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
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



Subject: Monthly Report for April 1954

Following is the report of activities for Yellowstone National Park during the month of April 1954:

Weather Conditions. The weather for April was variable as is usual for this time of the year. The temperatures ranged from a low of 17° on the 1st to a high of 61° on the 17th and 23rd. The average maximum temperature was 51° for the month and the average minimum was 27. The mean temperature was a cool 39°. The total precipitation was 1.92 inches. The above figures pertain to the headquarters area only. Snow depths for some of the courses at the end of the month are as follows: Norris 23.1", Lupine 24.8", Northeast Entrance 14.7", and Lewis River Divide 106".

Special Activities. Superintendent Rogers made trips to Bosesan April 7 and 13 for research work at the library on his legislative history of areas of the Lational Park System and to conferwith concessioner J. D. Haynes. On April 19 he and Administrative Assistant Joffe left for Billings to confer with Missouri Basin Inter-Agency Committee officials on matters affecting the convention to be held at Lake Hotel June 21-25 and attended the Seventeenth Annual Community Cooperative Dinner sponsored by the Billings Chamber of Commerce, returning the 20th. On April 27 Mr. Rogers made a trip to the Bozeman library.

Assistant Superintendent Hamilton and District Ranger Stevens departed April 7 for Cody, Wyoming, where Hr. Hamilton met with Bural Electrification Administration officials on proposed power line to East Entrance, and to the East Entrance Ranger Station on inspection and to deliver a radio, returning on the 9th.

On April 19 Mechanical Dupervisor Robinson, District Manger Ela, Park Ranger Murphy, Automotive Mechanic Herne, Truck Driver Jump, and Storekeeper Schultz left for Ephrata, Mashington, to obtain six house trailers from the Bureau of Reclamation for use here for seasonal employees. Assistant Superintendent Hamilton accompanied them on arrual leave. They returned the 24th.

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Assistant Chief Ranger Chapman and Smoke-Jumper Squad Leader Milligan attended the annual meeting of the Cooperative Firefighting Agencies at Missoula, Montana, April 22 to discuss and agree on firefighting wage rates.

James E. Epperson, seasonal Operator (General), was the recipient of a \$75 cash award granted by the Region Two Incentive Awards Committee for his suggestion to construct a grader ditch cleaning wing for use on park roads. The presentation was made by Superintendent Rogers at the staff meeting in the Superintendent's Office April 14.

Secretary of the Interior McKay announced that T. Raymond Goodwin, Superintendent of Death Valley National Monument, retired at the end of March. Mr. Goodwin was assigned to Yellowstone a number of years ago on road oiling. He was one of the discoverers and developers of the oil mix system of road paving.

Bids were opened April 26 for electrical generators, invitation for which was issued by the Regional Office April 5, and the three bids received were forwarded to the Regional Office for final approval. No award had been made by the end of the month.

Inspections. Hilton T. Hendrix, Supervising Investigator in Charge, Tenth Civil Service Region, Denwer, Dolorado, in April 12 to confer with Supervisory Park Ranger Harry V. Reynolds, Personnel Assistant William G. Proper and District Ranger Ruben O. Hart in connection with investigating procedures for federal employees. He left the 14th.

Robert B. Moore, Chief, Administrative Branch, Forestry Division, Washington Office; Frank W. Childs, Regional Forester, Region Two; Paul A. Judge, Chief Ranger, Eliot Davis, District Ranger, and Douglas McLaren, Park Ranger, Grand Teton National Park; Harvey B. Reynolds, Chief Ranger, Theodore Roosevelt National Memorial Park; Elmer N. Fladmark, Chief Ranger, A. Lynn Coffin, Assistant Chief Ranger, and Stanley H. Spurgeon, Assistant Fire Chief Dispatcher, Glacier National Park, arrived April 26 for Sectional Fire Control Training Conference, the latter four departing April 30 and the rest the following day.

Fred Quist, former Yellowstone employee who has been located in Yosemite for the past 15 years, visited in the park near the end of the month.

