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

Subject: Monthly Narrative Report of Ranger Activities, January 1960

General

Weather Conditions: January started with warm days and some light showers which contributed to the emergence of mosquitoes in the Flamingo area, but a "Norther" on the 23 brought winter weather with a killing frost "that was heavy enough to track a rabbit".

Rainfall was extremely low and the water table was falling rapidly by the end of the month. The staff gauge at Taylor Slough read 2.40" as compared with 3.35" for December and 1.90" for January 1959.

Following is a weather summary for the Park:

Increase or Decrease in Travel: A large increase in visitation was recorded this month. Visitors totaled 69,002 as compared with 57,088 last year which represents an increase of 20.8%. Of this total 11,031 entered by boat representing an increase in boating activity of 314% over last years total of 3513 visitors by boat.

All 50 states were represented as well as the countries of Norway, Honduras, Argentina, Egypt, Chile, Poland, Spain, Holland, Belgium, Thailand, Columbia, France, Brazil, Germany, Finland, Cuba, Switzerland, Austria, Peru, Luxenburg, Japan, Italy and the Canadian Provinces of Alberta, British Columbia, Manitoba, New Brunswick, Ontario and Quebec.

Camper use continues to increase at a phenomenal rate. Flamingo Campground use was up 244% over January last year and the Long Pine Key Campground was filled on 16 nights and overflowed on 12 other nights. The 30 day camping limit was ^{invoked} ~~involved~~ and several "old timers" were requested to leave after staying for 30 days.

Special Activities: A Water Resources Conference was held
at Flamingo by personnel of the National Park Service, U. S. Geological
Survey, Bureau of Sport Fisheries, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service,
Florida Fresh Water Fish and Game Commission and the Florida State
Board of Conservation.

Subdistrict Ranger Winte attended a meeting of the Upper
Keys Conservation Council.

District Ranger Stokes was interviewed on a 15 minute radio show over the Naples radio station by Mrs. Doris Reynolds. Everglades National Park and the boat tours were the subjects discussed.

Gulf Coast Rangers manned a booth, provided by the Collier Corp., at the Collier County Fair for 4 days and nights giving information to visitors.

Miscellaneous: District Maintenance Foreman Jack Lewis moved his office from the Flamingo Visitor Center to the new warehouse and equipment building at the Utility Area, Flamingo.

Farming activities in the "Hole-in-the-Donut" area continues at a feverish pace with the accompanying increase in traffic of tractors, sprayers, trucks, irrigators, labor busses and laborers' private cars causing special traffic problems at the Entrance Station and along the road. The labor camp operating in the area is filled to capacity and traffic to the camp by camp residents, salesmen, preachers and friends is quite sizeable.

This traffic problem will probably increase in the future if the area goes "frost-free" this season and more land is cleared for farming.

A pay telephone has been installed at the Tamiami Ranger Station and is getting heavy use by passing U. S. 41 traffic. The telephone number is Frog City #10 through the Miami Operator.

Administration

Personnel: Rotating Ranger Wilmer Walker accepted a permanent GS-7 position at Shiloh National Military Park. He departs *Jul. 18* for *E.O.P.* duty at Shiloh February 21.

Safety and Health: Two boating accidents occurred and were investigated. Both boats had capsized and considerable property damage ~~re~~ resulted, but there were no injuries to persons.

Four searches were made for overdue boats with two being rescued and two returning unassisted.

Two automobile accidents occurred during the month. One resulted in \$100.00 damage when a car backed into another. The second accident involving Government car I-59644 and a farm worker's vehicle caused major damage to the vehicles and slight injuries to the occupants. Investigation is continuing.

A hole was made in the bottom of one of the Park's airboats while rangers were attempting to apprehend violators. The damage was easily repaired and neither of the two men riding in the boat were injured.

The quarterly inspection of emergency and first aid equipment was made in the Glades and Mangrove Districts during the month.

Five cases of personal injury were investigated and reported.

Hazards to navigation, in the form of trees down in Tarpon and Buttonwood Creeks, were removed.

Tamiami personnel assisted the Florida State Highway Patrol with two accidents involving several seriously injured persons.

The Park Safety Committee inspected the Tamiami Ranger Station, the Seven Mile Tower area and the Gulf Coast District Office and dock for safety hazards.

Building Fire Protection: Everglades Park Company employees at Flamingo were instructed in the use and application of fire extinguishers.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State or Local Agencies:

Assistance was rendered the University of Miami Marine Laboratory in an attempt to recover a lost "current and drift" buoy containing instruments valued at several thousand dollars. It was not located.

Mr. Stanley Leach, U. S. G. S. Ground Water Survey representative, installed new equipment at P-35 and P-38 water gauges. Park Service boats and airboats were used for his transportation.

Assistance was given to the U. S. Navy and the U. S. Coast Guard in an attempt to locate plane wreckage off the mouth of Harney River.

Florida State Wildlife Officers were assisted by Rangers in several law enforcement cases.

Research by the University of Miami, Shark River Valley project, continues.

U. S. D. A. "Cotton Pickers" moved into the Flamingo area, set up camp and began another season's project of eradicating wild cotton.

Cooperating Non-Government Agencies: Messers. Robert Allen and Alexander Sprunt, Jr., National Audubon Society assisted Park personnel with counts of nesting spoonbills and Great White and Great Blue Heron populations.

Sixty-five observers in nineteen parties participated in the annual Coot Bay Christmas Bird Count and observed 146 species totaling about 67,604 individual birds.

Mr. Fred Truslow, National Geographic Society Photographer, has

been photographing Bald Eagle nesting activities.

Public Relations: Public relations in the Gulf Coast District are progressing satisfactorily. A case of an Everglades citizen being arrested for a fishing violation received no unfavorable comments from the local people.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Fourteen violators were taken before the U. S. Commissioner during the month. A summary is as follows:

Two cases for possession of firearms. One was found guilty and received a \$250.00 fine and two months jail sentence, both were suspended.

Three cases for speeding, two were fined \$10.00 each, the other was fined \$25.00 or 5 days, suspended.

One case of disorderly conduct, found guilty. No fine imposed.

Five violations for disturbing wildlife and using fireworks.

The U. S. Commission still has this case under advisement.

Three violations of fishing regulations involving an Everglades, Florida Fishing Guide and two visitors. The visitors were fined \$10.00 each and the Guide was fined \$15.00 and given a 60 day suspended jail sentence.

Seven written warnings were issued for other violations.

Two cases of firearms violation were scheduled for hearing during February.

Illegal crawfish traps were found in the Florida Bay area and removed from the Park. The owners could not be located.

Several cases of vandalism; illegal use of Audubon Society boat; breaking and entering of Government buildings; squabbles in campgrounds; drunken persons at motel; building fires without permits; dog-visitor hassels; reported shop-lifting activities; bird shooting and illegal use and entry to closed areas were investigated by ranger personnel during the month.

Overcrowded conditions in the Long Pine Key and Flamingo Campgrounds have required a considerable amount of ranger time to keep abreast of the situation.

The marking of "Tin Can Channel" between Joe Kemp and Buoy Keys was completed this month.

The ^(Yards)~~streets~~ in Long Pine Key Campground were lettered and a bulletin board was installed near the water tank truck.

Ranger personnel and the Park Engineer placed boundary covers around approximately three quarters of the boundary in Chokoloskee Bay.

A summary of charter boat information is being prepared by Gulf Coast District personnel.

Aircraft activities: Twenty-four flights were made during the month totaling seventy-seven hours and covering 7,700 miles. Seventeen passengers were carried. A summary of activities is as follows;

Seven violations were discovered and reported; wildlife and bird counts were made; two flights were made for photography; two flights were made for search purposes; four flights were for administrative purposes; one flight was aborted minutes after takeoff due to an oil seal failure which caused a complete loss of oil. No damage was done to the aircraft.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities:

A fourth aerial census of Great White and Great Blue Herons and Bald Eagles was started the last week of January and will be completed during February.

Maintenance: The Bahama boat was returned to services after approximately one year of lying idle while undergoing installation of an inboard engine and other repairs. Compasses were installed in the Bahama and Prowler boats.

Considerable "washing" of the concrete columns on Flamingo bridge has occurred.

Removal of the old porch and reconstruction of the porch steps was accomplished at the Lostman's River Patrol Station.

Concessioner: A new sightseeing boat schedule, offering more and varied trips to visitors, has been inaugurated at Flamingo but mechanical breakdowns and inclement weather has prevented a true test of merit. All sightseeing vessels are now back on the line with the approval of the U. S. Coast Guard.

Guided canoe trips for birdwatchers were introduced this month by Everglades Park Company and have been well received by participating visitors.

Fingerprinting, cataloguing and ~~contracting~~ of Everglades Park Company employees is now up to date.

The U. S. Coast Guard ordered one of Sammy Hamilton's boats to be taken out of service because of defective ^{pontoon} ~~portions~~. A new boat and motor has been ordered to replace it.


Sightseeing boat travel in the Gulf Coast District from December was down 35% due to cold windy weather. A total of 905 visitors were carried on the two concessioner operated tours.

Complaints: One verbal complaint was made regarding service in the coffee shop at Flamingo.

Forest Fire Protection:

The small amount of rain, the rapidly falling water table and the frost kill greatly increased the fire danger this month. Fire permits were cancelled and no new ones were issued for several days. Fire equipment was moved to the Tamiami District on January 8.

Fire Control Aids are assisting on two days a week in preparing Blocks H and J of Long Pine Key controlled burning project. It is expected that sample plots will be established in both Blocks H and J by February 15 with control burning of the two blocks scheduled for the last two weeks of February depending on favorable weather conditions.

General

Weather Conditions

Winter weather reached south Florida during January with a low of 30 degrees recorded at Royal Palm on the night of the 21st. The killing frost came on the night of the 23rd with a temperature of 30 degrees.

Rainfall was extremely low and the water table was falling rapidly by the end of the month. The gauge at Taylor Slough read 2.40 compared with 3.35 for last month. January, 1959 reading was 1.90.

Increase or Decrease in Travel

A total of 56,755 persons visited the District in 15,881 vehicles during January. This compares to 53,215 visitors last year and is an increase of 6.65%.

All 50 states were represented as well as 22 foreign countries and six Canadian provinces.

A phenomenal change took place in the camping at the Long Pine Key Campground. The ground was filled on 16 nights and overflowed on 12 nights. The 30 day camping limit was invoked and several "old-timers" were requested to leave. Subdistrict Ranger Larson has been assigned the special duty of Campground Supervisor.

The District Ranger attended a meeting of the Park Safety Committee. The Seven Mile Tower and Tamiami Ranger Station were inspected for safety hazards.

Miscellaneous

Farming in the hole in the donut continued at a feverish pace.

The frost, heavy enough to track a rabbit, on January 24th which took its toll of south Florida crops had little effect in the area. Some tomatoes were burned slightly, cucumbers and squash were affected but on a whole, the area escaped severe damage.

Traffic to and from the hole in the donut is increasing. Tractors, sprayers, irrigators, trucks, laborer busses, and private cars are creating special problems both at the Entrance Station and along the road. The labor camp operating in the area is filled to capacity. The traffic to the camp residents, salesmen, preachers, and friends is quite sizeable.

