



Subject: Monthly Report for January 1958

Following is the report of activities for Yellowstone National Park during the month of January 1958:

General

Weather Conditions. Weather for the month of January was unusually mild with precipitation recorded only five days. Precipitation in the headquarters area was only .37 inches compared to 1.23 inches during January of last year. The maximum for the park was 41° while the minimum was -2°. Snow course readings throughout the park reveal a below normal snowfall for this season of the year. The maximum snow depth of 72.0 inches was recorded at Lewis River Divide course while the minimum of 24.0 inches was recorded at the Lupine course.

Range. Snow depths increased very little on the northern winter range-hardly covering the ground on the critical range below Mammoth at the end of the month.

Increase or Decrease in Travel. A total of 503 visitors had entered the park during the month by car and 80 via snowmobile. These figures were obtained by actual count and the self registry.

Inspections. H. C. Johnson, Chief, Examing Division, Tenth Civil Service Region, Denver, was in the park January 6-10 to review the local Civil Service Board procedures.

Regional Director Howard Baker and Regional Chief of Operations George Baggley and Ted Wirth, Landscape Architect from Grand Teton, arrived January 12; Al Heubner and Al Kuehl from WODC in San Francisco arrived January 13; to attend the meeting on Grant Village held in Yellowstone January 13-14. Messrs. Heubner and Ruchl departed the 14th while Mesars. Baker, Baggley and Wirth departed the 15th.

Leonard Koski, U. S. Geological Survey, was in the park January 24 and 25 to measure stream flows on the Lamar, Gardner and Yellowstone Rivers.

FBI Special Agent Mason Melvin, Bozeman, was in the park on January 2 and 29 regarding law enforcement matters.

John J. Oravetz, Counter Intelligence Special Agent, Billings, Montana, was in the park on the 8th regarding personnel matters.

Special Visitors. John W. Jay, Superintendent of Theodore Roosevelt National Memorial Park, stopped in the park January 10 on his return to Theodore Roosevelt.

Wilford L. Miller of the North Dakota Fish and Game Department, Bismarck, was in the park January 10 to get pictures for the Encyclopedia Britannica. Mr. Miller was a seasonal park ranger in Yellowstone in 1942.

Pat Murray, Supervisor of the Shoshone National Forest, Forest Ranger Ray Swiggert, Cody, Wyoming and Quinn Blair, Manager of Pahaska Tepee were in the park January 15 to discuss the proposed erection of a new lodge building at Pahaska.

Walter Berlet, wildlife photographer from Casper, Wyoming was in during the month to take pictures.

Special Activities. Superintendent Garrison, Park Naturalist Condon and Management Assistant Joffe left January 7 for Worland, Wyoming where they engaged in public relations work and gave talks. Mr. Garrison spoke at the Chamber of Commerce annual meeting the evening of the 8th while Mr. Condon gave talks and showed movies to the Rotary Club and Worland High School on the 8th and presented a similar program to the Lions Club the 9th. Messrs. Garrison, Condon and Joffe also presented a TV program at Thermopolis the 8th. Messrs. Joffe and Condon returned the 9th while Mr. Garrison continued on to Bozeman and Kalispell. He attended the Montans Wildlife Federation meeting held in Kalispell on January 11 and 12. Chief Ranger Brown and Biologist Kittams also attended this meeting and then proceeded to Glacier to confer on wildlife matters.

The Yellowstone Park Credit Union held their annual meeting on January 31--the following officers were elected: Board of Directors, Lee L. Coleman, Alice A. Kohout, and Rolla D. Accidents and Public Safety. Two accidents occurred at the skiing area at Undine Falls--Supervisory Park Ranger Robert Howe broke his right arm on the 12th and Lynn Gillett, seven year old son of Heavy Duty Mechanic and Mrs. Lester Gillett broke his left leg on the 19th. Darlene Schmidt, visitor, fractured her leg while tobogganing on Capitol Hill.

Cooperative Activities

General Publicity. The annual travel story for 1957 was mailed to the press and the park mailing list on January 7, and a press release was issued on the award of the Gardner River bridges to be constructed on the 30th.

On each Thursday, the Yellowstone Weekly News was issued to keep employees, concessioners and others currently informed of park happenings.

Religious Services and Chapel Use. The Chapel was used every Sunday for the regular Protestant church school and services.

The Rev. Warren W. Ost, Director of a Student Ministry in the National Parks, New York, was in the park January 10-12 to discuss the religious program of the park.

