SUBJECT: Monthly Narrative Report, January 1963, Ranger Services Division

GENERAL

Weather Conditions: Pleasantly cool weather prevailed during the month of January with a high temperature of 88° being recorded at Tamiami Ranger Station and a low of 36° at Royal Palm.

Rainfall was extremely light in most areas of the Park. The water table continued to drop rapidly with the Taylor Slough gauge reading 1.27 feet. Surface water had vanished from the Shark Valley with only an occasional pond visible by the end of the month.

Small craft warnings were displayed for two days in the water areas of the Park. The following is a weather summary for Everglades National Park.

Increase or Decrease in Travel. Visitation to the Park increased slightly over January 1962. A total of 67,495 persons entered the Park during the month. This is an increase of 621 people or slightly less than 1%.

Everglades experienced a phenomenal increase in camper use in the Park. A total of 7,241 persons used designated camping areas, while 4,603 were forced to camp in the overflow areas, for a grand total of 11,844 persons and represents a 46% increase over last year's figure of 8,133 campers.

Visitors from all 50 states, 6 Canadian provinces and one US territory as well as the following foreign nations visited the Park: Sweden, Italy, Poland, Germany, England, Argentina, El Salvador, Venezula, Austria, Japan, Cuba, Union of South Africa, Brazil, Switzerland, Hondorus, Chili, Isarel, France, Finland, New Zealand, Egypt and Denmark.

ADMINISTRATION

Personnel. Mr. Don H. Castleberry was selected to fill the vacant position in the Cape Sable sub-district. Mr. Castleberry will report on the 3rd of February.

Ranger Raymond L. Spruill is on extended sick leave and was absent from the



Park the entire month.

Seasonal Ranger Rupert P. Schmitt entered on duty in the Glades District on January 15 and was assigned duty at the Entrance Station.

Sanitation: Mr. Joseph Boyer, Regional Director, US Public Health Service, Atlanta, Ga. was in the Park during the month of January. Mr. Boyer inspected concession facilities and operations in the Flamingo area.

Safety and Health: Ten first aid cases were attended by Ranger personnel during the month. No major accidents occurred during January.

INTERPRETIVE ACTIVITIES AND DEVELOPMENT

Interpretive Services: Boat-a-cades in both the Gulf and Mangrove districts continued during January. Four trips were made from the Flamingo area and three from the Everglades region. All were considered quite successful and well received by those participating.

Research and Observations: Both Cuthberth and East River rookeries were formed and progressing satisfactorily. By the end of the month birds were noted in the vicinity of the Old Shark River Rookery and it is hoped that these birds will nest in numbers early this season.

The re-evaluation of tree growth and size in the Long Pine Key controlled burning area got underway during January. All areas burned thus far in the project are being re-studies by Ranger personnel assisted by Park Biologist Robertson.

OPERATIONS


<u>Protection and Ranger Services.</u> Ranger personnel apprehended a 14 year old run-away boy in the Flamingo campground. He was returned to his parents who reside in Homestead, Fla.

Keys in Florida Bay which are being used as nesting areas by Roseate Spoonbills were closed to the public during the month. Signs so stating were placed at all approaches to these nest keys.

Two fishermen were apprehended for stopnetting in the Gulf District of the Park. Preliminary hearing was held before the US Commissioner and defendents were bound over to US Federal District Court.

Nine other defendents were taken before the US Commissioner on charges varying from passing vehicles at intersection, failing to stop at designated signs, possession of firearms in the Park, traveling at excessive speed and to no valid drivers license. All defendents were found guilty as charged. Total of 7 warning tickets were issued to motorists for traffic violations during the Month.

The Park aircraft flew 23 flights for a total of $59\frac{1}{2}$ hours flight time. Patrol mileage for the Park was as follows:

Forest fire protection: 14 burning permits were issued to farmers & campers along the east boundary and in the Hole-in-the-donut areas. Fire Control personnel completed a base map for the east boundary protective zone of the Park which will be used to good advantage. A total of 4 fires occurred in the Park and protective zone during the month.

General

Weather Conditions

Beautiful weather was the rule for Jan ary with only a few cool nights. Some windy weather and ery li the rain, 1.06 inches. Mean Max. Temp. 76.06 and a Max. Temp. of 840 with a mean Min. Temp. of 56.83 and a Min. Temp. of 410 for a mean temp. of 66.45.

Travel

Travel was up for January. Increases occurred in o r t rea main travel catagories, sight seeing, sports fishing and commercial fishing. Sport fishing increased due to the influx of cut of state visitors. Commercial fishing has increase que to the mackeral and compano fleets roving into the area. A total of 8,542 persons entered park from Everglades as compar d to 5548 in Dec. 1962 and 6718 in Jar. 1962.

Ranger activities were stepped on to a foverish cace during January. This was done for several masons. One pein reports of gator minting and stop retting and due to very little coat maintence work, which is very time communing, was needed.

The results of this activity were two cases incugat before the U.S. Commissioner. The first case involving Delton Demr and John Squires was made by Ranger Carlson. They were apprehenced in Convilier Bay comping in from an alligator hunting trip. They were able to rid the selves of tides and guns, but they collided with ranger boat in Alligator Creek and were charged with reckless boat operation, or ration of an un-numbered boat with no regri tration papers. (Delton Demry) For this he riceived 6 months probation. John Squires has charged with the latter two charges and was put on probation for one year and that terms were that he star out of park area for one year.

Another case was arraigned before the ".S. Commission r on Jan. 21. clark Brown and Carles Robinson were charged with stop notting and possession of firearms. This case was bound over to U.S. District Court. All three rangers worked on this case.

Ranger Hacktrbracht has been on sch duled night patrols or two weeks. Ranger Carlson has spent three nights at Lostman's River Station. Several other night patrols were ade by all three rangers.

The long standing problem of wire crab trans in the Long. County area of the early has at last been terminated. The chief rangers memo was received on Jan. 24 and the crabber is notified the same da to remove his trans. He was given one week to do so. On Jan. 31 the area was checked and not a tran was found.

Maintenance

Maintenance pe sonnel installed a much ned bulletin boatd at our bot lock area. This has been put to good use on both front and back.

Weather Conditions: Mild weather characterized by warm clear days prevailed through out January. Precipitation was again low with only 1.73 of inch recorded for the month. Small craft warnings were displayed for two days.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Protection: A complaint was received that a former concessioner employee had stolen clothing valued at \$300.00. All the information was given to the REEX FBI.

A written warning citation was given to a camper for disorderly conduct.

A runaway 14 year old boy was located at the campground and returned to his parents who were at the Chief Ranger's Office.

"Closed Area" signs were installed at six spoonbill nesting keys.

Ranger Kasparek made one plane flight over his sub-district.

Four boat-a-cades were conducted during the month with 25 boats and 107 ppp people participating.

A park visitor, whose motor vehicle was struck on the cape sable road, was given assistance by ranger personnel.

Patrol mileages for the month were: Vehicles - 5,291 miles, Boats - 2,531 miles.

One park visitor boat search was conducted.

Building Fire Protection: Four fire truck inspections were made and all the five hydrants were flushed once during January.

Sanitation: Mr. Joseph Boyer, Regional Director, US Publis Health Service, Atlanta, Ga., accompanied by Ranger Wickware inspected all the concessioner food service facilities in the Flamingo area.

Vildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: Tarpon fishing improved during the month in the Whitewater Bay area.

Both Cuthberth and East River rookeries have formed and are progressing satisfactorily.

oncessioners: The Everglades Park Company had an increase of gross sales of 2% over January, 1962. The Lodge for the last ten days of the month had 94.7% ccapancy compared to 25 82% for the same period in 1962.

safety & Health: Ten first aid cases were attended during the month.

Two park visitors whose injuries required a doctor's attention were escorted by ranger personnel to Homestead.



RESOURCE PLANNING

Cooperation with other Federal, State, or local agencies: Rangers assigned to this district continue to cooperate with personnel from the U.S. Geological Survey and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in connection with their studies within the park.

