Subject: Superintendent's Monthly Narrative Report for December 1964

General

Weather Conditions. Mild weather prevailed during December with only light snow showers and a few night temperatures below zero. Maximum temperature was 45 degrees on December 9 at highest altitudes. The minimum temperature was recorded at Northwest Entrance on December 11, -26 degrees. A low temperature of 36 degrees below zero was recorded at West Yellowstone on December 11, and a low of 22 degrees below zero was recorded at Old Faithful on December 13.

Increase or Decrease in Travel. Visitors to the Park during the month of December numbered 466 in 97 cars.

Snowmobiles of West Yellowstone. Snowmobile services from West Yellowstone started the first operation of the season December 11. Mr. Harold Young operates this service under a special use permit offering over the snow travel to Old Faithful and return from West Yellowstone. There were 110 guests who made the trip as of December 31. This included 16 aspirants to the U. S. Olympic Biathlon Team on December 26.

Range. Biologist Allen Lovvas, Montana Fish and Game Department, Gallatin Gateway, Montana, visited the Park to discuss Gallatin winter range study data with Park Management Biologist Howe.

Visitors. Robert Munson, U. S. Geological Survey, December 6. The U. S. Olympic Biathlon Aspirants and coaches visited Old Faithful December 21.

Mr. Robert Rothweiler, Montana Fish & Game Department, Billings, Montana, brought Mr. Heavachick, Game Biologist, Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission, Hays, Kansas, to the Park to observe antelope trapping on December 19.

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Special Activities. Associate Superintendent Castellum and South District Ranger Robert Morey attended the fifth annual meeting of Wyoming Outfitters Association in Jackson, Wyoming, December 5, 6 and 7. Membership of the group is composed of guides licensed by the State of Wyoming for hire and hunting purposes and other back country uses within the State. Mr. Castellum was one of the featured speakers at the meeting.

Superintendent Garrison and Chief Park Ranger Wayne S. Howe attended the Montana Wildlife Federation Meeting in Livingston, Montana December 6 and 7. Several members of Yellowstone's Division of Ranger Services attended all or part of the sessions. The keynote address was given by Dr. R. R. Nesme, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture for Foreign Affairs. The subject of his address was "Recreational Needs and Our Public Lands."

Robert N. McIntyre, Assistant to Regional Director, Midwest, and Barton V. Coale, Information Officer for the Midwest Region, visited the Park on December 2 and 3, selecting photographs and preparing the layout for the new Park Folder. Superintendent Garrison and Associate Superintendent Castellum accompanied them to Helena, Montana, to meet with Mike Kennedy, Director of the Montana Historical Society and secretary of the Montana Territorial Centennial Commission.

Personnel Management Specialist Thompson attended a U. S. Civil Service Commission Training Conference on Personnel Management in Denver, Colorado, on December 4, 5 and 6.

The Leopold report on wildlife management in National Parks was discussed and reviewed on December 9 by all uniformed personnel; also the National Academy of Science report on research needs in the National Park Service.

An interagency meeting was held at Park headquarters on December 10 to discuss the proposed Cooperative Agreement for the Management of the Northern Yellowstone Elk Herd and its Habitat.

On December 11 Superintendent Garrison and Associate Superintendent Castellum attended the Montana Outfitters meeting at Billings, Montana. Mr. Garrison made a report on general matters of interest and Mr. Castellum gave an illustrated talk on winter activities and elk trapping program.

Superintendent and Mrs. Garrison departed the Park December 22 to spend the holidays with their daughter, Mrs. Eldon Rayer, at Big Bend National Park.

Yearly Travel Report for Yellowstone for the year 1963 has been written. Travel figures to the Park are 1,872,417 visitors; boats, 6,170; trailers 13,112, and pickup campers 16,897. All categories showed a loss except boats and pickup campers.

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Earth tremors. The U. S. Forest Service reported a slight earth tremor at West Yellowstone on December 20 at 6:02 a.m.

Earth tremors were reported at Mammoth on December 16, 17 and 20. The one on the 20th was felt at West Yellowstone, Gardiner and Jardine.

The Superintendent's Staff Meetings were held on December 8 and 19.

Administration

Personnel. The annual board meeting for the U. S. Civil Service Commission Board of Examiners was held December 17 in the Personnel Branch. Plans for 1964 recruitment and staffing needs were established.

