General

Weather. The weather conditions were mild during the first half of the month. Precipitation and snowfall was light during the remainder of the month. Maximum temperature at headquarters was 43 degrees on the 22nd; minimum 0 degrees on the 26th. Total precipitation 1.26 inches.

Increase or Decrease in Travel. February travel was up 73.9 per cent from the same month last year; 581 visitors for February 1961, as against 564 in 1960. Visitors entering through the North Entrance totaled 91 cars and 336 visitors. Visitors entering through the West Entrance totaled 145.

There were 16 snowmobile trips from West Entrance to Old Faithful, carrying 131 visitors. Visitors represented the states of New York, Minnesota, Ohio, North Dakota, Colorado, Nevada, Arizona, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Utah.

Five snowplanes visited the Park via South Entrance during February.

Visitors. Mr. Russ Kline, free-lance writer and photographer visited on February 6-22. Superintendent and Mrs. Otto Brown, Grater Lake, February 16.

Inspections. Ernest K. Field, Region Two, Chief of Park Forest and Wildlife Protection, and Coleman G. Neuman, Biologist, from the Washington Office were here February 6-10 to review the northern elk herd reduction program and review the Gallatin herd situation.

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Mr. Earl Welton, Robert Gordon and Charles Joy, U. S. Forest Service employees from Bozeman and Gardiner, visited the Park on February 7 to review our radio problems.

George Bagley, Regional Chief of Operations, was in the Park February 15, 16 and 17.

Special Activities. Biologist Robert E. Howe returned on the 5th from the Annual Meeting of the American Society for Range Management in Salt Lake City.

Assistant Superintendent Castellana and Biologist Howe attended the Annual Bonneville County Sportsman's Jamoree in Idaho Falls, February 23-25.

Fire Control Specialist Gamzel attended an area agency meeting in Great Falls on the 28th to discuss Montana Indian fire fighters.

On February 1, Messrs. Darwin Williams, Franklin Elliott and Ellis E. Gabbert consulted with Field Solicitor Deasul in Billings relative to the Land-Air contract. A supplement agreement was drawn up and a copy sent to Electronics Engineer McFadden (WODC) for review. The approved supplemental agreement was sent to Land-Air for signature.

Chief Park Ranger Nelson Hurdock was in the Region Two Office the week of February 12 for orientation and to discuss a number of important protection functions in Yellowstone.

Members serving the tri-state essay contest on "What National Parks Mean to Me" were active during the month. Professor J.V.K. Weger of Colorado State University accepted to serve as principal judge.

Complimentary Permits for the 1961 season have been prepared and mailed in the tri-state area. All such permits for Wyoming are being issued jointly with Grand Teton.

Dr. Vincent J. Schaefer, College of Education, Albany, Schenectady, New York, and his party of seven meteorologists arrived in the Park February 14 for a 10-day Field Research Seminar, Yellowstone Phase NPS/State College of Education, concerning sub-cooled fog and clouds and the formation of ice crystals at Old Faithful.

Superintendent Garrison, Park Naturalist McIntyre, Landscape Architect Mattson, Park Engineer Howe, and Plans and Programs Officer Bean left February 18 for WODC, San Francisco, to discuss this season's operating and construction program. Messrs. Garrison and McIntyre conducted a program at the NPS Training Center at Yosemite on the 27th.

Cooperative Activities

Publicity. On each Thursday, The Yellowstone Weekly News was issued to keep employees, concessioners and others, currently informed.

There were three press releases: Yellowstone Lake Management Plans, Robert R. Robinson's retirement, and streambanks and lakeshore cleanup.

Religious and Chapel Use. The Chapel was used every Sunday for the regular Sunday School and Protestant church services.

Research and Observation. Park Ranger B. Riley McLelland, stationed at Old Faithful, reported on the 10th that Sapphire Geyser was erupting to a height of 150 feet with 15 minute intervals.

Interpretive Services. Chief Park Naturalist McIntyre wrote a short section on Shoshone Lake for Dr. John Montagne's Yellowstone canoeing manual.

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Museum Activities. Accoutrements for the Big Hole howitzer, along with miscellaneous items were received from former Management Assistant Robert L. Burnas.

Geological Surveys. Rangers assisted U. S. Geological Survey personnel by reading the Madison River water gage.