The slow moving trucks and farm tractors as well as daily breakdown of equipment and cars is creating greater traffic as time goes on. This traffic problem will undoubtedly increase in the future as more and more land in the area is cleared. If the area goes "frost-free" this season with other truck farms wiped out, a rapid change will take place by next winter.

A pay telephone is now installed and in operation at the Tamiami Ranger Station. It seems to be getting heavy use from passers by. Incidentally, that telephone number is Frog City #10 through Miami operator.

Personnel

Roving Ranger Wilmer Walker accepted a permanent GS-7 position at Shiloh National Military Park. He reports for duty there on February 21st.

Ranger Howard Copas took 40 hours annual leave in January.

Fire Control Francis X. Guardipee, Jr. took 36 hours sick leave during the month.

Safety and Health

One slight motor vehicle accident occurred in the District ~~in~~ when one car backed into another in the Mahogany Hammock parking lot. Damage was less than \$100.00.

A hole was knocked in the bottom of one of the Park's airboats during the month. The damage was easily repaired and neither of the two men riding in the boat was injured.

Late in the afternoon of the 31st, an accident occurred on the Taylor Slough bridge involving a car driven by an Iori farm worker and a Government vehicle. A complete investigation is being carried on.



Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies

The University of Miami research team made three trips to the Shark River Valley, traveling 60 miles.

Mr. Stan Leach, USGS Ground Water Survey representative, took P-35 and P-38 from the associated stations. P-38 was rebuilt and replaced with the aid of Park Service boats and airboats. A well is being drilled at P-35 to facilitate ground water measuring.

Two accidents involving several seriously injured persons were handles by Tamiami personnel prior to arrival of the Florida State Highway Patrol.

The Florida State Wildlife Officers were aided by ~~the~~ Subdistrict Ranger Whitmoyer in several cases.



Increase or Decrease in Travel: Camper use continues to increase many fold. The 4131 camper days is some two and a half times as great as the 1692 recorded for January last year. Total boating use is up 25 % over last year.

Administration

Safety and Health: Two boating accidents occurred and were investigated. They were reported on new State boating accident form. Both boats capsized and considerable property damage resulted, but there were no injuries. Two fruitless searches were made for overdue boats that later "came in" unassisted. Two other boats were rescued.

Hazards to navigation in the form of trees down in Tarpon Creek and Buttonwood Creek were removed.

Quarterly inspection of emergency and first aid equipment was made.

Five cases of personal injury were investigated and reported.

Boat speed limit sign "3MPH" was remounted between basins one and two at Flamingo.

Building Fire Protection: Everglades Park Company employees at the Marina were instructed in use and application of fire extinguishers. Two 40 gallon foam extinguishers at boat basins were recharged.

n Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State or Local Agencies: Assistance was rendered the University of Miami Marine Lab in an attempt to recover a lost current and drift buoy containing valuable equipment off the mouth of Shark River. It was not located.

Two trips were made to water guaging station P-35 with Mr. Stanley Leach, Central and Southern Flood Control District, to install new equipment.

Coast Guard and Navy personnel participated in search for plane wreckage off mouth of Harney River. The wreckage, previously visible above water surface apparently sank below surface out of view.

Maintenance: After several test runs and adjustments to bottom and running gear were made on the Bahama boat it was declared fit for service and transferred to the Gulf Coast District. Compasses were mounted on the Bahama and Prowler

Major maintenance projects completed were painting standpipe, painting campground restrooms, installing shelves and equipment in the new shop buildings and repair of radio base station, KIE 786.

It was noticed considerable washing of concrete columns on Flamingo bidge has occurred.

Concessioner: A new sightseeing schedule has been inaugurated on a trial basis by the Company and offers more and varied types of trips for the Park visitor. A true test of merit of the schedule has not been possible however because of mechanical breakdown and inclement weather. All sightseeing vessels are back on the line now with approval of the US Coast Guard.

Guided canoe trips for bird watchers is a new innovation offered by the Company and has been well received by participating visitors.

Current list of Company employees has been compiled, several employees have been fingerprinted and contracts have been obtained. All are up to date now, for a change.

A new contract was negotiated between the Everglades Park Company and City Linen after much hassel.

Mr. Hedley of Moore Houseboat Corporation spent a few days at Flamingo discussing with Mr. Knight the future of the Moore houseboats at Flamingo. Apparently no definite decision was made.

Complaints: One verbal complaint was made regarding service in the coffee shop.

USDA "Cotton Pickers" moved in, set up camp and began work on another season's ~~work~~ project eradicating wild cotton.

Robert Allen and Sandy Sprunt, National Audubon Society, helped Sub-District Ranger Winte with nesting spoonbill count. Approximately 110 nesting pairs were counted.

Mr. Fred Truslow, National Geographic Society Photographer, has been doing work on the bald eagle.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Notice of violation warnings were issued to two commercial fishermen conducting questionable netting operations on Gulf Coast near Big Sable Creek. Four illegal crawfish traps were found and removed from the Park, but owner of the traps could not be located. Prompt removal of abandoned boat resulted after owner received registered letter advising him he would be prosecuted if the boat remained in the Park

Reported shooting off Christian Point was investigated but was not confirmed.

The Audubon Society reported illegal use of their boats at West Lake but have been reluctant to sign complaint against offenders.

Vandals, again at work, broke into the old Coot Bay Ranger Station, helped themselves to University of Miami food, a few tools, and left leaving three broken locks. Program control push button in museum was also damaged by vandals.

Overcrowded conditions in the Flamingo Campground have required that a considerable amount of time be spent by rangers to keep somewhere near abreast of the situation.

One notice of violation warning was issued for speeding.

Marking of Tin Can Channel is now complete.

Other incidents requiring ranger attention included a couple of squabbles in the campground, drunks at motel, building fire without permit, reported shop lifting, dog-visitor hassel and illegal entry on closed road.

Subject: Narrative Report, Ranger Activities, February 1960

General

Weather Conditions: February weather varied from cool windy days to warm summerlike days. Small craft warnings were displayed for six days at Flamingo and Key Largo. Cypress trees started the spring "green-up" toward the end of the month and glades water levels continued to drop even though rainfall was greater than last month. The staff gauge at Taylor Slough read 2.12 feet as compared with 2.40 feet last month and 1.60 feet for February 1959.

Increase or Decrease in Travel: Total Park travel for February was

71,298 visitors which is an increase of 11.8% over February 1959.

Visitors entering by boat totaled 10,795. Total Park travel through February was 140,300 which represents an increase of 17% over last year.

Special Activities: Supt. Hamilton conferred with other members of a

National Park Ministry Committee at Flamingo to formulate a course of action in continuing the ministry in Everglades National Park.

Miscellaneous: A "Going away" party was held for Assistant Chief Ranger Clifford Senne and Fire Control Aid Larry Dale at the Pine Island Chickee. Farming activity in the "Hole-in-the-donut" was reaching its peak by the end of the month with the start of tomato harvest in the higher fields and continued planting of the lower areas. Production is expected to continue through May. Farm traffic totaled 3,496 vehicles.

Subdistrict Rangers Larson and Shaw were appointed official census takers for the Park area of Dade and Monroe Counties.

Mrs. Erwin Winte spent a week in Boston attending funeral services of her sister, Florence Holt, and to see her mother who is ill.

Subdistrict Ranger Whitmoyer took pictures of all staff members of grade GS-9 and above for use by the Regional Office.

Administration

Personnel: Roving Ranger Wilmer Walker left Everglades on February 18 to accept a permanent position at Shiloh National Military Park.

Fire Control Aid Robert A. Hawthorne was reassigned to the Royal Palm Subdistrict as a Seasonal Park Ranger, February 21.

Roger T. Pfiefer reported for duty as Seasonal Fire Control Aid on February 23.

Assistant Chief Ranger Clifford W. Senne was transferred to the position of Park Forester at Great Smoky Mountains National Park, February 29.

Safety and Health: Assistance was given to the U. S. Coast Guard investigation of the possibility that a plane overdue on a flight from Havana, Cuba to Miami, Florida was down in the Park. The plane was not found.

Ranger James R. Whitehouse suffered a knee injury when a cramp caused the tendons of his left knee to be torn loose. He spent two days on sick leave and is still slightly incapacitated.



Two boat rescues were made. Another boat reported to be sinking after hitting an underwater object was able to return to Flamingo unassisted after investigation determined it to be in operating condition.

The Coot Bay dump was burned over.

Building Fire Protection: A building Fire Control Plan for the Flamingo Development was submitted to the Chief Ranger's Office.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Ranger personnel conducted a group of nine officers of the Florida State Board of Conservation, Salt Water Division, on a training and exploratory trip to Shark River. Annual maintenance of aids to navigation in Whitewater Bay was completed by U. S. Coast Guard.

Coast Guard Marine Inspectors spent two days at Flamingo inspecting concessioner sightseeing boats.

Park Collaborator Frank Craighead and U. S. D. A. Supervisor "Lucky" Weaver cooperated with rangers to locate suitable mahogany trees from which to collect fruit for the Tropical Forest Research Center, U. S. Forest Service, Rio, Pedras, Puerto Rico.† Mr. J. Johnson, Public Relations Officer and Mr. Jameson, Photographer, Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, visited the Park in connection with a film on conservation.

Representatives of the Aviation Section, Florida Development Commission, were in the Park investigating the possibility of painting air markers on roof tops and roadways.

Collier County Deputy Sheriff Eric Weldon accompanied rangers on two boat patrols to investigate reported stills in that area.

Research by the University of Miami research team, Shark River Valley project, continues.

The F. B. I. and the U. S. Border Patrol were called in to investigate a bomb that was found near Sisal Hammock believed earmarked for a Cuban counter-revolution. Homestead Air Force Base Bomb Disposal Squad disarmed the bomb.

Interpretive Activities and Developments

Public Relations: District Ranger Stokes presented a talk to 30 members of the Everglades P. T. A. on "the Seasons of Great Smoky Mountains National Park".

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Eight persons were brought before the United States Commissioner during the month. A summary is as follows: One case of landing an aircraft in the Park, fined \$50.00. Two persons convicted of using spear guns and possession of firearms were fined \$30.00 each. One bow and eight arrows and a .22 caliber pistol were confiscated. Two cases of possession of firearms, fined \$20.00 each. One case of speeding on the Park road; found guilty and fined \$15.00. Two other speeding cases will be tried later. Two cases for reckless driving and driving without a valid state drivers license. One was found guilty on both counts and fined \$25.00; the other was found guilty for only the charge of no valid operators permits and was fined \$20.00. Warning violation notices were issued as follows: three for entering closed areas; eight for speeding on the Park road. Several verbal warnings were given for boat speeding in the boat basins, for taking small trout, and airboat operation in Florida Bay.

Ranger Whitmoyer was instrumental in the apprehension of two men who were in possession of illegal game just outside the Park boundary. State Wildlife Officers will bring the case to State courts.

The Chief Ranger and the Mangrove District Ranger met with the U. S. District Attorney to discuss an illegal charter boat operation.

One case of vandalism occurred at Royal Palm Station when a small portable pump and two trash cans were thrown into the pond.

Heavy useage of both campgrounds takes considerable ranger time for control and policing purposes. A new visitor register has been placed in the Flamingo Campground for "signing in."

