## **Glen Echo Park**

Glen Echo began in 1891 as a National Chautauqua Assembly, a center "To promote liberal and practical education, especially among the masses of the people; to teach the sciences, arts, languages, and literature; to prepare its patrons for their several pursuits and professions in life; and to fit them for the duties which devolve upon them as members of society." By 1900 Glen Echo had become an Amusement Park which served the Washington area until 1968. Since 1971, Glen Echo has again been developing the concept of arts and cultural education for everyone under National Park Service direction and with a high level of public and community involvement. It serves both the surrounding communities and visitors from across the country. Its four sessions of classes are taught year-round by wellknown artists and professionals, some of whom are members of the residency programs in the park. There are concerts, demonstrations, workshops and festivals on Sundays during the warm months as a part of the Chautauqua Summer Season, one of the largest cultural programs in the Washington, D.C. area. In addition, the antique hand-carved and hand-painted Dentzel carousel, saved by community effort, operates on summer weekends, and the Gallery offers changing monthly exhibitions of Glen Echo's artists.

Glen Echo Park has a brand new playground thanks to the Town of Glen Echo, Maryland. The old playground, built by the Youth Conservaton Corps in 1977, was demolished along with the Crystal Pool in the spring of 1982 when both were found to have safety and structural problems. Unfortunately no federal funds were available to rebuild the playground. Many of our visitors, especially young ones, missed the play area. During this time the Town of Glen Echo felt the need for a playground within the Town limits. Councilwoman Nancy Long suggested satisfying two needs by rebuilding the playground at Glen Echo Park. To fund this project, which would be used by a broad segment of the public, a fundraising campaign was started in May, 1983, to raise the necessary money to purchase and install new playground equipment. Donations were accepted from many of the park visitors, and many interested organizations and foundations—too many to name individually here—but all of whom helped tremendously in the effort. Work on the new playground was begun in late March of this year and all haste was made to have the play area ready for the opening of the summer season in May

We, the National Park Service, would like to extend our thanks to the many people who helped to make the playground a reality. A special thanks goes to the Town of Glen Echo for spear-heading the fundraising effort. Without their and your support, we would not have a playground here today. We hope that you and your family will enjoy using this playground and hope that you come again and again to participate in activities at Glen Echo Park.

## Procedure For Registration

Pre-registration is urged for all classes to insure yourself a place. To pre-register, mail or handdeliver to the registrar (1) a registration form and (2) a tuition check *made payable to the instructor* (with the exception of Glen Echo Pottery, Glen Echo Dance Theater, and the classes held at Adventure Theatre, see respective department listings). Tuition fees include a \$6 registration fee paid to the National Park Service. Supplies fees can be paid at the first class unless otherwise stated.

You will *not* be notified of acceptance into a class. If you register for a class which has been filled or cancelled, you will be notified and your money will be returned. You may register at the first class meeting only if the class has not met its maximum.


