Subject: Discontinuance of Superintendent's Monthly Narrative Report

The Superintendent's Monthly Narrative Report is one of the oldest reports still existing in the Service. It originated under the first Director and continues today as Report NPS(AM)-4. In the past, the Monthly Narrative Report was the one dependable means of documenting the general history of a park. There was a time when it was the report and as such, recorded the significant accomplishments, milestones, problems, and events that from month to month presented the story of the park.

The Service has expanded and grown in many ways since the first Superintendent's Monthly Narrative Report. Authority and responsibilities have been widely decentralized, and our programs have increased until we are now a complex organization. For a long time, the Washington Office has been concerned about the time spent in the laborious drafting of monthly reports by Rangers, Naturalists, and others in the park organizations as well as in the clerical effort involved. Many people now are involved in preparing material for the NPS(AM)-4. Such report writing takes many man-hours of time and energy.

Today, a majority of the items in the Monthly Narrative Report are covered in correspondence, in response to specific reporting requirements in Part II of the "Reports Management Handbook," or in other ways. As a result the Monthly Narrative Report, which is probably the most expensive report we have in the Service, has become highly redundant.

A recent study conducted by the Division of Management Analysis, at the request of the Director, recommended that the Superintendent's Monthly Narrative Report be discontinued. This recommendation has been approved by the Office of the Director and takes effect June 30, 1967. No Superintendent's Monthly Narrative Reports will be required after the June 1967

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report. The estimated saving in cost of preparation, based on standards developed by the National Archives and Records Service, approximates \$270,000 annually, and does not include the costs of the review process. In addition, the elimination of this report will help to ease the mounting paperwork burden in the field,

A requirement still exists for certain types of information to be recorded for historical purposes at the park level. Therefore, effective July 1, 1967, a LOG OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS AND IMPORTANT be simple, concise, and up to date. It should include brief notes in chronological order on: (1) important visitors; (2) special significant public contacts; (3) important events such as major catastrophes, floods, or fires, volcanic or earthquake activity causing permanent damage to historic or natural sites; (4) inspections, appraisals, or investigations; and any other information tions, appraisals, or investigations; and any other information tions, appraisals, or investigations; and any other information that, in the Superintendent's opinion, would constitute valuable historical source material, This "log" should be maintained as part of the permanent records of the park.

The monthly reports now required from each Regional Director will become the main document through which significant events and happenings can be reported to this Office. Here again, however, please avoid duplication of reporting for we do not wish to build the Regional report into more than just a brief but meaningful document.

The reports now required from Superintendents of new areas (Report NPS (SLR)-1) will be continued until such time as this Office determines, in each instance, that they should be discontinued.

This memorandum may be destroyed upon receipt of an amendment deleting Report NPS (AM)-4 from Part II of the "Reports Management Handbook," or for record purposes on August 1, 1967.

General

Weather Conditions: The extreme and prolonged drought was ended with a total of 5.86 inches of rainfall at the Park, which was slightly above normal. Temperatures averaged about normal for the month.

Decrease in Travel: A total of 21,165 visits was recorded for the month, which represents a decrease of 3% below June 1966.

Administration

Personnel: Ranger Historian Paul Slason entered on duty June 26.

Safety and Health: Ranger Huggins attended a safety committee meeting on June 1. The main topic of discussion was the importance of day to day elimination of safety hazards.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Services: 5,290 visitor contacts were made by uniformed personnel during the month. Three tours were given educational groups totaling 56 pupils.

Protection: Robert Franklin Palmer, apprehended April 21 for breaking and entering a visitor's automobile at Matanzas Beach, entered a plea of guilty in state court on June 3. A pre-sentence investigation is being held. Charges against Mrs. Palmer were dismissed upon recommendation by the prosecuting attorney.

On June 15, Ranger Huggins apprehended two Fort Lauderdale, Florida men for breaking and entering a beach visitor's automobile. They have been released on bond awaiting trial in State Court.

Wildlife: Two deer have been seen a number of times in the Visitor Center area of the Park.

Maintenance: Bids on the docks repair project were opened on June 12, and a contract was awarded Building Maintenance Corporation, Arlington, Virginia, in the amount of \$11,150.

Concessioners: The ferry concession operated 29 days during the month, transporting a total of 2,326 visitors to the fort.



SUPERINTENDENT'S MONTHLY NARRATIVE REPORT

for EVERGLADES NATIONAL PARK

June 1967

General

Weather Conditions: June's weather was hot, humid and wet and brought about the season's first onslaught of mosquitoes and other annoying insects.

Small craft warnings were flown on 2½ days.

The Taylor Slough gauge read 4.12' at month's end compared to 4.50' for June 1966. Water levels on the Anhinga Trail rose from below ground level and peaked at 4.16 feet on June 17. By the end of the month the level was back down to 3.80 feet. Pumping into the slough ceased shortly after the first of the month.

Increase in Travel: Visitation increased by 8.7% with a total of 70,242 persons visiting the Park as compared to 64,595 last June. Camping was up 117.5% over June of last year.

<u>Special Activities:</u> Ranger personnel spent 67 man hours with VIP's and cooperating agencies.



Glades District personnel stood by with fire equipment during Aerojet General's test firing of a solid fuel missile engine which developed 5.4 million pounds of thrust.

Mr. W. J. Kaland and Mr. Meredith of Westinghouse Broadcasting Company filmed a story on the Park. They were taken along the Shark Valley Loop Road and given an interview.

Mr. Fred G. Vosburgh, National Geographic Society, was escorted along the Shark Valley Loop Road for photographs and current information on the drought.

Chief Park Naturalist Miller, Asst. Chief Park Naturalist Tillman, Park Naturalist Inman, Park Naturalist Zimmer, Superintendent Allin attended the annual Ranger Aid dinner on June 5, at which the Superintendent spoke.

Training: Considerable time was spent during June orienting Park Naturalist Inman. Park Naturalist Zimmer accompanied her to Shark Valley on June 14, and Seasonal Naturalist Neusaenger to Fairchild Gardens on June 18. She accompanied Chief Park Naturalist Miller on a tour of the Park and the Flamingo area on June 12 and spent the day of June 21 with Supervisory Park Naturalist Mrazek.

Administration

Entrance Station: Entrance station receipts for the month totaled \$4,183.60. The total for 1967 fiscal year - \$104,354.50.

Mangrove District rangers contributed 54 hours of their own time.

Management Analysis: The morning of the June 19 was devoted by the Superintendent to an accounting conference. The afternoon of the same day was devoted to the restudying of quarters accounts and rental charges.



Carl W. Walden, Jr., Operator General (LD), promoted to Maintenanceman at Fort Jefferson National Monument 6/4/67.

Edomo P. Mazzer, promoted CAO from Supervisory Park Ranger, GS-7, Glen Canyon National Recreation Area, to Supervisory Park Naturalist, GS-11 at Fort Jefferson National Monument, 6/4/67.



Supervisory Park Naturalist Mrazek accepted a promotion to GS-11 at Cape Hatteras National Seashore on June 8. He reported on duty July 2, and will be the Assistant Chief, I&RM for Cape Hatteras. Mrazek was on annual leave June 17 to June 24.

Seasonal Ranger Naturalist George E. Neusaenger was converted from WAE to full-time seasonal status on June 14 and then resigned his position on June 28 to accept an appointment to the Albright Training Center.

Safety and Health: Two safety inspections were made of all interpretive trails. All major hazards have been eliminated and the others programmed for improvement. At Mahogany Hammock, the heavy rain caused a slumping mahogany tree to block the boardwalk trail. The trail will be rebuilt around the tree.

The monthly safety meeting was conducted by the Chairman of the Safety Committee.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Facilities: Information services in the Parachute Key Visitor Center were moved from the lobby into the converted auditorium on June 1. The new book display purchased by the Everglades Natural History Association was brought in on June 1 and placed in the building.

Asst. Chief Naturalist Tillman spent time during the month searching for designs and estimates for a railing for the Visitor Center mural.

An air conditioning unit was placed in the Royal Palm Information Station on June 30.

A Reminton cash register was purchased for the Parachute Key Visitor Center by the Everglades Natural History Association on June 15.

A preconstruction meeting was held on June 29 in regard to the contract for air conditioning in the Parachute Key Visitor Center.

Follow-up was made with the Branch of Motion Pictures and Audiovisual Services during the month to have a copy made of the WTVT television movie on alligator poaching. By this time a copy should have been made by the Branch and hopefully we will get a copy in the near future.

The alligator exhibit on Anhinga was removed and shopped to the Eastern Museum Laboratory on June 4 for repairs.

Some 71 35mm. slides were added to the Park slide collection during the month of June.



The exhibits in five lift boxes were renovated in June and are ready to be reinstalled on the interpretive trails.

Interpretive Services: Naturalists began using a small fogging device in the lobby of the Flamingo Visitor Center before evening programs.

The new Park folder is now being given to visitors at the Visitor Center and Gulf Coast District.

A trail marker on the Sandfly Island trail was replaced and the sign on Kingston Key which had been blasted at close range by a shotgun was repaired and reset.

Informal interpretive contacts were made during Ranger patrols along the Shark Valley Loop Road and Observation Tower in order to better inform the visitor why various wildlife populations vary seasonally according to surface water levels. Brief informal discussions are well received by visitors and add to their enjoyment of the area.


Research and Observations: Dr. Martin Zimmerman, Bussey Institute, Harvard, University visited the Park with Dr. Tomlinson on June 7 and 11 to discuss our tree ring studies. Dr. Zimmerman is a recognized authority on tree growth and movement of liquids in trees. On June 7, Dr. Bierhorst from Cornell Univ. came along. He is working on the gametophytes of ferns. This is the sexual stage of the ferns, a small green thallus that is rarely seen and has not been described for many of our ferns.

State Game Biologists continued their study of alligator populations along the Shark Valley Loop Road and at the Tower during the month. Nine alligators were tagged, sex identified, and then released. Ranger Winte and Biologist Hines were flown by helicopter over the Shark Valley to acquaint Hines with the numerous and populated alligator ponds. Landings were made at 8 gator holes for population estimates and counts.

Alligators have left the tower moat and have scattered into the flooded glades. Few remain for visitor observation.

Ten great white herons were noted frequently at barrow pits along the Shark Valley Loop Road. The pits are attracting an unusual number of them during low water this year. An immature Bald Eagle was noted at Barrow Pit No. 3 & 4. Two others were noted more frequently along L-67 extension.

An airboat trip down the Shark Valley to the headwaters of the Shark River was given to Biologists Robertson and Ogden to study large concentrations of Egret and White Ibis nesting areas.



A large funnel cloud near Manatee Creek was observed for ten minutes on June 10.

One old crocodile nest was found on Long Beach near Little Madeira Bay.

The small rookery of Egrets in Rodgers River Bay, the rookery of Pelicans and Cormorants on Rat Terde Key, and the rookery of White Ibis in Chokoloskee Bay all seem to be doing well.

A series of sea turtle crawl study plots has been set up on Highland Beach and Tiger Key in cooperation with the Park Management Biologist. Many sea turtle nest sites which have almost all been destroyed by raccoons have been noted on several outside island beaches. On kingston Key, the most heavily crawled in the north end of the Gulf Coast District, a nest still being raided was found on the 19th and 41 eggs from it were placed in a simulated nest near the ranger station.

Park Naturalist Zimmer and Park Ranger Hougham spent the day of June 21 in Florida Bay searching for diamond back turtles and nests. No turtle activity was found but one crocodile nest was discovered.

<u>Protection</u>: Warning citations were issued for: possession of firearms, speeding, fishing in closed waters, driving vehicle in closed area, failure to have an adequate safety chain on a boat trailer causing an accident, and indecent exposure.

Alligator poaching court case is pending.

Six boat search and rescues were conducted by ranger personnel.

One derelict boat was towed in from South Nest Key and two boats were seized in the vicinity of Graveyard Creek and towed to Flamingo.

Three court cases were heard: two for driving in a closed area; failure to pay the impkeeper at Flamingo; two cases of vandalism to park signs were investigated. 104 non-commercial and 15 commercial boats were contacted and checked on the water in the Gulf Coast District.

Rising waters caused increased airboat activity. Three cases of airboat trespass by commercial froggers were noted.

Two minor motor vehicle accidents were investigated.

Patrol mileage: Vehicle 16,465; boat 3,451; glades vehicle 54; airboat 412; Park plane 5,800.

Forest Fire Protection: Five fire fighting units were "mothballed" until next fire season. This will allow more time to be spent in operating the remaining units; this is necessary during the summer because of the increased humidity and breakdowns that occur.

Total fire patrol mileage for the 1966-67 fire season was:

East Boundary Patrol --- 18,163 miles (100.9 miles per day)

Long Pine Key Patrol --- 17,627 miles (97.9 miles per day)

Insects and Tree Diseases: A US Public Health Service team was in the Flamingo area for several days studying yellow fever possibilities.

<u>Building Fire Protection</u>: A new 50 lb. ${\rm CO_2}$ fire extinguisher on wheels arrived on the 13th and was placed in service in the oil house of the Gulf Coast District.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: Nine-Mile Pond was opened to fishing and boating on June 16 and Rookery Branch opened the 21st. The Cape Sable loggerhead turtle project was completed about mid-month.

Superintendent contacted Dr. Idyll of the Institute of Marine Science of the U. of Miami regarding work being done for the NPS under contract. This contract cannot be continued without proper funding.