Buoys were placed around Cuthbert Rookery to keep sightseeing boats a sufficient distance from the rookery to minimize disturbance.

Disturbances caused by drunkenness and a fight were investigated at Flamingo.

Eight miles of the East boundary was reported south of the Tamiami Trail and new trail markers were placed on the Headwater airboat trail.

Investigation of the bomb case is continuing.

Nineteen trips or special arrangements were made by ranger personnel during the month.

Aircraft Activities: Sixteen patrol flights were made during the month totaling thirty-six hours and covering 3600 miles. Two flights were made for the Great White Heron count. Several violations were found and reported for follow-up by ground forces.

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Maintenance: Two bulletin boards were erected in the Flamingo Campground and one in the Long Pine Key Campground. Fallen trees were cleared from Buttonwood and Tarpon Creeks.

An addition was made to the boat shed at Everglades to house the third boat there.

Concessioners: All concessioner facilities are now doing a good business but sightseeing boat operation by Everglades Park Company is still plagued with difficulties caused by mechanical breakdown.

Cuthbert Lake Rookery trips started on February 22 after the Coast Guard issued certificates to two boats. However, only one boat has been in operation because of mechanical difficulties.

Complaints: Several complaints were received on the Cuthbert Rookery trips because of the disagreeable attitude of the Captain, lack of protection from spray and the lack of speed of the boats. The Captain's employment was terminated by the Everglades Park Company.

One written and several verbal complaints were received regarding overselling sightseeing trips at the information counter at Flamingo.

A couple complained about the way another visitor talked to them concerning unleashed dogs. Both parties were warned about their behavior, abusive language by one and unleashed dogs by the other.

The management of Gilbert's Fish Camp at Jewfish Creek complained that his boat renters were having difficulty because net fishermen were blocking Bogges Pass with their nets. The commercial fishermen were contacted and agreed to leave more room in the future.

A Park neighbor complained of crocodiles in his rockpit and harbor and requested assistance to remove them.

Forest Fire Protection: Control Blocks H and J on Long Pine Key were prepared and burned during February. Block J was considered to be the most successful burn of the program to date.



Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: One violation of Park Rules and Regulations, Section 1.61 was committed. The offender was convicted of illegally landing aircraft and fined \$50 in US Commissioners Court. Two other convictions were obtained for violation of Section 7.45 (a) (8), illegal use of spear guns. A fine of \$30 was collected in each case. Seven spear guns, one bow with arrows and a 22 cal. pistol were confiscated.

Notice of Violation warning was issued for entering closed area. Several verbal warnings were issued for speeding in boat basins and taking of small trout.

Control and policing of campground has taken considerable time due to the heavy use. A new register form was prepared for "signing in" at the Campground. Pictures were taken of crowded camping conditions.

Legal assistance was requested from the US District Attorney to make a case against Don Sullivan and cohorts who have been engaging in charter boat operations out of Flamingo for the past two years.

Buoys were placed around Cuthbert Rookery to guide sightseeing boats on a course sufficiently far from the rookery to minimise disturbance.

A couple of disturbances were investigated and individuals concerned were "squared away". Company employee was drunk and a "cotton picker" picked a fight with another colored boy.

Occasional night road patrols were made to check on possible vandalism, poaching or other night violations. Total patrol mileage for the month amounted to:

A portable photography blind on Captain Key was investigated and determined to be alright.

An airboat owner ~~xxxx~~ believed to be operating in Florida Bay was contacted and warned of regulations concerning airboat operation.

Stone crabbers in Florida Bay are constantly moving their traps. This they say helps increase the catch, which is not supplying the demand.

Several large mangrove trees were felled near mouth of Shark River. Investigation indicated the Coast Guard had felled the trees, but for what reason it is not known. Other debris had been dumped at the site.

Maintenance: Both audio visual machines were repaired in the Flamingo Museum. Two bulletin boards were erected in the campground. A new gas tank was installed in the Frowler. Water pump was replaced on the Chetika. Trees were again cleaned out of Buttonwood and Tarpon Creeks. Drain and cover were installed at Utility area near boat ways. Viste clearing was done on south side of Visitor Center.

Concessioner: Sightseeing operations still seem to be a snag in concessioner operations. Cuthbert Lake Rookery trips were started on the 22nd, after the Coast Guard had issued certificates for two boats to run the trip. No more than one boat has been in operation since however because of mechanical failure and disabled underwater gear. The drive chain on the Robin K at Flamingo has broken at least four times during the month. The Juniper was down a couple of times and had to cancel several trips.

Charter boat Captain Mark Hamilton has returned to Flamingo with his boat ALBATROSS

All concessioner facilities are doing a good business.

Complaints: Several verbal complaints have been received on the Cuthbert Rookery trips. The disagreeable attitude of the Captain seems to be the biggest complaint. Also the boat is wet, no interpretation is done and little opportunity to see the rookery is offered because allotted time is consumed in transit to and from. The Captain has been fired to eliminate one source of complaint but the others still remain.

One written complaint was received regarding overselling sightseeing trips at information counter. Other similar verbal complaints have been received.

A couple complained about the way a man talked to them concerning unleashed dogs. Both parties were warned concerning their behavior, abusive language by one and unleashed dogs by the other.

The management of Gilberts Fish Camp at Jewfish Creek complained that persons renting boats from them have had trouble entering Buttonwood Sound because of net fishermen at Boggess Pass. The commercial fisherman was contacted and promised to leave more room in the future. A stop netting violation had not been committed.

Mr. Wallack again has complained of crocodiles entering rock pit and harbor on his property and requested assistance of Sub District Ranger Winte to remove same.

General

Weather Conditions: Most of March was dry and windy with several warm, sunny days near the end of the month. Two fast moving cold fronts brought high winds and rain to the area and tornado warnings were issued on March 18. Although no tornados occurred, strong winds did considerable damage to trees and television antenaes in the Everglades and Chockoloskee area. Small craft warnings were displayed for 90 hours at Flamingo and for 7 days at Key Largo. Glades water levels are dropping rapidly. The staff gauge at Taylor Slough read 1.20 feet on March 31 as compared with 2.12 feet February 28 and 2.11 feet on March 31, 1959.

Special Activities: A group of 90 members of the Tropical Audubon

Society was conducted on a one day tour of the Park by Superintendent Hamilton and Naturalist Hugh Muller.

District Ranger Borgman conducted a course in motor boat handling for marina and other interested employees at Flamingo. Classes met twice a week with an average attendance of ten persons per class.

Ranger Personnel assisted photographers and writers from the National Geographic Magazine to complete two stories which will be published in the future.

Ranger Winte met with the Corps of Engineers and Florida Keys property owners to discuss ways and means to save property and life during hurricanes. Subdistrict Ranger Whitmoyer presented a seminar before the University of Miami Zoology Department entitled, "Fish and Wildlife Management Problems in Everglades National Park".

Miscellaneous: Fire Control Aid Francis X. Guardipee, Jr. and his mother and father took a vacation trip to Nassau in the Bahamas.

Administration

Personnel: Fire Control Aid Laurel W. Dale left Everglades on March 3 for a permanent Ranger Position at Glacier National Park.

A draft of a standard job description for GS-7 Ranger Position for Everglades was prepared and submitted ~~by~~ the Chief Ranger's Office.

Safety and Health: One boat accident, caused by a rental skiff running into "Marker 30" in Whitewater Bay, and one minor automobile accident were investigated. No serious injuries were received.

A concessioner employee was taken to the Homestead Hospital when severe pains developed in his side. Examination revealed two cracked ribs.

Building Fire Protection: Faulty wiring caused a fire on board the "Prowler" boat. Prompt suppression limited the damage to about \$10.00.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Mangrove District Ranger personnel spent several days with the USDA Wild Cotton Eradication Crew observing and inspecting their operations. Their camp was moved out of Flamingo on March 17 and the crews moved into the Gulf Coast District for several weeks work.

Collection of mahogany seeds, for the U. S. Forest Service in Puerto Rico, was completed.

Rangers Borgman and Larson were appointed U. S. Census Enumerators to count all persons living within the Park in Dade and Monroe Counties.

U.S.G.S. personnel were taken to four water gauging stations to service the stations and install a new well and equipment at P-35 gauge.

Mr. Bruce Wright, Wildlife Management Institute, spent a day in the Flamingo area attempting to call some racoons with a new "coon caller". He left without success.

The University of Miami Research team made four trips into the Shark River Valley during the month.

Interpretive Activities and Developments

General Publicity: The establishment of the nation's first coral reef Park located off Key Largo is of interest to Park supporters in general.

Public Relations: District Ranger Stokes presented a talk on the developments for Everglades National Park to the Everglades Lions Club. Slides were also shown depicting other National Parks.

Subdistrict Ranger Whitmoyer attended a "Barbeque Meeting" of the Monroe Conservation Club held at Monroe Station on the Tamiami Trail and a meeting of the South Florida Airboat Association held at the association headquarters on the Tamiami Trail.

Research and Observations: Members of the University of Miami Marine Laboratory and Ranger Personnel attended a conference in the Chief Ranger's office to discuss the laboratory's work in the Park on marine biology.

Crocodile nest building activity has started on the shell beaches in Florida Bay.

Recent population of about 60 Roseate Spoonbills at Tern Keys were believed to have migrated there from Cuba.

White Ibis and Herons, estimated at several thousand birds, started nesting at Rookery Branch of the Shark River. All boat and airboat traffic has been stopped to the rookery area.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Five cases were heard before the U. S. Commissioner during March. Two cases of speeding and two cases of speeding and driving without a valid operator's permit were found guilty. Two were suspended without a fine being levied and the other two were fined \$10.00 and \$15.00 respectively. The fifth case involving reckless boat operation in Tarpon Creek was found not guilty.

Thirty-four warning tickets were issued for minor traffic violations and one for plant collecting.

Two juveniles, who had escaped from the custody of the Kendall Youth Hall, were picked up on Tamiami Trail by Ranger Whitmoyer and held for Dade County authorities.

Boundary signs were removed from a portion of the land that was returned to the state last year.

Gulf Coast District personnel were detailed to DeSoto National Monument at Bradenton, Florida to aid in their annual DeSoto Landing Celebration.

Special trips were arranged for seventeen persons during the month.

Several reports of vandalism to Everglades Park Company boats were investigated. Special patrols failed to identify the violators and the vandalism ceased.

Lostman's River Patrol Station was broken into with the loss of food and one sleeping bag.

Aircraft Activities: Seventeen flights were made during March totaling forty-two hours and covering 4200 miles. Seventeen passengers were carried. Flights were for the following purposes: Three flights to scout wildfires; three flights for aerial census of Bald Eagles nesting; two flights to complete the Great White Heron census; four flights for photography; one flight to locate mound sites; two flights for inland waterway route survey and Everglades City Developments for EODC personnel.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: The lowering water table produced the usual die-off of fish in the Royal Palm Pond area and in several places along the Tamiami Trail. Approximately 500 pounds of fish were removed from Royal Palm Pond.

Maintenance: A sprinkler system and a drinking fountain were installed in the mall in front of the Flamingo Visitor Center and a large crack in the breezeway has been repaired.

