

# Pieces of Buildings

# by Charles E. Peterson, FAIA

EEPING DRY—AND KEEPING WARM—(IN THAT ORDER) HAVE BEEN THE CONCERNS OF mankind even before it evolved to become homo sapiens. Those concerns have supported the great Building Industry as we know it today. Statisticians may be able to tell us whether it—or Agriculture—is now the bigger.

As discoveries and inventions proliferate, our structures become more and more complicated. Yet their occupants are hardly aware of what shelters them – unless the roof leaks, the heat goes off or the front door sticks.

Archeologists who dig around the world sometimes address these concerns. But unless the specimens come from some exotic locale like Mesopotamia or New Guinea, museum directors don't seem to have much exhibit space to devote to this compelling and pervasive subject.

Fifty years ago the Musée Carnavalet in Paris gave expert attention to the details of French buildings over the centuries. Today, specialized museums from Rouen to Nancy still feature a great array of architectural ironwork. Yet in East London, the Geoffrey Museum has now retreated from its former emphasis on architectural details to present popular programs to entertain children on weekends. The newly opened British Heritage Architectural Study Centre at the Rangers' House in Greenwich Park does look at the subject in a comprehensive way and is beautifully installed. But it is very

small in size, exhibiting only a tiny fraction of its immense holdings.

In Boston, the neat and instructive exhibit of architectural fragments at SPNEA, on display during the great Bert and Nina Little period, (I hear) has been moved to a couple of rural barns. We can only hope that local delinquents won't be inspired to torch them.

While serving with the National Park Service I had the opportunity of starting two collections of significant specimens: first in St. Louis in the late 1930s and then at Philadelphia in the early 1950s.

At St. Louis, the National Park Service was called upon to clear 40 city blocks of buildings on the Mississippi River levee (the area now landmarked by the great Saarinan stainless steel arch). There we had the opportunity to salvage interesting parts of hundreds of buildings, mostly built following a great fire in 1849. There we selected details of both structural and aesthetic interest for preservation. Specimens were marked for careful handling and delivery to storage in a modern warehouse by the several demolition contractors. Four representative cast iron facades were marked, unscrewed and stored. All remained there through World War II. It had been officially approved at the highest level that the specimens would be displayed in a Museum of American Architecture to be constructed on the site. A complementary institution was to have been a Museum of the American Fur Trade as projected by Dr. Carl Parcher Russell, a leading expert on that subject and head of the National Park Service Museum Division.

As it turned out later, the planning initiative passed to the National Park Service Omaha Regional Office. There the two-museum plan was abandoned in favor of a more general Museum of Western Expansion which was tucked under the big arch and covered over by a leaky natural landscape. Lacking a facility (proposed Museum of American Architecture), the architectural collection was publicly offered to any museum willing to come and take it. The Smithsonian was one of several that accepted and hauled one big truckload of specimens back to Washington. What happened to any of the items in that treasure trove of architectural history. I haven't heard.

When the big Independence National Historical Park in Philadelphia began to develop, and clearance of the site started, as Resident Architect I began to collect specimens that might be instructive to the staff in our new drafting room. No books existed that covered such subjects.

The first big accession was from the site of the new Fairless Steel Works at Morrisville, Pennsylvania, where a dozen or so early farmhouses were to be removed. A couple of truckloads of interesting (and some unique) specimens were brought to Philadelphia and stored.

An opportunity to show the collection came when the Society of Architectural Historians met in the city. Don Benson, an ingenious young staff architect, put up a good temporary display at minimal expense in

the vacant McIlvaine house on Walnut Street.

The staff architects always appreciated the value of specimens and kept adding to the collection – especially during the vast demolitions of the Redevelopment Authority along the Delaware Riverfront. Then, in 1970, a big show (humorously titled "See What They Sawed") was set up by Architects Henry Judd, Lee Nelson, Penelope Hartshorne Batcheler and their assistants. It occupied the whole ground floor of the First Bank of the United States on Third Street and remained there for 3 years.

The collection is now in storage in the Bank cellar vaults. Through campaigns using summer students, the specimens have been cleaned, mounted and labelled over the years and the important Philadelphia collection of the late Carl Gatter has been added. Two curatorial interns, John Marks and David Conradsen, sponsored by the Friends of Independence National Historical Park, have recently put the collection on a computer data base and have catalogued and improved the storage. But the collection remains locked up and mostly unknown to the people, professional and otherwise, who would appreciate it and find it useful.

Keeping Dry and Keeping Warm – problems people have faced and solved time and again in the structures they've constructed, lived in and modified. These specimens, if studied, have stories to tell the architects, architectural historians and anyone who lives in buildings about those who have gone before.

# This Survey

HE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE HAS COMPILED THIS SURVEY BY CONTACTING potential sources and requesting that they share information about their collections by filling out a 2-page Request for Information (see last page). As you will see, architectural study collections are a largely undiscovered resource for research or study. Of the 170 collections in this listing, only 54% have even one object on exhibit. Only 33% can state that any publications have referred to items from their collection.

The focus for this effort has been the threedimensional parts of a building that have been salvaged for study or for research and display. Architectural artifacts can consist of various architectural features-fireplace mantels, windows, doors-which may be representative of materials, craftsmanship, technology, finishes, or collections and could include manufactured items such as hardware. In order to be useful, information that provides the object with context should be provided, such as what building it is from, what the object is, and where, if known, it was located on the building. Some collections might be limited to a specific site, place or region. Collections may be started as a result of repair or replacement of features or as a result of a building's demolition.\*

In order to narrow the focus of this compilation, the following have <u>not</u> been

included: collections outside the United States, intact historic structures, period rooms, commercial salvage companies, furniture or furnishings, tools, architectural drawings, photographs, trade catalogs, or blueprints. If a collection owner, whose primary focus was one of the above and who also had architectural objects or artifacts responded, then that information is included.