<u>Maintenance</u>: The old tables at South Lostmans Beach primitive . campsite were rebuilt.

Willows and brush were cut back from along the Shark Valley Loop Road and from airboat trails out from the Tower and Tamiami Ranger Station.

Concessioners: Colorful poolside equipment was purchased by the Everglades Park Co., and enhances the area considerably.

 Λ station wagon is being prepared by the Park Co. for emergency road service and area security.

The Superintendent spent three days in planning with members of the Everglades Park Co., Inc. and Mr. John Pennekamp, Assoc. Editor of the Miami Herald.

Concessioner use was up 17.1%.

Complaints: Visitors mentioned that the Park should do something about the number of potholes along the Shark Valley Loop Road.

Several complaints were received regarding the temporary loss of power service at Flamingo.

Resource Planning

Boundary Adjustments: One week of the month was spent with the Park Boundary Study Team in their investigations.



Spent about one day with Mr. Souci of the Wilderness Society who was visiting the Park.

Ranger Winte and Engineer Alexander inspected the surveyed wast Tamiami subdistrict boundary by both weasel and airboat. Mr. Ross Phillips, a surveyor from the county engineers office, visited the Gulf Coast District Ranger to give estimates on boundary work. Several boundary posts in Chokoloskee Bay were straightened out.

Resource Management: The control burning of Long Pine Key Campground and picnic area was started. This burning is done to check the growth of poison wood and poison ivy and to reduce the habitat of rattlesnakes. This program is progressing well due to good ground water conditions. By burning now, the vegetation should "green up" well before the heavy use period.

Cooperation with other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Glades
District personnel assisted the USGS with airboat transportation on
several trips.

Mr. Shearouse, US Coast and Geodetic Survey team, consulted with District Ranger Stokes on names of places for the new map series being prepared.

Public Affairs

General Publicity: Superintendent Allin worked closely for a period of about a week with Mr. Kaland of the Westinghouse Broadcasting Co. on the film he was doing here in the Park.

This party was escorted to East Cape for late evening photography of turtle nesting activity.

Miss Anita Brumfield of Scholastic Magazine spent several days in the Park, and talked at some length with Mr. Allin.

Messrs. Cooper and Parker of the Orlando Sentinel interviewed Mr. Allin for a TV program to be presented by the Orlando station.

Spoke to 30 members at the Annual meeting of the Nature Conservancy in Miami on productivity.

Public Relations: June 20 and 21, Supt. Allin escorted the Conservation Minister of Kenya, Africa Hon. Kodchek and Asst. Minister Alatsa with State Department representative John Large to portions of the Park, and to John Pennekamp State Park. This group was taken by boat from the Key Largo Ranger Station across the Bay to Flamingo where they remained overnight, touring the Park trails enroute to Miami on the second day.

The evening of June 21, Supt. Allin went to Tallahassee to be present at the June 22 meeting with Governor Claude E. R. Kirk, Jr. of the State of Florida and Washington and Region personnel of the National Park Service.



From Tallahassee he went to St.Augustine with Supt. Theo. L. Davenport where he inspected the National Park Service operations, traveling from St. Augustine to Cape Canaveral where he met with Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife Officials for one day, and then with NASA officials regarding planning for the Cape Canaveral project.

Mr. Jim Brantley local representative of the State of Florida Conservation Department was contacted.

Florida Bay Subdistrict Ranger Hougham attended the June meeting of the Florida Keys Recreation and Conservation Council at Key Colony Beach on June 20.

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DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION

Plans, Maps and Surveys

Plan No. NP:EVE 3321B with Specifications, and Invitation for Bids No. IFB D&C-70-E-67 for Pier Repair, Flamingo Maraina Area were received from the Philadelphia Planning and Service Center. The following two bids were opened June 22: Dock and Marine Construction. - \$1,666.00 which was submitted without review of plans and specification (Bidder withdrew bid); Metro Metals, Inc. - \$7,481.00. The engineer estimate for this project was \$8,000.00. The Philadelphia Planning and Service Center if the Contracting Office for this project. The award of contract is pending. This is the second time this project has been advertised for bids.

Plan No. NP:EVE 3325 with Specifications and Invitation for Bids IFB No. D&C-64-E-67 for Revisions to Sewerage System, Gulf Coast were received from the Philadelphia Planning and Service Center. The following two lump sum bids were opened June 6: J. L. Sherman Water Treatment - \$4,069.00; and F. B. Schreck Construction Co., Inc. - \$9,220.00. Contract No. 14-10-7-981-19 was awarded to low bidder J. L. Sherman Water Treatment in amount of \$4,069.00.

Contract No. 14-10-7-981-17 in amount of \$23,450.00 was awarded to low bidder Sam L. Hamilton, Inc. for Air Conditioning of Lobby and Electrical Changes, Parachute Key Visitor Center. The Preconstruction meeting for this project is scheduled June 29.

- C. A. Davis, Inc., Contract No. 14-10-1-160-3, Wall, Rail and Gates, Shark Valley Observation Tower Contractor reported aluminum rail has been received and installation will commence.
- E. R. Brownell, Contract No. 14-10-0131-1657, Surveying Portions of Northwest Bounday Final inspection of work under this contract was made June 21, by Park Engineer William Alexander, Ranger Erwin Winte, and Mr. Kingsbury of the contractor's office. Work under the contract was accepted as of June 8, 1967. Letter of Acceptance was issued June 22, and Request for Release of Claims was issued June 23. Release of Claims was received from the contractor and final estimate submitted to the Regional Office for payment.

William S. Connole, Contract No. 14-10-1-160-2, for Surveying Portions of Eastern Boundary of Everglades National Park - Change Order No. 1 dated June 13, 1967 extended contract for a period of 15 calendar days which changed completion date from June 15 to June 30. Contractor requested extension of time because of field conditions, and the breakdown of mechanical equipment which made it impossible to complete the work by June 15.

Utilities

Contract No. 14-10-160-14 in amount of \$293,000 was awarded to Florida Power and Light Company for installation of electrical power to the Flamingo Area.



- June 9 and 12 Administrative Officer Paul Heaton and Park Engineer William Alexander met with Mr. Birdsong and Mr. Johnson of Florida Power and Light Company to appraise the value of the National Park Service electrical installation at Flamingo for contract negotiation.
- June 13 Park Engineer William Alexander met with Mr. Edward Ghezzi, Architect to discuss project for Air Conditioning of Lobby and Electrical Changes, Parachute Key Visitor Center.
- June 22 Assistant Superintendent Carroll A. Burroughs, Administrative Officer Paul N. Heaton, and Park Engineer William Alexander met with Mr. Stanton, Mr. Birdsong, Mr. Autrey and Mr. Eyman of Florida Power and Light Company for final negotiation of contract for installation of electrical power to the Flamingo Area. Contract was finalized at this meeting and forwarded to the Washington Office for signature.



Subject: Superintendent's Monthly Narrative Report - June 1967

General

Weather Conditions: Water levels on the Anhinga Trail rose from below ground level and peaked at 4.16 feet on June 17. By the end of the month the level was back down to 3.80 feet. Pumping into the slough ceased shortly after the first of the month.

Special Activities: Chief Park Naturalist Miller, Asst. Chief Park Naturalist Tillman, Park Naturalist Inman, Park Naturalist Zimmer, Superintendent Allin attended the annual Ranger Aid dinner on June 5.

The Chief Park Naturalist assisted the Westinghouse Broadcasting people on June 13 through June 16.

Personnel: Par Naturalist Zimmer returned from annual leave on June 3.

Park Naturalist Inman entered on duty on June 6 from the Albright Training Center, Grand Canyon.

The Chief Park Naturalist interviewed Miss Frieda Gratz regarding the Division Secretary position on June 18.

Supervisory Park Naturalist Mrazek accepted a promotion to GS-11 at Cape Hatteras National Seashone on June 8. He reported on duty July 2, and will be the Assistant Chief, I&FM for Cape Hatteras. Mrazek was on annual leave June 17 to June 24.

Seasonal Ranger Naturalist George E. Neusaenger was converted from WAE to full-time seasonal status on June 14 and then resigned his

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position on June 28 to accept an appointment to the Albright Training Center.

Supervisory Park Naturalist Edomo Mazzer entered on duty on June 14 and spent that day in the Park for orientation with Chief Park Naturalist Miller, and then went to Fort Jefferson.

Park Naturalist Truesdell was on annual leave June 22 through the end of the month.

Park Guide Harriott was on annual leave through the month of June.

Training: Considerable time was spent during June orienting Park Naturalist Inman. Park Naturalist Zimmer accompanied her to Shark Valley on June 14, and Seasonal Naturalist Neusaenger to Fairchild Gardens on June 18. She accompanied Chief Park Naturalist Miller on a tour of the Park and the Flamingo area on June 12 and spent the day of June 21 with Supervisory Park Naturalist Mrazek.

There was an Interpretive Division Staff Meeting on June 22 to discuss various aspects of the Interpretive Division and its operation.

The Chief Park Naturalist, and Seasonal Naturalist Neugsaenger went over the West Lake Canoe route on June 20.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Facilities: Information services in the Parachute Key Visitor Center were moved from the lobby into the converted auditorium on June 1. The new book display purchased by the Everglades Natural History Association was brought in on June 1 and placed in the building.

Asst. Chief Naturalist Tillman spent time during the month searching for designs and estimates for a railing for the Visitor Center mural.

An air conditioning unit was placed in the Royal Palm Information Station on June 30.

A Reminton cash register was purchased for the Parachute Key Visitor Center by the Everglades Natural History Association on June 15.

A preconstruction meeting was held on June 29 in regard to the contract for air conditioning in the Parahhute Key Visitor Center.

Follow-up was made with the Branch of Mition Pictures and Audiovisual Services during the month to have a copy made of the WTVT television movie on alligator poaching. By this time a copy should have been made by the Branch and hopefully we will get a copy in the near future.

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 The alligator exhibit on Anhinga was removed and shipped to the Eastern Museum Laboratory on June 4 for repairs.

Some 71 35mm. slides were added to the Park slide collection during the month of June.

May 1957

General

Weather Conditions: The weather during the month was mild and very dry. Small craft varnings were flown over the Park only twice. The Taylor Slough gauge read "below surface" at the month's end as compared to 2.57' for May 1966.

Pumping continued at Royal Palm during May except a few times when pumps were inoperative. It was found in one instance that the water level in the pond dropped five to six inches in three hours when the pumps were not operating. The pumps were off for repairs on May 11 resulting in a fish kill of about 100 gar.

Special Activities: Human bones were reported found on Sid Key by a fisherman. An investigation by Ranger Kirkland and the Monroe County coroner revealed they were remains of the 1935 hurricane.

The oil drilling rig across from the entrance to the Shark Valley Loop Road has completed its operation to 12,000 feet. It is not known if oil was found. The drill rig has been dismontled.

Staff meetings were conducted by the Superintendent on May 17 and 31.

Supt. Allin talked with Mr. Dean Franklin of Chalk's Flying Service regarding possible air transportation for Fort Jefferson personnel to and from the Fort under a Special Use Permit.

Ranger personnel spent 38 manhours with VIP's and cooperating agencies this month.

District Naturalist Mrazek presented an off-site program for the North Miami Beach Garden Club on May 10.

Asst. Chief Park Naturalist Tillman presented a talk to a combined Mismi Boy Scout Council and the Downtown Mismi Rotary Club meeting at noon on May 25. The point of discussion there was the participation of Explorer Scouts in canoe trail marking and other assistance to the Park.

District Naturalist Mrazek conducted a Natural Landmark appraisal study for Cowpens Island and in submitting his report he did not recommend the site as a registered landmark at this time, but deferred study to a later date when the spoonbill nesting can be re-studied.


Asst. Chief Park Naturalist Tillman conducted a similar Natural Landmark study to appraise Jupiter Island for landmark status. This report also was submitted on May 27 and the recommendation was to include Jupiter Island as a Natural Landmark.

Naturalist Truesdell gave a talk on the Park on May 4 at the Western Laboratory School in South Miami.

Administration

Safety and Health: Four first aid cases were handled during the month.

Two water moccasins and four pigmy rattlesnakes were removed from the yard at the residence of the Tamiami Ranger Station.

Two inspections were made of all interpretive trails. A short section of the Gumbo Limbo Trail was closed for two days to place a hand rail and fill a large hole.

Hine temporary signs were erected at rockpits in the Royal Palm subdistrict. The signs read "No fires, camping, swimming".

Revised editions of the 1967 Hurricane Warning Plan were distributed to all Pine Island residences and Division heads.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Facilities: The Liguus collection was transferred from the old cabinets to the new cabinets during the month. The study collection was completed during May. Work was accomplished on signing the Anhinga Trail during May. An introductory sign was moved into place at the beginning of the Anhinga Trail and appropriate signs and trash receptacles were placed at both ends of the boardwalk on the Anhinga Trail.


Altex representative Haskins was here on the 18th and completed installation of the new movie projector. He also did some routine work on the automatic programs and installed automatic counters on audio-visual equipment.

Everglades Natural History Association installed cash registers at both the Royal Palm and Parachute Key Visitor Center information decks. This was on an experimental basis and the smaller machine was removed from Royal Palm because it did not do the job. However, a two-total register has been left in the Parachute Key Visitor Center and will probably be purchased.

