

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



Another final inspection of the utility lines onstruction in a Area B at Canyon was held on July 29 and this time we refuse accept the work because of the many deviations in construction for the plans and specifications, especially in the construction for sewer manholes, valve boxes, and lateral distribution lines for water. The contractor, Studer Construction Company, has been by the Project Supervisor to correct and complete the work. appears likely that the contractor will make claim against us for the cost of this work, claiming that he followed explicit institution of the Construction Representative there on the job.

A final inspection was held on August 4 for the construction of hidges on the Gibbon and Lewis Rivers and the work was accepted. These were built by Cop Construction Company under BPR supervision.

Projects on which work went well were:

Construction of apartments and dormitory-messhall at Madison Junction and comfort stations at Grant Village--Teller Construction Company may complete these by October 1.

Repair of Warehouse roof--Reed Nielsen is ready to place tile.

Repair of rock walls by McLaughlin--work has gone slowly but appears to be well done.


Construction of bridge and approaches at Bridge Bay--Charles M. Smith has progressed rapidly on this BPR job and may have the bridge in service when needed in October.

Relocation of road at Madison Junction and construction of Gibbon River Bridge--Taggart has done well although we continue to doubt that he can make his schedule of completion this fall except for surfacing.

Construction of service roads by Brush started slowly but is moving along now.

The construction of water and sewer systems by Northwest Construction Company at West Entrance and Nelson Brothers at Madison progressed slowly but steadily. However, the Nelson Brothers project for construction of the seasonal apartments at Mammoth and comfort stations at Madison Junction has started very slowly with only the concrete foundations completed to date.

Considerable difficulty was experienced with Studer Construction Company in addition to the refusal of work in Cabin Area B previously mentioned. The contract with him for production of aggregate for Grant Village roads



was signed only last week after steps were started to take the bid bond. His project for construction of the campground roads went slowly and we are becoming apprehensive that he will interfere greatly with Kloepfer Construction Company on construction of the water and sewer lines in Grant Village. Fortunately he has subcontracted the construction of the seawall to Cop Construction Company, a very good firm, and they have started construction.

The stabilization of the slide area on the North Entrance Road has gone slowly and the contractor has been on penalty time since early July. Nelson Brothers have filed two formal protests and claims. In the first they claim additional compensation and time because of an alleged change in the sequence of work by the BPR Project Engineer. In the second claim they protest unsafe working conditions because of the manner of work prescribed by the engineer. The Bureau of Public Roads has denied both claims and it appears likely that Nelson Brothers will appeal the first one.

Conferences and Meetings: The Yellowstone Park Company sponsored a conference at Canyon Village on July 28 and 29 for the purpose of investigating ways and means of constructing cabins for visitor use which would be cheap enough to justify reasonable rental rates and at the same time meet National Park Service standards. Director Wirth, Chief of Design and Construction Vint, Regional Director Baker, Chief of WODC Hill, and Superintendent Garrison appeared on the program. A number of manufacturers of prefabricated and precut buildings, trailer manufacturers, and dealers of other construction materials appeared and the Rushmore Mobile Homes demonstrated one of their trailer-type motel units. We hope that the conference will result in early construction of more units by the concessioners.