Some extremely modest collections have been included along with more extensive ones. To those who study these architectural elements and fragments, much of the value comes from seeing one object in relation to other similar objects-whether within the same collection or, within the mind's eye of the viewer. Given such a context, even a collection of one single item might provide some very important information to the knowledgeable preservation building technologist, architectural conservator, architectural historian, historical architect, preservationist, engineer, archeologist, student or educator.

Also, given the current state-of-the-art in the museum community, sizable backlogs of uncataloged and unaccessioned holdings are now being more effectively managed and preserved. Outside the museum, historic structures continue to be repaired and deteriorated elements removed for addition to collections. Thus, the collections cited are likely to grow or to become more usable because of accessioning and cataloging. A listing in this book indicates those areas that contain artifacts; additional resources are likely to be available. While

contact names and telephone numbers are likely to change, information has been provided as a useful starting point.

Listing does not imply that these artifacts are on display and open to the public. Listing means that if you would like to see the artifacts you will need to contact, in writing or by telephone, the person identified and arrange, by appointment, to see the artifacts they have collected. Those collections that have items on exhibit are noted. Bear in mind that exhibits change and because an object has once been exhibited does not mean it continues to be. (Mr. Peterson's article offers several examples of this.) It is beyond the purview of this survey to make any qualitative assessment of the collections listed or the detailed descriptions provided. Comments on the usefulness of this information or to provide information about collections you own or use are welcome.

# Learning From the Material Fragments of Historic Structures

In their **first lives**, structures that are now historic were envisioned, designed, crafted, assembled, and, most importantly, occupied over long periods of time. For a variety of reasons, including inherent design flaws and construction, changes due to owner whim or neglect, natural disasters, or the changing economic needs of a community, features crumble; an entire building may be razed.

At the end of the first life, a **second life** may begin based solely on remaining material fragments. Sometimes they are the only surviving pieces from a structure that had stood for several generations. Or, if the effects of time and weather have required the removal of a single feature, it can now

be preserved in a less harsh environment to tell what stories it can to those who study its history. Collectively, these features, materials and finishes have many stories to tell as they provide a tangible link with the people who designed, crafted, and used them over time.

Construction techniques and craft practices can vary due to regional practice, ethnic tradition, available materials and expertise. Architectural artifacts are tangible links with the building's craftsmen and owners—they reflect the expertise, lifestyle, financial standing, and explore the realm of what was possible for that time and set of circumstances. With comparison, with analysis, with **study**, architectural artifacts provide irrefutable evidence of what was used and how buildings were fashioned.

# What Is An Architectural Study Collection? Why Are Artifacts Collected?

Study collections can contain artifacts that vary in size from entire facades, large carved columns or cornices, to tiny chips of paint or pieces of the mortar found between bricks. Some artifacts are assemblages of materials-each reacting differently to humidity, heat, moisture and each otherthat are not easy to handle, move, care for or store. Collections were often initiated to gain immediate knowledge and preserving them in perpetuity or including them in a museum collection was not often considered. Because they have varied so much in size and shape, and because buildings and their components are often thought to be more durable than other types of artifacts, architectural study collections have not always received curation and conservation care according to museum standards. Many organizations that have architectural study collections are only now addressing the preservation challenges such collections afford.

Architectural study collection is more a statement of potential than a realized fact in most instances. Because these artifacts have been saved and are being protected, the potential exists for others to study and learn from them. Architectural study collections may provide a second life for the architectural artifacts and fragments but they also offer us a second chance to look at, touch and come to a better understanding of the role played by individual units that were once indistinguishable within a structure.

# The Importance of Architectural Study Collections

Architectural study collections help to fill the gap in our understanding of the craft practices of a region, the use of materials and finishes, how different building parts or units were assembled, and the hidden processes that exist beneath finishes or behind walls, These objects are threedimensional, actual, tangible, historic materials, and they represent the structure in a way that cannot be illustrated by photographs, photogrammetry, measured drawings, architects' plans, construction blueprints, oral history, and even personal recollection. Yet, because these artifacts have been removed from their original place in the historic structure, they are objects taken out of context, and can mislead or misrepresent the structure if the supporting two-dimensional documentation is not available or is not studied.

Current construction techniques and materials differ from historic construction techniques and materials. Many of the historic craft practices were learned during a lengthy apprenticeship—a combination of oral instruction and hands-on work—and little documentation about actual historic construction practices exists. Even with today's construction, the kind of records that are kept rarely include the shop drawings or models that translate the architect's sketches and blueprints into craft units. Lacking

written documentation or working knowledge, the preservationists must carefully examine the clues given by original artifacts and weigh these against other documentary information such as photographs, engravings, bills, insurance descriptions, letters, sketches, public documents, and other scholarly interpretations of this kind of material, in order to gain an accurate understanding of the composition and evolution of the structure.

The potential exists as never before for individuals with backgrounds in science and the humanities to combine efforts to establish and document how a building system performed, why it failed, how an element was crafted and units assembled, what tools were used, how materials were selected and why one was selected instead of another. The answers to these questions can save money, time, and effort in assuring the long-term preservation of a structure. Architectural study collections are a vital ingredient to this endeavor.\*\*

#### Notes:

\*It should be noted that the National Park Service guidelines never recommend removal of a feature that-although damaged or deteriorated-could reasonably be repaired and thus preserved in place. (Restated from "Introduction to the Guidelines," p. xi, The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation and Illustrated Guidelines for Rehabilitating Historic Buildings, 1992.)