Interpretive planning, particularly as it pertains to Flamingo, has been conducted in the month of May. District Naturalist Mrazek has spent four days at Park Headquarters reviewing the existing documents and making accomplishment in rewriting for the Interpretation Prospectus for the Mangrove District.

The Shark V lley exhibit plan texts were received from the Eastern Museum Laboratory during the month. It is presently being reviewed. Sandfly Nature Traff apartlets were delivered to the Gulf Coast District on May 3.

Slides were proceed in one unit for the audiovisual program in the Parachute Key Visitor Center.



Research and Observations: Visitors at the Shark Valley Observation Tower had a raw look at Nature on Sunday, May 28, when they observed an alligator eat a large cottonmouth. The snake struck the 'gator all around the head and tongue but was swallowed anyway.

experimental basis.

A rookery of pelicans, cormorants and a few American egrets was observed at Rat Terde Key. There is a nice rookery of pelicans, cormorants, Louisiana Herons and American and Snowy egrets on the bird roost in Chokoloskee Bay. At month's end there were approximately 500-700 White Ibis coming in to roost in Chokoloskee Bay evenings.

There Everglades Kites were seen by rangers in the Park near the L-67 dite.

Very few wading birds were seen along the Shark Valley Loop Road during the month but from the air many were observed feeding in Conservation Area 3 where the water level is dropping.

Because of the low water this year, Ranger Winte was able to make a more accurate count of alligators along the Shark Valley Loop Road on his annual May count. He counted 202 on May 16 and 17, including 67 of which all were less than one year old. The USGS has begun their alligator tagging project along the Shark Valley Loop Road, the observation tower and in the Shark Valley. So far they have tagged 18.

Several otter were seen in the Shark Valley and in the canal on the Shark Valley Loop Road where water remained.

Water hyacinths in the old trail canal were sprayed in several locations to test the effects of spraying with various mixtures of 2-4-D.

Soft-shelled turtles were observed laying eggs in the Royal Palm area during late May. A great white heron stayed in the Royal Palm area during most of May.

<u>Protection</u>: 149 noncommercial boats and 26 commercial boats were contacted and checked, and two commercial boats were inspected for commercial permits. Sports fishing was extremely heavy with good catches of snook.

Ranger personnel conducted six unscheduled night boat patrols of the Everglades area, covering the area (on the outside) from West Pass to Broad River sid (on the inside) from Camp Lonesome to Fakahatchee.

174 marketons were contributed by Mangrove District personnel, majority of this on right perching patrols.

Unscheduled which patrols along the Shark Valley Loop Road were increased and the looks on the gates were changed. Three alligators were killed at borrow pit how the Shark Valley Loop Road. One was about 6 feet long and

and was skinned. The others were about 5 feet long and 3 feet long and were shot and found floating in the pond. Others were also found at borrow pits 2 and 4.

Verbal warnings were given to 4 shooters along old Highway 41, 2 snake hunters, and the owners of 3 cars along the L-67 dike.

Two cases are pending for the following violations: one for fraud and disorderly conduct and one case involving three men for 'gator poaching.

Five men were cited before the U.S. Commissioner for firearms in the Park.

Two inebriated Indians were given assistance in leaving the Ranger Station.

Three men were cited for fishing in closed waters, were found guilty, fined \$50 each and sentences were suspended.

Ranger personnel conducted 4 boat search and rescue actions.

Ranger personnel requested the assistance of the Florida Highway Patrol in removing a man with a police record who was camping hear the Loop Road entrance on old Highway 41.

The speed limit on the main park road was increased to 55 MPH.

Based on an indictment from the Federal Grand Jury, Mr. Pennington was arrested on May 24 for an aggravated assault on FCA Wondergem and placed under \$5,000 bond.

Other court cases heard were: speeding, defendant charged \$20.00; one for driving in a closed area, \$10.00 fine; one for failure to report accident and no valid license or registration, \$300.00 fine suspended provided defendant stays out of the Park for one year; one case (5 juveniles) for possession of firearms, pleaded guilty and Commissioner dismissed the charges.

District Naturalist Mrazek and Park Naturalist Storey assisted Rangers in patrolling the Nine Mile Pond during late evenings and nights of May to prevent allignment of gator poachers from preying on the large concentrations of allignment of fine Mile Pond.

Forest Para A resion: Increased patrols were instituted to contact persons with cockang allowed along our north boundary because of the dry conditions. One small such a halside fire was put out in about 1 hour. All protection personnel were an apecial alert during May due to the very dry conditions. Much of the area west of the Park has been burned.

All Glades District personnel were assigned to a six day work schedule. Six fires occurred during the month and four man-caused fires were held to under a quarter of an acre. They were discovered within 15 minutes after they started. One Class C lightning fire occurred in 8 to 10 feet high sawgrass; it was held to about 55 acres. One Class B lightning fire occurred.

The Suburban Acres fire was finally declared out on May 21, after burning 59 days.

Seasonal FCA Jim Owens gave a talk on fire prevention to 15 Boy Scouts.

Subdistrict Ranger Carlson made up a "fire kit" consisting of hard hats, fire shirts, goggles and masks for 6 men. This kit is located at the Army Missile Base for initial attack, primarily on weekends when manpower is limited.

Concessioners: At Flamingo concessioner use was down 18% and the concessioner at Everglades, Florida, conducted 33 sightseeing boat trips with a total of 256 people.

Resource Planning

Water Resources: May 23, 24 and 25 the Superintendent spent in the Washington Office where he attended the bi-monthly meeting of the Water Planning Committee for Everglades National Park, and transacted other park business.

Superintendent Allin attended a meeting of the Dade County Water Resources Committee of the Miami Dade County Chamber of Commerce. At this meeting a Resolution was unanimously passed to pull the plug in Canal C-lll.

Mr. Allin met with Dr. Idyll and Durbin Tabb, Institute of Marine Science, regarding further research work to be done by them for the Park.

Boundary Adjustments: The survey of the west Tamiami subdistrict boundary has been completed and monumented.

Cooperation with other Federal, State or Local Agencies: On May 11, Rangers cooperated in a poaching patrol with Florida Fish and Game Officers. Good cooperation with State Game officers has proven beneficial in deterring poaching in this area as well as in helping Governor Claude Kirk to get a good picture of the dry conditions of the glades during his recent visit.

Public Affairs

General Publicity: The Superintendent was host to Mr. Frederick T. Vosburgh, Vice President and Associate Editor of the National Geographic (and his party) duality the month.

Governor: where he had a visit to the area and stopped at S-12D spillway where he had accorded into Conservation Area 3 by Florida Game Commission officers are a helicopter ride over a portion of the Park.

Messrs. Weblief W. Wilensky of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch discussed the water problems of the Fark with Superintendent Allin on May 22.



Superintendent Allin talked with Mr. Dick Kienitz of the Milwaukee Journal regarding the Park water situation and the Florida drought.

WTVJ (Miami) reporters were taken on a $2\frac{1}{2}$ hour tour of drought conditions in the Taylor Slough-Royal Palm area by District Ranger Robinson.

At least a dozen newsmen seeking stories about the drought were escorted on the Shark Valley Loop Road and given interviews.

Many other newsmen were in the area to cover the story of the drought. Articles and pictures appeared in many Florida newspapers and some national papers, as well as television. Chief Ranger Kerr appeared on WTVJ-TV (Miami) and discussed drought conditions.



New Construction

Request for Quotations were opened April 27, for planting 18 Cabbage Palms, 3 Paurotis Palms, and 24 Cocoplums at the Ranger Office-Comfort Station, Gulf Coast. Only one bid was received in an amount of \$1,826.22. The award of contract for this planting project is pending the availability of funds.

Invitation for Bid No. IFB No. D&C-56-A-67 for Air Conditioning of Lobby and Electrical Changes, Parachute Key Visitor Center were opened May 22, 1967. The following two bids were received: Sam L. Hamilton, Inc., Miami, Fla. - \$23,450.00 and Central Air Conditioning and Sheet Metal, Inc., Miami, Fla. - \$25,489.00. The engineer estimate for this project was \$26,000. Mr. Richard Huber of the Philadelphia Planning and Service Center will be the coordinate on this project at the Design and Construction Office level, and Mr. Edward M. Ghezzi, Architect, will provide supervisory services in accordance with Change Order No. 1 of Contract No. 14-10-0529-2813. Memorandum dated May 23, 1967 from the Southeast Regional Office to the Director requested allotment of funds in the amount of \$23,450.00 to award contract to low bidder.

The installation of the venetian blinds has been completed in the Employee Apartments. Clothes lines were obtained on purchase order and installed by Maintenance personnel. Five of the eight apartments have been occupied.

C. A. Davis, Inc., Contract No. 14-10-1-160-3, Wall, Rail and Gates, Shark Valley Observation Tower - Change Order No. 2 dated May 1, 1967 was issued to provide an additional 63 cubic yards of crushed onlite fill in place at a total cost of \$283.20. This change order extended contract for a period of thirty calendar days which changed completion date from July 7, to August 6, 1967. The Contractor reported that the aluminum rail has been ordered but not received to date.

E. R. Brownell, Contract No. 14-10-0131-1657, Surveying Fortions of Northwest Boundary - Work under this contract has been completed and acceptance is pending final inspection and submission of survey drawings.

William S. Connole, 38 NW 8th Street, Homestead, Fla., Contract No. 14-10-1-160-2 - Installation of boundary markers is in progress.

Solicitation, Offer, and Award No. 160-3 dated May 25, 1967 was issued for Electrical Generator Plant for Fort Jefferson National Monument to prospective bidders. This bid is scheduled to be opened June 12, 1967. Successful bidder will deliver generator to the MacArthur Causeway, Miami Beach, Florida for transfert to the Fort by the U. S. Coast Guard.

Solicitation, Offer, and Award No. 160-2 for Garbage and Refuse Collection and Disposal, Everglades National Park was opened May 19, 1967. Only one bid was received. Able Waste Service, Inc., Miami submitted total bid for \$22,530.00. Award of contract is pending analysis of M&R funds.

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Park Engineer William M. Alexander accompanied Mrs. Constrance Layne of the Southeast Regional Office on following inspections: April 26 - Flamingo and Royal Palm areas; May 27 - Long Pine Key Area, Pineland, Pa-Hay-Okee, Mahogany Hammock, and Mangrove Trails; May 1 - Fort Jefferson National Monument.

Mr. Alexander and Mrs. Layne worked on the Operating Program for the Park April 28, May 1, 2, and 3. At noon, May 3, Mr. Alexander escorted Mrs. Layne to the Miami International Airport to return to Richmond, Virginia.

May 4 - Mr. Alexander met with representatives of the Southern Bell Telephone Company to discuss revision of the telephones in the Headquarters Building.


May 8 - Mr. Alexander ran test on old cased well on Old Ingraham Highway near the Artesian well. Test revealed that the bottom of the well will require opening.





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16 Sailboats of the Florida West Coast Sailing Club visited the Fort for four days. This was the largest florilla of boats to anchor in Garden Key Harbor the past several years.

Administration

Safety and Health: Captain-Engineer John Midgett entered the hospital in Key West in January and since that time he has undergone three operations. He remained in the hospital during the month of May. His doctor has not given any definite date for his release.

On the lith, the shrimp boat "Good Luck" went aground near Pulaski Light. It was pulled free by another shrimp boat but had to be towed to Key West for minor repairs.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Research and Observations: The first turtle crawls of the season were noted on Loggerhead Key and on East Key. On the 21st, two crawls were observed on East Key and on the 22nd, two crawls were seen on Loggerhead.

Protection: On the 13 th, a search was conducted for the yacht "Guilden Cage". It was located adrift near Loggerhead Key with mechanical trouble.

On the 21st, a small commercial fishing vessel near East Key was assisted. The boat had mechanical trouble and the two men aboard had been trying to summon help for three days.

Eleven warnings were issued during the month for improper boat operation, collecting marine life and commercial fishing.

Maintenance: The NPS vessel "Garden Key" was drydocked in Key West for repairs and painting. It was put back in operation on the 20th.

A tug boat and work barge from the Powell Brothers Construction Company arrived on the 25th. They removed five old fender pilings and installed fourteen new pilings. on the dock. The dock is not in better condition that it has been for many months.

Again this month most of the maintenance effort was directed at keeping the NPS vessel "Bush Key" operational. It continues to be plagued with mechanical problems.

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



SUPERINTENDENT'S MONTHLY NARRATIVE REPORT for EVERGLADES NATIONAL PARK

April 1967

GENERAL

Weather Conditions: April's weather was pleasant, though windy and very dry. Small craft warnings were displayed on 4 days. Temperatures ranged from the mid-80's to a high of 92°. The nights were cool with a low of 52° recorded. At month's end, the Taylor Slough guage read "below surface" as compared to .68' last year. Rainfall was a high of .91" at Flamingo with none at Everglades, Florida, and .07" at the Florida Bay recording station. Royal Palm received .20" and Tamiami .10".

The water level on the Anhinga Trail dropped from 0.7 to 0 feet during the month of April. Aeriation was set up at the Royal Palm Pond and air was pumped all during the month. Water continued to be pumped into the Anhinga Trail area. In addition, a 25-foot well was dug adjacent to the Royal Palm Pond and a gasoline pump was set up. These efforts raised the water level a total of 11 inches. There was a fish kill at Royal Palm on April 28-29.

