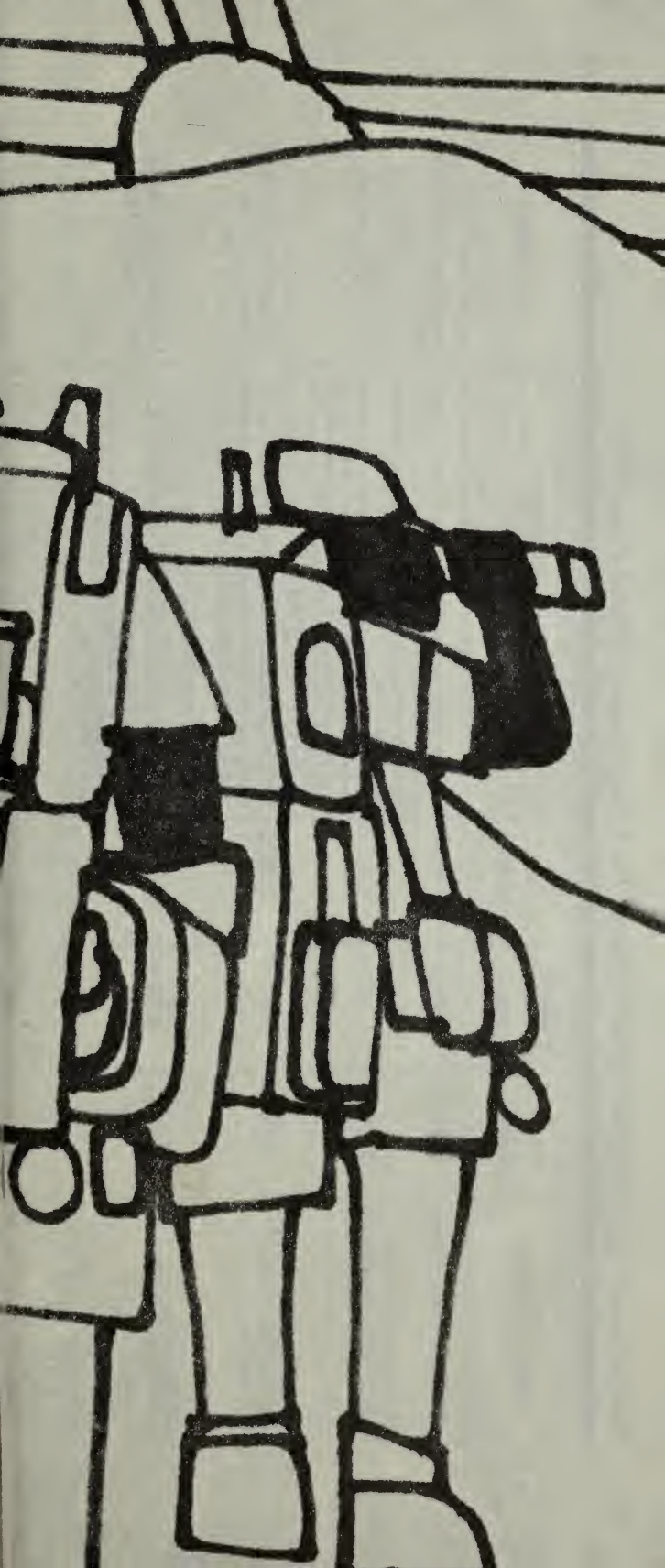

Congress has designated 1972 as National Parks Centennial Year and established a National Parks Centennial Commission to celebrate the beginning of the national park idea with appropriate ceremonies, culminating in the Second World Conference on National Parks. This international conference will be held in September 1972 in Yellowstone and Grand Teton National Parks. Delegates representing many countries will examine the role of parks in a time of deepening environmental crisis and look for ways to strengthen and extend the national park idea throughout the world.