Many of the remarks on the new campground registration forms refer to the cleanliness of the Flamingo Campground and rest rooms. The maintenance crew at Flamingo can be proud of these compliments.

Ranger personnel spent two days cutting trees and brush from Plate Creek to provide an inland water passage from Lostman's River to Everglades.


Concessioners: The Cuthbert Rookery boat trips have improved from an interpretive standpoint. Both boats are now in operation. The East River Boat trips were discontinued due to lowered water levels and the Cape Sable boat trip was cancelled several times due to rough water which prevented docking the boat at East Cape Sable.

The Everglades Park Company's business was good all month.

Sightseeing boat passengers increased 13% in the Gulf Coast District.

Complaints: Several verbal complaints were received concerning the re-scheduling of the boat trips to Cape Sable. Adverse weather conditions caused the re-scheduling.

Forest Fire Protection: Suppression action was taken on three non-statistical and one statistical fire during March. Two of the non-statistical fires were along the Tamiami Trail, the other was along the East Boundary. The statistical fire occurred on private lands within the Park. All the fires were suppressed before they reached Federally owned lands. The fire break around the pine area north and west of Panther Glade was completed this month. The "break" was started last May but work was stopped because of high water.

Increase or Decrease in Travel: Travel continues to be far ahead of March 1959 figures. A comparison of figures shows that there was 2 1/2 times more total camping use, a 10% increase in hotel visitation, and an increase of 25% in the number of boats using the Flamingo boat ramp. In comparison with last month, camping use declined by about 30%, hotel use was up 10%, and boating use at the ramp was down 15%. Total boating use in the District is about 10% below last month.

Special Activities: Rangers Borgan and Arnett attended a conference at the Chief Ranger's Office in regard to the University of Miami Marine Laboratory's work in the Park on marine biology.

District Ranger Borgan conducted a course in motor boat handling for marina and other interested employees at Flamingo. Attendance averaged about ten persons per class; classes met twice a week.

Walter Smith, Du Pont Corp., filmed the Boat-A-Cade and park scenery for a movie to be shown on TV.

Park Collaborator Fred Truslow completed the project in which he photographed a family of bald eagles from the time the two young birds hatched until they left the nest. His photographs and a story will be seen in the National Geographic Magazine.

Ranger Winte attended a Corps of Engineers and property owners meeting at Marathon on March 8th. Ways and means to save property and life on the Keys during hurricanes were discussed.

Ranger Winte also assisted Treat Davidson as Mr. Davidson took pictures of Park airboats, planes, and other things for a story to be published in the National Geographic Magazine.

A group of 90 members of the Tropical Audubon Society spent a half day in the Flamingo area. They were accompanied by Supt. Hamilton. Naturalist Muller conducted a special auto-Cade for them.

Boat Trips for Important Visitors: Mr. Moran and Mr. Lewis, EODC, accompanied by Chief Ranger Nelson and Rich Huber, were taken on a boat trip into Florida Bay.

Mr. Ferraris, State Department guest from Italy, and his party were accompanied by Ralph Miele on a trip to Oyster Keys and Palm Key. The party was taken out in the "Cherika" boat.

Dr. Melville B. Grosvenor, his wife and son, Mr. Thomas Smith, all with the National Geographic Magazine, and Fred Truslow were taken to the East River Bookery, Murray Key, and Palm Key on March 31st.

Administration

Safety and Health: An emergency trip was made to James Archer Smith Hospital in Homestead with an Everglades Park Company cook who had severe pains in his side. Examination revealed two cracked ribs.

One minor automobile accident was investigated, involving an Everglades Park Company employee.

One boat accident was investigated in which a rental skiff ran into Marker "5" in Whitewater Bay. No serious injuries were received in the accident.

Three minor personal injuries were treated by ranger personnel.

Fire Protection: A fire on the Prowler boat was extinguished before much damage was done. Damage was estimated at \$10. Faulty wiring caused the fire.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State or Local Agencies: Rangers spent several days with the USDA Wild Cotton Eradication Crew observing and inspecting their operations. They moved from their camp on March 17th.

Collection of mahogany seeds for the Forest Service in Puerto Rico was completed.

USGS personnel were taken to Water Gauging Station P-35 for completion of the well and installation of gauging equipment.

Bruce Wright, Wildlife Management Institute, spent a day in the Flinging area attempting to call some coons with a new "coon caller." He left without success.

District Ranger Borgman is taking a census of all persons within the Park who live in Monroe County.

Interpretive Activities and Developments

General Publicity: The establishment of the nation's first coral reef park located off Key Largo is of interest to Park supporters in general.

Research and Observations: Crocodile nest building activity has started on the shell beaches in Florida Bay.

Approximately 60 Roseate Spoonbills were seen almost the entire month at Tern Keys. This is unusual, and they are thought to have come recently from Cuba.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: A Notice of Violation was issued for reckless boat operation in Tarpon Creek; the boat operator was found not guilty.

Two Notice of Violation warnings were issued, one for speeding and the other for picking of airplants and orchids.

Several reports of vandalism were investigated in which Everglades Park Company sightseeing boats had water put into their gas tanks. Special patrols failed to identify the violators, and the vandalism ceased.

Rookery Branch River has been closed due to the formation of the rookery by white ibis and herons.

An Air Force helicopter was observed flying very low over the quarters area at Flamingo on March 25th.

A private plane was observed by an Everglades Park Company sightseeing boat captain as it buzzed the Cuthbert Rookery. The correct number on the plane was not obtained, so no action has been taken.

Maintenance: A sprinkler system has been installed in the mall in front of the Flamingo Visitor Center.

The storeroom at the Utility Area at Flamingo has been partially stocked and organized.

A drinking fountain was installed at the Flamingo Visitor Center.

Two remote controls have been installed on the MFG boat.

Many of the remarks on the new campground registration forms concern the cleanliness of the Flamingo campground and rest house. This is something of which the maintenance crew at Flamingo can be proud.

Concessioner: The Cuthbert Rodbery boat trips have improved greatly, from an interpretive standpoint. Both boats are now in operation.

The "Robin K" boat is back in operation after having an engine overhaul.

The East River boat trip was discontinued due to lowered water levels.

The Cape Sable boat trip was cancelled several times due to rough water preventing docking the boat.

Concession business was good all month.

Complaints: Several verbal complaints were received concerning the re-scheduling of the boat trips to Cape Sable. As was mentioned above, this was done because of adverse weather conditions.

Suppression action was taken on three non-statistical and one statistical fires during March. Two of the non-statistical fires were along the Tamiami Trail, the other was along the east boundary.

The Hayes Road Fire started near the end of a water-filled drainage ditch, presumably by fishermen. A strong wind from the east south east with gusts up to 22 miles per hour moved the fire rapidly through the glades and old cultivated fields. Two glades buggy crews worked the fire ~~the~~ from the north and south flanks and pinched it off before it reached Service owned lands. The fire, although burning entirely in the Park, was on private lands (hole in the donut).

The fire break north of the Park road was completed during March. The break was started last May but had to be discontinued because of high water.

Fire glades buggy 11-1684 was in the process of being overhauled by the end of the month.





Subject: Monthly Narrative Report of Ranger Activities, April 1960

General

Weather Conditions: Dry, windy March-like weather continued to mid-April, lowering the water table at Taylor Slough to .60 feet on April 17 and raised the fire danger to a critical point. Refreshing relief came in the form of a week of heavy rains starting April 18. The water rose to 2.16 feet at Taylor Slough as compared with .75 feet for April 30 last year and 1.20 feet last month. Following the rain, mosquitoes appeared in excessive numbers in the Mangrove areas. Small craft warnings were displayed on four days at Key Largo and two days at Flamingo. The following is a weather summary for the Park:

Increase or Decrease in Travel: A total of 63,390 visitors entered the Park during April which is an increase of 30% over April 1959. Travel showed the usual seasonal decline being about 10% less than March this year. Campground use declined 51% in the Long Pine Key Campground and about 80% at the Flamingo Campground. Visitors came from all the states except Alaska; Canal Zone; Virgin Islands; the five Canadian Provinces of Manitoba, New Brunswick, Ontario, Quebec and Saskatchewan; and the foreign countries of England, Holland, France, Japan, Israel, Australia, Poland, Cuba, Chile, Venezuela, New Zealand, Indonesia, Spain, Philippine Islands and Thailand.

Travel on the Farm Road to the Hole-in-the-Donut" area increased 32% during April due to increased farming activities. A total of 4,610 vehicles used the road.

Fish and Wildlife Service, American National Red Cross and the U. S. Coast Guard Auxiliary participated. Rangers Whitehouse and Arnott represented Everglades at the Seminar.

Fifty members of the Miami Rod and Reel Club spent a weekend at Flamingo, April 23 and 24.

Ranger Borgman flew to New Orleans to assist Capt. Greenleaf and Marine Engineer John Williamson from Isle Royale NP transport the new "T" boat for Fort Jefferson.

Special trips were arranged for 16 important visitors in addition to arrangements for 26 persons who attended the Water Safety Seminar.

Safety and Health:

A visitor who fainted at the Royal Palm Visitor Center, was taken to the Homestead Hospital where it was determined that hunger was the cause of her spell.

Three minor vehicle accidents occurred during the month. One involved a truck loaded with tomatoes which overturned at an intersection when the

brakes failed. A second brake failure caused a vehicle to back into the water at the boat ramp at Flamingo. The third accident involved a car driving into a culvert while the driver was looking for birds. No injuries were sustained by the occupants of the vehicles. Several minor personnel injuries occurred during the month.

A photograph and legend on poisonwood was prepared for the bulletin board at the Long Pine Key Campground to aid visitors in recognizing the plant.

Building Fire Protection: Pine Island fire hydrants, outside fire extinguishers, outside faucets and hose nozzles were marked with reflective tape to make them easier to locate in case of fire at night.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: U. S. Coast Guard personnel were transported to the Little Shark River and Indian Key Sight for the purpose of servicing the light beacons.

The Florida Bay Subdistrict Ranger assisted the Florida Highway Patrol directing traffic and caring for injured persons after a three-car accident on U. S. Highway #1, near the Key Largo Ranger Station.

The Geology Department, Florida State University, continued their program of taking tide current readings in Florida Bay. They were assisted by the Florida Bay Subdistrict Ranger.

The U.S.G.S. drilled seven wells in the Park in conjunction with their water studies. These wells may prove advantageous in the event of fire.

The University of Miami Research Team continued its work in the Shark River Valley.

Rangers Borgman and Larson completed the census of Dade and Monroe County residents living within the Park boundaries.

Interpretive Activities and Developments

Interpretive Facilities: The Chief Park Naturalist visited the Gulf Coast District April 30 to discuss the interpreting development program for the District.

More air plants and orchids have been added to the displays at the Flamingo Visitor Center.

Research and Observations: A rookery of 250 to 300 pairs of Louisiana Herons and a few Egrets, formed on Bird Key near the mouth of Sandfly Pass.

Five completed crocodile nests have been located on the shell beaches in Florida Bay.

Mrazek Pond had an excellent bird show this month until the heavy rains again filled the pond with water. About thirty Roseate Spoonbills, many Herons, Egrets, ducks and other birds frequented the pond.