Increase in Travel: Visitation showed a decrease of 0.5% as compared to April 1966. There was an increase of 2.5% in visitation as compared to a like period last year. The decrease in travel figures for the month of April may be attributed to the closing of the Shark Valley Loop Road for repairs during 7 days of the month.

Concessioner use was down 32% over April of last year.

Camping showed an increase of 5% over a like period last year.

The travel for Royal Palm decreased 26.2% from 1966. This, of course, results in few interpretive contacts in that area.

Weather instruments were installed on top of the Weather Bureau tower in Everglades City and wired to the visual recorder in the office.

Two boat-a-cades with a total of 16 boats and 68 people were conducted in Flamingo; and 2 boat-a-cades with 7 boats and 31 people were conducted in Everglades.

Ranger personnel spent 91 manhours with VIP's and cooperating agencies during the month.

The Superintendent spent a day at Fort Jefferson National Monument with personnel there on inspection and planning.

Miami Educational Television Channel 2 reran the program which had been previously run on March 30 concerning conservation in Everglades National Park.

Chief Park Naturalist completed a Junior First Aid Course for the Everglades (City), Florida Boy Scout Troop. This course was completed on April 6 and 7.

Chief Park Naturalist Miller presented a talk to the Analytical Division, American Chemical Society, Miami Beach, Florida, on April 11.



CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Interpretive Facilities: The Mangrove Nature Trail at West Lake was closed for one week during the month for repairs.

Altec Electronics, Inc., representative was in the Park on the 10th and the 27th of the month to install a new 16 mm. movie projector in the Parachute Key Visitor Center. This projector is installed, but is still not functioning properly. At the same time, the Altec representative worked on the message repeater and slide projector for the Flamingo Visitor Center. Both of these pieces of equipment were placed back into operation; however, both are nearing the end of their usefulness because of worn parts.

A Bird Observation Bulletin Board was designed and built by Seasonal Naturalist George Stevenson during the month of April. This has been installed in the Flamingo Visitor Center and from reports by Supervisory Park Naturalist Mrazek this new idea is functioning quite well.

Superintendent Allin inspected the Whitewater Bay area in company of the Supervisory Naturalist from Flamingo to plan for the establishment of water trails in that area.

Ranger Castleberry spent one day with the Chief Luralist, Pat Miller, in Florida Bay discussing interpretive needs of the subdistrict.

Interpretive Services: Ranger Castleberry gave an interpretive talk on Boat Camping-Boat Safety at Miami-Dade Jr. College.

Six evening programs were given by ranger personnel (on their own time) at Everglades, Florida, with a total of 29 persons attending.

Ranger Riley gave the naturalist program at Long Pine Key Campground. Seventy visitors attended.

Ranger personnel at the Tamiami Subdistrict made an effort to contact as much of the public as possible on the Shark Valley Loop Road during regular ranger patrols. This results in an informal but well received message about the Park.

The winter program was closed at the end of April 15. The spring program was initiated on the 16th. Copy of this reduced program is enclosed. This program is designed to give minimal coverage for the Park visitor during the spring and summer months with the limited amount of personnel available.

On April 24 Park Naturalist Zimmer and Subdistrict Ranger Castleberry presented a section of a symposium on camping; the subject was "Camping Etiquette, Boat Camping and Interpretation in Camping Areas."

During the month of April there has been quite a shuffle in offices and in space. The allocation of space was designed to give the Biologist and Hydraulic Engineer more habitation space. As a result the study collection room was cut approximately in half; however, these facilities will be adequate for the existing study collections.

During the month of April three new insect cases with Cornell drawers were received. These pieces are designed to house the Deckert Liguus collection. Inspections proved that the original estimate of three cases was inadequate. Negotiations with the Southeast Regional Office resulted in three additional cases being transferred from Hatchez Trace Parkway to Everglades National Park. These cases should prove adequate to house the entire collection.

Research and Observations: Mr. Allin discussed with the Management Biologist his progress on research programs and new programs to be started and the management of the Anhinga Trail area.

Some crocodile nests were observed along the north shore of Florida Bay.

Wildlife observations were taken weekly at Tern Key.



As many as 900 to 1,000 snowy egrets have been Leding in the small pond at the Tamiami Ranger Station in the early morning. Now that the water is so low, large concentrations of water snakes are in the pond. Twenty to thirty can be seen at any time. Several sandhill cranes have been observed on the Shark Valley Loop Road, and an occasional wild turkey. Ten spoonbills have been feeding in the borrow pits and at the Observation Tower.

Four Swallow-tail Kites were observed at the entrance station on April 2.

Park Naturalist Miller accompanied Dr. F. C. Craighead to Paradise Key on April 23. Dr. Craighead is cutting cross sections of downed trees to study growth rates through tree-ring studies

Protection: Ranger Carlson held three one-hour in-service training sessions on law enforcement covering review of ENP policy on law enforcement, law enforcement procedures, and defensive tactics.

Two verbal warnings were given to migrant workers for carrying firearms in the Park.

Fire Control Aid Delbert Wondergem was assaulted by a Park visitor on April 14. He was taken to the hospital with a serious concussion. The FBI is investigating this incident.

A speaker, microphone and control head of a park radio was stolen from the ramp truck at the Tamiami Ranger Station.

Fourteen persons were cited before the U.S. Commissioner for illegal possession of firearms in the Park along the Shark Valley Loop Road. Two snake hunters were also warned.

Eighteen persons were warned not to shoot along old Highway 41 on the north Park boundary.

Ranger personnel were engaged in 11 boat search and rescue actions. Two "no boats allowed" signs were re-installed at the Rat Terde Key rookery. Four court cases were heard before the U. S. Commissioner: 1 public drunkeness, defendant found guilty and barred from the Park for 6 months; 1 disorderly conduct, \$500 and 6 months jail term was suspended but sentence to be imposed if defendant returns to the Park; 1 for speeding, defendant fined \$20.00, 1 for careless driving, defendant found not guilty.

Warnings were issued for the following offenses: speeding (boat and vehicle), undersized fish, failure to renew Commercial permit, water skiing, driving in closed area, drunkeness, disorderly conduct, collecting driftwood and molesting wildlife.

One case of breaking and entering is still pending.

There was one minor vehicle accident with damage of \$125.00



Two other vehicle accidents resulted in the total loss of both cars. The driver of one of the cars required 185 stitches on his neck and face.

Ranger personnel investigated 4 larceny offenses and recovered stolen property in two of them.

Royal Palm Subdistrict rangers assisted 34 visitors along the main Park road. $306\frac{1}{2}$ hours of contributed time were donated by ranger personnel.

Patrol Mileage: Vehicle 25,362; Glades vehicle 35; Boat 4,130; Airboat 119; Park plane 10,800; Total 40,446.

Forest Fire Protection: Fire conditions within the Park became critical this month. Thousands of acres of glades and pinelands burned close to the Glades district and normal rainfall was down 50%. During the last week of the month, all Fire Control Aids were assigned a six-day schedule. One 35-acre fire and three spot fires were quickly controlled.

Ranger Carlson reported that the 28-acre Suburban Acres fire, which started and was controlled on March 26, has not been declared out. The deep peat soil in a small hammock is still burning like a sawdust pile. This fire does not pose any threat to the Park and will go out when rainfall raises the ground water table.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: There is a very nice rookery of American Egrets on an island in Rogers River Bay. The rookery is re-forming this year on Rat Terde Key and the rookery on the bird roost in Chokoloskee Bay is re-forming. Both of these are now composed primarily of pelicans and cormorants.

Concessioners: The Superintendent attended the annual neeting of the Everglades Park Company, Inc., Board of Directors in the Park and neetings were held with some of them regarding plans for improvement.

Mr. Allin met with the president of the Everglades Park Company, Inc., regarding the sanitation inspections at Flamingo and the improvement which must be made.

RESOURCE PLANNING

Water Resources: The Superintendent attended conference on the Park water situation in Washington.

Mr. Allin met with Mr. Nat Reed of the Governor's office regarding the water situation.

Mr. Allin attended the regular monthly meeting of the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District.



The Superintendent met with Mr. Keith Colburn o. the Tampa Tribune newspaper regarding the water situation.

Mr. Allin met with Dr. Leigh, Department of Botany, University of Miami, who was accompanied by Dr. Tees, regarding their proposed work in the Park on C-111 area.

Superintendent Allin attended the meeting of the local Water Committee group at Park Headquarters.

The R. K. Petroleum Company started drilling for oil on April 23 in Conservation Area 3 near the entrance to the Shark Valley Loop Road. They intend to drill to 12,000 feet.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

General Publicity: The concessioner at Flamingo is in the process of having a film made extolling the virtues of ENP and Flamingo in particular.

The Miami Herald (April 21) carried an article (humorous) describing the General Baking Company Board of Directors and stockholders meeting and the hazards and difficulties inherent in attending said meeting.

Public Relations: Ranger Richard Stokes attended the dedication of the Koreshan State Park at Estero as the Superintendent's representative.

Mr. John Johnston, new Superintendent of John Pennekamp Coral Reef State Park was contacted and welcomed to the area by Don Castleberry.

The Superintendent attended a retirement luncheon in Miami for Admiral Thayer of the U. S. Coast Guard 7th District (Miami).

Miss Pat Caulfield, writer, was hosted by the Superintendent during the month.

Superintendent Allin hosted Marquis Childs, writer, during his stay in the Park.

The Superintendent attended the meeting of the Federal Executive Council in Miami.

DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTIO

Plans, Maps and Surveys

Plans, No. NP:EVE-3324, with Specifications and Invitation for Bids No. D&C-56-A-67 for Air Conditioning of Lobby and Electrical Changes, Parachute Key Visitor Center were received from the Philadelphia Planning and Service Center. Invitation for Bids were mailed April 20, and are schedule for opening May 22, 1967. The Philadelphia Planning and Service Center will act as Contracting Office for this project.

Planting Plans, No. NP:EVE-3323, for the Ranger Office-Comfort Station, Gulf Coast were received from the Philadelphia Planning and Service Center. Plans with Specifications, and Request for Quotations were issued April 15, and they are schedule for opening April 27. This project includes planting of 18 each Sabal palmetto (Cabbage Palm), 3 each Paurotis wrighti (Paurotis Palm), and 24 each Chrysobalanous icaco (Cocoplum).

New Construction

Waters and Stewart, Inc., Contract No. 14-10-1-160-7, Employee Apartments, Flamingo - A final inspection was made April 17, and work under the contract was accepted as 100 percent complete in accordance with the plans and specifications. Letter of Acceptance and Final Estimate were issued April 17, and Request for Release of Claims was issued April 18.

Request for Quotations No. 160-13 to furnish and install 42 venetian blinds in the above mentioned Employee Apartments at Flamingo were mailed April 7. Five bids were received and Purchase Order No. 160-471 dated April 19, was issued to low bidder Ford Venetian Blind Company, 3299 NW 7th Street, Miami, Florida for a total amount of \$598.00.

C. A. Davis, Inc., Contract No. 14-10-1-160-3, Wall, Rail and Gates, Shark Valley Observation Tower - It was agreed by offices concerned to change the design of the original plan under this contract, and change was renegotiated with the Contractor. Letter dated April 3, 1967, from the Contractor confirmed revision would be accomplished without change in the original contract price of \$8,985.00. Findings of Fact, Revision of Design and Renegotiation of Contract, were issued April 10, 1967.

Order to Resume Work dated April 6, 1967, directed Contractor to resume operations on April 10, 1967, and changed completion date to June 7, 1967. Change Order No. 1 dated April 10, 1967, directed Contractor to install, according to Drawing No. NP:EVE-3314C, a double aluminum rail in lieu of block wall, and single aluminum rail specified in Drawing No. NP:EVE-3314A. This change did not increase the price of contract. This Change Order also provided for an estimated 400 cubic yards of colite fill in place, and an estimated 435 square yards of single bituminous surface treatment. This additional work increased the contract price for an estimated total amount of \$2,191.50, and extended contract for a period of 30 calendar days which changed completion date from June 7, to July 7, 1967.

Project Supervisor John Flister returned April 18, to the Philadelphia Planning and Service Center for reassignment.









- SANDFLY ISLAND Located in the Ten Thousand Island region near Everglades, Florida and accessible only by boat. Trail on a small island explaining some of the pioneer history of the area. Use of insect repellants recommended.



Administration

Safety and Health: Captain-Engineer John Midgett remains in the hospital in Key West. He is not expected to return to duty until July or August.

Assistance was given to the U.S. Coast Guard in their search for one overdue vessel. It was not located within the Monument.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Research and Observations: The Florida Audubon Society banded a number of terns on Bush Key. About 8000 adult Sooties were handled, which included more than 2000 previously banded birds. Among the recaptures were 15 Sooties of the 1937-1941 banding, all now 26 or more years old. The oldest bird was 30, a chick banded in 1937, one of the very few birds of any kind known to have reached such great age in the wild.

<u>Protection:</u> On the 7th a hearing was held before the U.S. Commissioner in Key West for three men accused of illegally taking lobster within the Monument. They were found guilty and each fined \$50.00. Two of the men were unable to pay the fine and were sentenced to 30 days in jail.

On the 16th a man was cited for commercial fishing near East Key. A hearing was held in Key West on the 28th. The man was found guilty and fined \$13.00.