Cooperating non-government agencies: Personnel from the University of Miami, have been active with their studies in the Flamingo area concerning shrimp migration and populations.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Public Relations: With the influx of population into the district the importance of sound public relations is being stressed to all uniformed personnel. We are proud to say that things are going smoothly as of this date.

Monthly Narrative Report, February 1963

GENERAL

Weather: Several cold fronts swept into the south Florida area from the north, causing generally unsettled weather during the month. Temperatures however remained in the comfortable zone. A high of 86 degrees being recorded at Flamingo and a low of 41 degrees registered at Royal Palm. Winds and some rain accompanied these fronts. A total of 3.78 inches of rain fell in the Tamiami area and this was generally true for the remainder of the glades section of the Park. Winds were moderate to strong. Small craft warnings were displayed in the Flamingo and Florida Bay sections of the Park for 6 days during the period.

The water table rose slightly with the Taylor Slough gauge reading 1.68 feet on February 28 as compared with 1.27 feet the last day of January and .58 feet for February 1962.

Following is a weather summary for the month:

Increase or Decrease in Travel: A total of 71,790 persons visited the Park during February. This is an increase over February 1962, however is a drop of $13\frac{1}{2}\%$ below the 81,567 visitors recorded in 1962. There is no apparent explanation for this drop unless it could have been the cool blustery weather which occurred over two weekends in February.

Campground use continued to grow rapidly. A total of 15,280 persons took advantage of camping facilities. Of this total, 7, 868 were handled in overflow camping areas adjacent to the regular campgrounds. In 1962 only 10,415 campers used the Park campground and overflow during February.

Visitors from 48 of the 50 states were represented in the total travel figures as well as 8 Canadian provinces and the following foreign countries: Germany, S. Africa, Sweden, Cuba, Spain, Thialand, England, Italy, France, British West Indies, Japan, Peru, Norway and Dominican Republic.

Special Activities: Ass't Chief Ranger Maxwell attended a meeting with representatives of the Metro Fire Department discussing protection of Aerojet Lands which

lie adjacent to the park boundary. This land has in previous years designated as park protective zone, with service personnel taking action on wildfires starting in the area.

Everglades National Park was represented the six days of the Miami International Boat Show held at the Dinner Key Auditorium. Park Rangers participated in manning a booth assigned to the Everglades Park Company. It was felt that good contact and public relations were enhanced by this activity.

ADMINISTRATION

Personnel: Donald H. Castleberry entered on duty February 4th as a Park Ranger. Mr. Castleberry was assigned to the Flamingo District. Zeb V. McKinney was terminated as seasonal Park Ranger on February 28. Park Ranger Raymond L. Spruill remained on sick leave during the entire month of February.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Interpretative Services: Ranger conducted boat-a-cades continued from Flamingo and Everglades Ranger Stations. Windy weather kept attendance to a minimum. One one Saturday, one boat-a-cade in both areas were- was cancelled because of the wind and rain.

Research and Observation: Long Pine Key control burn project was continued during the month. On February 6, two days following a substantial rain, Block I of Long Pine Key was ignited. Four days was required to complete the successful burn of the block. This is the same block that was partially burned in 1961.

Restudy of research of Blocks on plots B, E, and F was completed during the month. It is hoped that all study restudy of previously burned plots can be completed in March.

The Liguus snail collection at Headquarters was recatalogued by Collaborator Archie Jones and Ranger Winte during February. This collection is now in excellent condition and more usable than it has been previously.

PROTECTION

On February 12, a Northwest Orient 720B Fanjet aircraft crashed approximately 12 miles south of Tamiami within the boundaries of ENP. All 43 persons aboard were killed instantly. Wreckage is strewen from just south of the 7 mile tower westward approximately 10 miles. The main fuselage and nose of the craft is locate in Township 36, Range 35, Section 18. All bodies have been recovered and removed from the Park. Investigation of the crash is being conducted by the CAB with the FBI and other government agents assisting. Ranger personnel were taxed to the utmost at this busy time of the year in protecting the scene of the crash and furnishing transportation and communications for the investigation. A partial mock-up of the crash is being built at the scene. As many as 60 persons are being used on this project. By the end of the month, the possibility of removing the nos and cabin section from the Park for further mock-up in Miami was being discussed.



In the meantime, Ranger personnel are still involved in this operation. A Special Incident Report will be prepared covering the entire project.

Two law enforcement cases were taken before the US Commissioner during February. These involved speeding and possession of firearms. In both cases, the dfe defendents were found guilty by the US Commissioner.

MISCELLANEOUS

Personnel participated in the Homestead Rodeo Parade. Fire equipment, airboat and park weasels were displayed during the event.

<u>Protection</u>: District personnel in the Flamingo area effected four boat rescues during the month. All four were in the Florida Bay area.

First Aid cases rose sharply with 10 cases being treated; none serious.

The US Department of Agriculture installed 12 fruit fly traps in the Flamingo area. To date no flies have been found. A special report was submitted by District Ranger Whitehouse as to location, etc.

Five airboat and 3 firearm permits were issued during the month.

Forest Fire Protection: The unseasonal rainshowers during February decreased fire danger during the month. It was estimated that effect of these rains would last at least three weeks. One fire occured in the park's protective zone during February. This fire accounted for 1.1 acres.

Building Fire Protection: The Pine Island fire brigade held two drills during February.

<u>Sanitation</u>: A minor problem developed in both campgrounds concerning the dumping of sewage or waste water in the campground area from trailers. As soon as this was noticed each trailer was contacted and warned against this practice.

Resource Planning: Boundary Adjustments - Ranger Personnel, assisted by the Park Engineer, ran a Park line along the north side of the Hole in the Donut where additional clearing for agricultural purposes is taking place. The Barnes brothers have leased approximately 1,000 acres of land in the section which includes the west half of section 26 and all of section 27 and plan to clear the entire area for farming next fall.

March 1963

GENERAL

Weather Conditions: March proved to be one of the driest months in the history of Everglades National Park. With the exception of the Tamiami Ranger Station, all areas reported less than one inch of precipitation. Water levels were dropping at an alarming rate by the end of the month. At Taylor Slough, the reading was 0158', which is the mud level. This compares with February's reading of 1.68'. It is of interest to note that the 10 year average of rainfall for the Royal Palm area is 2.33". Rainfall for March 1963 at this station was 0.08 inches. If this trend continues, the resulting drought will be as severe as the 1961-62 drought.

Temperatures were mild and seasonable, with a high of 91° recorded at Tamiami and a low of 39° recorded at Royal Palm. Winds for the month were those typically expected for March. Relatively strong and gusty, making boating activities difficult in the water areas of the Park. The following is the weather summary for Everglades National Park:

Increase or decrease in travel: Visitation to the park followed the decreasing trend started in January of this year. A total of 77,709 persons visited the park compared with 82,567 for March 1962. This is a decrease for the first three months of 6.1%. Camping figures are reversed however. March shows a 25.7% increase for camping over that recorded a year ago. The first three months of 1963 show an increase of an astounding 40.7% over the like period last year. Both Long Pine Key and the Flamingo campgrounds have been taxed to their capacity, during most of March.

Visitors from all states but Hawaii, Montana and Nebraska were in the park during the month as well as those from 8 Canadian provinces, one US Territory, and the following foreign countries: New Zealand, Poland, England, Japan, Germany, Cuba, France, Spain, Yugoslavia, Australia, Denmark, Sweden, Holland, Brazil, Israwl, Dominican Rep., S. Vietnam, S. Africa, Italy, Scotland, Switzerland, Norway, Pakistan, Mexico, Venezuela, and India

Special Activities: District Five of the Florida Park's personnel Association met at Flamingo with Everglades National Park as host.

Everglades NP participated in the Homestead Community Fair on March 28, 29, 30 and 31. A booth with an automatic rear screen projector and still photographs was manned by the members of the protection staff. Also an exhibit of Fire Unit #2 was displayed, which consisted of tractor, pumper and low-boy carrier.

Two rangers were detailed to DeSoto National Mounment on March 17 and 18 to assist in the handling of visitors in that area who were attending the landing of DeSoto Celebration.

Miscellaneous: A 7 lb 8 oz girl was born to Mr & Mrs. Francis X. Guardipee on March 23rd. The little girl was named Theresa Gay by her parents.