Several previously unrecorded Bald Eagle nests were located by air patrol. Unusual Bald Eagle observations for this time of year were two Eagle eggs in a nest in the Ten Thousand Island Area and a downy young Bald Eagle (about one week old) in the nest at Mud Bay.

Plant material was collected from the outside Keys and Sandfly Island in the Ten Thousand Islands area by Park Collaborator, Dr. Frank Craighead.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: A disabled boat was towed to Flamingo from "Marker 35" in Whitewater Bay; an overdue boat, enroute from Jewfish Creek to Flamingo, was found at Buoy Key and was escorted to Flamingo, and an overdue stone crab fisherman was located in South Florida Bay.

Seventeen warning violation tickets were issued for the following: three for speeding in Tarpon Creek; two for landing helicopters at Flamingo; ten for speeding on the Park road; two for snail collecting.

Several cases were heard before the U. S. Commissioner this month. A summary follows:

One case involved five men who were found guilty of killing a bobcat within the Park, running dogs within the Park and firearms violation. Three men were given suspended jail sentences of three months on each of two counts and two men were given suspended jail sentences of three months on each of three counts. The sentence was suspended from day to day and term to term of court. The firearms were returned to the defendants. A firearms violation by two North Bay Village policemen was found guilty. The entry of sentence was suspended because of intervention by the North Bay Police Chief. The firearms were returned to the defendants.

A Miamian was found guilty of firearms violation and he was fined \$100.00. The fine was suspended and the firearm was returned to the defendant.

One violation of speeding; violator fined \$10.00. Two cases are still pending. One involves possession of firearms, the other concerns speeding, driving without a valid operators permit and lack of adequate brakes on a vehicle.

Vandals also attempted to enter the cigarette vending machine at the Flamingo Marina. No money was taken but damage to the machine was about \$10.00. Investigation by rangers and F. B. I. failed to reveal the parties responsible.

The quarterly inspection of emergency and first aid equipment was made this month in the Mangrove District and the Tamiami Subdistrict.

Channel markers, installed by Stanley Brown of the Angler's Motel, Chockoloskee Island to Rabbit Key Pass, were inspected by the Gulf Coast District Ranger and were found to be entirely satisfactory.

Another section of boundary was located in Chockoloskee Bay by Park Engineer Hafferman and EODC Architect Huber. Only two corners remain to be located.

A new card system for warning violation records is being installed at Park Headquarters.

Signs were placed around Bird Key closing the area to all boats and persons to protect the rookery there.

High water has caused the deer to seek high ground along the road again, resulting in two deer being killed. This makes 36 killed since the road was opened to traffic.


Aircraft Activities: Nineteen flights were made during the month totaling forty-two and one-half hours and covering 4,250 miles. Sixteen passengers were carried. A summary of flight purposes follows: nine flights for routine patrol; two flights to search for overdue boats; one flight for photography; two flights for 100 hour check and repairs; one flight to check illegal activities; one flight for Bald Eagle survey; one flight for Regional Publications Officer orientation; two flights to scout wildfires.

Concessioners: A decrease in sightseeing boat passengers was recorded by all three concessioners this month. The decrease in the Gulf Coast District was 26%.

Mechanical failure on the large boats reduced the Cuthbert Lake Rookery trip to operation with a small outboard boat capable of carrying only five passengers.

Summer rates for the Flamingo Area will go into effect on May 1.

The Everglades Park Co. trailer park is being re-planned and patios are being constructed for each trailer site. The Flamingo Lodge is full only on weekends now because of the seasonal decrease in visitation.

The information of the extended season reached them after they had pulled their traps. The complaint was against the Florida State Board of Conservation.

Forest Fire Protection: A fire critique was held following the Hayes Road Fire. Several good points of more effective fire suppression were brought out.

GENERAL

Weather Conditions

Dry, windy, March-like weather continued thru mid-April, lowering the water table to .60 on April 17, and raising the fire danger to a critical point. On April 18, refreshing relief came in the form of 6 in. of rain in a week. The water table rose to 2.3 at Taylor Slough. By the end of the month 6.43 in. of rain had fallen and the water table stood at 2.16.

Increase or Decrease in Travel

Visitation made its usual decline in April. 51,375 visitors in 14,539 cars entered the park. This is a 12% decrease under March.

Half as many campers used Long Pine Key Campground in April as in March. There were 532 campers this month compared to 1,083 in March, a decrease of 51%.

Alaska was the only state not represented this month. Five Canadian Provinces and 15 foreign countries were represented.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service

Several court cases were heard during April. Two of them involved shooting within the park. A bobcat was killed by one group in the Royal Palm Sub-district. Five men were found guilty and sentenced to 3 mos. on each of two and three counts. The sentence was suspended.

Another group was found in the Tamiami Sub-district. A suspended fine of \$100. was imposed.

Two cases are pending. One involves illegal possession of firearms. The other concerns speeding, driving without a license and lack of proper brakes. Other violations consisted of speeding.

Vandalism reared its ugly head several times during the month. Boundary signs along the Loop Road were shot up, and , on two occasions, windows were broken in the entrance station.

From the appearance of blood on the end of the Anhinga Trail it seems that someone killed an alligator and carried it off the trail.

High water has prompted deer to seek the high ground along the road again. This resulted in two deer, the first this year, to be killed. This makes nos. 35 and 36 since the new road opened.

The heavy rains kept farmers in the Hole in the Donut from picking all the tomatoes but loses weren't as heavy as in other areas. Several of the farmers are raising cucumbers which weren't yet ready for harvest, and most of the tomatoes had been picked prior to the rain.



General

Weather Conditions: In general, weather conditions during April were quite pleasant. A week of rainy weather brought much-needed rain. Following the rain, the mosquitos appeared in excessive numbers. Small craft warnings were displayed on four days at Key Largo and on two days at Flamingo.

Increase or Decrease in Travel: Boating use increased over last month by 30%. Campground use declined from 3800 visitor days last month to 658 visitor days this month. Total visitors on the Everglades Park Company tour boats declined from 2981 persons in March



to 1987 in April. In comparison with April 1959, there was an increase in motel use from 1896 visitors in 1959 to 2392 in 1960. The number of boats using the ramp decreased from 700 in April 1959 to 591 in April 1960. Campground use at Flamingo in April 1959 shows 636 visitor days and April 1960 shows 658, virtually the same.

Special Activities: Rangers Whitehouse and Winte and Naturalist Muller participated in the Civil Service audit.

Ranger Borgman completed the census of Monroe County residents who live in the Park.

The NPS Water Safety and Rescue Seminar was held at Flamingo from April 11 to April 15. Representatives from about 12 NPS areas were present; in addition, the Forest Service, Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, and the Fish and Wildlife Service also had men in attendance. Rangers Whitehouse and Arnott represented Everglades National Park at the Seminar.

Fifty members of the Miami Rod and Reel Club spent a weekend at Flamingo on April 23rd and 24th.

Trips for Important Visitors: Miss Fitzgibbon of England's National Parks was taken by boat to Palm Key to see the flamingos.

Bruce Miller, Bob Metherell, both of the Water Safety and Rescue Seminar staff, and Fred Quaeserly, Region One Personnel Officer, were also taken to Palm Key.

Dr. Shimaji and Mr. Kabahoog were taken to East River Rookery.

Mr. and Mrs. Roger Ernst were taken to Whitewater Bay, East Cane Sable, and Cuthbert Lake Rookery.

Administration

Safety and Health: A visitor backed his car, a 1959 Ford, off into the canal at the boat ramp while attempting to back his boat and trailer into the water. Marina employees assisted in getting the car out of the water, and after an oil change and other minor repairs, the man drove his car home.

Several minor personal injuries occurred during the month.

One minor automobile accident occurred as an Everglades Park Company employee drove his car into a culvert while looking for birds.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Two Coast Guard men were transported to the Little Shark River for the purpose of servicing the lighted beacon.

The Florida Bay Subdistrict Ranger assisted the Florida Highway Patrol direct traffic and take care of injured persons in a 3-car accident on U. S. Highway #1, near the Key Largo Ranger Station.

The Geology Department, Florida State University, continued their program of taking tide current readings in Florida Bay, and were assisted by the Florida Bay Subdistrict Ranger.

Interpretive Activities and Developments

Research and Observations: More airplants and orchids have been added to the displays in the Visitor Center.

Marazek's Pond had an excellent bird show this month until the heavy rains again filled the pond with water. Some days there were thirty and more roseate spoonbills in the pond, along with many herons, egrets, ducks, and other birds.

Five completed crocodile nests have been located on the shell beaches in Florida Bay.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: A disabled boat was towed in from Marker "35" in Whitewater Bay; it had ignition system problems.

Three boat operators were given written warnings for speeding in Tarpon Creek.

An overdue boat, enroute from Jewfish Creek to Flamingo, was found at Buoy Key and was escorted to Flamingo. Two helicopters, which the owner of the boat enlisted to aid in the search of the missing boat, landed at Flamingo because of low gas supplies. The pilots were given warning citations, and National Park Service policies regarding airplanes were explained to the pilots and the owner of the boat.

The cigarette vending machine at the marina was vandalized; no money was taken, but damage to the machine was \$10.

The Florida Bay Subdistrict Ranger initiated a search for an overdue stone crab fisherman who was found by the ranger pilot in South Florida Bay. He had had engine trouble.

The Quarterly Inspection of Emergency and First Aid Equipment was made this month.

Patrol mileages are as follows: Vehicle--3,780
Boat-----1,969

Maintenance: Remote controls were installed in the MFG boat.

Now that the mosquito season is here again, the "Fogger" is being used each day.

Two of the Flamingo on-the-job quarters were painted, as was the Subdistrict Ranger's quarters.

A trail from the picnic area to the motel has been laid out by the landscape architect.

The campground lawn is being fertilized.

Concessioner: On April 16, the Cuthbert Lake Rookery Trip was being run in an outboard boat with a capacity of five persons per trip. The small boat is being used because of mechanical failure of the regular tour boats.

A decreased number of boat trips is being run because of the decrease in number of park visitors.

Summer rates go into effect on May 1.

The motel is full on the weekends only.

The concessioner trailer park is being re-planned, and ratios are being constructed for each trailer site.

Complaints: No complaints were received during the month concerning the concessioner or the Park Service. However, the Florida Bay Subdistrict Ranger received verbal complaints from six stone crab fishermen concerning the extending of the stone crab season until May 15th. It seems that the fishermen had already pulled their traps before receiving word of the extended season. The complaints were lodged against the State Board of Conservation.

District Ranger Discussed the installation of the radio system for the district with Mr. Rhinshart on the 1st.

One overnight patrol was made to Lostman's River. Due to difficulties with boat and bad weather we were forced to spend one night near Plover Key on the trip back. This was brought about by a bent wheel on the Engine Ship which occurred in Roanoke Bay. The park airplane was called in to assist in case we were unable to make trip in after landing wheel. On this trip careful patrols were made in the third bay area of Lostman's River. Nothing unusual was observed.

Stanley Brown of the Angler's Motel on Chokoloskee Island was given permission to start channel out Rabbit Key Pass from Chokoloskee Island. The route and location of barrier was inspected and the overall job was found to be very good.

