Following is the report of activities for Yellowstone National Park during the month of March 1958:

General

Weather Conditions. The weather was generally dry and mild during the month. The maximum temperature of 50° was reached several times at headquarters while the minimum for the park was -16° at West Entrance on the 11th of March. Snow course readings show a minimum of 25.9" at Northeast Entrance and a maximum of 99.1" at Lewis River Divide. Precipitation was recorded on only 13 days during the month at headquarters, the maximum being 1.37" which is slightly below normal.

Range. Non-critical range in the Yellowstone and Gallatin drainages was free of snow in March. Considerable old forage was available in the Yellowstone drainage while the forage in the Gallatin drainage was rather limited.

Increase or Decrease in Travel. Travel during the month showed 966 visitors entering the park against 1,140 for the same period last year.

Inspections. FBI Special Agent Mason Melvin was in the park the 13th in regard to law enforcement matters.

Ronald Bell, District Supervisor of the Wyoming Fish and Game Commission, Cody, Wyoming, was in the park on the 5th regarding wildlife matters.

Special Activities. Superintendent Garrison left the 3rd for WOODC where he attended the meeting on Grant Village, and to Yosemite National Park to attend the Department Field Executive

Following is the report of activities and accomplishments
National Park Service for the month of March 1937.

General

Weather Conditions. The weather was generally dry and
mild during the month. The highest temperature of 77° was recorded
several times at Gardiner during the month. The lowest was
-10° at last entrance on the foot of Mount. There were several
snow storms during the month. Precipitation was recorded on only 11 days
during the month at Gardiner. The amount being 2.37" which is
slightly below normal.

Game. Game-watching trips in the Yellowstone and Teton
National Parks were few in number. Game-watching is being
available in the Yellowstone National Park during the month
of March was rather limited.

Progress of Research in 1937. Work during the month
showed 500 visitors entering the park during 1937 for the same
month last year.

Inspection. 171 Special Agent visits were made in the

COYOTE. These animals have been observed along the roadside in the Tower Fall area and also the headquarters area in frequent numbers.

DEER. Deer have been observed in the Old Faithful area frequently during the month. They were also reported in the headquarters area and in the vicinity of Geode Creek.

MARTEN. Two animals were seen at the upper Miller patrol cabin on the 13th and 24th. Five martens are still in the vicinity of the Old Faithful ranger quarters.

MOOSE. A cow and calf were noted near the Tower area and four were seen along the Gallatin river.

WEASEL. A weasel in winter coat was observed at close range along the Lamar River trail on the 27th.

FISH. The effects of DDT spraying is being analyzed and the findings will be published in a few months.

BIRDS. Fifty trumpeter swan were observed along the Yellowstone River between Canyon and Fishing Bridge on the 17th--also two bald eagles, and on the 19th, 30 trumpeter swan were observed in flight at one time. Birds observed on the 22nd were 2 mallard ducks, 2 goldeneyes, 3 mergansers, 27 Canadian geese, 1 red wing blackbird and a mountain bluebird. Starlings were first observed on the 28th in the Old Faithful area.

Building Fire Protection. Training lesson plans and outlines in building fire protection are being prepared for the ranger conference which will be held in May.

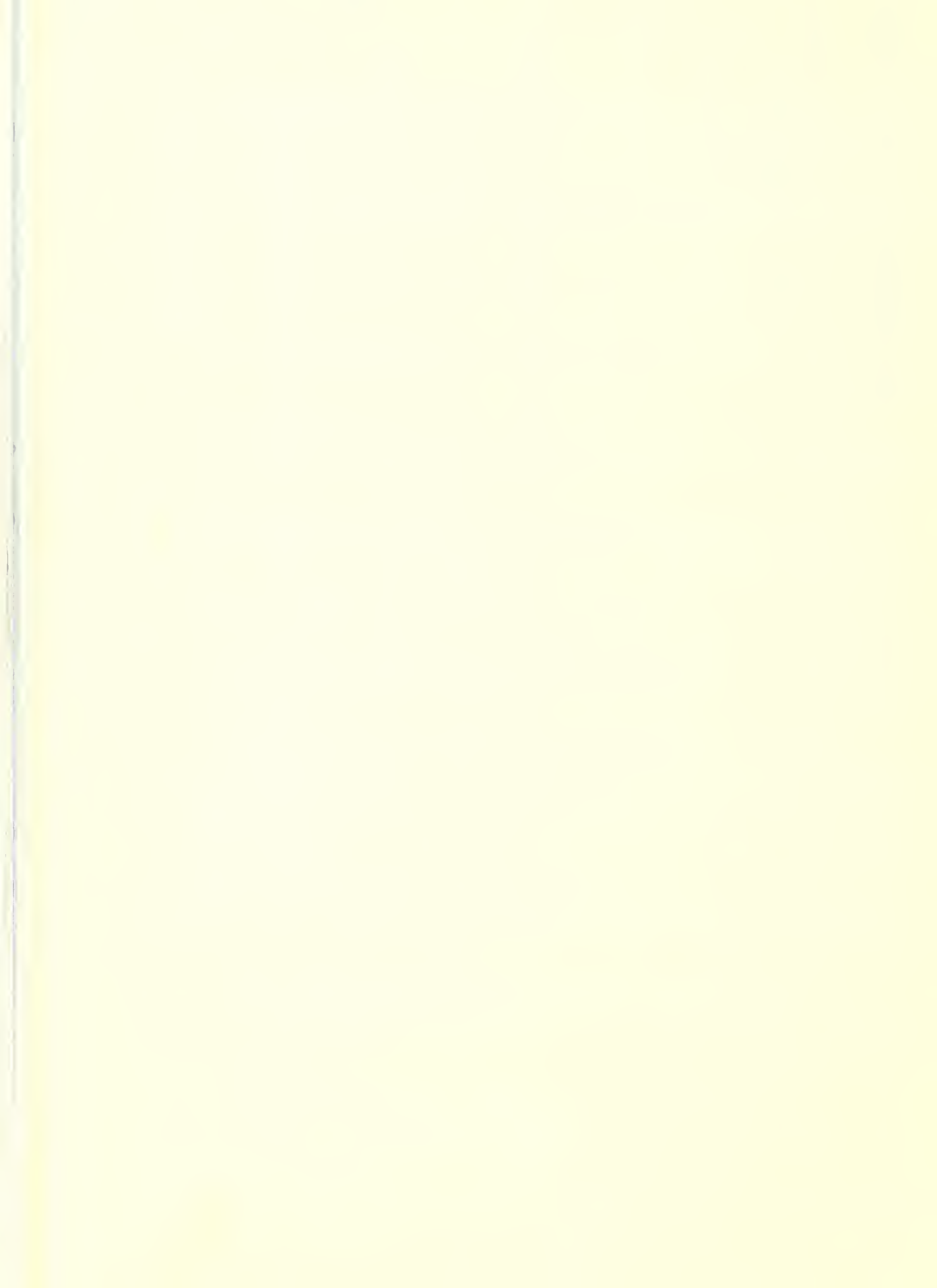