ADMINISTRATION

Personnel: Subdistrict Ranger William C. Brown accepted a transfer to Cap Cod National Seashore. Park Ranger Robert E. Benton was designated acting Subdistrict Ranger for the Royal Palm area.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Interpretive Services: Park Rangers conducted 8 boat-a-cades with 35 boats and 110 visitors participating. It is believed that interest in the boat-a-cades was stimulated by Park Service participation in the Miami boat show during late February. District Ranger Richard A. Stokes spoke to 378 members of Collier county Junior Deputies Society.

Research and Observation: A lone Flamingo was seen on the flats near Rabbit Key Pass in the Gulf District of the Park. This is the first time any of these birds have been seen in this particular area. They are usually limited to the Florida Bay waters of the park.

The remeasurement of trees on study plots at Long Pine Key was completed during March. Information has now been taken on all areas that have been burned over the past 6 seasons.

Protection: Patrol mileage for the park was as follows:

Boat - 6,050 aircraft - 600 Motor Vehicle 19,316 Total: 25,995

The Ranger Services Division participation in the investigation of the Northwest Orient Airliner crash continued through the month. A special memorandum covering this activity has been prepared by the Chief Ranger's Office.



Heavy weekend travel has necessitated increased road patrols during these periods. Rumors that deer were being killed along the park road, particularly in the area of Mahogany fire were investigated. As a result of these investigations, night and early morning patrols were initiated. Ten cases covering minor violations were heard before the U. S. Commissioner during the month. All cases pleaded guilty and sentences handed down by the commissioner. (These ten cases did not involve deer)

The Bureau of Indian Affairs have started increasing the size of their fill in the vicinity of the Indian school and 6 additional sites. The contract for the rock fill delivered to the Seminole strip calls for 36,000 additional yards of gravel.

Ranger personnel in the water districts participated in 10 boat rescues during March.

Forest Fire Protection: Water tables in the glades area dropped steadily this month and it appeared that another dry parched glades condition would **Exhixi** exist in April and May as it did last year. Despite the drought however, fires were few and small. A summary of fires during March are as follows:

Building Fire protection: Regularly scheduled fire brigade drills were conducted at Pine Island and Flamingo during March.

Insect and tree diseases, etc. Ranger personnel assisted by Dr. Frank Craighead made a preliminary survey, on the encroachment of the Australian Pine on the Cape Sable beaches. It was found that this tree has now been widly spread, presumably by Hurricane Donna and it appears that control measures will be necessary to eradicate it from vital beach areas of the park.

Safety and Health: ENP Safety Committee met during the month. The documented safety program for 1963 was revised and submitted to the Superintendent for approval.

Concessioner: The concessioner at Flamingo accommodated 3,810 persons which is almost exactly equivalent to the number handled in March 1962. For the year to date however, 4.1% more persons have been serviced by the Flamingo concession, than for the like period last year. Boat concession operating from Everglades shows an increase of 36% over the visitor use during March 1962.

GENERAL

Weather Conditions: The weather outlook for the month of April was one of pleasant temperatures and practically no precipitation. Humidity was noticeable on only a very few days. Drought conditions prevailed as well as stoppage of normal flow of ground water caused by the new Levee 29 along Tamiami Trail.

By month's end the water table had dropped to levels below that of last year for the same period. The months rainfall of 0.10 inches was well below the 10 yr average of 2.61 inches.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Protection: Work has continued, as time permits, on the Nature Trail at 7 Mile Fire Tower. The trail skirts the outer perimeter of the moat and affords better access for viewing the alligators and other wildlife.

Rangers in the Gulf Coast District made an extended "gator" poaching patrol into the headwaters of Lostman's, Broad and Rodgers Rivers. One gator camp with 16 carcasses was found. Most of these were small gators.

On April 18, deer #48, was found alongside the road below Mahogany Hammock.

Nine boat rescues were conducted during the month and 10 first aid cases.

Reports were submitted on the Boeing Jetliner crash, Phases I & II as well as reports on the new construction work along the Seminole Strip and water hyacinth encroachment.



Building Fire Protection: On April 4, the Pine Island fire truck was taken to the LPK pond by FCA Guardipee and Shop Foreman Parker, where they conducted successful drafting tests, thus ending 4 weeks of inoperation.

Forest Fire Protection: Six burning permits issued. The "Bombardier", a new piece of glades fire-fighting equipment purchased by the park, arrived on April 1, but because of difficulties with the drilling rig, it was returned to the dealer for further modifications.

The Tamiami weasel was modified to accommodate the Forester Slip-on pumper unit.

April brought the first serious outbreak of fire of the drought period. In all, there were 6 fires; each of which originated in the East Boundary protection zone. Four of them were believed to have been incendiary in origin. At the month's end 4 were still not declared out, and 1 was actively being fought by fire crews. A summary of the month's fires follows:

Safety & Health: One automobile acccident occurred in the Mangrove Dist during the month.

Areport was submitted by Ranger Winte concerning the consumption and use of water supply at Tamiami RangerStation. On April 18, the Park Maintenance Division gave the PI water supply a special chlorine treatment to combat the foreign element (Kerosene) which was found to be in the water. The kerosene taste left the water about 3 days later.

Maintenance: The Farm Road traffic counter was re-installed on Apr 1.

A new intercom system was installed at Pine Island on Apr 12, using the old remote sets which had been replaced recently.

Research and Observation: Gulf District reports headwaters of all rivers completely salted. All fish are dead as well as fresh water vegetation. Very few salt water fish seen, no bird life and very little animal life in the area.

Cooperation with other Federal, State or Local Agencies:

Continued cooperation has been extended to the USGS in their studies on the park water problem. Mangrove district personnel cooperated fully with US Customs officials on their activities within the district.



The U of Miami Marine Lab. continued with their studies on shrimp migrations and population in the Flamingo area.

GENERAL

Weather Conditions: Cool, mild weather prevailed during most the month, with light rainfall during the first few days of the month. It was not until the last week of May that substantial rainfall began to swell the water table throughout the glades. End of the month precipitation in the Glades District was enough to bring the May total of 7.01 inches slightly above the 10 year average of 6.78 inches for May. Rain has fallen in the Gulf Coast District on eleven days by this reporting period.

The following is the weather summary for Everglades National Park for the month of May 1963:

Increase or decrease in travel: Visitation to the park had an increase of 9.3% over May of last year with a total of 50,022 persons entering the park. All states but 5 were registered while 4 Canadian provinces, one US Territory and 23 foreign countries were listed.

Special Activities:

Seasonal Ranger Pumphrey and FCA's spent several days each week in May working with EODC Engineer Al Mullan on the layout of the LPK campground extension.

Camping

Ranger division cooperated in a display at the Owaissa Bauer Family/Clinic Of the estimated 5,000 persons at the exhibit, over 1,000 were contacted by NPS personnel.

ADMINISTRATION

FCA's Ronek and Whitney ended their tours of duty in May. Ronek will be going to Prince William Forest in Virginia and Whitney to Yellowstone NP. Flamingo Park Ranger George Schesventer spent two days in the Florida Bay sub-district in preparation for the transfer of sub-district Ranger Kasparek



who has accepted a promotion transfer to the position of Assistant Chief Park Ranger at Hot Springs National Park, Arkansas. Gulf Coast Ranger William N. Hackenbracht has accepted the position of Park Naturalist at Platt NP Sulphur, Oklahoma, with departure June 9.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

<u>Interpretive Services:</u> Seven boat-a-cades were conducted with a total of 38 persons participating.

Sanitation: With the beginning of the summer rains on May 21st, the general water level in the park has raised. On May 20th the water level at the Taylor Slough bridge was 1.20 feet above sea level. By the end of the month the level was up to 4.04 feet. This rise in water level should reduce the amount of organic matter coming from the Pine Island well.

Research and observation: A report was received from Lelden Thompson, a charter boat captain, concerning 18 to 30 flamingoes that he observed on the morning of May 6. They flew across the bow of his boat at the mouth of Barron River and they proceeded toward Fakahatchee Bay.