The existing boundary line signs were all inspected and repairs made where necessary. Also on April 28 the park ranger and Mr. Fisher came over to locate another section of boundary in Chokoloskee Bay. This is very early to be established in the bay area.

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Dr. Crangham went over to one of the outside levees and to S. Haffly Island to gather boat material.

Signs were placed around bird banding area to boats and persons. Five boat trips were made to take visitors into the district.

Maintenance

An air conditioner was installed in park office.

Repairs were made to a motor to a motor trailer, which included painting front room, installing new refrigeration, roof coating with special trailer to bring out reflecting all window and one door screen.

The 18 motor boats were given regular monthly service. A new water pump, grossed out in front and a new gear shift handle were installed on one of the 18 motor boats.

Concessions

Sight seeing boat passengers dropped to nearly ¹/₂ of the March total. In March 1975 persons were taken as compared to 1240 persons in April for a decrease of *26%

Complaints

The first complaint in writing was made against the 10,000 Island Boat Tour. A lady complained of miss information about the trip. She was told that this trip was the same as the Mangrove Wilderness trip. She had taken this trip (Mangrove Wilderness) in a previous year and was very unhappy that she had not gotten the same trip. The concessioner was told that the correct information must be given and that further complaints of this type would result in the requiring of a new man to give information.

General

Weather Conditions: May started out unusually cool and dry but ended up typically hot and humid. Heavy rains over Memorial Day weekend climaxed a wet week with 8.36 inches being recorded at Flamingo. Temperatures were in the 90's by the end of the month with Tamiami's 95 degrees high for the Park. The water level at Taylor Slough fell to a low of 1.16 feet before the late month rains brought it up to 2.90 feet on the 31st. Small craft warnings were displayed one day each at Flamingo and Key Largo Ranger Stations. Monthly averages follow:

Special Activities: Chief Ranger accompanied Superintendent and Ranger

Winte to Tavernier to attend a meeting for consideration of rules and regulations for the preservation of the Key Largo Coral Reefs. The meeting was called by Emmet L. Hill, Director of Florida Board of Parks and Historic Memorials, and Walter A. Cresh, Regional Director, Fish and Wildlife Service. Rules and Regulations for Everglades National Park and Fort Jefferson NM were reviewed. Ralph McLane, Assistant Attorney General of Florida, was to prepare a draft of proposed rules and regulations which would be routed to

all concerned, then presented to the Department of Interior through A. M. Edwards, Associate Solicitor, Department of the Interior.

District Ranger Borgman assisted Capt. Greenleaf and Engineer Williamson of Isle Royal National Park in bringing a new Army T-boat from New Orleans to Fort Jefferson National Memorial. The boat is to replace the old Fort Jefferson boat.

A meeting in the Superintendent's office relevant to a proposal for closing certain keys in Florida Bay was attended by ranger personnel. It was felt that keys used extensively as nesting areas for birds be closed to public use. It was also suggested that the islands that can be used by the public and are desirable for camping and picnicking be so designated.

Miscellaneous: Fire Control Aid Ralph C. Johnston received a \$10.00 Incentive Award. The presentation was made by Superintendent Hamilton in his office on May 19.

Protection personnel went into the summer uniforms, short sleeved shirts and straw hats, on the first of May.

Administration

Personnel: Two seasonal fire control aids entered on duty during the month. James Foster reported the 11th and Ross Hopkins the 26th. Mr. Hopkins' term of employment was short, however, for he received notification of a permanent position as historian at Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park and was terminated here at noon on the 28th.

Thomas Hartman, Fire Control Aid, terminated May 2. Mr. Hartman was called into military service.

William B. Whitney, Fire Control Aid, was placed on furlough May 30. He is to report to Craters of the Moon National Monument June 5 for summer employment.

Robert Hawthorne was reassigned from seasonal ranger, Entrance Station, to fire control aid and moved to Tamiami Subdistrict.

Martin Benham entered on duty as Glades District Ranger May 30. He reported to Everglades from Mount Rainier National Park.

Subdistrict Ranger Whitehouse took three weeks annual leave during May.

Safety and Health: Two single automobile accidents occurred in the Park during the month. One occurring on the 26th was the result of the driver losing control of his car and driving off into the glades. Damage was light and there were no injuries. An accident on the 27th in which a car overturned resulted in injuries to the two occupants. The driver of this vehicle was cited to the U. S. Commissioner for speeding, reckless driving, driving without a license, and driving while under the influence.

Three minor boat accidents were investigated in which no personal injuries were involved.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Protection personnel attended a conference held at the University of Miami Marine Laboratory on Virginia Key. The Lab's quarterly progress report on research carried on in the Park was discussed.



Transportation was furnished the U. S. G. S. in reading three water gauging stations in the Park.

Subdistrict Ranger Paul Larson and Landscape Architect Richard Huber attended the Family Camping Clinic conducted by Dade County Parks. The two men prepared exhibits on Everglades National Park which were displayed at the Clinic.

The U. S. Border Patrol is keeping up their air and land patrols in the area. The "Hole-in-the Donut" and the old landing strip on Cape Sable are kept under almost daily surveillance.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Ten warning tickets were issued by rangers for minor violations during May. Three cases were heard before the U. S. Commissioner. Guilty verdicts were rendered in all cases.

Daily manning of the Entrance Station was discontinued May 8. During the remainder of the month, the station was open only on weekends.

Approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles of Park boundary were reposted after former signs were stolen. The estimated cost to the Government was in excess of \$400.00. The F. B. I. agent stationed at Homestead was informed of the case.

Frogging activities along the east boundary increased greatly as areas outside of the park dried up. Night patrols in the area were increased to cope with the situation.

Two cases of vandalism were noted in the Royal Palm area. Two jalousies were broken in the Entrance Station and empty cold drink bottles and cases



were thrown into the pond at Royal Palm Visitor Center.

Protection personnel participated in two rescue operations. One in which two boys were lost south of the Tamiami Trail just west of the Park boundary. The boys were located by the Park plane about 5 miles south of the Trail and the Coast Guard helicopter picked them up.

An all-night search for a young girl lost in the Ten Thousand Islands area near Everglades City ended happily when she was found by local fishermen.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities: Aerial observation of nine manatees was made in the head waters of the Shark River.

The first turtle crawls were noted on May 13. This activity increased later in the month. Crawls were noted especially on East and Middle Capes.

A grey squirrel was observed on the road going through Palma Vista Hammock.

Concessioners: Safety and sanitary inspections revealed progress in housekeeping practices and sanitary conditions in the kitchen at Flamingo, but the service station, power house, utility area, and employees' trailer park were in very poor condition.




Forest Fire Protection: High fire danger occurred during most of the month.

Four non-statistical and three statistical fires occurred in the Park.

Danger lessened with rains the last of the month.

Park rangers attended a fire demonstration held at the Homestead Air Base.

This demonstration was attended by fire department personnel from several communities in south Florida. The purpose of the program was to show how to rescue the crew from a B-47 bomber after a crash.

GENERAL

Summer eased its way in during the month with 5 days of temperatures in the 90's and a rise in humidity. During the first three weeks of the month the water table at Taylor Slough slowly fell from 2.16 to 1.16, but heavy rains during the last week, amounting to 6.64 inches, brought the table back up to 2.90 on May 31. On May 29, hard winds blew the Pine Island weather station over, felled small branches throughout the pinewoods and broke up one of the mahogany trees at Royal Palm Visitor Center.


Increase or Decrease in Travel

Visitation continued to decrease in May. 33,517 visitors in 9,514 cars visited the park. This represents a decrease of 23%.

Campground usage made another sharp decline. There were 199 campers during May, compared with 532 in April. This is a decline of 63%.

All but five states were represented as well as 4 Canadian Provinces and 23 foreign countries.

Most of the activity in the "Hole in the Donut" ended with the harvest of cucumbers and melons.

Administration

Personnel

F.C.A. Tom Hartman received his draft notice, was terminated on May 2, and left that day to return to Tennessee.

James Foster entered on duty on May 11, as Fire Control Aid, filling the position vacated by Tom Hartman.

F.C.A. Robert Hawthorne returned to the Tamiami Sub-district on May 9, after spending several months on entrance station duty in the Royal Palm Sub-district.

Ross R. Hopkins EOD on May 26 as F.C.A. but received a permanent appointment as historian at Chickamauga and Chattanooga NMP and terminated on May 28.

F.C.A. Bill Whitney terminated on May 29, and left for a seasonal position at Craters of the Moon N.M., Idaho.

Martin Benham arrived from Mount Rainier to fill the District Ranger, Glades District position vacated by Ralph Maxwell.

Safety and Health

Two automobile accidents occurred during the month. On May 26, an E.P.Co. employee lost control of his vehicle and drove off the main park road near Pa-ha-okee when one of the rear wheels came off. The driver was alone and uninjured.

Late in the evening on May 27, another automobile went out of control and turned over near the Royal Palm intersection on the main park road. The driver, a man, injured his neck; a chip fracture of the third vertebra. The passenger, a woman, bruised her shoulder. The driver was charged with speeding, reckless driving, driving without a valid operators permit and driving while intoxicated.

In the Tamiami Sub-district, first aid was given to victims of two auto accidents as well as two persons who had shot themselves in the leg.

Building Fire Protection

The Glades District fire truck is gradually being readied for use. It was given a new paint job and minor repairs are being made. 2,300 ft. of new 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " hose was obtained from the Homestead Air Force Base.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with other Federal, State or Local Agencies

The University of Miami research team made three trips into the Shark River Valley, totaling 75 miles. This activity has been removed to the Taylor Slough area for the remainder of the fiscal year. The drought has been a contributing factor for this decision.

USGS personnel visited the 7 mile Tower and were given short airboat rides to familiarize them with the topography of the area.

The Ranger Pilot and the Sub-district ranger from Tamiami joined the U.S. Coast Guard in a search-rescue mission south of the Loop Road. Lt. Commander P.A. Hogue, USCG helicopter pilot had high praise to Park Service personnel for their part in the rescue.



Park Service equipment was used to read guaging stations P-33 and P-34. Mr. Stan Leach of the USGS tended the stations.

Metro Deputy Sheriffs aided in directing traffic along U.S. 41 during the "Telephone Company" fire. Deputy Sheriffs also set up a road block to apprehend the persons who tore out the pay telephone at Tamiami but failed to make contact.

Water guaging stations P-37 and P-38 were serviced by USGS personnel on May 19.

Richard Huber and the Royal Palm Sub-district ranger attended the Family Camping Clinic conducted by Dade County Parks at Camp Owaissa Bauer on Sunday, May 29. Two exhibits on the National Park were displayed with others from conservation and nature organizations.

Interpretive Activities and Developments

Research and Observation

Several bird specimens collected from road kills along U.S. 41 were sent from the Tamiami Sub-district to the District Park Naturalist at Flamingo. Included were a limpkin, an adult king rail, a juvenile king rail and a cat bird.

The Carolina wren returned to the Tamiami station shop and set up house-keeping in the mail box. Three young have survived and were last seen perched in the garage.

A grey squirrel was observed on the road thru Palma Vista again in May.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service

The Tamiami Sub-district ranger had two court cases; one for illegal possession of firearms; the other for petty larceny. Defendants in both cases were found guilty.