Several warnings were issued during the month for improper boat operation and collecting marine life.

Maintenance: On the 1st, 4,700 gallons of diesel fuel was received from the U.S. Coast Guard "Walnut".

Two 3,000 gallon diesel storage tanks were received and installed.

The NPS vessel "Bush Key" continues to be plagued with mechanical problems. Most of the maintenance effort for the month was directed at keeping the "Bush Key" operational.

March 1967

General

Weather Conditions: Dry, mild weather prevailed this month. One cold spell occurred during the last two weeks. Small craft warnings were flown on two days at Key Largo and Flamingo. Temperatures ranged in the mid-80's with a high of 90 and a low of 49 recorded at Royal Palm. At month's end, the Taylor Slough water gauge read .79' as compared to 1.16' a year ago. Rainfall for the month was as follows: Royal Palm, .73"; Tamiami 2.81"; Flamingo 1.45"; Florida Bay 1.79"; Everglades .61".

Increase in Travel: A total of 147,497 persons visited the Park; an increase of 12.5 per cent over a like period last year. Concessioner use was up 4% and camping showed a 16% increase over March 1966.

A gasoline economy rally was conducted on the Shark Valley Loop Road by the Humble Oil Co. Twenty vehicles participated in the rally.



Safety and Health: One heart attack victim was given first aid and transported to Homestead hospital.

Creeping eruption hookworm caused by polluted soil and further contamination by night-roaming Indian dogs still infects the children living in the Tamiami Subdistrict.

Several men developed skin irritations from contact with poisonwood while suppressing the "Bee Hive" fire.

Personnel of the Tamiami Subdistrict completed a standard first aid course held at Everglades.

Numerous rocks were removed from the airboat trail at the Shark Valley Tower as the water level dropped.

Chief Park Naturalist Miller completed instruction of a standard First-aid Class at Everglades that included three townspeople and eight members of the Park staff.

The Park Safety Committee made an inspection tour of the Royal Palm Station and area on March 2.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Facilities: A new Graflex 16 mm. movie projector was received. This machine is to be hooked into the automatic program in the Parachute Key Visitor Center to use the short 7-minute movie. This will be in lieu of the 7-minute slide program now in use.

Two new "Auditorium" signs were installed near the auditorium doors in the Parachute Key Visitor Center.

Some 75 new color slides were added to the Park's slide library during March.

Two Mahogany Hammock exhibit panels were shipped to the Eastern Museum Laboratory. These two exhibits, along with other exhibits from Flamingo and the Anhinga Trail, will go to the Eastern Museum Laboratory for refurbishment.

Leaflet boxes for the Shark Valley Loop Road leaflets were broken into and contents taken along with the coin boxes and locks sometime during the latter part of March. These were not retrieved.

Interpretive Services: The Interpretive Division personnel contacted 102,685 people during the month of March. This was an increase of 66.7% over 1966. This increase is mainly in Visitor Center contacts. The additional number of walks presented this year have also accounted for part of the increase.

It is interesting to note the evening programs at Flamingo in the new, tempcrary outdoor amphitheatre averaged one person per night more than the two combined talks produced last year in the auditorium.

A filmed program on the Park was shown on Miami Educational Channel 2 on March 31. The program dealt with the duties of Park Rangers and Conservation under the National Park Service policy. Superintendent Allin presented a talk on the program.

Chief Park Naturalist was a judge for the Tropical Audubon Society in selection of their special awards in the Dade County Science Fair in Miami on March 29.

An exhibit was set up at Owissa-Bauer Park. The exhibit joined many other exhibits at the Park dealing with camping.

Interpretive personnel from Royal Palm gave special talks to 726 students during the month.

On March 2, Seasonal Ranger-Naturalist Kelly Motherspaugh conducted 34 guides from the Guild of Science Museum on a tour of the Park. This tour was for orientation purposes for the guides.

March 13, Asst. Chief Naturalist Tillman was a judge at the South Dade High School Science Fair, Homestead, Fla.

On the 19th a Sub-Tropical Nature Workshop from the University of Miami was at Royal Palm as part of a tour through the Park.

On March 13, the Shark Valley Loop Road was re-opened to the public with an average of 400 visitors per day. Rangers and Fire Control Aids of the Tamiami Subdistrict averaged 300 public contacts per weekend. Two groups of elementary and junior high school groups were met and given interpretive talks of the Shark Valley Loop Road.

Ranger Max Holden is making a study of a sawgrass fire that burned over 7" of standing water, in order to add this information to the Park's study of controlled burning.

Two new trails were opened this month starting at the Long Pine Key Campground The hiking trail is three miles long. The Hike or Bike Trail is 5 miles long. Both trails are very popular with visitors.

Fourteen evening programs were conducted at Everglades with 321 persons attending. The ranger personnel of the Gulf Coast District contribute their time to give these evening programs. Three hundred forty persons were contacted at the information desk in the Administrative Building there.

Research and Observations: Anhingas nesting along the Anhinga Trail in plain view of thousands of Park visitors have now reared six young birds. This has been the star attraction along the Anhinga Trail during March.

A Limpkin has been feeding along the Anhinga Trail this month and has been the subject for thousands of pictures.

Some 300 to 400 Fulvous Tree Ducks have been on West Lake Pond during the middle part of the month.

There was a fish kill at Nine-Mile Pond the latter part of the month.

A 500 lb. loggerhead turtle was released by Ranger Hougham after it had become entrapped in a stone crab buoy line.

Two sandhill cranes were seen from the Shark Valley Loop Road during March.

There are now six primitive campgrounds in use in the Gulf Coast District: Onion Key (3 tables, 3 charcoal grills, trash burner, 1 toilet)
Indian Key (1 table, 1 trash burner, 1 charcoal grill)
Rabbit Key (2 tables, 2 charcoal grills, 1 trash burner)
Turkey Key (1 table, 1 charcoal grill)
Lostmans River (1 table, 1 charcoal grill, 1 trash burner)
Watson Place (1 table, 1 charcoal grill)

<u>Protection:</u> Twenty-eight unscheduled night road patrols were made during the month; one early morning boat patrol and two night boat patrols were conducted; one overnight boat patrol to Lostmans River patrol station.

Verbal warning were given for the following: molesting wildlife, driving on undesignated roads, speeding, (boat and auto), undersized fish, parking, disturbing vegetation, and tying to channel markers.

One court case was heard for "picking orchids," defendant found guilty and prohibited from using the Park for one year.

Investigations were conducted for three vehicle accidents and two thefts of visitor's property.

Nineteen boat search-rescues were conducted during the month.

An investigation of a stolen boat was made. The boat was found by fishermen three days later in a small creek. It had obviously been bowed there but nothing on board was missing.

Twenty-three commercial fishing operations permits were issued by ranger personnel during the month.

A pilot practicing landings on the Shark Valley Loop Road crashed, was cited into the U. S. Commissioner's court and fined \$100.00

Patrol mileage for the month was as follows: Vehicle 23,787; boat 4,494; glades vehicle 250; airboat 378; and park plane 8,500 miles. Total 34,409 miles.

Forest Fire Protection: New and updated maps of the east boundary fire protection zone and the "Hole-in-the-Donut" were completed and placed in patrol pick-up vehicles and the Glades District Office.

Small notebook-size maps in file covers entitled "Suggested Routes for Prime Movers" were distributed to personnel engaged in firefighting.

Two fires occurred during the month. The first was only one-half mile from Park Headquarters in the pinelands. The second fire was in the east boundary protection zone and did not burn on park lands. Quick action on these fire enabled suppression crews to control them before the end of the first burning period.

Fire Control Aids Haller and Kelly demonstrated the bombardier and patrol pickups and gave a talk on forest fire prevention to 50 Boy Scouts at their camp within the Park boundary.



Building Fire Protection: The Royal Palm Fire Brigade covered hose lays and hook-ups and use of the resusitator in two sessions.

Sanitation: The U. S. Public Health Service made their annual Environmental Health Survey in the Park this month. A meeting was held with State, County, USPHS and Park Service personnel on the septic tank installation at Everglades, Fla. Mr. James Westbrook, USPHS accompanied by Resident Manager Johnstone, Everglades Park Co., Inc., and NPS personnel inspected concessioner facilities at Flamingo.

Concessioners: Mr. Sam Hoover, Engineer from Washington had meetings with the Florida Power and Light Co., the Everglades Park Co., Inc., and Park personnel regarding installation of commercial electricity at Flamingo.

144 boat trips were made by the concessioner at Everglades, Fla. with a total of 1,796 people transported. This was a 93% increase over a like period last year.

Rate inspections were made of the Flamingo concessioner facilities.

Maintenance: Rangers repainted interpretive signs along the Shark Valley Loop Road before the road was re-opened to the public.

The fence around the new Administrative Building and utility area at Everglades was completed. A gate was installed at the entrance road by Ranger personnel.

Resource Planning

Water Resources: Mr. Charles Brookfield of the National Audubon Society with Messrs. Brwaner and Hayes, attorneys, visited the Superintendent regarding the filing of an injunction by the Society to stop removal of the plug in C-lll.

A conference was held with Everglades National Park personnel and the Institute of Marine Science and Dr. Taylor Alexander, Botany Department of the University of Miami to arrange to secure information for the Director to use in hearings before the Appropriations Committee.

Supt. Allin talked with Mr. Nat Reed, Asst. to Governor Kirk on Conservation, regarding the plug in C-lll.

Supt. Allin spent part of Friday, March 3 in the field with the Institute of Marine Science crew in their study of the C-lll panhandle area.

Water levels in the Taylor Slough in the vicinity of the Anhinga Trail have dropped severely during March with many exposed places now along the trail. The very shallow water level may cause some distress among aquatic animals sometime in April.

On March 17, pumps were started to pump well water into the Anhinga Trail area. At the end of the month the aerator-compressor was started in front of the Royal Palm Station to provide oxygen to the water of the Royal Palm Pond.

The water level measured on the Anhinga Trail dropped from 1.55' to 0.78' during this month.

Hydraulic Engineer Francis A. Nix attended a meeting with the Corps of Engineers in Jacksonville, March 23 enroute from Washington, D. C.

Dr. Robert M. Linn of the Washington Office spent some time in the Park with Research Biologist Robertson in study of the C-lll plug removal.

Supt. Allin addressed the annual banquet. of the Izaak Walton League at Islamorada on Saturday evening, March 4. About 60 members were present to hear Mr. Allin discuss the water problems and C-lll.

An address to approximately 150 members of the Coconut Grove Rotary Club, Coconut Grove, Fla. was given by Supt. Allin. Again, the requested subject for his talk was the water situation.

Status of Private Lands: The 1971-72 and 73 Lend Acquisition program was completed

Boundary Adjustments: Eight miles of boundary were posted at Tamiami.

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Administrative Officer Paul N. Heaton attended the Greater Miami Federal Executive Council meeting in Miami. This meeting covered Excepted Appointment Authorities, Neighborhood Youth Corps and recruiting of college students.

Supt. Allin, as State Coordinator, attended a meeting on State/Federal coordination called by Governor Kirk on Friday, March 31.

Continued cooperation has been given and received from the U. S. G. S., Corps of Engineers, Florida State Fish and Game Commission, U. S. Weather Burea, and the National Hurricane Center in Miami.

State Salt Water Conservation Officer Cooper was given a tour of Florida Bay, including a trip to Flamingo.

Cooperation with other local agencies: There was a meeting of the Everglades Natural History Association at the residence of Dr. Charlton Tebeau on the 10th of March. Dade Thornton was elected Chairman of the Board at this meeting.

Public Affairs

Public Relations: On March 30, Chief Park Naturalist Miller conducted Dr. Leontsinis of Brazil and Mr. Ashford, State Department, Miami on a tour from Royal Palm to Pay-ha-okee.

Congressman Howard Robison, Mrs. Robison and their two sons spent two days at Flamingo. They were taken on a boat trip, and Supt. Allin personally contacted the Congressman.

Michael Frome, writer for American Forest, Harpers etc. visited Supt. Allin at the suggestion of the Director. The water situation was discussed with Mr. Frome at some length, and he was flown over the Park and the conservation areas during his visit here.

Rangers Robinson and Carlson welcomed 40 members of the League of American Wheelmen at the entrance station. Several members made a round trip from Homestead to Flamingo, travelling over 100 miles by bicycle in one day.

An article appeared in the Gulf Coast edition of The Miami Herald on the new administrative building and boat tours in Everglades, Fla.

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

New Construction

Waters and Stewart, Inc., Contract No. 14-10-1-160-7, Employee Apartments, Flamingo - Change Order No. 3 dated March 17, 1967 provided for installation of 18 each 8-foot high bifold doors to each closet in the apartments and panels above doors, and painting of doors and panels to match existing trim at a lump sum of \$2,700.00 which changed total contract price from \$135,105.25 to \$137,805.25. This change order extended contract for a period of thirty (30) calendar days changing completion date of contract from April 3 to May 3, 1967.

Request for Quotations have been issued to furnish and install venetian blinds in the above apartments.

The number of visitors to the Fort in March increased by 329% from February. The depleted staff donated many hours of their own time assisting the large number of visitors.

Administration

Safety and Health: Captain-Engineer John Midgett remains in the U.S. Navy Hospital in Key West. His long period of absence from duty is causing a serious hardship on the small staff at the Fort.