Transfers: Arthur J. Hayas, Park Ranger, GS-7, to Chief Park Ranger, GS-9, Lava Beds National Monument, California, effective 12/8/63.

Birth. A son, Ray David, was born December 17 in the Memorial Hospital, Livingston, Montana, to Ranger and Mrs. Stewart R. Orgill.

Death. John H. Wells, Butte, Montana, passed away December 28, in the Men's Dormitory, Mammoth. He was employed by the National Park Service as a janitor. Cause of death Arteriosclerotic heart disease. Burial was in Baltimore National Cemetery, Baltimore, Maryland.

Accidents and Public Safety. A total of 330 reported vehicle accidents occurred in the Park during the year 1963.

Special Assignment. Park Rangers Charles V. Janda and Gordon D. Boyd completed the fall course at the Horace M. Albright Training Center, Grand Canyon National Park on December 6. Training began September 15. Rangers Janda and Boyd returned to the Park December 19.

Conservation, Interpretation and Use

Interpretive Services. Park Ranger Kenneth A. Lindfors provided impromptu interpretation at Old Faithful for visitors arriving on the Snowmobile trips from West Yellowstone.

Interpretive Planning. The West District Naturalist spent considerable time during the month in preparation of the Fountain Paint Pots nature trail booklet. The text should be completed by mid-January.

Research and Observation. U.S.G.S. Geophysist Robert Munson of Denver, spent December 5 and 6 in the Park putting into operation the seismographs at Canyon Visitor Center and at West Yellowstone. Recording on the seismographs is done photographically and the records developed in Denver.

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Wildlife

Antelope. On December 19 there were 18 antelope trapped at the Gardiner trap. During the wildlife count 135 antelope were observed.

Bighorn. From one to 17 sheep were observed throughout December on the slopes of the Gardner River canyon near the lower bridge.

Canada Geese. 415 were observed in Hayden Valley on December 4 and 5; and 154 were counted on the Madison River December 6.

Deer. Herds of 300 have been counted between Gardiner and Reese Creek.

Eagle. A pair of bald eagles was seen in the vicinity of the Slough Creek trap on December 20. Said eagles were seen in flight at Gibbon Canyon, Madison River, Mt. Jackson, and Madison Junction between December 5 and 19. A Golden eagle was observed at Eagle Bend on the Madison River, December 19.

Elk. Biological elk collections for research were made for the Montana State College and Montana Fish and Game.

Live Shipped. To date 40 elk have been live shipped. They were assigned to the Hualapai Indian tribe, Peach Springs, Arizona.

Live Trapped. Two helicopters from Johnson Flying Service, Missoula, Montana, are being used in this operation. We are fortunate to have pilot Mel Galloway return -- this is his third year in the Park on elk trapping operations. The other pilot is Bill Wyler. They arrived in the Park December.

To date, 172 elk have been live-trapped. Of these, 76 were neckbanded and released, 16 were re-trapped elk, and 23 escaped.

Moose. Many are seen frequently in the vicinity of the Northwest Entrance.

Trumpeter Swans. 102 observed in Hayden Valley on December 4 and 5.

Ranger Service. Patrols were made over all open Park roads.

Law Enforcement. Four law enforcement incidents occurred during the month. None were reportable under the FBI Uniform Crime Report.

A total of 338 incidents were reported to the Law Enforcement Office during the 1963 calendar year. In 1962 there were 413 incidents reported. Of the total reported incidents, 152 were taken before U. S. Commissioner Brown for a hearing and final disposition.

Geological Survey. The Madison and Lamar River water gauges were read for the Soil Conservation Service and Geological Survey.

Building Fire Protection. Fire brigade training for Mammoth personnel was held December 13.

Roads. Snow removal and sanding has been on a 7-day coverage, as needed, with plowing to Cascade City, Montana on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Public Affairs

Publicity. On each Thursday the Yellowstone Weekly News was issued to keep employees, concessioners and others currently informed of Park happenings.

One press release was issued on discussion of Cooperative Management for the Northern Yellowstone elk herd.

Religious and Chapel Use. Protestant services were held throughout the month. A special Christmas Eve service was held December 24 at 7:00 p.m., conducted by Rev. John Lee.

Public Relations. Park Historian Deines gave a one-hour talk on the Mayan civilization to the sophomore class at Gardiner High School on December 16.