7 violation notices were issued for speeding, 5 for illegal possession of fire arms, one for entering a closed area, 1 for reckless driving, driving while intoxicated and driving without a permit. One court case is pending.

Entrance station operations were curtailed on May 8, as visitation began to diminish and activities in the Tamiami Sub-district began to increase. The entrance now is manned on weekends only.

Approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles of boundary were reposted after former signs were stolen on May 7. The estimated cost to the Government exceeded \$400. A report was made to the F.B.I.



Windows at the entrance station seem to be too great a temptation for vandals to pass up. Two jalosies were broken again on May 13. At Royal Palm Visitor Center they threw an empty bottle case into the pond and wrote a vulgar message on the visitor register. There is little question as to the identity of the vandals but late patrols have failed to coincide with their recreation schedule.

Discontinuation of late road patrols was necessary in order to provide better day time fire protection.

Three all night airboat patrols were made along the east boundary during the month. Several surprise contacts were made with professional froggers which greatly increased their respect for the boundary line.

On the night of May 15, the Tamiami pay telephone, (Frog City #10) was torn out and burglarized by persons unknown. An attempt was made to apprehend the culprits but N.P.S. vehicles available were not effective.

Maintenance

Tamiami station maintenance included construction of a screen to prevent drift of water hyacinth into the station pond, spraying of water hyacinth and fertilizing of the station lawn.

Gates were erected at both ends of the new fire road surrounding the Pinelands Trail.

Forest Fire Protection

Three statistical fires were quickly brought under control during the month. Total acreage burned was about 2.35 acres. Suppression costs amounted to \$351.70.

General

Weather Conditions: Calm, warm and sunny weather prevailed most of the month. Memorial Day weekend was an exception. Rain squalls occurred Friday night and Saturday. Steady rain continued through Saturday night, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, the last days of the month. The largest amount of rainfall recorded for one day was 8.36 inches on Monday the 30 th.

Small craft warnings were displayed one day at Flamingo and one day at Key Largo.

Increase or Decrease in Travel: Vehicle travel dropped considerably from last month, but boat travel was up 35%, and 28% ^{over} May of last year. The 12,293 participants in boating activities were more ^{than} ever before. Increase amounted to 23% on rental boats, 28% on Flamingo launching ramp and 38% on boats entering from the Florida Keys. Sightseeing and charter boats were only activities that showed a decrease. Sightseeing was off 50% for the month and 41% from same month a year ago.

Camping activity decreased considerably but showed an increase of 25% over May of last year.

Hotel use was up 28% over the same month last year.

Special Activities: The District Ranger completed a very arduous assignment in New Orleans assisting Capt. Greenleaf and Engineer Williamson of Isle Royal National Park to secure and deliver a new Army T-boat to Fort Jefferson National Monument.

Regional Director Cox was in the Flamingo area most of one day inspecting the area with the Superintendent.

A meeting in the Superintendent's office relevant to a proposal for closing certain keys in Florida Bay was attended by the District Ranger.

Sub-District Ranger Winte attended meetings of State and Federal Conservation Agencies regarding administration of the Coral Reef Preserve off Key Largo.

Boat Trips for Important Visitors: Assistant Secretary of the Interior Ernst and wife were escorted to the Cape Sable beaches on a shelling expedition. They were also accompanied to Cuthbert Rookery and returned to Homestead.

District Naturalist Muller spent a day with Mr. Soper, of BBC, photographing birds in the Snake Bight area.

Mr. Wadsworth and Dr. Holdridge were shown some mahogany trees from which seeds were collected for the Forest Experiment Station at Puerto Rico. Since both men were very interested in birds they were also taken to East River rookery.

A party of four conservation officer from the Air Corps and Navy were taken on a sightseeing and fishing cruise into Florida Bay and Lake Ingraham.

Miscellaneous: May 1 ushered in the new summer uniforms, and they are mighty cool.

Administration

Personnel: Sub-District Ranger Whitehouse departed the 12th. for a vacation in Kentucky. According to latest reports JR's knee, which has been bothering him for several weeks, is now well healed. The vacation must have agreed with him.

Safety and Health: Several personal injuries occurred. Broken ankle, head wound, possible broken arm and lacerated hand were of a serious nature. Other injuries were minor.

Three boat accidents were investigated. No personal injuries were involved, but boats and equipment were damaged in each case. One boat hit a marker in Whitewater Bay. Two other boats capsized in Buttonwood Creek. Both capsizings were direct result of negligent or reckless boat operation. Another skiff was disabled on Middle Cape when skiff wasn't pulled clear of incoming tide.

Two EPC rental skiffs were rescued by Marina personnel when skiffs failed to return to Flamingo.

One automobile accident was investigated. No personal injuries resulted, but car was extensively damaged as it left the road and hit a rock.

Public Health service officers have been collecting data on tree borer mosquitoes.

The subject of a guard rail around sea wall at Flamingo was again brought up for discussion. Need for this rail has been a recurring argument since Flamingo was opened to visitation.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State or Local Agencies: One trip was made to Water Gauging Station P-35 with Stanley Leach, USGS, to complete installation of equipment there. Water flow data was also obtained in Shark and Harney Rivers.

A conference was held at the University of Miami Marine Lab. regarding trout and snapper studies and fish and effort studies conducted by the Marine Lab in Everglades National Park. Quarterly progress reports on the projects were discussed. The District Ranger attended.

Border patrolmen have been fairly active in the area. Several flights have been made over the Flamingo and Cape Sable area, but no alien activities have been discovered.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Three warning violations were issued for excessive speed of boats, one for reckless operation of boats and one for failure to report an auto accident. A warning violation was issued for taking ^{air}airplants. Several verbal warnings given people speeding in boat basins at Flamingo. Need for more patrols in Buttonwood Creek, Tarpon Creek and Flamingo boat basins is obvious.

One case was held in Commissioners Court. Defendant was found guilty. No fine or sentence was imposed.

Increase in commercial fishing activity accompanied movement of trout into Western Florida Bay and along West Coast. Two commercial pompano fishermen were warned verbally concerning use of trammel nets in the Park. They were contacted at Park Boundry near Schooner Bank with trammel nets aboard. A few stone crab traps were overlooked when crabbers pulled traps at the end of the season. Traps found have been destroyed.

Wendall and Tommy Williams were strong suspects of vandalizing EPC sightseeing boats at West Lake. They were observed at the West Lake Dock in the early hours of the morning by sightseeing Captain Enos, although not in the actual process of dismanteling controls of sightseeing boat. Controls were partially disassembled.

Don Sullivan's boats and Captains continue to operate a Charterboat business. Request from the District Attorney's Office for help to curb this activity has been to no avail.

Ranger Arnott checked out on the Prowler. All rangers in the District are now qualified to operate any NPS boats in the area.

Two night "gator" patrols were made in headwaters regions. Four night road patrols were made. Patrol mileages for the month were:

Maintenance: Several maintenance projects were completed in the Flamingo area. The Visitor Center was painted, tile was partially replaced on the museum floor, Maintenance area yard was graded and sewer pit at marina was put into operating condition.

Boat maintenance consisted of painting woodwork on MFG, installing life preserver racks and replacing waterpump on Chekika. Both Chekika and Prowler were serviced. A survey was made of the Prowler to determine needed repairs.

The Inter County Telephone Company complied with request to relocate phones from offices at Visitor Center to Campground and Shop. A line was also run into the shop office for remote radio hookup. Base radio station KIE 786 was repaired during the month.

Reports of boats hitting logs in Buttonwood Creek were received on tow occassions, and logs were removed from the creek.

Most of the filling and grading has been completed on the new trail from Motel to Picnic Ground.

Concessioner: Safety and Sanitary inspections revealed progress in housekeeping practices and sanitary conditions in the kitchen at Flamingo, but Service Station, Power House utility area and employee trailer Park were in very poor condition.


The Playmate VI, sightseeing boat, was out of service for repairs all month.

Jud Hird, Motel Manager, left the Everglades Park Company with often heard complaint of promises not kept.

The Everglades Park Company annual stock holders meeting was held at Flamingo.

Complaints: Several verbal complaints were voiced because of the abundance of mosquitoes, particularly in the evening.

Forest Fire Protection: Three nonstatistical fires were investigated. One occurred at Highland Point, one at Sandy Key and one at East Cape. No suppression action was taken.

Increase or Decrease in Travel

Several white ibis are now roosting at bird Key. Cormorants and Pelicans are now nesting there along with Louisiana Herons. One spoonbill was also seen there.

An apparent mating of porpoise was observed in Sunlar Bay on May 21.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service

Boat Patrol 1035 miles Automobile patrol 250 miles

Samples of blood found in a cabin on Turkey Key were sent in to the state lab for tests. The results showed blood was human, but investigation has turned up no foul play.

One two day patrol was made to Lostman's River. The District Ranger from Manrove, brought load of lumber for dock repairs. In afternoon a long patrol was made into the upper bays and down Broad River and then up Harney to Tarpon Bay where District Ranger Borman met me and we spent the night in that area checking for gator poachers. No activity was observed or heard.

Eight Boundary line signs were replaced with longer stakes.

An all night search was conducted on May 1 for Miss Sue Arnold who became lost in the islands near Indian Key Pass. Ranger Kasperik and several local people took part. Miss Arnold was found in Russell Pass around dawn by one of the local guides. She suffered no harm except for a few mosquito and sandfly bites.

Four evening trips were made to bird key to check on white ibis roosting there and to watch for shooting.

Mr. Carol Sehnert, a Miami photographer taking pictures for Holiday Magazine to illustrate an article on the Everglades, was taken on an all day trip to Watson place on Chatham River and back via Duck Rock.

A new fishing camp is being built on the Mary MacDougal tract on Chatham River. These men were contacted and the park rules explained to them. A check was made to see if this could be stopped, but due to this still being privately owned land we could not stop them.

Maintenance

All outboard motors were given regular monthly maintenance. The WFG and the Fibercraft were both pulled and the batteries cleaned.

The water pump went out on the Boston Boat. It was taken to shop for repairs. Boat is still not in service.

General

Weather Conditions: The weather during June was about normal, hot and humid, a typical summer in South Florida. A temperature of 90 degrees or higher was recorded at the Tamiami Ranger Station on 21 of the 30 days. Rainfall was scattered over the entire Park and came mostly as afternoon showers. The water table continued to rise slowly and the Taylor Slough gauge read 3.26 feet on June 30. This compares with 2.90 feet for May and 4.20 feet for June 1959.

Following is a weather summary for the Park:

Increase or Decrease in Travel: A total of 39,190 visitors entered the Park. This compares with 28,965 for June 1959 and is an increase of 35.3%. Of the visitors entering the Park, 26,139 came by motor vehicle and 13,051 by boat. All states except Nevada were represented. Visitors also came from three Canadian provinces, two U. S. territories, and the following foreign countries: England, France, Germany, Holland, Denmark, Sweden, Poland, Switzerland, Italy, Egypt, South Africa, New Zealand, Japan, Korea, Brazil, Chile, Peru, Uruguay, Australia, Nassau, and Cuba.