On the 13th a search was conducted for a small boat which was overdue with seven person on it. The boat was located adrift near White Shoal, and was towed to Garden Key.

During strong winds on the 31st, three shrimp boats went aground in Garden Key Harbor. They were pulled free and apparently sustained no serious damage.

Assistance was given to the U.S. Coast Guard in their search for three overdue vessels.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Research and Observations: Dr. Gray Multer, Institute of Marine Science, Miami, spent seven days at the Fort taking soil and rock samples. In addition, he had a drilling crew and rig take core samples from a hole which they dug to 103 feet. The results of this National Science Foundation research project will not be known for some time.

On the 26th the first terms landed on Bush Key. This was four days later than last year. The first term eggs appeared on the 28th.

Protection: On the 23rd, 42 lobster traps were confiscated near Pulaski Shoal

Three men were apprehended on the 29th for commercial lobstering in the monument. There were cited to appear before the U.S. Commissioner in Key West on April 4th.

Several warnings were given during the month for anchoring in Garden Key Harbor, commercial fishing and vandalism.

Maintenance: Repairs were again made to the NPS vessel "Bush Key" during the month. This boat continues to be plagued with mechanical problems. The maintenanceman operates and maintains the Bush Key while the Cpatain-Engineer is in the hospital. To maintain the boat in operating condition is almost a full time job, and as a result the backlog of maintenance chores needing attention increases almost daily at the Fort.

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Mechanical repairs were made to three boats which visited the Fort.

The materials necessary to upgrade the sewer system to meet U.S. Public Health Service standards were ordered.

SUPERINTENDENT'S MONTHLY NARRATIVE REPORT for EVERGLADES NATIONAL PARK

February 1967

GENERAL

Weather Conditions: Mild winter weather continued during February. The temperature dipped into the 30's some nights during the month. Rainfall was light and scattered. The water table as recorded at Taylor Slough station continued dropping in February and read 1.72 at month's end compared to 2.06 for February 28, 1966.

A high of 86° was recorded at Tamiami, with a low of 32° at Royal Palm. Greatest rainfall was 1.60" at Everglades, Florida and the least 1.17" at Tamiami.

Increase in travel: A total of 121,985 persons visited the Park during the month as compared to 121,780 last year, or an increase of .5%. Although concessioner use increased at Everglades, Florida, the total concessioner use for the Park decreased 15.5%. Camping was up 15.5% over February of last year. This may be due to the severe winter weather throughout the country encouraging tourists southward. The majority of local and State camping facilities reported crowded conditions during the month.

Special Activities: Dr. C. J. McCoy, Jr., from Carnegie Museum, arrived on February 24 to discuss a pending scientific paper with Chief Park Naturalist Miller on which they are jointly working.

A Resources Management Study Team (Lyle MacDowell) from Washington arrived about the middle of the month to work up a Resource Management Plan for Everglades. This will be a pilot plan for the Service in this field.

Naturalist Vincent Mrazek took part in five wilderness trips with former Advisory Board Chairman Frank Masland and National Geographic Society Staff Photographer Otis Imboden to assess possible wilderness canoe trails and an inland boat route from Flamingo to Everglades. Areas visited were: Bear Lake Canal, The Lungs, Lard Can Camp, Little Sable Creek, and Broad Creek.

Ranger personnel spent 229.5 manhours with VIP's and cooperating agencies.

Boat-a-cades for the month were as follows: Flamingo, 22 boats, 85 people; Everglades, 7 boats, 26 people.

Ranger Stokes and Denslow represented the Park at the Everglades Park Co. booth at the Miami International Boat Show on 3 days of the month; and Ranger Castleberry represented the park on 2 days.

Rangers Moseley and Mayer attended Power Squadron classes in Homestead on small craft operation.

Ranger Denslow took part in the annual career day program at Norland High School and gave a talk to 59 students. Ranger Miele took part in the annual career day program at Miami Springs High School on February 3, 1967.

Ranger Castleberry attended a demonstration of the Forest Service fire Simulator Training Device at the Dade County Civil Defense Hq. in Miami.

ADMINISTRATION


Entrance Fees: Entrance station receipts for the month totalled \$14,490.50.

<u>Personnel</u>: Asst. Supt. Carroll A. Burroughs attended the Southeast Regional Superintendent's Conference. Supt. Allin attended portions of the conference but was called to Washington to confer with the Director and his staff regarding the water problem and the plug in Canal C-111 during this week.

Asst. Supt. Burroughs and Administrative Officer Heaton held numerous telephone conferences with Regional Office personnel regarding the filling of vacant positions here. Of primary importance were a Management Biologist, Research Biologist Secretary and Personnel Management Specialist. Other of the 16 vacancies here were also discussed, as there is a critical need for personnel during the peak season of this park's biggest year to date.

Supt. Allin talked with Mr. Blake, retired NPS, from Hot Springs, Arkansas before referring him to the Administrative Officer. Mr. Blake is interested in employment with Everglades National Park as he has recently moved to Florida.

Elijah (NMN) Elliton was promoted from Janitor to Caretaker effective 2/12/67.



Applications for a newly stablished biologist position f. Everglades National Park personnel were accepted for consideration.

Efforts are continuing to secure a replacement for the Personnel Management Specialist.

Park Guide Ruth L. Mendlen left on February 4 for Harper's Ferry to attend a two week Park Guide Course offered at Mather Training Center.

Park Ranger Don Pumphrey left on Feb. 23 to attend the spring training session at Horace M. Albright Training Center.

Safety and Health: Water from the new well at the Tamiami Ranger Station was approved for drinking.

Two first aid cases were treated.

Ranger Castleberry was injured by stepping on a metal spike which required medical attention but no lost time.

One visitor accident was reported at Everglades when the window of the sightseeing boat slammed shut on a passenger's finger.

A safety ladder was installed on the seawall at Everglades as was recommended by the Safety Committee.

Chief Park Naturalist Miller is teaching a first aid course in Everglades, Fla. These classes, which began on February 16, are not only being attended by Gulf Coast District personnel, but by the townsmen. Total in attendance: 18.

Fort Jefferson National Monument: Liaison Officer DeWeese has been active in securing information regarding a means of transportation to the Fort (other than the Park Service boat) in an effort to cut costs for trips to and from the Fort by personnel assigned there. One means being considered is aircraft. Many details of a leasing agreement are yet to be worked out, if it is determined this is the most feasible means of transportation. Also discussed was the possibility of transporting interested visitors when the aircraft was not full with Park personnel leaving and returning to the Fort. This would serve the purpose of giving scheduled transportation to the Fort for visitors, for which there is a definite need.

The underwater interpretive trail markers were removed after a period of six weeks test. With weekly cleaning, these markers had stood up very well in salt water immersion. It is estimated that a complete trail will be in effect for the summer season at the Fort.

Quarters 1 and 2 are to be refurbished. This will be accomplished by arranging 50 man days of contract work, to free Everglades personnel to go to the Fort and do the renovating.

Mr. DeWeese reported that the morale of the employees was low, due to lack of personnel assignments to vacant positions at the Fort.

The use of an imprest fund for local purchases rather than the field purchase order was suggested to reduce paper work. Administrative Officer Heaton will take this up with the Regional Office.



Since it is not feasible to do the \$4,000 dock repair job with our own forces, nor to contract at Fort Jefferson for so small a sum, this money should be used to contract for maintenance at Everglades National Park so we can release Everglades men for this and other maintenance at the Fort.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Interpretive Facilities: On February 1 and 2, Asst. Chief Naturalist Tillman was in Everglades working on S.ndfly Island Nature Trail.

The interpretive program for the Gulf Coast District was prepared and mimeographed for insertion in the printed winter program of activities handout.

Further on-site study of the proposed pullouts was accomplished by Chief Naturalist Miller and Chief Ranger Kerr on February 2.

Interpretive Services: The Shark Valley Autocade continued to be popular. During the month 474 people took advantage of this chance to view the superior wildlife show along this road.

February upheld its reputation for being an extremely heavy visitor use month. There was a 22% increase over last year in the number of persons entering the museum at Royal Palm - total entering 1967 was 19,470. Roving contacts in this area were increased by 59% (6223 contacts made). Attendance at the campfire programs at Long Pine Key were increased by 1649 over February, 1967; however, some of this increase reflects the one additional program offered a week. Attendance at the Flamingo Campfire program was down by 757 persons, but this was due to the fact that only one program an evening was offered instead of the two given last year (29 programs less than February of last year). 1006 visitors joined the conducted walks lead jointly by the Headquarters and Flamingo staff. Although 20, 689 visitors entered the Parachute Key Visitor Center this month, no comparison is given as this facility was closed during February of 1966.

Special talks were given to about 1065 members of school classes and other special groups who visited Royal Palm during the month. These groups were also shown the introductory slide program at Parachute Key Visitor Center.

Some of the off-site talks given during the month were:

Florida Keys Recreation and Conservation Council, Laten, Florida; presented by Asst. Chief Naturalist Tillman.

Port Royal Beach Club, Naples, Florida; presented by Chief Park Naturalist Miller.

The Chief Park Naturalist reported the peak winter interpretive program had settled down into a good routine. The Sandfly Nature Trail in the Gulf Coast District is now in use, as is the temporary Campfire Circle at Flamingo. Air conditioning in the Parachute Key Visitor Center should be in use by late May or early June, making it possible for personnel to serve the public and also show the orientation movie to summer visitors. Chief Park Naturalist Miller suggested air conditioners of the window type for the Royal Palm Visitor Center in the hope these might be secured from Regional contingency funds in time to use this coming summer season. The Annual Information and Interpretive Services Reports and the Everglades Natural History Annual Report are being worked on. After viewing the film produced by the Tampa TV Station, Messrs. Degan and Everhart of the Washington Office believed it worthwhile to reproduce.

Reventy-three tram train trips were run at Flamingo with a total of 1,278 people. It lift box for Park folders is now installed at the Key Largo Ranger Station, for convenience of visitors when the Ranger is away from the station. A note bad and pen are provided for messages.

Seven evening programs were given at Everglades with 157 persons attending.

Ranger Denslow gave a talk to 20 persons at the Clewiston Kiwanis Club on Feb. 22.

Research and Observations: Two mullet, 4 and 5 lbs., were observed in the fresh water of Sisal Pond.

A good wildlife show still persists in the Shark Valley area. There is still enough water to enable large flocks of white ibis, herons, and egrets to feed in the area. Many herons (black crowned, yellow crowned, etc.) are nesting here. Larger flocks of glossy ibis have been observed in the early morning with as many as 20-40 birds in each flock.

A special study of the fresh water flora and fauna south of C-111 by the University of Miami Institute of Marine Science was begun. Glades vehicles proved unsuccessful for transportation due to high water. A total of 54 man hours, 13 equipment hours and 336 miles were driven at the start of the project. A helicopter was then used for transportation.

Young spoonbills are off the nest and apparently this was quite a successful nesting season. The wood ibis rookeries are still active as of last week. All boat or air trips near or over rookeries are to be cleared with Dr. Robertson before they are executed.

Chief Park Naturalist Miller, Naturalists Mrazek and Stevenson, and Biologist Ogden visited Cuthbert Rookery on February 4. Another trip to East River Rookery was made by Biologist Ogden and Naturalist Mrazek. Both Rookeries seemed to be in good condition.

On February 15 along the Anhinga Trail 35-40 young alligators were observed on and around their mother.

Limpkins have been seen along Anhinga Trail every day since the 23rd of the month.


Glossy Ibis were observed regularly next to the Anhinga Trail during the first 20 days of the month.

Also observed regularly along the Anhinga Trail was a Least Bittern.

One of the Anhinga nests which were started in January has finally produced young Anhingas. Two young were counted on February 27. The other active nest is still being tended. The third nest close to the trail was abendoned.

Water level in Taylor Slough has been steadily dropping during the month. The lowest reading at the end of the month was 1.55'.

<u>Protection</u>: Several night airboat "stake-outs" were made along the Park's east boundary to stop illegal trespass, frogging and alligator poaching.



No arrests were made but the illegal activity appeared to cease. Many protection patrols have been necessary along the new L-67 Extension to protect wildlife now moving into this new canal. Old highway 41 continues to be a problem with at least six different parties shooting at animals in the Park. Rangers stopped two drunks driving around the picnic area near the ranger station. One drunken man was removed from the Tamiami Ranger Station yard.

A motorist who knocked down the NPS mailbox at Tamiami with her car was given a verbal warning.

Ten search and rescues were conducted during the month.

Two incidents of stolen fishing equipment from the Flamingo Marina were investigated with no clues or suspects.

Sixteen motorists with minor breakdowns were aided by rangers.

Four visitors were found guilty of speeding; 2 sentences were suspended, one was banned from Park for 90 days, and the other banned from Park for 6 months.

One robbery case is still being investigated by the FBI.

The following warning citations were issued: speeding (boat and auto), drunkeness, disorderly conduct, undersized fish, picking orchids, crab traps in restricted zone, illegal parking, landing on closed Keys.

A drag race involving 15 vehicles was broken up by Ranger Riley while on night patrol.

An orientation airboat patrol was made by Rangers Robinson and Carlson down C-111 canal to the plug at U.S. 1.

Campground Ranger Pumphrey had a request to remove a 7' alligator from a camper's tent.