On May 27, Ranger Winte observed a live Mink in the fresh burn of the Captain Tony Strand Fire.

<u>Protection:</u> Vandalism took an up-sweep during the month. On May 11, a rented convertible was broken into at Flamingo. The vandals took clothing and jewelry out of the automobile. Ah all-out effort throughout the park failed to bring the case to a successful close. The case was turned over to the local FBI agents.

A small alligator was brought to the park and released in the headquarters pond. Three days later the alligator was found dead, shot in the head. No suspects were found.

A total of 8 warning tickets were issued by district personnel; 7 of these were routine speeding violations. The 8th case concerned failure to have a valid drivers license.

Four court cases were heard before the US Commissioner during the month; three of which are still pending and will be heard again the first of June. One of these cases concerned the apprehension of two alligator poachers apprehended in the Gulf Coast District. Another involved a "landed" small aircraft in the park near the Pa-Hay-Okee Overlook and the third is a "repeater".

During the month many sports fishermen and commercial fishermen were contacted in the Gulf Coast district on routine and irregular patrols. The sports fishermen have become aware that they will very likely be caught if they attempt to keep illegal fish. The constant checking for illegal fishthat the Gulf Coast District has done is well received by the fishermen.

Protection, contd: Resident Manager George Cockill of Everglades Park Company reported on May 16 that an employee, Kenneth Keys had left his job and make took with him several hundred dollars worth of EPCo tools. Subsequent investigation led to involvement with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who now have the case.

Sometime between 12 midnight and sunrise the night of May 10, vandals removed two alligator crossing signs from the roadside in the Flamingo area. This vandalism occurred in spite of the fact that over 25 park families were on the road during the pm traveling to and from a party at Flamingo.

Seven boat rescues were performed by ranger personnel during the month of May.

One firearm and 1 airboat permit also 2 buggy permits were issued to individuals for the "Hole" area.

Forest Fire Protection: Glades district personnel spent the better part of their time during May in fighting or moping up wildfires in the glades. Moderate precipitation on May 3-4 eased the fire danger only temporarily. Not until May 29 did water tables begin to rise substantially. On May 7 FCAs Hite and Pfeifer were airlifted to Big Lostman's Bay in the Gulf Coast District where they spent 2 days assisting Rangers Hackenbracht and Carlson in suppressing the Rogers River Fire. Ranger Pumphrey and FCA Foster were airlifted for a 3rd day's action. The Grossman Willow Strand and Grossman Chain fires continued to smolder throughout most of the month and were not declared out until May 31st. The larger East Glades Fire was declared out on May 23rd. Eight burning permits were issued to farming operations and 6 campfire permits to Scout groups in their special area. Ranger personnel in the Flamingo area gained experience in fighting glades fires as during the month several large grass fires outran both men and equipment during the early part of the month.

Supv. FCA Guardipee and District Ranger Benham traveled to Miami on May 23 to check and price new fire-fighting equipment. Miami firefighters and Biscayne Fire Equipment were contacted.

In spite of the frequent fire activity during the month only one new fire occurred in the glades, this one set by a stranded individual in the glades to attract attention. This fire was well on the way to being declared out by the month's end as frequent rainshowers were hitting the area.

A minor injury to an eye was suffered by one of the Glades district personnel, when a small particle lodged in his eye. Medical treatment was needed.

Mangrove Safety Meeting was held at Flamingo on May 23. Members of all Flamingo Divisions were present as well as some personnel from the headquarters area.

Five minor first aid cases were treated during the month.

Concessioner: On May 18, the Cuthbert Rookery Trip was concluded for the season. This was a fairly successful season. Visitors seemed pleased with the trip as well as the operators and boats used. In May, 408 persons took the Mangrove Wilderness Boat Trou in the Gulf Coast District. This is an increase in travel of 134% over that of May 1962.

<u>Miscelleneous:</u> Two members of the Ranger Services Division received Letters of Commendation from the Superintendent for their performance of duty well above that normally required in the apprehenshio of alligator poachers. There were Rangers Hackenbracht and Carlson.

On May 11 a full grown Doberman dog was drowned by an alligator in the pond at LPK campground. The dog was retrieved before the alligator could make a meal of him.

GENERAL

Weather Conditions: Exceptionally low precipitation prevailed during the month with light showers prevailing. In the Flamingo area of the park it was the lowest precipitation recorded for July in the past ten year period.

Increase or decrease in travel: Park visitation for the month exceeded that of the same month last year by 5,268 or 11% and was the highest figure for that month in the park's history. The total visitation for the year to date continues to increase slightly over 1962. Camping statistics continue to climb at a phenominal rate.

ADMINISTRATION

Personnel: Ranger Edward Carlson of the Gulf Coast District was promoted to Supervisory Park Ranger GS-7 on July 21.

David E. Marshall was selected to fill a permanent Park Ranger position in the Cape Sable subdistrict. He entered on duty on July 7.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Protection: Gulf Coast personnel experienced threats from some local gator poachers during the early part of the month. Four of the local gator poachers were apprehended in Georgia for gator hunting. It is understood that they are under \$500 bond each. One written warning was given from this district also for possession of firearms. The fisherman had a pistol in his fishing tackle box.

Ranger Schesventer and Ranger Pilot Miele located 280 crab traps stored on the shoreline of Black water sound. The owner of the traps was notified that he was in violation of park rules and regulations.

Four written warning citations were issued to park visitors in the Flamingo district during the month; the Glades district reported a total of 27 warnings 10 of which were written and 17 verbal. Twenty-four of these were routine speeding violations and 3 for littering park roads.

Three park visitors reported that their cars were broken into and property removed. Investigations were made and part of the stolen items recovered.

One case was heard before the US Commissioner for speeding. The defendant was found guilty and fine was suspended.

Ranger personnel conducted eight boat search and rescue operations during the month.

The Flamingo district ranger and Florida Bay sub-district ranger each made a flight with the Ranger-Pilot over the Mangrove district water use areas.

Ranger personnel in the Flamingo area conducted eight boat-a-cades with five boats and seventeen persons participating. No boat-a-cades were conducted in the Gulf Coast District.

Ranger Carlson made trip to Buzzard Key to take a party of 5 Naturalists; 50,000 birds were observed.

Many routine patrols were conducted in the Gulf Coast district during the month. Activity has slowed down in many respects, especially illegal activities.

Safety and Health: Three life ring bouys were installed on the exterior of the Flamingo Visitor Center.

A resuscitator was transferred to the Key Largo ranger station for use in that area.

Five first aid cases were attended by ranger personnel during the month



<u>Safety and health:</u> One boat accident which occurred in Oyster Creek was investigated by Ranger Schesventer.

A series of training sessions were held for park personnel in theuse of the new Emerson Resuscitator.

The Entrance Station ressed week-end operations during the month. An entrance station survey of visitors was introduced and put into effect during the month, to determine the percentage of visitors entering the park, making first contact at the Entrance Station as compared to headquarters Visitor Center.

Building Fire Protection: The 30 day follow-up on the annual districts building fire hazard inspection was completed.

RESOURCE PLANNING

Cooperation with other Federal, State or Local Agencies: U. S. Geological Survey team was furnished weasel transportation to P-37, P-38, P-33 and P-34.

Brownell surveying of 10 Mile corner boundary continued on the 11th of the month.

- U. S. Geologic Survey personnel serviced the saline recording stations at Shark and Harney Rivers on the 10th and 11th.
- U. S. Public Health Service personnel were in the headwaters of the Shark River on July 23 and 24 trapping mosquitoes for their study on encephalitis. Prior to going to Everglades City they were called to Georgia where there was an outbreak of encephalitis.

Ranger Johnson accompanied survey crews, surveying 10 Mile corner boundaries within the Tamiami sub-district.

Research and Observations: The number of wading birds in the vicinity of Seven Mile Tower has shown a marked increase. The alligator nest reported on Seven Mile Road last month was completed about July 3rd. Several Black-Necked Stilts were seen south of the Tamiami Ranger Station.

A new roosting of whiteibis has been observed in Chokoloskee Bay. There are about 10,000 birds appearing each evening. These birds have roosted in this area in past years but never in such large numbers.

