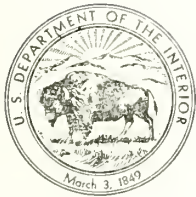

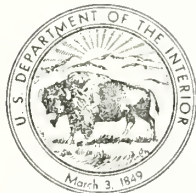

GENERAL

Weather Conditions.

The weather was generally dry and mild through December. Daytime temperatures were near freezing or above during most of this period. Maximum temperatures at headquarters were 51 degrees on December 22, and the minimum was 5 degrees below zero on the 13th. The dry weather ended with the first snowstorm on December 24, with wind and some snow continuing the remainder of the month. Temperatures and snow depths around the Park were:

Increase or Decrease in Travel. A total of 1,580 visitors entered the Park during December as compared to 403 in 1964.

Travel for the year totaled 2,062,476, as compared to 1,929,316 in 1964, an increase of 133,160.

The road from West Entrance to Old Faithful and Mammoth was reopened on December 1 and remained open until Christmas Eve when it was closed by snow.

SNOWMOBILES. Special Use Permits were issued to Harold Young and to Howard T. Kelsey, owner of Stage Coach Inn, West Yellowstone, to operate snowmobiles from West Yellowstone to Old Faithful this winter.

Inspections. Associate Regional Director George F. Baggley came to the Park on December 12 with the Superintendent when he returned from the Annual Meeting of the Montana Wilderness Association. He remained until early December 15 when he returned to Omaha. While here he looked over the area where prescribed burning was given a trial in an aspen stand on the Northern elk winter range. With the Superintendent Mr. Baggley went to the Upper Geyser Basin by car on the 13th. They were able to get around over most of the area although snow did prevent an inspection of the Nez Perce wildlife corral and trap. We were glad to have Mr. Baggley see Park operations at this time of the year.

Special Activities. Superintendent McLaughlin talked to the Idaho Falls Rotary Club regarding the Park and the Service on December 1. About 70 Rotarians and guests were in attendance. After the meeting an informal question and answer period was held with the Superintendent "fielding" a variety of questions in Park development. The Associate Editor of the Idaho Falls Post-Register interviewed the Superintendent later on travel to the Park and plans for the future.

In company with Park Biologist Robert E. Howe, the Superintendent attended the annual meeting of the Montana Wilderness Association in Great Falls on the 11th and 12th. He participated in a panel discussion on policies and problems of administering Wilderness Areas. Associate Regional Director Baggeley was the feature speaker at the Association's Banquet on the 11th and he made a talk that was well received.

Chief Park Ranger Wayne R. Howe represented Yellowstone National Park at the Montana Outfitters and Guides Association's 16th annual Convention held December 2-4 in West Yellowstone, Montana

Biologist Robert E. Howe attended the Wyoming Outfitters and Guides annual meeting in Dubois, Wyoming, December 3, 4, 5. A presentation of Yellowstone's bear and elk management was made, and questions answered.

Chief Park Naturalist John M. Good departed Yellowstone on December 5 for the Midwest Regional Office to attend the Interpretive Planning Conference December 6 through 10. At the Conference, plans for the Norris, Madison, Old Faithful and Lake prospectuses were discussed with Washington Office interpreters and the first two above-mentioned were recommended for approval. Approved copies were received at the naturalist office December 20. Mr. Good attended the Farewell Party for Regional Director Lemuel A. Garrison on the 11th, who will transfer to the Northeast Regional Office, Philadelphia, as Regional Director. Superintendent Fred C. Fagergren of Grand Teton National Park will become Regional Director, Midwest Region.

A committee appointed by the Regional Director, composed of Messrs. Ralph McFadden, Western Office, Design and Construction, David Johns, Montana Power Company, and Frank Elliott, Chief of Maintenance, conducted a survey December 6 through 10 to establish an inventory and current evaluation of the Montana Power distribution system for use in contract negotiations with the Montana Power Company.

Forestry Technician John N. Reeves attended the United States Service White Pine Blister Rust Contro. Zone meeting at Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, on December 7-11; a U. S. Forest Service meeting.

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Assistant Superintendent Julius A. Martinek attended a meeting in Cody, Wyoming regarding proposals for a new Sunlight Basin road which would be an all-weather highway connecting with the Beartooth Highway, eight miles north of Cooke City.

Superintendent's Staff Meetings were held December 3, 17 and 30.

Visitors. Associate Regional Director Saggley, Midwest Region was in the Park December 12-13; Engineer Ralph McFadden from Western Office, Design and Construction, was in the Park December 7-11 to participate in an appraisal of the electric power system serving Mammoth.

Mr. Carl Lamb arrived December 21 to discuss possible subjects for an M. S. in Resource Administration at Michigan State University.

