. For the male staff she listed assigned duties, among them "One Man on duty every afternoon for Tea and Telephone."¹¹¹

Uniforms were probably the custom for all help during this period. References survive from 1940 and 1941 to ordering and laundering "Alpaca housemen's coats" and "butler's coats" and one 1940s photograph of the dining room shows a servant in livery.¹¹²

The caretaker during these years was Chester Holzendorf, and Joe Graves' childhood companion on the island was Chester's son William. The Holzendorfs lived in an existing two-story dwelling, located at the north end of the Plum Orchard compound.¹¹³

Up until the war, hunting and fishing continued to dominate island life. Like George Lauder Carnegie, Marius Johnston was a dedicated sportsman. Early in the century he joined a year-long big game expedition to Africa. With his friend and frequent visitor to Cumberland Island, Harry Whitney, Marius Johnston also journeyed to the Arctic. Plum Orchard's polar bear rug came from this expedition.

To the children he was the focal point of an active, and entertaining, life on the island. "Father knew every spot on the island." When horseback riding with his children, he would pretend to be lost and then challenge the children to find the way home. Coleman Johnston described his father once tying a live rattlesnake to the automobile running board. When released, the snake flicked its tail and "something hit father in the eye." "I believe I'm the only man who has had a rattlesnake piss in his eye," Marius responded. They proceeded to skin and cook the snake.¹¹⁴

Such delicacies were common on the island. Coleman Johnston's sister Lucy Graves described catching 30 skates in one day, and eating superb shrimp that usually "never made it to the dining room table."¹¹⁵

The Johnstons usually brought about five of their own horses along with some milk cows in a freight car to Cumberland Island. As a teenager, Coleman Johnston participated in rodeos at the Stafford Corral. Together with Lucy and Bob Ferguson, Marius Johnston engineered track racing on the island, ensuring that the fire line cut by the WPA was oval.¹¹⁶

There were 600 to 1,000 head of cattle on the island in the 20s and 30s and Joe Graves remembers cattle being dipped for ticks each year near Stafford.¹¹⁷

In time Marius Johnston assumed much of the animal husbandry responsibilities for the entire island. At the May 1936 meeting of the trustees of Lucy Carnegie's estate Marius Johnston and Bob Ferguson were charged with managing everything concerning the island horses and cattle.¹¹⁸

Finally, the sporting life on the island was sustained by a golf course, located between the Stafford barn and beach road.¹¹⁹

During the war years Plum Orchard remained vacant, its furniture covered with sheets. The U.S. Coast Guard set up beach patrols on the island and used the Plum Orchard stable, among other island structures, for its horses.¹²⁰

After the war, life at Plum Orchard changed in many ways. First, management of the house gradually shifted to the third generation of the Johnston family, now approaching adulthood. Marius and Nancy Carnegie Johnston, in fact, did not return to the island after the war. Much of the responsibility for maintaining the house fell to Joe Graves who, as a recent college graduate, began to return to the island in the early 1950s. Joe's Transylvania College friend Homer Hail, who became president of the Cumberland Island Historical Foundation in 1986, also began visiting the island regularly with Joe in the 1950s.

Second, the formality of island life established early in the century that had diminished somewhat in the 30s and 40s now disappeared completely. In contrast to the sizeable staff that supported Plum Orchard before the war, the Graves and Johnston families depended largely on a series of couples that acted as caretakers during the 50s and 60s. Sometimes they would also bring along a cook from Lexington.

Less help, in fact, was needed. Like many other Americans, the Carnegie family became very serious minded and career oriented in the postwar period. Coleman Johnston, for instance, was now establishing his career as a surgeon. As a result, visits to the island were less frequent and shorter in duration.

With fewer people occupying Plum Orchard more room was available. Instead of occupying one of the support structures, the caretakers now lived inside the mansion. As Joe Graves has explained, even the hunting and fishing that characterized the prewar years were largely abandoned. The extreme sociability associated with these early activities depended on large numbers of participants.¹²¹

Certainly the fun that always characterized island life continued, but there were new forms of entertainment after the war. Nancy Butler has described big lively parties that were combined family efforts. They were generally thrown with little or no help from staff.¹²²

The postwar Plum Orchard is perhaps best described as a true 20th century vacation home, an isolated and even primitive getaway from everyday existence, as opposed to its earlier use as an alternate residence complete with every comfort of home.