In the Flamingo agr area snook fish was excellent during the first two weeks of July. Sea turtles continued to lay their eggs on the beaches of Cape Sable.

Forest Fire Protection: Four lightening-strike smokes were reported in the Tamiami sub-district. No action except aerial scouting, was taken, as they were quickly extinguished by heavy rainfall. One statistical and two non-statistical fires, caused by lightening strikes occurred in the Royal Palm sub-district the latter part of the month, as follows:

A reconnaissance patrol of Paradise Key was made during the month, to obtain information for a structural fire plan.

Sanitation: A different type of chlorine is now being used in the Pine Island water system. A dry pellet type is replacing the liquid used in the past.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: The fisherman harvest of fresh water fish is improving. Good reports center around Pine Glade Lake, for both bass and bream.

Lowwater levels continue throughout the glades, preventing the smaller fish from doing much moving.

<u>Maintenance:</u> New roof braces were placed under the fire cache equipment shed. (This action eliminates much of the danger in working in this area).

Concessioner: The Concessioner at Everglades, along with the District Ranger, met with the Superintendent regarding a trip to bird roost in Chokoloskee Bay. Plans for the trip look favorable and are pending approval until such time as approval of rates are received from the Washington office.

for the concessioner at Everglades was up 471 over July 1962 with an increase of 34%. July 1962 was 1319 and July 1963 was 1790.

At Flamingo, two inspections of the rental skiffs were made. Occupancy of the Flamingo Lodge was up 14% for this July over July of 1962.

SUBJECT:

GENERAL

Weather Conditions: Hot and humid weather prevailed during most of the month with above normal rainfall over most of the park area. Two hurricanes developed in the south Atlantic area, but offered no threat to the Park.

Following is the weather summary for the park for the month of August 1963:

Increase or decrease in travel: Park visitation for the month showed an increase of 5% with a total of 48,972 persons entering the park, as compared to a total visitation of 46,666 during August of 1962. Year to date visitation was 480,477 as compared to 470,995 for August of 1962 year to date. This was an increase of 9,482 persons or 2%. This month showed a decrease of 9% over last month with a total visitation of 48,972 as compared to 53,621 for July 1963.

ADMINISTRATION

Personnel:

Park Ranger Zeb V. McKinney reported for duty in the Gulf Coast District August 19.

Lee B. Chamberlaine entered on duty in the Glades Districe on August 5. After a weeks orientation in the Royal Palm Subdistrict, he moved to Tamiami subdistrict into the quarters formerly occupied by Ranger McKinney.

Seasonal Ranger Rich Nelson ended his tour of duty in the Glades District August 16. He will attend school in Mississippi this year and will not return for the 1963-64 fire season.



CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Research & Observation: In the Tamiami area, Ranger Winte noted 6 wild turkeys three miles south of the Loop Road and one quarter mile inside the park boundary. He reports this to be his first knowledge of turkeys in that area.

Ranger Winte also reports that as many as 40 deer have been observed over a distance of approximately $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles of glades travel southwest of the station.

<u>Protection</u>: Crawfish season opened this month and two verbal warnings for possession of undersized crawfish were issued to park visitors.

Inspection revealed that all crab traps stored in Blackwater Sound have been removed.

Continued checks of sports fishing catches resulted in two written and one verbal warning for possession of undersized snook and trout; One verbal warning for operation of boat without registration and one written citation for undersized Three boat-a-cades were conducted during August with a total of 8 boats and fish. 27 people.

One auto accident was investigated in the Flamingo area, as well as one boat accident.

Six boat searches and boat rescues were conducted by ranger personnel during the month.

Twelve airboat permits were issued to persons using the lower Taylor Slough runs in the "Hole" area.

Mr. Brownell and crew of surveyors resumed their work on the Ten Mile corner boundary on August 1. Tamiami personnel were afield 8 days on survey and boundary posting. By the end of the month only 0.4 miles of new 10 mile park boundary had not been surveyed and posted.

Cooperation with other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: A research team from the University of Miami Marine Laboratory are conducting studies on juvenile pink shrimp in the Florida Bay- Calusa Key area.

The John C. Pennekamp State Park opened officially for camping. They have 35 sites and the fee per night is \$1.55.



On August 13, a team of men from the US Geologic Survey serviced the saline stations in Shark and Harney Rivers. On the 19th and 20th a team serviced the water flow stations at Lostman, Royer, Broad, Harvey and Shark Rivers.

On August 21st, US Coast Guard personnel serviced the Little Shark River Light.

District personnel assisted Florida State Wildlife officer, Chuck Mann in the rdease of approximately 7 alligators in the Park.

The Corp of Engineers representative on the Indian Key dredging project has been given permission to use the office facilities at Everglades City.

<u>Training:</u> Ranger Services personnel attended the Chief Ranger's Helitack slide program on August 14.

Ranger Benton began preparations for his assignment to the Ranger School at Grand Canyon by doing some research into the effects of controlled burning.

<u>Safty and Health:</u> Subdistrict Ranger Winte suffered an injured back while working on water softener. Injury was minor and he has resumed his duties.

Five first aid cases were attended by Ranger personnel. Six new safety posters were displayed on bulletin boards.

Two Everglades Park Company rental skiff inspections were made during the month.

<u>Frotection (continued)</u>: Early a.m. and late evening road patrols have continued at Tamiami in checking for possible poaching activities.

Rangers Winte and Chamberlains found enough water to make an August airboat patrol to the Shark River headquarters Waters.

Galvanized pipe on which boundary signs have been used along old highway #41 are being removed. They will be used only at fill sites along the Strip.

A rough draft of the current status of the Bureau of Indian Affairs activities along the Seminole Strip was submitted.

Law Enforcement: One case of minor vandalism occurred in which the soft drink machines at Royal Palm were broken into.

Two of the impounded skiffs stored at Pine Island were released to owners.

During the month a total of 23 warnings were issued during the month.



Forest Fire Protection: Two burning permits were issued to farming operations and one to the Aerojet operation. One campfire permit was issued to a scout group.

Sup FCA Guardipee met with the Chief Ranger on several occasions to draw up plans for a new Fire Cache. Funds for this new construction are being allocated under the accelerated Federal Public Works Program.

On August 20 Rangers Benton and Johnson and FCA Guardipee took the Bombadier to Paradise Key for drill and pump tests which proved successful.

Frequent lightning storms played over the Glades District during the month resulting in 2 Class E fires requiring suppressive action. The fire situation improved considerably near the month's end. A summary of the month's fires follow:

Building Fire Protection: Four fire truck inspections were made in the Flamingo area.

All fire hydrants were flushed.

One inspection was made of all NPS fire extinguishers.

Maintenance: The Tamiami Bunkhouse received a complete roofing job, by the Walker Roofing Company of Homestead.

Several of the Pine Island quarters have had sewage trouble during the month.

Maintenance personnel from Pine Island mowed yards and vacant lots at quarters in the Everglades area. Due to the condition of yards they cannot be mowed without tractor equipment.

Concessions: The concessioner at Everglades City started a trip to the bird roost in Chokoloskee Bay on 23 August. Only three trips were made with a total of 32 persons. A total of 1,401 persons participated in the regular boat tour as compared to 911 in 1962 for an increase of 44%.

The concessioner at Flamingo reports a total of 3,159 persons using the Motel facilities as compared to 3,463 for August of 1962. This is a decrease of 9%. The decline is believed to be caused from the mosquito problem in the area.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: Commercial trout fishing has been almost nil and mullet fishing sporadic at best.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION and USE

<u>Protection</u>: One special boat-a-cade was conducted in Florida bay, for the Calusa Crusing Club of Ft. Myers. 12 boats and 43 people participated.

Florida bay sub-district ranger, Schesventer, issued crab trap permits, during the month, for the stone crab season which opens October 15.

Three written warning citations were issued to commercial trout fishermen, for having too many bait traps in park waters.

100 Stone crab traps were discovered, stored on lower Arsenicker key and the owner removed them upon the orders of Ranger Schesventer.