Prompt action and teamwork resulted in the apprehension of two auto thieves and the recovery of a stolen automobile. Seasonal FCA's Joe Kelley and John Haller discovered the vehicle and reported it. Rangers Robinson and Carlson stopped the car after a 7 mile chase at speeds of 85 mph. The car and suspects were turned over to Dade County authorities for prosecution.

Patrol mileage: Vehicle - 16,108; Boat - 3,300; Glades vehicle - 130; Airboat - 270; Park plane - 800.

Construction of a new bridge just west of the Miccosukee Restaurant to an oil lease in SW% of S18/T54S/R36E began in February. The lease area is just north of the Tamiami Trail.

Forest Fire Protection: Glades District personnel attended the Florida
Forest Service Fire Simulator in Miami. FCA Kirkland spent the week operating
the simulator with Forest Service personnel.

All Fire Control Aids were given a short in-service training session on the use of hand compass by Kirkland.



Permits were issued to burn a total of 80 acres of farm land during the month.

Building Fire Protection: Two fire brigade training sessions were held at Pine Island covering the Building Fire Plan, Safety and Pump Operation of the fire truck.

A television set in one of the motel rooms at Flamingo caught fire. Minor damage to the room was sustained. The fire was brought under control by the occupant and the use of a fire extinguisher.

Sanitation: The temporary septic tank installation in the new Visitor Center-Ranger Office at Everglades, Florida was discussed. This installation is outside Park boundaries and it was decided to request a man from PSC be sent here to work on clearance with the Florida Health Department and the U. S. Public Health Service. A meeting has been scheduled for the latter part of March with all parties to be present.

It is apparent that some of the chickee sites in the Miccosukee Reservation within the Park are becoming very littered. This creates the same condition of health and sanitation that the new units were supposed to prevent. It also creates a fire hazard to the chickees and for the grass lands of the Park that borders these sites. Many hours were spent during the month cleaning up litter from the new L-67 Extension dike as the fishermen using this area do not, as a rule, use the litter cans provided, even though signs and rangers urge them to do so.

Maintenance: Early in the month, Mr. Coryell, PSC, visited the Park and the final inspection of the bridge repairs at Flamingo was made, with a prefinal inspection on the Everglades, Florida job.

Further work will be necessary on the Flamingo bridge. This does not affect the soundness of the bridge, but the base plates need rust scraped off and the beam recoated with concrete in the near future.

In the interest of safety, the driveways on the Flamingo apartments will have to be changed so drivers enter the road to merge easily with other traffic. This will also eliminate replacement of other work which would be more costly than realigning the driveways.

The natural rock wall at Shark Valley Observation Tower is to be redesigned by PSC and specifications worked up for a rebid on this work.


The broken pier at Flamingo is to be submitted to PSC for plans and specifications for repairs to be made.

A flag pole was installed on the new administrative building in Everglades.

The Onion Key primitive campground was completed for use with the installation of a pit privy and trash burner.

Railings were built and painted on both concessioner docks at Everglades.

Work was continued on repairs to the Shark Valley Loop Road, and on the fill and utilities at the Tamiami trailer site.



Concessioner: Mr. Pistell, Chairman of the Board, Everglades Park Co., Inc. visited Mr. Robert B. Knight, President. While at the Park he met with Supt. Allin and took an avid interest in the removal of the plug from C-111 and the general water situation. Mr. Knight reports Mr. Pistell has already made a trip to Washington on the water problem and will probably make more in the future.

Resident Manager (Flamingo) of the Everglades Park Co., Inc., left late in January taking with him several key employees. Since that time President Robert B. Knight has been filling this spot.

Sammy Hamilton, Jr. moved to his new site this month. The local people are quite excited about this development and Hamilton's new boats and boat trips. Skippers are being indoctrinated in interpretive talks by the Gulf Coast Ranger personnel.

135 trips were conducted at Everglades with a total of 1,456 people. Concessioner use increased at Everglades due to the addition of new trips by the concessioner and the new location of ;this facility.

Inspections were made of Everglades park Co. food service facilities, rental skiffs and motel and cottage units at Flamingo.

<u>Complaints</u>: Complaints continued to be heard regarding the hoist operated by the Everglades Park Co. The boat hoist is inoperable most of the time.

Numerous complaints were received regarding the crowded conditions in the Long Pine Key Campground overflow area.

RESOURCE PLANNING

<u>Water Resources</u>: Senator Gaylord Nelson, A Subcommittee of one, visited the park to view the water situation first-hand on February 9 and 10. He was briefed on the water problem by Superintendent Allin then driven to Flamingo for a brief boat trip of Florida Bay. Next he was taken to the Shark Valley Tower, by airboat into the 'glades, and on to Everglades, Florida by air and boat. Rain and faulty starting of the park aircraft had upset a better organized plan for the Senator and Mrs. Nelson.



The date for the submission of the Corps report on water requirements for the Park has again been changed to some time in the fall. It was last reported it would be ready some time in June.

Superintendent Roger Allin and Hydraulic Engineer Francis A. Nix attended a meeting of the U. S. Geological Survey in Miami on February 24. Represented were the Washington and Atlanta Offices of the Survey, NPS personnel from Washington, and Dr. William B. Robertson of Everglades National Park. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the 1968 program of the USGS for Everglades National Park and the monitoring of pesticide residue for water quality.

Dr. William B. Robertson represented the Park at a conference with staff members of the Institute of Marine Science who believe they have established a relation between the water levels at gages P-33 and P-35 which will enable them to predict salinity at any given point. The Institute is not yet ready to release this abstract.

With the information furnished by the Institute, Dr. Robertson accompanied Frank Nix, Hydraulic Engineer to a meeting with the Corps of Engineers in Jacksonville where they were joined by Don Lee, NPS, WASO, USGS representatives and Arthur Marshall, USF&WS.


At the request of the Florida Governor's office, Mr. Allin attended a regular monthly Board meeting of the Flood Control District at West Palm Beach regarding the water problem, the plug in C-lll and other matters appearing on the FCD agenda.

Dr. C. P. Idyll, Durbin Tabb and members of the Institute of Marine Science staff met here with Superintendent Allin, Asst. Superintendent Burroughs, Hydraulic Engineer Francis A. Nix and Dr. W. B. Robertson regarding the survey of the area affected by removal of the plug which the Institute will do, under contract. This survey will be completed before the end of March, which is the target date for removal of the plug by the Corps of Engineers.

Construction of L-67 Extension has been completed for 4.6 miles.

Director Hartzog has made \$30,000 available for a movie on the water situation. Messrs. Degan and Everhart visited the Park on this and other projects during the month.

Superintendent Allin briefed all Division Chiefs regarding his work with the



Director's staff the final two weeks in January which culminated in unrecorded hearings on the plug in Canal-111. The meeting was called by Senator Holland and attended by representatives of numerous other Government agencies, including Corps of Engineers, U. S. Geological Survey, Bureau of the Budget, Flood Control District of Florida and Representative Dante Fascell.

At this hearing it was Senator Holland's view that the plug in C-111 should be removed and wells established within and without the Park boundary to determine salinity inflows. Director Hartzog accepted the well studies with the stipulation that the U. S. Geological Survey Director make formal request to the Park Service for such wells.

Mr. Allin requested Division Chiefs to incorporate current water situation data in all interpretive talks, and since this request has followed up by supplying a brief written summation on the problem for the use of Park personnel. The State will pull the plug from the canal, probably by the end of March.

The Superintendent also briefed the staff on the Annual Water Resources Conference held by the Governor in Tallahassee January 31. This meeting was attended by the Corps of Engineers, Metro-Dade County Commissioners and others from South Dade as the Southwest Dade Project was on the agenda.

Status of Private Lands: We are about ready to close out the Hutner-Freeman deal. Receipt of insurance of title is all that remains to accomplish the transfer of the 480 acres of the Hutner property to the ownership of the U. S. Government. This is now in process of completion.

We are still awaiting the reaction of BOR on the Annat property in 1967 substitute tract. Only remaining prospect for the \$30,000 remaining for this year was a tract of about 275 acres owned by Signets, who wants \$175. per acre.

Mr. Laser secured an option on the Lounsbury property. The Alico and Lounsbury lands are in the 1968 budget as are others in the Northwest Extension.

An option on the Bridy property (80 acres) was received and accepted for reprogramming in 1967. This is in lieu of property we have been unable to attain.

Boundary Adjustments: About 70% of the Brownell survey of the north and west boundary was completed in February.

Cooperation with Federal, State or Local Governments: Upon approval of the use of Amate for the wild cotton reduction program by the Regional Office, the USDA was notified. This letter particularly called to their attention the restrictions imposed in the use of this pesticide.

The Bureau of Public Roads representatives visited this Park in conjunction with the resurfacing of the main Park road. Plans were begun by the Interpretive staff, in cooperation with the Park Engineer, for interpretive turn-outs to be staked, changes to be made in the routing of traffic at the Entrance Station to reduce accident hazards.

U. S. Army testing team was in the Park testing special equipment.



Ranger Moseley accompanied the Coast Guard boarding team during the month.

U. S. Department of Agriculture 'Wild Cotton Crew' personnel assisted in rescuing Mr. Masland and party from East Cape area after they had been beached by a storm.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

General Publicity: The National Education Television studio of Channel 2 made a film in the Glades District. The film "Everglades - Project Conservation" will be shown on Channel 2 on March 30 at 9:30 and again on April 3 at 12:45.

Public Relations: Mr. & Mrs. Frank Masland of Carlisle, Pa. spent the month in a housekeeping cottage at Flamingo. Mr. Masland met with various members of the Park staff, including several conferences with Supt. Allin. He also aided Messrs. Degan and Everhart in the groundwork for a park film and at the request of the Director made a survey of some of the areas which are to be proposed for inclusion in the National Wilderness Preservation System. Mr. Masland is a former member of the National Park Service Advisory Board.

Supt. Allin and Asst. Supt. Burroughs met with Mr. Gene Marie, News Editor of Rampart magazine regarding an article he proposes to do on this park.

Superintendent Allin shopped the competition at the Parrot Jungle and the Serpentarium during the month -- on non-work days, of course.

Superintendent Allin spoke on the Everglades Water Situation at the Biscayne Bay Yacht Club on Tuesday evening, February 14.

A special tour of the Anhinga and Gumbo Limbo Trails was given to Mr. Ivan Sandrof and party on February 23. Mr. Sandrof is with the Worchester News, Worchester, Mass.

On February 4, 1967 Assistant Chief Naturalist Larry Tillman and Ranger Edward Carlson assisted Mr. Ivan Marleaux, Channel 2, Miami, in filming an elementary social studies program, "The Everglades--Project Conservation". This show will be televised on March 31 at 9:30 A.M. and again on April 3 at 12:45 P.M.

Mr. Johnson of the "Flipper" television series was in the park on February 1 regarding materials for a scene to be shot outside of the Park.

Naturalist Mrazek also accompanied Dr. F. C. Craighead and Lawrence Will, author of "A Dredgeman of Cape Sable" to Cape Sable and Lake Ingraham on February 22. Lawrence Will donated a copy of his new book "Dredgeman of Cape Sable" to the park's reference library.

On February 10, Mr. Max Dorian, a French writer sponsored by the State Dept. interviewed the Chief Park Naturalist in regard to an article he is writing. Later, Naturalist Wm. Truesdell escorted Mr. & Mrs. Dorian around the Anhinga and Gumbo Limbo Trails.



DUSIGN AND COMPTRUCTION

Waters and Stewart, Inc., Contract No. 14-10-1-160-7, Employee Apartments, Flamingo - Change Order No. 2 dated February 8, changed electrical service to underground, provided installation of four electrical meters for each building at an increase in cost of \$2,685.10; installation of two water meters at each building and an additional 125 feet of 4 inch soil pipe at an increase of \$941.56. February 24, Project Supervisor John Flister, Foreman IV. (Maintenance) Robert Breazeale, and Mr. Ellis of Miami Sod Company made final inspection of work under this contract and accepted contract as 100 percent completed.

February 23, Foreman IV (Maintenance) Robert Breazeale met with Mr. R. J. Rendleman of the Contractors Supply Company at the site to discuss installation of fence and gates at the Ranger Office-Comfort Station, Gulf Coast.







GENERAL

<u>Weather Conditions</u>: January had pleasant days with cool spells early and late in the month. Small craft warnings were flown on 3 occasions at Key Largo and once at Flamingo. Scattered light rain fell throughout the Park ranging from 1.20" at Everglades to 9.96" at Key Largo. At months end, the Taylor Slough water gauge read 2.24"; compared to a reading of 2.40" at the end of January 1965.

A Maximum Temperature of 87° was recorded at Royal Palm and Tamiami. A Minimum temperature of 34° was recorded at Royal Palm. Rainfall for the month was as follows: Royal Palm - 2.12"; Tamiami - 1.60"; Flamingo - 1.21"; Key Largo - 2.96"; Everglades - 1.20".

Increase in Travel: There was a 1.7% increase in visitation with 105,854 visitors during the month as compared to 104,070 for January 1966.

Camping use decreased 12%. This may be attributed to a 200 campsite area opened to the public in Florida City with no limitation on length of stay.

Miscellaneous: Fire Control Aid Delbert Wondergem was married to Miss Mary Christensen of Jackson, Michigan and the couple now reside at the Shark Valley Tower.

ADMINISTRATION

Entrance Fees: Engrance Station collections for January totalled \$11,502.