Specific uses for Plum Orchard's many rooms are better documented for this period than any other. The large room at the west end of the house that the George Lauder Carnegies had created as a "Men's Room" became the "Big Room" or "Game Room" to the modern generation. The children frequently occupied this room after dinner while the adults spent evenings in the library. Among other activities the children staged their own plays in the Game Room. It was here that Nancy Johnston Butler was married in 1968. The entrance hall was always called just that, never the Great Hall.

Plum Orchard's master bedroom, the large room on the west end of the second story, was not regularly occupied by one family during the '50s and '60s. Used as a bedroom by both Margaret Thaw Carnegie and Nancy Carnegie Johnston, the room was now reserved for guests or sometimes became a girls' dormitory. Coleman Johnston's daughter, Lucy J. McKinstry, remembers slumber parties here with her friends. The room contained the polar bear rug from her grandfather's arctic expedition and became the "Bear Room" to the children. Thomas M.C. Johnston occupied bedroom 205 full time for a year in the 1950s and installed the wood stove in the adjoining bathroom at this time. The most musical member of the family, he is remembered fondly for playing the violin and piano at Plum Orchard. Joe Graves remembers occupying different bedrooms but frequently room 213 located just east of the colonnaded porch. Joe associates the middle bedroom, room 208, with his Aunt Retta Wright. As a child Joe remembers occupying all three nursery rooms on the north side of

the second floor. A nanny usually accompanied the family and lived in room 232 in the north wing. The caretakers lived in room 119, on the first floor of the north wing, which George and Margaret Carnegie had designed as a gun room. The caretakers used the area north of the large kitchen as their dining room. While the swimming pool was used frequently in the '50s and '60s, the squash court is a vestige from the early Plum Orchard and was rarely used after the war.

The Johnston family had Plum Orchard painted in 1959, and in 1966 power lines reached this end of the island. Before this time Plum Orchard, like the other island houses, was powered by its own generator.¹²³ Thomas M.C. Johnston had replaced the generator plant in 1954, probably in connection with his extended sojourn at the house.¹²⁴

When the last of Lucy Carnegie's children, Florence Carnegie Perkins, died in 1962, the trust governing the Carnegie holdings on Cumberland Island ended. In his historic resource study, Louis Torres describes the dissolution of the trust and the division of the island property among the heirs. Joe Graves also discussed this process when interviewed in 1986.¹²⁵ Generally the island houses were dispersed to the branches of the family with which each had traditionally been associated, and Plum Orchard appropriately became Johnston family property.

During the 1950s and '60s it became increasingly apparent to the family, as well as to independent conservation agencies, that the island's remarkable natural and scenic resources were in danger of irreversible compromise. No sooner had the family successfully fought mining the beaches for titanium than private developers began to make inroads on the island. Developer Charles Fraser's bid to create a planned community here is portrayed by John McPhee in *Encounters with the Archdruid*.¹²⁶ Acting fully in the spirit of Lucy Carnegie's early intentions to preserve the island, the family turned to the Interior Department. Plum Orchard, in fact, was the stage for many meetings with department officials. In 1971 Plum Orchard, twelve surrounding acres, and \$50,000 were donated by the Johnston family to the National Park foundation. With the assistance of the National Park Foundation, which purchased much

of the island for the National Park Service, Cumberland Island was designated a national seashore on October 23, 1972. Following the purchase, the Johnston family donated most of the Plum Orchard furnishings to the National Park Foundation, which in turn transferred them to the National Park Service.

Interior Furnishings

The most complete information about Plum Orchard's interior furnishings during the Johnston years is contained in a 1972 appraisal of the building's contents prepared in connection with the donation of this material to the National Park Foundation and in a 1983 inventory taken by the National Park Service before removing the household contents to safe storage to begin exterior restoration (appendixes IV and V). Photographs of many of the rooms taken in 1970 also provide valuable documentation of the interiors (figs. 26-32). The Johnston family descendants, in fact, made few changes to the interiors established by Marius and Nancy C. Johnston in the 1920s. As a result, these records accurately reflect the house over the 50-year period that the family occupied it.