A break-in occured at the Buttonwood Lounge in the Flamingo Visitor center, on the night of September 5. Cash and liquor were taken. An investigation was made by District ranger personnel and by special agent Kelly of the FBI.

A break-in occured on the night of September 13, at the tool shed of tht Price dredging co. at the Flamingo campground extention site. Three new truck tires and wheels were taken. District ranger personnel and FBI agent Kelly participated in the investigation. No arrests have been made and both cases are still open.

Building Fire Protection: 4 firetruck inspections were made.

All NPS fire extinguishers were checked and the fire hydrants flushed.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: Commercial trout fishing continued to be poor during the month and some fishermen switched to pompano fishing near cape sable. Sport snook fishing improved near the mond of the month with many snook being taken near the mouth of the Flamingo canal.



Weather Conditions: Brisk breezy days predominated during October, which caused small craft warnings to be displayed on 7 days and gale warnings on 2. The threat of two hurricanes influenced the weather considerably also. Cloudy skies were the norm, with resultant moderate temperatures. A cooling trend was experienced late in the month which sent visitors to their rooms in search of sweaters for evening and early morning attire. Precipitation was evenly scattered throughout the month and was very light. The maximum amount recorded at Flamingo during one 24 hour period was .57 inch.



All rangers assigned to the Mangrove district attended an in-service training program held at park headquarters on 10/30 and 10/31. This proved to be a most interesting and profitable session for all and especially those who have not had the opportunity to be exposed to the information before.

Safety and Health: Park Rangers treated three minor first aid cases during the month.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Protection: District personnel were utilized to effect the completion of two complete yellow and green phases of the hurricane warning plan for the district. Activities on hurricane Flora began at 10:00 AM eastern Standard time on 10/3/63. Park rangers were working on this program in one capacity or another until 5:00 PM on 10/12/63.

On 10/23 at 8:15 AM E.S.T., district Personnel again proce ded to effect the green and yellow phases of the plan to prepare the district for the onslaught of hurricane Ginny. In one way or another, rangers were tied up in this program until 5:00 PM on 10/25/63.

District Park Ranger Whitehouse, Ranger Pilot Ralph Miele, Florida Bay Sub-district Ranger Schesventer and Flamingo Park Ranger Castleberry participated in the aprenension of an out of season stone crab trapper in the Broad river area on 10/14/63. Mr. Earnest Hamilton of Chokoloskee was tried for the offense on 10/15/63 and judged to be guilty and fined \$125.00.

Cape Sable Sub-district Rangers completed four boat rescues during the month, all of which were routine in nature.

Rangers assigned to the Flamingo area have been involved in another unusual law inforcement situation during the month. It came to the attention of this confice that a blue and white outboard skiff had launched at the public ramp, which had previously been involved in the "Sandy Key" munitions expose of last April. U.S. de artment of Justice (Immigration Service) personnel were notified and they have had the boat "staked out" since, Several trips were made to Sandy Key, Clive Key and Man-o-War Key in e forts to find the nature of the activities. This case is being continued as of this date.

Extensive boat patrols were made into florida Bay and the inland waters by rangers of both sub-districts in spite of the confining nature of hurricane preparations.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural activities: As the high water level of last month receeds, the raccoon problem at Flamingo is returning as the animals come back in search of greener pastures. One sick animal was destroyed and taken to the Florida State Board of Health for rabies tests. Results of the tests were negative.

Efforts continue to bring the population under control in the heavy use area. No live trapping has been necessary this month.

Complaints: One written complaint was received by Everglades Park Co., regarding a fishing guide, namely one Luther (Slim) Ryder. The complaint concerned the manner in which he "fished" his customers. The matter has been discussed with the guide by his supervisors.

Cooperation with other Federal, State or Local Agencies: This district continues to be the focal point for the operation of many other agencies. We continue to give these organizations our cooperation; U.S. Geologic Survey, U.W. Customs Service, U. of Miami Marine Laboratory and the U.S. Weather bureau.

The U.S.G.S. has required our assistance on several occasions this month and will continue to do so.

Because of the continuing Cuban problem in the area, our as istance has been given to concerned agencies, namely U.S. Customs, U.S. Coast Guard and the U.S. Border Patrol. All personnel in the Mangrove district have directly worked with these agencies in some capacity within the past month.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Public Relations: In so far as is possible, Park Rangers assigned to this district, contact as many visitors as they can to sell them the National Park Service Idea. This action takes place primarily in concentrated use areas such as the Campground and Public Boat Ramp. This of ice continues to stress the importance of this activity.

The stone crab traps that were stored on the Lower Arsnicker Key have been removed by their owner upon the orders of the Sub-district Ranger. Stone Crab season opened on the 15th and the Sub-district and District Rangers flew the Sub-district on the 14th. looking for traps set out too early. XXXXXX None were found in the Sub-district. The Florida Bay Sub-district Ranger did attend a commissioner's hearing as a witness for the trial of a stone crabber who was apprehended for catching stone crabs out of season off Broad River. A total of 30 stone crab permits have been issued to stone crabbers no work out of the Keys area so far this year as compared to 28 at this time last year. Very little boat patrol was done in the Sub-district due to a combination of storm varnings and inoperation of Sub-district boats.



Fire Protection: All fire extinguishers were inspected, weighed and tagged.

Maintenance: The Osceola inboard was out of service in the Sub-district having extensive repairs made on it. Subject: Monthly Narrative Report for November 1963

General

Weather Condition: November weather was generally fair with warm, sunny days and cool evenings. November 10 a cold front crossed the area with strong winds and torrential rains. Winds reached a velocity of 60 mph. at Flamingo and in the campground one trailer was blown over and several tents were knocked down. The water table throughout the Park continued to drop at a rapid rate. Taylor Slough gauge read 3.80" at the end of the month compared with 4.50' on October 31. Small craft warnings were displayed for five days during the month. Below is a general weather coverage for the Park:

Increase or Decrease in Travel: Visitation increased by 12,567 persons, or an increase of 32% over November 1962. The year-to-date figure now stands at 599,736 persons for an increase of 5%. Concessioner activities for the same period showed an increase of 59% over November 1962 and 4% over last year-to-date. Camping continued its upward movement with 56% more campers in the area during November, 1963 and 45% for year-to-date.





Visitors from all 50 states entered the Park during November as well as representatives from six Canadian Provinces and the following foreign countries: Germany, Franch, England, Austria, Australia, Venezuela, Belgium, Guatemala, Italy, Switzerland, Israel, the Netherlands, South Africa and Norway.

Observation, Interpretation and Use

Research and Observations: A lone Flamingo was sighted in the Gulf Coast District near Clam Point on several occasions during the month. This is an unusual setting and the bird seemed to be an excellent color and quite tame. It was possible to bring a boat within ten feet of the bird during the taking of photgraphs.

Protection: The 1963-64 deer hunting season opened November 9 in areas adjacent to the Park and in the Hole-in-the-Dougnut. Hunting pressure on the first day was above that usually reported. Kills were unusually small in proportion to the number of hunters inthe field. Early morning hunting patrols have been necessary and the entrance station manned to check hunters into and out of the Park for hunting in the Hole-in-the-Do ughnut area.



During the month of November 185 Firearm permits, 26 Airboat Permits and three Glades Buggy Permits were issued to hunters using the Park road to enter the Hole-in-the-Doughnut area.

With the development along the East boundary by the Aerojet Corporation it is now necessary that all hunters wishing to use this area cross Park lands to arrive at their destination. It is anticipated that this type of use will increase with the population growth of South Florida.

One case was heard before U. S. Commissioner Ralph C. Jordan during the month. The defendent was apprehended speeding on the Park road and arraigned and taken into the Commissioner's Court on November 8. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$15 by the Commissioner.

On November 29 an employee of the Everglades Park Company, Inc. was apprehended by Park Rangers after he had removed money from the concennioners filling station. The employee was placed in the Homestead jail and charged with petty larceny. U. S. Commissioner Roger Davis placed bond at \$5,000. The dependent requested Court appointed council and it is expected that the case will be heard in the U. S. Federal District Court early in December.

On November 3 an automobile was broken into while parked at the Flamingo Marina. Rangers investigated and a report was furnished to the FBI.