Museum Activities and Exhibits. Six birds have been captured and are being mounted for use in the Canyon Visitor Center--American Raven, Clark's Nuteracker, Water Ouzel, Barrow's Goldeneye, Rocky Mountain Jay and Mountain Chickadee. One Marten has been captured for use as part of the mammal exhibit, also in the Canyon Visitor Center.

Research and Observation. Maximum temperatures were obtained from each of the springs on the Mammoth Terraces and were charted along with temperatures taken of the same springs in midsummer. Library research work is being continued on the geysers in the geyser basin along the Firehole. A detailed report has been prepared on Castle Geyser and its activities through the years. A similar report is being prepared on the Giantess Geyser.

Natural History Association. The annual meeting of the Board of Directors of the Yellowstone Library and Museum Association was held January 27. The annual report of the Association was submitted to the Director's and Regional Director's Offices on the 29th. Joseph Joffe was elected Chairman and Aubrey L. Haines was elected by the Board to fill the position vacated by Alice Quist. The Association voted to purchase a \$100 life membership in the Employees Alumni Association of the National Park Service.

Concessioners. A copy of a memorandum from Jackson Price to J. E. Haynes, advised the Washington Office had executed on December 30, 1957 an amendment to Haynes' Contract No. I-100-np-440, which provides for a change in the franchise fee, effective January 1, 1957, amending section 9(a)(2) to provide for the payment of 1½ per cent of gress receipts.

The Annual Report and franchise fee in the amount of \$48,920.37 for Hamilton Stores, Inc. covering 1957, was received January 1. The Annual Report and franchise fee in the amount of \$16,364.03 for the Yellowstone Park Company for the period of October 1, 1956, to September 30, 1957, was received January 9.

Concessioners representing their respective companies were in the park January 12-15 to attend the meeting on Grant Village. Trev Povah represented Hamilton Stores, Inc.; John Q. Nichols, Huntley Child, Jr., Hugh Galusha and Orr Pickering represented Yellowstone Park Company; Jack and Isabel Haynes represented Haynes, Inc.

Jack and Isabel Haynes were in the park January 27.

Jack attended the annual meeting of the Yellowstone Library and Museum Association.

Maintenance. The road to Cooke City was kept open all month and the Terrace Loop road on the Mammoth Terraces has also been kept open to allow winter visitors to view this feature.

Routine maintenance was carried out on buildings and utilities.

Protection and Ranger Service. A staff meeting for Protective Division personnel was held on the 8th. The Boating Committee met on the 22nd to discuss policy and revision to boating regulations.

The annual waterfowl census was taken during the month. Normal winter activities are being carried out in addition to inspection trips and patrols, and the continued search for horses lost last summer.

Elk reduction was conducted from the 29th through the 31st with a total of 59 killed. Live trapping has been unsuccessful due to insufficient snow and good weather.

Law Enforcement. Round the clock patrols were made in the area adjacent to the park (U. S. Highway 191) on week ends to apprehend or discourage violators since poachers killed two elk in this vicinity on January 4.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities. BISON. Approximately 115 bison have been ranging near the Lamar Unit throughout the month. The bull (Geronimo) which spent last winter in the Stevens Creek area is again wintering there--arriving there on the 15th.

ELK. The downward movement of elk was very little during January.

OTTER. Six were observed during the month--3 near Norris Junction on the 9th and 3 on Obsidian Creek the 12th.

SHEEP. Sheep were observed during the month on Druid Peak, east of the Pebble Creek campground, near Junction Butte, above Bear Creek and near the North Entrance.

Building Fire Protection. An unannounced fire drill was held January 27 for the Mammoth Fire Organization, after which the use of CTC and dry chemical fire extinguishers on oil fires was demonstrated. The building fire plan for Mammoth has been written and all employees have received copies.

Forest Fire Protection. The Forest Fire Report Summary was completed and forwarded to Region Two on the 14th and the Report of Forest Protection and Building Fire Equipment the 25th.

Construction. The contract for furnishing and installing a 300 K.W. diesel generator at Canyon, cost \$39,839, was awarded to Nash-Davis Machinery Company of Billings, Montana, on January 23.

The bids for two Cardner River bridges were opened the 14th by the Bureau of Public Roads and the low bidder was W. R. Cahoon Company of Pocatello, cost \$172,687.65, which was accepted by the National Park Service on the 28th. Work on this project is expected to start next month.