Awards. A 10-year Length-of-Service Emblem was presented to John W. Card, Janitor, December 1.

Assistant Superintendent James M. Carpenter was presented with a 30-year Length-of-Service Emblem on December 3.

A Citation for Meritorious Service was presented to Clarence E. Scoyen on December 3. Mr. Scoyen retired last March.

Forestry Technician John N. Reeves was presented with a Unit Citation Award from the Department for outstanding work on the Mountain Pine Beetle Control in the Grand Teton National Park area.

Birth. A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. James Patterson, on December 14 in San Mateo, California. Personnel Officer Richard C. and Mrs. Miller are the maternal grandparents.

Statistics. Assistant Superintendent and Mrs. Julius A. Martinek adopted a baby girl on December 23. Lisa Linda was born December 4, 1965. Lisa joins Steven West whom they adopted January 23, 1964.

Death. Mr. Frank Clancy, Buffalo, New York, died December 3. He was the father of Edward J. Clancy, Landscape Architect.

Ill. Park Geologist George Marler was a surgical patient in the Idaho Falls hospital, where he had an operation for a stomach ulcer. His condition has been complicated due to difficulties with his esophagus and he was operated on again late in the month to correct these conditions. His recovery has been slow but progress is evident.

Miscellaneous. The National Federation of Federal Employees held its regular monthly meeting December 6.

Mammoth Schools closed December 23 until January 3.

#### Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Services. The Mammoth Museum was closed December 1 and will remain closed until next Spring.

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South District Naturalist Johansson completed work on the draft for the Mud Volcano Trail self-guiding booklet and the draft materials were given to Bill Chapman of Gardiner for preparation of the art work.

Work began during the month on researching material for a revision of the Manual of General Information on Yellowstone Park.

Research and Observation. BEEHIVE GEYSER erupted on December 22. Madison Junction seismograph was serviced on December 14.

Ranger Activities. Sub-District Ranger Raymond L. Ives participated in the lost hunter search for Mr. Tom Garofalo, Wyoming Game and Fish employee stationed at Laramie, Wyoming. The search was conducted in the northeastern section of Grand Teton National Park, an area of approximately 3,000 acres. On the afternoon of December 2, a 9-man search crew of Rangers came upon the body of Mr. Garofalo under a large spruce tree just off the south shore of Emma Matilda Lake, approximately 1/4 mile from its outlet. Death was caused by exposure.

Law Enforcement. No incidents occurred during the month; however, the preliminary total of reported incidents for 1965 is 586.

Safety and Health. Three motor vehicle accidents were reported and investigated by Ranger personnel during December.

The total number of motor vehicle accidents for calendar year 1965 is 389, the highest yet recorded. This total represents the following "class" totals:

Building and Utilities. A new 10 KVA standby power plant was installed at Old Faithful for emergency use this winter.

Roads and Trails. Snowmobile operations started from West Yellowstone to Old Faithful on December 27.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities. On December 2, Biologist Robert E. Howe spent several hours with Biologist Greer, Montana Fish and Game Department, and Drs. Hawkins and Cottin of the Veterinarian Research Division of Montana State University at Bozeman, discussing parasitological findings in antelope, bison, and elk; and finalizing plans for this season's biological control studies.

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Antelope. In cooperation with Mr. Bert O'Carra of the University of Montana, North District personnel assisted in the antelope research study program by taking four buck and five doe antelope on December 6 and 7, respectively.

Bison. The Lamar buffalo herd group was trapped by helicopter at Crystal Trap. A check of the group showed a return of six out of 12 neckbanded animals with bands intact; two returned without bands. Of the remaining four animals not accounted for, only two might be expected to be with the herd. Total calf crop for the year was four with 100% survival. Mortality from all causes has been greater than increase. After being released from the trap, the entire group returned to the Cache-Calfes ridge.

Eagle. Bald eagles were observed in the Old Faithful area on December 21 and 25.

Elk. The first work of this year relative to gathering information on methods of biological control of elk populations was done on December 6. The work is being carried out in cooperation with the Montana Fish and Game Department and the Veterinarian Research Laboratory of Montana State University. Mr. Kenneth Greer, Drs. Perkins and Cottin were involved. Eight adult cows (4 adults and 4 yearlings) were operated on, removing their ovaries. These animals were then confined in the Mammoth elk trap for future study.

Messrs. Merlin Shosmith and Richard Blott, students at the University of Montana at Missoula, are participating in the Northern Yellowstone elk migration studies. Blott is now living at Lamar and will be involved with winter migration studies. Shosmith will work winter and summer on elk behavior and observations related to migration.

Otter. Two otter were seen swimming in open water on the Lamar River between Cache and Calfes Creek, December 27.