William Dunn, Superintendent, Yellowstone Park Fish Cultural Station, arrived April 29 to begin Fish and Wildlife Service operations at Yellowstone Lake for the season.



Frederick H. Rutherford, Manager, and Lawrence Rasmussen, Interviewer, Montana State Employment Service, Livingston, in April 20 to confer on employment.

Rublicity. A press release was issued to the park's mailing list April 16 on the 1954 opening dates for the various roads and accommodations.

On April 20 the first shipment of 1954 Yellowstone bro dsides arrived and most of the 400,000 which were shipped had been received by the end of April. A total of 373,500 Yellowstone bro dsides were on hand at the end of the month.

Information was mailed april 28 for a feature story for International News arrive to their Denver rangementative.

Plans, Maps and Turveys. In new projected lighment for the Fishing Bridge campground road was completed and grades worked out for the road widening project at west Intrance.

All of the time of the Resident Landscape Architect during the month was spent in the office, largely on plan proparation.


A Master Plan sheet for the Fishing Bridge campground area was prepared, reviewed in the park and forwarded to the degion 1 Office.

A plan for the revision of trail terminus, Inspiration Point is under preparation and proposes a concrete flight of stairs and ramps with metal hand rails and quand rails.

Architectural plans for the comfort station and actor pump house at Canyon have been reviewed and recommendations are being prepared.

Some work is underway to start on the remodeling of one CCC building at Old Faithful into three small apartments.

Mainte ance. Snowplowing ws started toward Norris pril 5 the plows arriving there the 12th and plows started toward Canyon and Old Faithful on the 15th, arriving at those points on the 20th. Thous reached Lake on the 26th and by the end of the month were within three miles of West Thumb and about twelve miles out on the last Entrince road. Around the first of the month snow reports indicated about normal depths but warm weather and high wind were fast reducing this depth. Plowing has been generally good with some trouble caused by the "lease!" tracks made during the winter. At the end of the month plowing has about two days behind last year's schedule. The rolds to Old Frithful and lest Entrance were to be opened for traffic May 1.



Maintenance crews are located at Nam oth and Mallatin. They are busy patching and taking down snow fence and snow stakes. The Gallatin section of road is breaking up on some sections. bout 600 yards of gravel were placed on the Mammoth Notel cottage area roads in preparation for placing a bituminous mat. About 20 miles of road center-line stripe were placed and an additional live siles spotted for striping. Three new dump tracks were received during the last week of April.

Construction. All construction projects are closed down for the winter except the following: Account 231.01, Replace the Heating Plant at the Nammoth Hospital, Building No. 16, which project is 99% complete; Account 231.03, tehabilitation of CCC Buildings, Old Faithful, material being ordered and work will start in a cly May; Account 332.17, ater Line Extension, est Thumb Gabin and, material ordered; and account 232.02, Rehabilitate Gener tors, Janyon, material on order and some carpenter work under way and the electricians lining up generators and panels. A few additional concrete signs were constructed by the maintenance crew.

Concessioners. Dr. John . Pearson of the Yello stone
Park Medical Service was in the park April 9 from Livingston to confer
with Superintendent Rogers and Resident Physician Silman on park
medical matters.

Jack E. Haynes, President, Maynes Inc., photographic concessioner, moved to Maymoth April 15 for the summer from his winter headquarters at Bozeman.

On April 16 the first supply was received of the Yello stone Park Company's A and B Folders containing the rat s for bus tours and motorist accommodations for the 1954 season. On the 28th the first supply of the 1954 Accommodations and Dervices leaflet were received. This latter publication was printed in St. Paul, Minnesota, this year, having been printed in the Yellowstone Park Company's print shop in the park in previous years.

Huntley Child, Jr., Vice President, Yellowstone Park Company, was elected President of the Montana Hotel association at its convention held in Billings April 23-24. He served during the past year as Vice President of the Association.