How much Margaret Thaw Carnegie left in the house is unknown. At least one finely crafted piece, a desk, that was photographed at Plum Orchard during the George Lauder Carnegie years accompanied the house to the present.

As previously mentioned, the house was refurnished in the 1920s primarily with pieces from Dungeness, which closed about the same time. No Plum Orchard pieces can be identified in historic views of the Dungeness interiors, but the heavily carved Renaissance or Jacobean style pieces that descended with Plum Orchard closely resemble those seen at Dungeness.¹²⁷ And photographs show that Margaret Thaw Carnegie initially selected similar pieces for Plum Orchard.

Different in style is the French Empire revival furniture dating from the last quarter of the 19th century that served Plum Orchard's master bedroom. This furniture has always been associated with Lucy Carnegie's bedroom at Dungeness.¹²⁸

Interestingly, the Johnstons seem to have duplicated the George Lauder Carnegie interiors quite closely, replacing pieces almost one for one. Where Margaret and George had placed a hall table or a long bench, so did the Johnstons.

The Johnstons brought some pieces from Lexington. They brought a library desk, a dining room sideboard, and a side table from Marius Johnston's Lexington house following his death. Margaret Wright located other pieces, specifically the dining table in Virginia and a sugar chest in Kentucky.¹²⁹

Pieces of china at Plum Orchard numbered more than 400. They included a set of gold china and dessert plates monogrammed with "LCC," transferred no doubt from Dungeness.

Nancy Johnston had upholstery work done in Jacksonville. In 1940 she ordered slipcovers for two sofas and two chairs and had two additional sofas and a chair cleaned. At the same time she purchased six candle shields and two "fruit paintings on velvet" at \$25 each.¹³⁰

Because so many different people occupied the house over the years, a strong continuity was preserved, perhaps inadvertently, in the interiors. With the property in trust until the 1960s, family members took extra care to respect what was community property. And the caretakers assisted in this tradition, immediately replacing in its original location any pieces that were moved about during a visit.¹³¹

Plum Orchard's contents were appraised in September 1972 by S. Blaisdell of Parke-Bernet, Inc. The appraised value, less certain individually owned pieces that were included by mistake in the appraisal, was \$40,495.¹³² In November 1978, family members removed from the house those items not included in the donation to the Park Service. Most of these items were china, glass, and silver stored in the pantry. In 1980 Margaret Wright returned her share of the dinnerware to enable the Park Service to more fully interpret the dining room.¹³³

GARDENS

Outdoor life was as important as indoor life on the island. At Plum Orchard, like at Dungeness, the Carnegies imposed order on the natural island landscape with a formal ornamental garden and vegetable gardens. Although records are limited of the George Lauder Carnegies' impact on the landscape, it is clear that they, and the Johnstons after them, improved the grounds. Nancy Carnegie Johnston's descendants consider her the chief architect of the Plum Orchard gardens. Her personal gardening journals, donated to the park by her granddaughter Nancy Johnston Butler, preserve some of the history of the Plum Orchard grounds.

Surviving records indicate that the George Carnegies may have been chiefly concerned with growing vegetables on the property. Between 1904 and 1906 they placed five major orders for vegetable plants, including one for strawberry plants in November 1905. In June and December 1905 George Carnegie bought tobacco dust and tobacco stems, probably for use as an insecticide. In December 1906, they also bought "bulbs" and "perennials." Judging from the dates of the orders, planting took place mainly between December and February.¹³⁴