On November 19 a boat belonging to a Park visitor which had been parked (docked) at Flamingo was broken into and several items stolen. gation of this theft was conducted by Park Rangers and the information submitted to the FBI.

Personnel from the Cape Sable Subdistrict were involved in two boat rescues during the month.

Forest Fire Protection: All Fire Control Aides were returned to duty during the middle of the month when a three-day fire training conference was held.

One non-statistical fire was extinguished in the Long Pine Key campground.

On November 14 a meeting was held at Park Headquarters between representatives of the Metro Fire Division, Everglades Fire Control District, Homestead AFB Fire personnel, and City of Miami Fire Department. Fire problems of mutual interst were discussed. Also the up-dating of the cooperative agreement between Dade County Fire Division and Everglades Fire Control District and Everglades National Park was discussed. This agreement is now being redrafted and up-dated for further consideration of the organizations involved.



GENERAL

Weather Conditions: Cool breezy weather predominated in November. Small craft warnings were displayed for five days during the month. A storm front moved into the area, in the afternoon of Nov. 10, with winds of 60 MPH and heavy rains. Precipitation was light during the month, most of it occuring in the period of storm activity on the 10th, 11th and 12th. The maximum amount, recorded in one 24 hour period, was 1.22 in., on Nov. 5.



ADMINISTRATION

Personnel: Seasonal park Rangers Ken Morgan and B b Holmes entered on duty on 11/19, attended fire school and began duties at Flamingo on 11/24. All Rangers in the Mangrove District, attended the annual fire school, Nov. 19-22, ending in a control burn at Pine Island.

Trainin has been given the two seasonal rangers in campground operations, first aid and boat operation.

Safety and Health: Park Rangers treated 6 minor first aid cases during the month. One woman was treated for shock and taken to Homestead for medical attention, after her trailer was turned over by high winds in the Flamingo Campground. One woman fell at Mahogany Hammock, was assisted by rangers and directed to medical aid at Homestead.


2 Concessioner's rental skiff inspections were made during the month.

CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Protection: On Nov. 3 an automobile was broken into, while parked at the Flamingo Marina. Pangers initiated investigation, notified FBI and completed necessary reports. On Nov 19, boat, which belongs to Mr. W.J. Dorsey, parked at the Flamingo Launching ramp, was broken into and several items were stolen, investigation of these thefts is continuing.

Ranger personnel were active in checking catches of sports fishermen, results indicate most fishermen observe regula ions as to size and limits.

District personnel, with assistance from Glades district and CRO Rangers, aprehended an E.P.C. employee who was attempting to leave the park in possession



of E.P.C. monies. Mr. Carroll Humphries was held at the Homestead jail on \$5000.00 bail and a hearing has been set before the U.S. Comissioner.

Two boat rescues were made during the month.

Patrol Milages were as follows. VEHICLE 4465 Miles, BOATS 1243 Miles.

Building Fire Protection: 4 fire truck inspections were made, all NPS fire extinguishers were checked and fire hydrants flushed.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: A marked decrease in the mosquitoe population was noted, due to the low precipitation and the colder weather. Redfish and Snook fishing improved with the colder temperatures.

Concessioners: E.P.C had a 29% increase in gross sales over the same period in 1962.

RESOURCE PLANNING

Cooperation with other Federal, State or Local Agencies: Research teams from the University of Miami Institute of Marine Science continued to conduct studies in the area.

Personnel from the U.S. Geologic survey continue to man their sal nity and tide stations. Assistance is given by District personnel as needed.

U.S. Customs and Border Patrol agents were assisted in their investigation of aliens in the area

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

480 members of the National Audubon Society, in 10 buses, visited the park during their Miami convention. Ranger personnel assisted in the routing of these people and with interpretation during their visit.

10 members of local fire control agencies were in the district and were given a boat trip and tour of the Flamingo area.

CONSTRUCTION


Construction continued on the E.P.C. lodge expansion. Two buildings are under construction.

Subject: Monthly Narrative Report for December 1963

General

Weather Conditions: Cooler, but not cold weather prevailed through December. No frost occurred in South Florida during the month. This was a distinct contrast to December 1962 when a low of 280 was recorded, with heavy frost, in nearby farmlands. Rainfall was good with 2.25" recorded at Royal Palm. This is an increase of 2.01" over the same month last year, and .95" above what the 10-year norm is for the area. Water levels throughout the Park were generally higher. The gauge at Taylor Slough read 3.39' on December 31 compared with 2.88' for December 1962, and 3.80' on November 30, 1963.

Several days of strong winds occurred during the month. Small craft warnings were dieplayed a total of five days at Flamingo and Key Largo.

The following is a weather summary for the Park:

Increase in Travel: The travel year ended in a flurry of activity with \$69,496 persons entering the Park during the month. This is a 32 per cent increase over December of last year. Total visitation for the Park for the calendar year was 669, 233 or 7 per cent more than that recorded in 1962.

The Flamingo concessioner did correspondingly well with December producing a 20 percent increase over the like mo nth last year. For the year the Park concessioner business increased by 5 per cent. Camping showed a phenomenal growth with 12,829 persons using Park facilities during December. This is a 49 percent increase during the same month last year. During the Christmas to New Year's rush the new campground addition at Long Pine Key. This was immediately filled, and it was again necessary to use overflow facilities in the picnic ground in this area. Increased camping at Flamingo caused an immense increase in workoad for both Rangers and Maintenance crews. At one time 159sites were located in the picnic ground overflow area. It was necessary for Ranger personnel to assist in cleaning and servicing restrooms in this area. Substantial rain over New Year's created additional problems in the picnic overflow area as cars attempted to extract themselves from the muddy conditions.

Visitors from all 50 states entered the Park during the month, as well as those from six Canadian Provinces, U. S. Territory of Puerto Rico and the following foreign countries: Germany, Austria, Panama, Peru, The Netherlands, Arabia, The United Kingdom, Japan, Formosa, France, New Zealand, West Africa, Israel, Argentina, Cuba, Pakistan, Norway, India, Union of South Africe, Greece, Poland, Mexico and the Dominican Replic.

Special Activities: The Tropical Audubon Society held its 14 Annual Christmas Bird Count in the Flamingo area on December 29. Christmas Bird Counts are held all over the United States during Christmas week thus making an interesting and accurate pattern of specie identification and migration. There were 78 persons involved in the Flamingo count. A total of 72 individual species were identified out of 54,359 sightings. The count was considered a great success by officials in charge.

Miscellaneous: A son, Daniel Lee was born to Ranger and Mrs. Harvey D. Wickware on December 14 at James Archer Smith Hosptal, Homestead, Fla.

Administration

<u>Personnel</u>: Annual leave which would otherwise have been lost was granted to several persons in the Ranger Services Division. The leave schedule as prepared last spring had eliminated all but the very minimum that was necessary to be taken.

Ranger Robert E. Benton returned to duty at Everglades on December 23 after three months tour of duty at the Grand Canyon Ranger School.



Ranger Lee B. Chamberlaine was temporarily assigned to the Royal Palm Subdistrict to assist in the controlled burn of Blcok "C" on Long Pine Key.

Safety and Health: Park personnel treated nine first aid cases this month, most of which were of a minor nature. One imbedded fish hook and one raccoon bite were the exceptions. These parties were directed to the emergency room at James Archer Smith Hospital in Homestead, Fla.

Cooperation with Other Federal, State or Local Agencies: Asst. Chief Ranger R. D. Maxwell, Ranger Johnson attended a luncheon meeting with Metro Fire Chief Bullock and Captain Radford on December 13. The meeting was sponsored by Aero-jet General Corporation represented by Mr. Carl XXXX Wieuf, Safety and Security Manager. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss a fire prevention and suppression program for Aerojet property which is adjacent to Park lands. Fire Control Aid Guardipee, Rangers Benton and Johnson later toured the Aerojet facilities and discussed possible preventive fire action that could be taken by the corporation. This included controlled fires along the East Park boundary.

Personnel from the U. S. Geologic Survey were taken to Stations P-33 and P-34. Annemometers were erected at both of these gauging stations.