On April 27 Trev Povah, Vice President, Gar Helppie, Manager, and other Hamilton Stores, Inc. employees arrived to open their general store and service station at Old Faithful by May 1 when motorists will be admitted to the west side of the park. They will provide lodgings and meals of an informal character until other facilities are open at that location.



On April 30 permission was manted imilton stores, Inc. to discontinue operations of its pener I store and different in the Mammoth campground beginning this summer, the building to be used as a general storehouse for the storing, marking and redistribution of merchandise to their various stores in the park.

The Yellowstone rark Company prepared during the winter a number of one-inch scale models of quest cabins and these were viewed by National Park service personnel in april. The purpose of the study was to evolve some economical method of prefabrication.

Religious Services and Chapel Use. The regular Junday School services were held in the Yellowstone National Park Chapel at 10:30 each Sunday morning during the month. The Youth Tellowship organization met in the Chapel at 6:00 p.m. on the 25th.

A well-attended aster candle light service are held in the Yellowstone National Park Chapel at 6:00 a.c. laster funday, and 18. Reverend G. M. alker preached the sermon. Tusic has supplied by the Mammoth Youth Choir and the combined Cardinar-Yam oth dult Choir. Although the weather was stormy there was an exceptionally large congregation in attendance.

Interpretive Services. Park Saturalist atson presented a program to the Gardiner High chool science class on the geological history of Yellowstone National Park. There were fifteen students in attendance and two teachers. On the 30th Park Naturalist toon presented a similar talk to the Scouts and parents in condiner with 24 pursons present.

A special talk was given by Mr. Condon to a group of nine wildlife students and instructors from Italio tate College at rec tello, Idaho. Dr. Van Pulling was in charge of this group.

Ranger Naturalist and prospective employee for the 1954 season, submitted an outline for a proposed study on nature trail suicing which he plans to make as part of the qualifications for his matters degree. This study outline was reviewed by members of the Enturalist at first a letter outlining our suggestions on its improvement was sent to br. Gebler.

Park Naturalist Elmore devoted a lot of time to historical research for the prepartion of museum exhibits and Park Naturalist watson spent a good deal of time on library research with respect to the Norris Ceyser Busin reviewing published information on the letivities as recorded for that thermal area. He also spent considerable time



working on final details of a map of this area and stippled in the forested area which tongued out into the may ser be sin.

The osprey were reported back at the and is Best tock in Cardiner Canyon on April 4 and during the month were busily engaged repairing the nest and setting about with their nesting.

The possibilities of setting up a research program on the hydrothermal phenomena of the geyser basin along the Firehole diver is being explored and it is hoped that a program can be justified thich will be supported by private found tion funds. The Yellowstone Library and Museum Association is interested in acting a sponsor of such a research project and Mr. George D. Marler was in on april 30 to discuss the possibility of his participating with this research work.

On the 13th and again on the 25th trips were made over range lands north of the Park which are Forest pervice lands and privitely owned livestock range by Chief Park Maturalist Condon for his parsonal enlightenment. These run elands provided a marked contrast to the north Yellowstone runge within the National Park boundary. Forage and general vegetation cover was exceptionally good on the lorest lervice range lands and good on the privitely stocked ranges in contrast to the virtually barren condition of the countryside from beese Greek to Narmoth around the slopes of Sepulcher Mountain and around the slopes of Jount Everts. Any one interested in receiving a shock with respect to vegetation need only walk over some of this countryside.

On the 26th, Park Naturalists ilmore and Condon visited the Mud Volcano area for the purpose of determining what changes had occurred in this thermal ar a and especially to nake observations of the SL ck Dragons Caldron. It was found that the Black Brasons Caldron is violently active along fissure bearing 32° east of south and having a total active length of 109 feet. The temperature of this sections mass of and was 191° F. A smaller fissure was active on the north side of the crater. This fissure had a bearing of 42° east of north. Its temperature was only 162° F. The original crater of activity as it as discovered in the spring of 1948 had a width of 45 feet, a length of 6° feet, and a depth of 7 feet 11 inches and followed the long axis on the fissure bearing 42° east of north. The present length of the crater along this bearing is now 142 feet. The extent of the crater along the fissure alignment bearing 32° east of south is also 142 feet. The width of this crater at its widest point is 77 feet and its depth from rim to boiling and surface is 18 feet 5 inches.