Landscaping records for the Johnston period are particularly good for the late 1930s, which may indicate that these were active years in garden development at Plum Orchard. These records begin in 1934 with an order for eight azaleas.¹³⁵ Mrs. Marius Johnston placed numerous garden orders between 1937 and 1940. In 1937 she hired the Jacksonville landscape consultant Richard Forester who provided several designs for Plum Orchard. In March 1937 he billed the Johnstons for four visits to the property.¹³⁶ Forester may have designed the formal garden to the north of the house that appears in photographs dating to c.1939 (figs. 19-21). Forester apparently was a nurseryman as well as designer. In September 1937 he provided the Johnstons

with 1000 Narcissus bulbs, 100 Easter lily bulbs, and 25 white calla lilies.¹³⁷ Easter lilies are visible in photographs of the formal garden and family members associate calla lilies with Nancy C. Johnston and thereafter her daughter, Lucy Johnston Graves, who both regularly brought arrangements of callas into the house. A former caretaker for the property remembers callas located around the pond. They were home to sometimes as many as three alligators.¹³⁸ The footbridge that once spanned the Plum Orchard pond is seen in figure 18.




Figure 22. Plum Orchard garden, n.d. [c.1939].

Figures 19-21 illustrate the formal garden around 1939. At its center was a round lily pond with fountain. A greenhouse and vegetable or cutting garden appears in photos from the same period (figs. 22 and 23). How early there was a greenhouse on the property is unknown.

In his study of the historic landscape at Plum Orchard, J.F. Avriett points out that fruit trees were used extensively as landscape features, both in the formal garden area and among the support structures behind it. Cherry laurel, used as a hedging for the formal garden, survives at Plum Orchard in the form of small trees.¹³⁹

Coleman Johnston remembered a vegetable garden, with “beautiful strawberries,” located to the north of the formal garden, together with the “chicken coops and pheasant pens.” This was probably the garden seen in figures 22 and 23. Pine needles provided a perfect mulch for the vegetables. He also recalled his mother’s rose garden, located behind the fountain, and barely visible in figures 19 and 20.¹⁴⁰ Located quite a distance from the house and offering no views from the house, these were gardens rooted more in the 19th than the 20th century. The gardens may have offered another dimension to experiencing the island, one that was entirely separate from the house parties and sporting activities that dominated island life.

With little help available in the post war years and with different expectations for their life on the island, the younger Johnstons never became the gardeners that their parents were and the gardens gradually succumbed to natural overgrowth, until finally only outlines of the garden borders survived.

FURNISHINGS PLAN

INTERPRETIVE OBJECTIVES

Plum Orchard should be interpreted to c.1971 when the National Park Foundation received the house and most of the contents in donation. Good documentation exists for this period. Furthermore, the 1971 interiors best represent the full history of the structure. By all accounts the 1971 interiors changed little from their appearance as established by Dr. Marius and Nancy Carnegie Johnston around 1925. And the senior Johnstons apparently duplicated many of their predecessors', George Lauder and Margaret Thaw Carnegie, choices in furnishing Plum Orchard.

At this writing Plum Orchard is the only major Carnegie house that is accessible on Cumberland Island. Dungeness burned in 1959, and Stafford remains in private hands. Plum Orchard, therefore, forms a logical stage from which to interpret the Carnegies' long association with Cumberland Island, particularly the domestic aspects of that story. Exhibits treating the Carnegies' life on the island are available in the ice house, centrally located at Dungeness dock. Interpreting Plum Orchard provides an opportunity to expand that story to a more dimensional interpretation of the island houses.

Interpretation at Plum Orchard focuses on three objectives: Plum Orchard's history, from construction and early expansions through its many occupants; life at the house throughout its history; and the role of Plum Orchard and the Carnegies in the preservation of Cumberland Island. Each objective will be met most successfully by placing the Plum Orchard story within the context of the other Carnegie houses on the island.

OPERATIONAL CONSIDERATIONS

This furnishings plan includes two alternatives for media development at Plum Orchard. The first alternative describes furnishings development in four rooms. A significant investment in wallpaper restoration and textile reproduction is required to implement alternative I. **Both alternatives require increased staffing, security measures, and upgrades to deficient mechanical and electrical systems, particularly the wiring.** The second is designed for current visitation levels and outlines furnishings development only in the dining room, with minimal exhibitry elsewhere on the first floor.

