Scott's Bluff, an ancient landmark and later an important location on the Oregon Trail, is a massive promontory rising 800 feet above the valley floor. It was named for Hiram Scott, a fur trapper who died in the vicinity about 1828.

Large group of mounds built 300 B.C. to A.D. 600 by the Indians primarily as a burial place.