Soil Conservation. Park personnel took readings of all snow courses in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service and reports were mailed to the Weather Bureau in Casper, Wyoming.

Yellowstone Park Boundary. A preliminary study of the northwest boundary of the Park was started for consideration of a possible boundary adjustment.

Concessioners. The Annual Financial Report for the year 1960 for the Yellowstone Park Medical Service was pre-audited and Summary prepared during the month.

Building and Utility Maintenance. The final inspection was made of the sprinkler system installed in the Mammoth Supply Center, which was completed and accepted February 3.

Ranger Activities. Several employees made a ski patrol in the Miller Creek area February 22-26.

The Ranger force devoted nearly all of their time to ski reduction activities.

District Ranger Reynolds accompanied by Lt. John J. Craighead, conducted a ski patrol to the Shoshone Lake area via Old Faithful, February 11-17.

Park Ranger McLaren, accompanied by Grand Teton National Park District Ranger Gene Balaz, conducted a ski patrol to Heart Lake, January 31-February 1.

Rangers Fraser and Holder attended First Aid Instructor's course at West Yellowstone, February 9-10.

Forest Insects. Forestry Aid Reeves returned February 25 from a seven weeks assignment in Missoula, Montana. He assisted the U. S. Forest Service advisors in preparing the Blister and Control program for Yellowstone for the coming season.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities. BIGHORN. On February 11, eighteen were seen on the slopes of Druid Peak. On February 21, three very large rams and four ewes were observed across the Lamar River from Junction Butte.

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BISON. About 100 bison have grazed in the vicinity of Soda Butte during the month. There is one small red calf in the herd. Smaller herds were observed on Specimen Ridge, Slough Creek and Bullroaring.

EAGLES. Two Bald Eagles were observed near Junction Butte on February 23. Two were observed on the Gardiner River, February 13, eating on a deer carcass. A mature Bald Eagle was observed near Specimen Creek on the 6th, the first one seen in two years.

MOOSE. Two cows and a calf moose have been seen near the East Entrance Station.

ELK. Direct reduction operated on a limited basis from February 9 through the 14th, due to lack of snow cover. Direct reduction will cease March 10.

Live trapping continued full scale. All request for live elk from the State of Montana have been filled. We have 185 requests for live elk from private individuals or groups. Trapping will continue through March if weather conditions permit.

Our total reduction figure, including 25 taken by hunters outside the Park is 1,131. This is 75 per cent of this year's reduction goal of 1,500.

Contracts. The final estimate for contract 14-10-243-398 with Utilities Service Company for Utilities Extension Residential Area, Mammoth, was paid. Amount of contract was \$144,328.98.

Nance Engineering Contract No. 14-10-243-394 for Investigation of Dredging Bridge Bay was paid on final estimate. Amount, 75,540.

Shallaker, Inc. Contract No. 14-10-243-411 for Dredging Bridge Bay Lagoon was paid on final estimate. Amount, \$235,045.02.

New Construction: Three contract construction projects continued through February with progress on each as follows:

Installation of sprinkler system in Warehouse by Grinnell Company of the Pacific. Work completed except for replacement of a broken switch. Final inspection and acceptance complete except for this one item.

Two seasonal apartments at Mammoth by Nelson Brothers. Progress slow. Interior painting complete and exterior work underway. Floor man holding up completion of bathroom plumbing. Insulation completed. There has been no work on the floors and all electrical and heating tests are yet to be completed.

Duplex teacherage and principal's residence by Easton and Miller. Progress is good. Cabinets have been set in duplex. Sanding of hardwood floors in duplex started. One half of duplex has electrical fixtures in place. Painting of duplex complete except for minor trim; house has been started. Exterior items to be held until spring.

All other construction jobs are shut down until spring except for the procurement of tables, fireplaces, and latrines by contract, and the assembling of these items by the permanent force for use in day labor campground and picnic area projects this spring.

Conferences and Meetings: Superintendent Garrison, Chief Park Naturalist McIntyre, Mission 66 Coordinator Bean, Chief Park Engineer Rowe, Park Landscape Architect Mattson left the Park February 18 for San Francisco to confer with Western Office, Division of Design and Construction personnel on construction and development matters.