A series of temper tures were r corded for other thermal features in that general a and these temperatures re as follows: Dragons Mouth, 192° F.; Mud Volcano, 200° J.; and loyser, 136° F.; Sulphur Caldron, 14° F.; Large and cone below alphur Caldron, 146° F.; Large turbulent pool near Black rapons hadron, 142° I.; Large and pit up ravine behind the lad Volcano, 194° F.


The March-April issue of Yellowstone Lature Loves and prepared, multilithed, and mailed by the Joth. There were 307 copies placed in the mails.





Elk Management: Diologist Joe Jaab of the Norten fish and Game Department dropped, by Mir, 1,200 bounds of salt in the Suffalo-Hellroaring area on April 26. The arounds and locations are essentially the same as has been the practice for some years.

Bighorn: Joe ay reported 15 bighorn seen on abighor and two on Mt. Norris. These are over and bove those seen previously during the winter. The ctual count of bighorn seen this winter is 110 animals.

rishing Regulations. The 1954 I shing comulations were approved by Accretary Ackay april 15 and the Tederal degister of spril 22 containing these regulations was received april 26. The fishing regulations were mimeographed and issued the following day, 6,000 copies having been prepared. Only a new minor changes were ande.

Range. According to observations of biologist kittles all of the Lower and most of the Intermediate and is now free of snow. Since mid-pril, considerable old forme has been vailable to grazing animals on the Intermediate Range. On the entire Yelloustone runge, there was negligible growth of grass curing the first half of april. Less than normal growth in late pril was see to low temperature on most of the range. Near Stevens Greek the shaence of new or sted wheat grass in the bottoms and presence of new grass on soist north



slopes suggests a shortage of moisture. It higher elevations, greatest growth is on south slopes which warm early. An interesting comparison of crested whe ton heavily grazed and relatively ungrazed range was observed near atevens Greek. Tithin the nursery fence, new leaves are about four inches long; outside, most created wheat has not put out now leaves yet. Of 25 bison seen in the firehole area on April 24, several were in poor flesh. Forage had been cleaned from nearly all sectors which were free of show. Nost elk in the Yellowstone drainage are in fair flesh. At low elevations elk are feeding on north slopes and higher up they are on critical range, apparently seeking green grass.

Forest Fire Protection. Revisions of the Yellowstone Park Fire Fighting Plan and Guide for the coming season were partially completed.


Building Fire Protection. As a follow-up from the fire extinguisher inspection reports for the Manmoth Village area, the maintenance of extinguishers was st rted the 1 st week of April. Twenty seven Foam, 5 soda acid and 6 Protexite extinguishers were cleaned and recharged. CCl₄ extinguishers were recharged with air, improper type extinguishers and unsatisfactory extinguishers were replaced.

Blister Aust Control. Additional personnel were selected for the blister rust crew to replace selections who declined or failed to return questionnaires within the specified time. A purchase order was issued to the Director's office for the purchase of a new 4-wheel drive pickup truck.

Ranch and Corral Operations. Morses and mules were fed may during the entire menth. Daily consumption of hay was reduced from 41 bales per day to 24 bales by the end of the month as snow had melted sufficiently for limited grazing. Young horses and those needing additional training and gentling received this attention.

A small amount of work was done on the portion of meadow to be resected. The soil is still too wet for proper tillage. Deed was purchased for reseeding this portion of the meadow.

Trails. More man power was available for work in the trail sign shop during the month and by the end thereof 260 signs had been completed and approximately 100 more were in various st ges of manufacture.



All nine men offered positions on the trail crew maye accepted and the first ones will report June 1. Due to the 1 teness of the season and the amount of snow it is not expected much trail work can be accomplished prior to that time.
