DESCRIPTION OF THE DIRECTORY

The Directory includes agencies and organizations, both public and non-profit, directly involved with the conservation of river resources. River conservation is the wise use and preservation of rivers and their related resources. It involves the protection of recreation access, water quality, in-stream flow, scenic beauty, stream beds, wetlands, adjacent lands, and associated flora and fauna.

The type of river conservation efforts in which the entries may be involved include advocacy work, trash clean-up, public education, promotion, corridor studies, management, planning, land protection, pollution control, and research.

The information for state agencies and organizations was obtained by the Association using an information request form to collect data which was, in turn, entered into a master database.

The National Park Service was responsible for collecting information on federal agencies, national organizations, and multi-state organizations. This information was acquired primarily from public documents and the National Wildlife Federation's Conservation Directory and was entered directly into the master database.

Despite our efforts to obtain complete and consistent information for each entry, some information may not have been available at the time or provided by the source. Variations in the consistency of information from entry to entry may be a result of the agency's or organization's structure. For example, contacts listed for state agencies may be at the department, division, or program level depending on the organization of a particular state government's body.