Because more park visitors currently see Plum Orchard from the outside than from the inside both alternatives identify exterior wayside exhibits as the first priority. Likewise, both reserve the game room on the west end of the house primarily as exhibit space rather than as a refurnished interior. As exhibit space, the room requires no staff and serves as a holding area for visitors waiting to tour the house. The Historic Structure Report for Plum Orchard, recommended a maximum load of ten people on the west end of the second floor. Consequently, house tours should be limited to that number. The game room will provide shelter and diversion for those awaiting the tour.


For both alternatives the primary means of interpreting Plum Orchard's interiors is by guided tour. The interpretive program depends largely on the quality of personal services provided during the tour. Although the exact route should be defined by experienced park staff, we recommend that tours proceed from the game room to the master bedroom suite and down the main stairway. After viewing the kitchen, the tour climaxes in the entrance hall where a second guide (staff, volunteer, or concessioner) is stationed. Visitors can view the entrance hall, library, and dining room on their own, and exit through the front door at their own pace, thus releasing the guide for the next group.

ALTERNATIVE I—Preferred Interpretive Media Development (designed for regular visitation and continuous staffing)

Exterior Interpretation: One wayside exhibit located on the south approach to Plum Orchard and one near the front entrance. Plans for such exhibits were approved in 1978 as part of a parkwide wayside plan. With revisions reflecting current operations, these plans will form the basis for production.

Interior Interpretation: The following media will supplement the personally guided tour.

- The west porch and game room provide orientation and a holding area for visitors awaiting the tour. The east sliding doors remain closed until the guide invites the next group to the tour. In addition, media outlined conceptually on the accompanying drawing provides introductory interpretation of the mansion's historic interiors and island living during the Carnegie era.
- The dining room, entrance hall, library, and master bedroom are refurbished with park collections to c.1971 when the National Park Foundation acquired the house. Visitors view the dining room from the entrance hall where a simple barrier spans the dining room doorway.

 - In the entrance hall, a full color photo of the hanging glass lamp is superimposed on a black and white enlargement of the room as it appeared in 1915-20.
 - An enlargement of a 1915-20 photo of the game room sits on the piano in that room.
 - In the library, a full color photograph illustrates the north end of the room with its furnishings. Producing this image will require the short-term installation of several objects for a photograph session, and the subsequent return of the objects to secure storage.




Figure 26. Plum Orchard, library and entrance hall, 1970.





I send you by mail pencil sketches indicating Mrs. George Carnegie's ideas as to the additions to Plum Orchard House.

Mrs. Carnegie wishes to break up the symmetry which was preserved in the sketches you forwarded herein the summer. It may be that this scheme suggested in our sketch will break it up altogether too much.

In order that the addition at the west end, with the living rooms in it, may not be too high in comparison with the main house, it is proposed to make the clear height of the lower story 10 feet 6 inches, and of the upper story 9 feet 6 inches. Steps will then have to be introduced in the second story at some point on the way from the old to the new part.

The height of the Swimming Pool building can be adjusted to a mean between the height of the old house and of the west addition. Some irregularity in treatment of openings in the south side will give variety to the front elevation. The east end of the Swimming Pool addition will be approached by a road, and the elevation should be treated with some emphasis. Cellars will be built under the main part of both additions.

So far as the outside details of the new additions will follow the details of the old house it will not be necessary for you to furnish detail drawings, as we have on file here all the drawings of the original house. It is proposed to finish the west addition in the first story in oak or other hard wood, and the second story in white wood or white pine painted white. No paint will be permissible in the inside finish of the Swimming Pool building, as the sulphur fumes from our Artesian water affect the color. Hard pine treated with an acid stain or some similar process will be more satisfactory.

I hope that you will be able to furnish preliminary sketches following Mrs. Carnegie's ideas at your earliest convenience in order that the working drawings may be done in time for us to begin work by the first of February.

Dear Sirs:—

Mr. and Mrs. George Carnegie have gone over carefully the plans submitted by you for additions to their house. They have decided that scheme A in its general features must be adopted. They appreciate that the scheme you propose substituting for this makes a better building, but the arrangement of the east wing is impossible for their purpose. The addition shuts the air away from the rooms at the east end of the house, cutting off the prevailing breezes in the warm spring season. They also believe that the general appearance of the house will be better suited to the arrangement of the grounds if scheme A is following with some minor changes, therefore they have decided to adopt scheme A.