Management Analysis: Messrs. Liles, Bainbridge, Cox and Millell, comprising the Management Appraisal Team from the Southeast Regional Office, arrived on January 4 to remain for approximately ten days.

The Superintendent's Annual Research Report and the annual Information and Interpretive Services Report were submitted.



Personnel: William G. Truesdell, Park Naturalist, GS-452-7, reassigned from Shenandoah National Park effective 01-15-67.

William E. York, :Auto Mechanic Helper, was transferred to the Department of the Army, Fort Miles, Lewes, Delaware, effective 01-06-67.

Safety & Health: The Park Safety Committee met at the end of the month and made a field trip to Tamiami and Everglades City to inspect the areas for safety hazards.

Park families are cooperating with the Dade County Health Department, and with Indian neighbors, in trying to rid the Tamiami area of the Lookworm which infests the reservation. This area has one of the highest rates of hookworm in the south. Park Service families have contracted a mild form of hookworm and are making every effort to avoid contracting the more harmful varieties.

Ranger personnel are attending first aid classes at Park Headquarters.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Interpretive Facilities: Chief Park Naturalist Miller met with Messrs. Frank Masland, Who. Everhart, and Carl Degen to discuss the "Men of Conservation" film to be "shot" in Everglades National Park. January 23, Naturalist Mrazek accompanied these men and their photographic crew to 'Gator Lake and to East River Rookery on January 24 and 26.

Chief Park Naturalist Miller, accompanied by Dr. F. C. Craighead on January 6 and 11 and again by Dr. W. D. Robertson on the 31st, toured the main park road to inspect possible interpretive pull-out sites.

Naturalist Gale Zimmer has completed texts for the Fort Jefferson underwater nature trail.

Writing of the text for the Sand Fly Island nature trail booklet was started during the month.

The Gulf Coast District rangers finished work on the Sand Fly Island nature trail and stakes.

The new temporary amphitheater at Flamingo was completed and the first outside program held an Saturday, January 14. With the exception of four evenings (when there were light rains and cold windy weather) the attendance at and response to the outside programs were good.

A study was made on January 12 by Chief Naturalist Miller and Naturalist Zimmer regarding the rehabilitation of the Mahogany Hammock and Flamingo Visitor Center exhibits.

The Chief Park Naturalist took Naturalists Vm. Truesdell and Mike Story on an orientation trip to the Tamiami Sub-District and the Gulf Coast District on January 27 and 28. District Ranger Stokes transported the trio to Lostman's River Patrol Station January 27 where they were met by Naturalist



Mrazek from Flamingo. All spent the night at Lostman's and returned to Flamingo via the East River Roohery the following day.

Interpretive Services: As news of the Shark Valley Autocade was published and spread around by word of mouth, attendance at this activity rose and showed signs of Lecoming one of the more popular programs being offered.

An excellent film pertaining to alligator poaching, featuring Ranger Richard Stokes, was reviewed by the members of the staff and Chief of Motion Picture and Audiovisual Branch Degen. The message of this film is so timely and the problem so critical that Chief Naturalist Miller and Mr. Degen are attempting to have copies made to be shown as widely as possible.

Six off-site talks were given by the members of the Division of Interpretation.

The Annual Bird Count was held on January 1. 170 species were observed.

On January 22, Chief Naturalist Miller escorted the Ranger Aids and Naturalist Truesdell to Shark Valley.

The 5-mile hike and like trail and 3-mile hiking trail are very popular with 15 to 20 persons using them daily.

Auto caravan trips on Saturdays and Sundays have proved very popular for visitors on the Shark Valley Loop Road.

The docks on loth Sandfly Island and Kingston Key have been completed, except for the handrail on the Kingston Key dock, and the trail on Sandfly has been completed.

A talk consisting of slides and information obtained from the 1966 loggerhead turtle project was incorporated into the evening talk series at Flamingo. Many of the visitors attending this talk commented favorably on it and expressed much concern and interest in the subject matter.

Research and Olservations: The East River Rookery appeared to be in healthy condition at the end of the month. About 600 pairs of Wood Itis, a number of Snowy and Common Egreta and several pairs of Anhingas were nesting there. It was estimated that 25% of the Wood Ibis nests contained young birds late in January. The rest were incubating.

A ground visit to the Cuthbert Roohery showed the small roohery which formed there in November seemed to be in good condition.

Three pairs of Anhingas have built nests in view of the shelter on the Anhinga Trail. It is believed that egg laying has taken place in one of these.

The 1966 Loggerhead Turtle Project report was completed and submitted to the Chief Ranger by Ranger Klukas.

Subdistrict Ranger Erwin Winte submitted a research paper on tree snails.

Ranger Holden extended his pesticide report and submitted more details on pesticide use by farmers.

The fish hill progressed as far as the Shark Valley Tower where several hundred bass and bream were killed but the situation had improved by month's end.

Curatorial Activities: Dr. C. P. Kin all, author of Arthropods of Florida, visited the Park on January 31 and deposited five specimens in the Park's study collection.

Protection: Ranger personnel spent 150.5 manhours with VIP's and cooperating agencies.

Extensive loat patrols were made during the month into the back-country areas of the Park as poaching activities appeared to be on the increase.

Three men appeared before the U. S. Commissioner and pleaded guilty to killing wildlife, were fined \$100 each and put on probation.

One case was heard before the Commissioner and the defendant was found guilty of reckless driving. His driving rights in the Park were suspended for 30 days.

One incident of considerable vandalism of Everglades Park Company property was investigated. No court action was taken as the guilty party agreed to pay for the damages. Total damage incurred was \$800.00

Ranger personnel participated in Cloat search and rescues.

Many gunners in the Tamiami area were heard shooting both day and night. Many continue to shoot from moving cars at road signs and into the Park. One shooter cited to appear before the U.S. Commissioner, for shooting Park wildlife, was fined \$10.

Warning citations were issued to two men shooting along L-67 Extension inside the Park. Another man was warned for carrying a loaded sidearm on this same dike

Eight verbal warnings were given to people shooting from old Highway 41 into the Park. One man was warned not to shoot at maintenance men, and four who didn't know the Ranger Station and MPS residence were right behind the willows into which they were shooting.

Rangers investigated, but could not apprehend, the person or persons practicing touch-and-go landings on Mahogany Hammock Road.

Twenty-one unscheduled night patrols were made for wildlife protection and visitor services.

One skinned alligator carcass was found along the Ingraham Highway. Two alligators were killed by vandals.

Fire Control Aids Kirkland and Haller and Seasonal Ranger Kloos assisted Ranger Riley on a stake-out of the Royal Palm area until early morning in an unsuccessful attempt to apprehend alligator poachers.

The Chief Ranger assisted ranger personnel in breaking up a drag race on the Long Pine Key Road. The 6 men involved, from the Missile Site in the Hole-in-the-Donut, were turned over to their Commanding Officer who reduced them in rank, gave them extra duty and restricted the men to the lase.

Many campers were asked to leave the Long Pine Key Campground Lecause they had overstayed the 14-day limit.

Patrol Mileage for the month was as follows: Vehicle - 22,505; Noat - 3,342; Glades vehicle - 68; Airboat - 266; Airplane 5,050.

Forest Fire Protection: 4-3/4 miles of old highway 41 were burned to reduce the fire potential.

Class days of the National Fire Danger Rating System were as follows:

Moderate - 2 days High - 12 days Very High - 17 days

Insects and Tree Diseases: U. S. Department of Agriculture cotton eradication crews moved in and began operations.

Ranger Riley took Drs. Craighead and Tomblinson by glades vehicle to obtain cross sections of cypress trees for tree ring analysis and environmental studies. These trees showed the effects of Hurricane Inez and old fire scars.

Building Fire Protection: A fire drill was held whereby a fire was simulated in the "T" area of the campground at Flamingo. Eleven NPS and one Everglades Park Co. personnel responded.

A general clean-up of all the old buildings at the Tamiami Ranger Station was completed to reduce the fire hazard.

Sanitation: New garbage cans for fishermen were placed along the L-67 Extension, with renewed pleas and signs to help keep the area clean. Little has been accomplished as the thousands of people who use this area do not choose to use garbage cans or carry out their own litter. In addition, they throw hundreds of pounds of unwanted fish on the ground.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: Alligators are still Leing seen in the creeks with several being observed in the upper Broad and Rogers River areas. Good populations of ducks over the Gulf Coast District; many Bluebills in the Bays, Widgeon and Teal were observed in the fresh headwaters areas of the Gulf Coast District. Egrets, Il is, and Herons were observed in great numbers.

Maintenance: A new water well at the Tamiami Ranger Station was partially completed.

Outdoor facilities for evening programs were installed at Flamingo, an improvement over the auditorium formerly used.

Campsite location signs were installed at the beginning of all side roads in the Flamingo area campground.

Concessioners: Mr. Tom Flynn, Chief of Concessions Management, Washington, arrived to go over the Flamingo and Everglades concessions and make recommendations for improvements.

Sammy Hamilton, concessioner at Everglades, launched a new big tour boat and it looks excellent. This new boat should be a real asset to his operation.

Concessioner use was down 20% at Flamingo.



Mr. Burroughs met with Mr. Robert B. Knight and Mr. Richard Clark, President of the General Baking Co., regarding concessioner development plans and monument plans for Fort Jefferson on January 10.

Assistant Superintendent Burroughs and concessioner president, Ir. Robert B. Knight, conferred regarding the development plans for the proposed Everglades Park Co.. Inc. extension of facilities at Flamingo.

Mr. Crabtree of the AAA paid his respects to Superintendent Allin upon leaving the park following his inspection of the motel and dining facilities at Flamingo. He will submit a report at a later date.

RESOURCE PLANNING

Upon arrival at the Superintendent's Conference, Mr. Allin was directed to proceed to Washington for meetings with the Director and his staff regarding the water situation, prior to the meeting called in Senator Holland's office for January 24. Mr. Nix met Mr. Allin in Washington on Honday, January 23 to also attend this meeting.

At the request of the Director, Messrs. Allin and Nix went to Washington, D.C. on Monday, January 16, on the water situation.

On Tuesday, at the telephoned request of Superintendent Allin, Research Biologist Robertson went to the Marine Institute to confer with members of the staff regarding the possibility of salt water intrusion upon the removal of the plug in Canal 111.

On Wednesday, January 13, Messrs. Him and Robertson attended a meeting with the Corps of Engineers in Jacksonville, Florida while Superintendent Allin remained in Washington.

Following the meeting in Semator Holland's Office, a meeting was held on Friday, January 27 with Messrs. Hartwell and Ferguson of the USGS Miami and Arlington, Va. Offices, Dr. Craighead and Hydraulic Engineer Nix on the results of the Washington meeting.

On January 31 Superintendent Allin and Hydraulic Engineer Frank Nix attended the Governor's Annual Conference on Water Resources Development, Florida Board of Conservation in Tallahassee. Governor Kirk requested Superintendent Allin attend a meeting of the Florida Flood Control District to be held at West Palm Beach on Friday, February 3.

When Hydraulic Engineer Nix returned from his latest trip to Washington at the call of the Director, Messrs. Ketchum of the Washington Service Center and Manuel Morris of the San Francisco Service Center returned with him. They were shown the park from the ground and from the air.

Mr. George Collins, San Francisco, NPS retired, and Mrs. Doris Leonard visited Superintendent Allin offering conservationists assistance. Mr. Allin went over the water problem with them as did Mr. Nix, and they were flown over the Park, the Conservation Areas and various other flood control works in their brief visit. Enroute to the west coast of Florida they spent some time and took some excellent pictures at the Shark Valley Loop Road and Observation Tower.



Mrs. Mary Collett Farris, author from Punta Gorda, Florida, visited Mr. Nix to check and see what changes had occurred in the water situation since her last visit here approximately one year ago.

Status of Private Lands: Mr. Ned Williams of the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, Atlanta, Georgia, flew over the Annat tract, to inspect this property prior to acquisition by the Park Service.

Management Assistant John R. DeWeese spent a day at the Miami Courthouse checking land records for the land acquisition program.

Eoundary Adjustments: Mr. Brownell is resurveying the Park boundary just west of the Tamiami Ranger Station.

Cooperation with other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: District Ranger Stokes attended the Five Counties Water meeting at Marco Island.

District Ranger Stokes met with Weather Bureau people to discuss the installation of weather instruments and facilities at the new building in Everglades, Florida.

Royal Palm Subdistrict rangers assisted the U.S. Army Limited War Laboratory personnel in their classified project.

Tamiami rangers are cooperating with the Corps of Engineers by taking additional measurements to help them determine the head of water they hold to the north of the Park.

January 21, the Miami Geological Society conducted a field trip to Everglades National Park. They were accompanied on a Bus and boat tour Ly Chief Park Naturalist Miller, Research Biologist Robertson, Collaborator Craighead, Asst. Chief Naturalist Tillman, Park Naturalist Truesdell, and Ranger Riley.

Mr. Faircloth of the Wild Cotton Eradication Project met with Dr. W. B. Robertson, Research Eiologist, regarding the work to be done by the cotton picking crews.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

General Publicity: On Saturday, January 14, Superintendent Allin was the featured speaker at the Annual Convention of the Florida Audubon Society in Miami, Florida.


Reports of actions in court cases are now being submitted to local news outlets.