Subdistrict Ranger Erwin Winte assisted the Florida State Highway Troupers and ambulance drivers in giving first aid to two seriously injured victims of an automobile accident which occurred on U. S. 41 along the Park's north boundary. Park Rangers are, amny times, called upon to assist on this heavily traveled highway.

Several trips were made to rookery areas to determine whether or not the birds are going to start nesting this season. As of this date no evidence of use has been noted. Last year at this time East River and Cuthbert Lake Rookeries were well underway.

Interpretive Activities and Development

General Publicity: District Ranger Richard A. Stokes escorted Mr. and Mrs. John Hughes on a trip of the 10,000 Island section of the Park. Mr. Hughes is Travel Editor for the New York Times (circulation 4 million). Information was gathered for two articles to be published on Everglades and the general West coast area in the Times.

Operation, Protection and Ranger Services

Patrol mileages for the month of December was asfollows: Motor vehicle 19,140; boat 2,756; glades buggy (weasel) 151; aircraft 3,000; Total: 25,047



Protection personnel participated in four boat rescues during the month. It is interesting that at Flamingo two of the three boats needing assistance had failed to use the sign-out register. Rangers are making every attempt to encourage the boating public to make use of the sign out register. When rescue is necessary it is much easier and can be accomplished more readily if this facility is used.

With the influx of visitors over the Christmas and New Year's holidays the usual minor law enforcement problems which occur with the congregation of large numbers of people were present. Park Rangers at Royal Palm and Flamingo attempted to nip these problems in the bud, from proper parking on park roadsides to camping and speeding were handled with dispatch.

With the approaching end of deer hunting season a flurry of hunting activity was noted along the Park boundaries and the Hole-in-the-Doughnut area. A total of 109 firearm permits, 25 airboat permits and three glades buggy permits were issued to those crossing Park lands into the "Hole" area. Increased patrol activity was necessary along the entire Park boundary, particular emphasis was placed in the Ten Mile Corner area where several hunting camps and airstrips are located.

One case of speeding and operating a cab without permit were heard before the U. S. Commissioner during the month. The Commissioner found the defendent guilty and fined \$25.00. A case of petty theft appeared in the U. S. District Court. This involved a sum of money taken by an employee of Everglades Park Co., Inc. from his employer. The defendent was found guilty as charged and the Judge ordered a presentence investigation before passing sentence. Two citations were issued to defendents for failure to properly register their boats. These cases will be heard before the U. S. Commissioner during the month of January 1964.

Concessioner: Flamingo concessioner showed a 20 percent increase over a like period last year. Buring Christmas week facilities were completely filled and taxed to their maximum. Sightseeing concessioner at Everglades, Florida showed an increase of 40 per cent over a like month last year, and now has three boats operating in this area.

Complaints: Two complaints were issued against the Everglades Park Co., Inc., during the month. Reports have been prepared on both of these matters.

Forest Fire Protection: The control burn of Block "C" of Long Pine Key experimental burn project was completed during the month. Approximately 75% of the block or 90% of the block of pine were burned. A special report will be prepared on this matter. Three statistical fires were



during December and no acreage in the Park was involved.





GENERAL

Weather Conditions:

Generally dry conditions prevailed throughout the month in the park's southernmost district. Small amounts of precipitation were scattered evenly throughout the month, with the greatest amount occurring on the 30th. The last 10 days of the month were cool and generally cloudy. Small cfaft warnings were displayed for 5 days at Flamingo and Key Largo.


Increase or Decrease in Travel:

Travel into the Mangrove District rose sharply this past month. The heaviest impact was felt from December 24 through 31. Total visitor use increased 62% over November 1963. An increase of 36% over December 1962 was experienced. The increase in camping use was reflected by a 47% rise in the use of these facilities over December 1962.

The effects of this "crowd" were widespread. Comfort station utilities suffered from the heavy use, garbage and other refuse facilities were jammed to capacity daily. Ranger and Maintenance personnel worked an overtime schedule to handle the record crowd. All district personnel did a fine job handling the problems associated with it.


Miscellaneous:

ADMINISTRATION

Safety and Health:

Ranger personnel treated nine first aid cases this month, most of which were minor. One embedded fishhook and one raccoon bite were the exceptions. These parties were directed to the emergency room at James Archer Smith Hospital.



CONSERVATION, INTERPRETATION AND USE

Research and Observations:

Several trips were made into rookery areas to determine whether or not the birds were going to start nesting this season. No evidence of congregation was found. Last year at this time, rookery formation was well underway.

As two cold fronts entered the south Florida area, water temperatures dropped with resultant good fishing in the Flamingo area. Large catches of snook and redfish were common and trout fishing was improving at the month's end.

Protection:

Mangrove District Rangers effected 3 boat rescues during the month, two of which were at night. Considering the large number of out-of-state boaters that were in the park this month this figure is quite reasonable. Of these rescues two also <u>MAD NOT</u> used the sign out facilities available for their use.

Rangers conducted extensive patrols of park roads and waters in connection with special activities as well as scheduled law enforcement patrols. Mileages attributed to these patrols were as follows:

Vehicle5499 miles

Flamingo personnel spent more than 2 man-weeks on water activities.

With the influx of visitors came the usual minor law enforcement problems that are associated with congregations of large numbers of people. Park Rangers of both Key Largo and Flamingo have nipped these problems in the bud. From improper parking on park roadways to camper squabbles over possession of campsites have been some of the situations. Those Rangers assigned to campground duty have been doing a fine job of keeping incidents down through constant patrol and constant work.

On Friday, December 6th, two violations cases were heard, one before the US Commissioner Ralph Jordan for speeding, and operating a taxi without a permit, and the other in US District Court for petty theft. The speeder, Mr. Thomas Whitten, was fined \$25.00 by Gommissioner Jordan, and Mr. Carroll D. Humphreys pleaded guilty in District Court. Mr. Humphreys was judged guilty and a pre-sentence investigation was ordered.

Fishermen streamed into the park during the cold weather and were rewarded with good catches. Park Rangers were on hand to greet the fishermen and to check their catches as often as possible. A very few undersize fish were noted and these were primarily trout. Verbal warnings were the norm, but two written warnings were issued also.

((. • . When we at Flamingo think of the winter season, we tend to think of problems that are often associated with Everglades Park Company Employees. As use increases, the number of their employees increases. Fingerprinting these people this past month has been an alimost daily routine for one Ranger or another.

Key Largo Sub-district Rang r Schesventer has been busy with Park visitors also. Special boat patrols and commercial fishing activity problems consumed a great portion of his time.

Sanitation

A Quarterly inspection of Everglades Park Company facilities was made during December. Several items were found to be out of order and the Chief Ranger's office was notified.

One case of infectious hepatitis was found among the kitchen staff of the E.P.Co. This matter is under investigation and treatment at this time.

Maintenance

At this time of year maintenance performed by District personnel ceases to be a minor item. All boats and vehicles must be maintained in ready condition at all times. With the influx of visitors into the Park, our boats become vehicles for special activities at a more frequent rate, thus our maintenance must keep pace.

The weekly Boat-a-Cade program was resumed on 12/15/63. Two boat-a-cades were led into the waterways of the District. Four boats with 19 persons aboard participated.

Concessioners

Construction contracts let by E.P.Co. are progressing at a satisfactory rate.

Effective 12/9/63 Everglades Park Company changed from Phillips 66 products to those sold and distributed by Standard Oil.

Complaints

Two complaints were recieved on Everglades Park Company services this past month. One was a written complaint directed to the Secretary of The Interior regarding food service at the Coffee Shop. (See special incident report regarding Mr. Ferd. Doepel).

The second complaint was recieved by District Ran er thitehouse regarding just about ever/ facility the P.P.Co. operates. (See special incident report regarding Mr. R.J. Levy). These incidents were handled with all the tact that could be mustered.



Resource Planning

Cooperation with other Federal, State, and Local Agencies

On December 18, 1963 a meeting was held at Flamingo in regard to the long range effects of the Buttonwood canal on the Park. Members of the following agencies were present: National Park Service, University of Miami Marine Laboratory, and the U.S. Geological Survey.