Mrs. Carnegie was dissatisfied with the arrangement of the rooms in the second floor of the west wing as first submitted to you, and submits the enclosed sketches as a substitute. The only practical embarrassment I find in this new arrangement is the management of the chimney in Mrs. Carnegie's room. We propose that the fireplace and chimney be carried by steel beams from the second floor, so as not to spoil the window arrangement in the room below.

The following notes will assist you in getting out the working plans:

The Library ceiling will be lowered to height of new rooms and finished plain, as any beams required to carry the floor above can be hidden.

Finish of west wing is to be in keeping with that of the main house. Mens' rooms to be finished in dark oak, second story rooms to be finished white.

A cellar will be built under the Hall and stairway, and the cellar stairs should go down under the staircase.

On first floor use windows which do not reach to the floor.

Use west porch as on drawings, with steps to the west. Omit steps on south side opposite the Hall.

East wing, cover the passage Marked "Pergola" with a porch roof. If it is desirable to lengthen this wing, make the court 38 feet long instead of 34 feet, and add 3 or 4 feet to the space east of it. Do not lengthen the pool, but allow the extra space between the pool and the dressing rooms.

A cellar goes under this wing where the pool does not occur, with an entrance from the north side. A cellar stairway might be worked in under the [?] stairway which is wide enough for a man to go up and down.

The east face of this wing now centres with the stable some 200 yards away.

If we change the arrangement inside, we do not get as pleasant a room, and run against many inconveniences.

As the grounds are laid out, I do not think that the extending of this wing south of main line of the house would be offensive.

All porches and open passages on the new and old house are to have cement floors.

For the sake of cellar ventilation, it seems desirable to use brick and steel beam construction for all the porches except those attached to the east wing and possibly the west porch. The wooden terrace in front of the old house is a failure. The sun is so hot that it draws the most carefully laid flooring out of position.

By the next mail I will send you a little sketch showing changes which Mrs. Carnegie wants made in the region of the servants' staircase in the old house.

The fixtures in the North-west Bath room in the old house are to be placed in the closet in the south side over the front entrance. I understand it will be possible to run the soil pipe down the outside pilaster.

It is proposed to face the Squash Court walls with wood. In the Squash Court built at Dungeness we used cement successfully, but I understand that the wood facing has some advantages. What has been your experience?

Abundant light should be let in to the Squash Court through the roof as well as on the two sides under the eaves.

We use here hot water circulation in the heating apparatus. Will it not be cheaper to put a new heater for the west wing in the cellar of the west wing than to double the capacity of the old heater (which is nearly under the dining room) to heat from it the west wing. The Swimming Pool also requires a heater of moderate size, and a bank of seven or eight pipes will be laid around the pool, near the bottom, to keep the water at about the average temperature at which it is delivered at the Artesian pipes. This temperature is about 76. In winter we find that the water cools rapidly in the pool, even if the room is at a temperature of nearly 80, unless pipes are introduced in the pool.

I believe I have covered all the points that are necessary at present.

Dear Sirs:—

Mrs. George L. Carnegie would like you to change the window treatment over the pool in the east wing of the addition to her house. She would prefer two separate windows, and possibly some ventilating window above. The present window she considers too large and conspicuous for the building.

Mrs. Carnegie wishes the hall and mens' room in the west wing finished in very dark oak. In the hall the ceiling will be plain plaster, and there will be no wainscoting. In the mens' room there are to be heavy plain ceiling beams and a high wainscot. Mrs. Carnegie is undecided whether the wainscot should be (say) about five feet high, ranging with the mantel shelf, or considerably higher, leaving only a frieze of plaster about the room, and wishes suggestions on this point.

It is decided to double the studding in the mens' room and in Mrs. Carnegie's apartments above. It will not be necessary to change your framing plans, simply notify us the most desirable thickness to make the walls, and then we can send you the exact measures before you make the drawings for the inside finish.