Special Activities: The Incentive Awards Committee held its monthly meeting at Flamingo. The Committee is attempting to rekindle interest in the awards program by holding meetings in various areas of the Park. Subdistrict Ranger Theodore Whitmoyer received a \$40.00 incentive award this month. The presentation was made by Superintendent Hamilton June 8

with members of the staff present.

Chief Ranger Nelson left for Glacier National Park to escort Florida's Governor LeRoy Collins and family at the Governors Conference.

Miscellaneous: Two surplus house trailers were delivered at Flamingo and will serve as employee residences. The trailers were secured from Camp Polk, Louisiana. One more is enroute.

A baby girl, Barbara Diana, was born June 29 to Student Landscape Architect John Andres and his wife, Harriott.

A special news release was issued reminding people of National Safe Boating Week, July 3 through 9.

Administration

Personnel: With the end of the fire season and the coming of hot weather, fire control aids left for cooler patches in western areas. Separations: David Foster, June 6 to Yellowstone; Roger Pfeifer, June 8 to Glacier; Richard Glass, June 9 to Yellowstone; William Brown, June 9 to Rocky Mountain; Robert Hawthorne, June 9 to Grand Teton; James Foster, June 28.

Furlough: Ralph Johnston, June 30.

Theodore Whitmoyer was on annual leave from June 13 through the end of the month.

Eugene J. Senat was selected from the register to fill the vacant ranger position at Everglades with reporting date June 16. On the seventh of June, he and his wife arrived at Everglades and were met by Ranger Kasperek, at which time he voiced the opinion that the housing was very poor. The next morning the Senats packed up and left the motel where they were staying. After he did not report for duty on the 16th, a telegram was sent requesting the reason. A letter was received June 20 stating that, because of poor housing in Everglades, he was declining the position.

The Health Benefit Plan was discussed with all ranger personnel and most took advantage of it by enrolling for one of the various options.

Safety and Health: The movie on Rescue Breathing was shown to all personnel available during the month.

Rangers aided in three boat rescues, all were caused by mechanical failure.

Two minor automobile accidents occurred and were investigated. No injuries were incurred.

Building Fire Protection: The annual building fire hazard inspection of concession and Service buildings was completed in June. The report on this inspection was prepared and submitted.

A one-day training session on fire truck operation was held for ranger, naturalist, and maintenance personnel at Flamingo.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Ranger personnel assisted the State police on two accidents on the Tamiami Trail, one involved a fatality. The ranger station at 40 Mile Bend, near the half-way point of the Tamiami Trail and the only building, is a natural reporting place for accidents and mishaps that occur all along the Trail. Often the ranger arrives at the scene of an accident and renders first aid long before the state police arrive. As traffic increases on this already busy highway, more demands are being placed on our personnel. The recently installed pay telephone at the Bend is aiding somewhat in reporting accidents to state authorities. However, our rangers cannot refuse a call for help or refuse to go to the scene of an accident on the Trail.

Subdistrict Ranger Winte spent a day with State Fishery Biologists tagging fish in the newly established Key Largo Coral Reef Preserve. The U. S. Public Health Service has been collecting mosquitoes in the Flamingo area. One collector with a load of recently captured live insects escaped near catastrophe by just barely outrunning the Flamingo mosquito fogger.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Three cases were heard before U. S. Commissioner Jordan during the month. One defendant was charged with reckless driving, speeding, driving while under the influence, and no valid driver's license. He was found guilty of reckless driving but other charges were dropped because of insufficient evidence. The fine was 30 days in jail suspended and suspension of driver's license for six month.

The second case was for unauthorized use of another's property. The defendant was found guilty and fined \$10.00.

The third defendant was charged with disturbance of wildlife and use of an illegal net. He was found guilty of the use of the illegal net with no sentence entered.

Three cases of vandalism occurred during the month. Two in the Royal Palm area and one at Flamingo.

The use of one of the U. S. D. A. houseboats was secured for the Duck Rock patrolman. The boat was towed from Miami and anchored near the big roost. Trips to the ~~Rock~~ by the Audubon Society started June 25.

Beginning on June 1, the Park Entrance Station was manned only on weekends.

Night patrols in the Gulf District were stepped up with reports of illegal acts occurring in the back country. Personnel spent twelve nights on boat patrol in an attempt to apprehend the violators.

Park Collaborator Frank Craighead reported that some of the very rare finger ferns (*Cheiroglossa palmata* (1) Presl) had been removed from Mahogany Hammock. Dr. Craighead reported the theft to Naturalist Christensen around the 20th of June. When the Chief Ranger's Office learned of it on the 24th, Dr. Craighead was contacted on the matter and he informed us that he had noticed that the ferns were gone on the 16th of June. He also said that he had been in the hammock a week or so before that and the ferns were still there. Not all of the plants were taken. Most of the young plants which might possibly be propagated were gone as well as a few of the older ones. This fern, as far as we know, is found only one other place and that is along the Turner River near the Tamiami Trail outside of the Park.

Concessioners

Considering the season of the year, business has been very good for the concessioner. Reduced rates at the motel have contributed greatly to

the increase. All departments, except sightseeing, which is off 40%, are doing better than last year.

Forest Fire Portection: Two fires occurred, one caused by lightning in the middle of the Shark Valley, the other by fishermen along the Tamiami Trail.

All fire control aids were terminated by the end of the month.

Aircraft Activities: Ten flights were made during the month totaling $22\frac{1}{2}$ hours and covering 2,150 miles. One flight was for orientation of Glades District Ranger; one for map "East Cape" fire; one for search for overdue Ranger boat; two routine patrol; one for photography; three for Great White Heron count, search for overdue visitor boat during part of one flight; and one flight to investigate ransom note. One flight terminated after dark.



The Royal Palm Sub-district Ranger accompanied Dr. McTaggart Cowan of the Univ. British Columbia, Mr. Tom Connochie and Mr. Robert Reed, photographers with the Canadian Broadcasting Corp., on a trip through the

park to orient them for making a 30 min. film to be part of a T.V. series on natural history called, "The Web of Life". Eventually the series might be shown on the A.B.C. T.V. network.

OPERATIONS

Protection and Ranger Service.

Glades District Ranger Martin Benham, who E.O.D. on May 30, was taken on orientation trips with the Chief Ranger and the Assistant Chief Ranger early in the month for familiarization of the district and its problems. He also took a flight over the district and an airboat trip thru the Tamiami Sub-district. Supervisory Fire Control Aid Guardipee instructed him in the operation of the fire equipment.

Beginning June 1, the park entrance station is being manned on weekends only. The orientational sign was re-erected at the station to aid visitors in locating points of interest.

Glades District Ranger Benham attended a court case with the Royal Palm sub-district Ranger on June 4. The case resulted from a violation in May. The defendant was found guilty of reckless driving and was given a 30 day jail sentence, suspended for 6 mos. and had his drivers license revoked.

Two violation notices were issued for excessive speed in the park.

Vandals pulled the face from the "All Plants - Wildlife Protected" sign near the park entrance, broke the outside light bulb at the entrance station, broke the hasp on the soft drink machine at Royal Palm Visitor's Center and stole some tools from the mower which was parked near the Mahogany Hammock turnoff, on the night of June 16.

Fire Cache Supervisor Guardipee spent June 11 in being shown the duties at the Tamiami Ranger Station in order for him to man the station during Ted Whitmoyer's vacation. Gunner went on duty at the station on June 30.

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Forest Fire Protection

A lightning strike started a fire, the "Middle Glade" fire, about 6 mi. so. of the 7 mi. fire tower on June 3. It was discovered on an air patrol and considered safe because it was surrounded by water. Ted Whitmoyer checked it out and found that it had burned itself out.

Both fire towers were closed for the season.

The Glades district ranger and the fire cache supervisor brought the Tamiami fire equipment to Pine Island on June 22, to be kept under cover until the winter fire season begins again.

A small roadside fire was extinguished at 11 mi. east of the Tamiami Station on June 12.





A trawling operation to secure juvenile sea trout in connection with life history studies of the species by the University of Miami Marine Lab. was personally observed by ranger personnel. The Marine Lab. catch and effort studies are scheduled to be continued through fiscal year 1961. Lab students were granted special permission to take catfish by trotline for scientific studies.

US Public Health Service cooperators have been in the District collecting mosquitoes. One quick thinking mosquito collector avoided a near catastrophe by outrunning the fogging truck at Flamingo. He had a load of collected (live) mosquitoes aboard.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: A commercial operator was arrested and tried in Commissioner's Court for violation of Park Rules and Regulations, Sec. 1.6 and 7.45 (8). He was found guilty of the charge having illegal nets. No sentence was imposed.

Two incidents of aircraft landing in the Park were observed. One pilot alibing engine trouble was contacted and issued a violation warning. The other pilot took off before the plane could be reached, but the number of the plane was secured.

Warning violations were written for reckless driving and taking of undersize fish.

A campsite appearing to be of a permanent nature was investigated on Manatee Key. Several mangrove trees had been cut at the site. Users of the camp have not yet been located.

Charter boat business has become quite popular. Everyone wants to get into the act. In addition to Watson and Sullivan former employees of the Everglades Park Company, Wendal Williams and Dick Lowry, have tried to finagle some way into the business other than required procedures. Both men were contacted and warned of consequences that would result from conducting a commercial operation without proper approval.

Several commercial fishermen were contacted and given copies of Park regulations. Three fishermen came into Flamingo from Sandy Key to "beer up". They were promptly dispatched back to Sandy Key.

A former Everglades Park Company employee reported the loss of a radio and some tools out of a house trailer he had left unattended at Flamingo. Missing items have not been recovered.

Four night road patrols and three night boat patrols were made. Total patrol mileage for the month was:

Maintenance: Several trips were made to the Gulf Coast District with men and supplies to rebuild and repair the Lostman's River Patrol Station.

Estimates were obtained from two boat yards on repairs to the Prowler patrol boat. Bottom was painted on Chekika, Osceola and Prowler.


A radio remote unit was installed at the Flamingo shop office. Radios were repaired on the Prowler and District Ranger quarters.

Electric refrigerator and stove were installed at the Cape Sable Subdistrict Ranger quarters. LP gas is no longer used there.

Concessioner. Considering the season of the year business has been very good for the concessioner. Reduced rates at the motel has contributed greatly to increased business. All departments benefit. The sightseeing department is the only one that is off, again by about 40 %.

Litigation on the rental houseboats that have been out of service for some time has apparently been settled. The houseboats were removed from Flamingo by the Moore Houseboat Corporation.

Power House supervisor Egan, long time employee of the Everglades Park Company, was discharged.

General

Weather Conditions

Several heavy rains occurred during month which brings us the start of the summer rainy season.

Increase or Decrease in Travel

There was a total of 8-17 persons in the park area as compared with 90-2 during May for a decrease of about 1%. There were 644 persons on sightseeing boat trips for an increase of 6% over May when only 351 persons went on trip. There was an increase in number of boats but a decrease in number of persons on boats which was due to only a few charter boats going out and a lot of week-end fishermen going out.

Administration

Personnel

Mr. Eugene Senat was to report for duty on June 16, he came to the Everglades area on June 7. After looking around the area for about two hours he spent the night and left next morning. No further word was received from him until he was sent a telegram to which he replied that the housing was not good enough for him.

Safety and Health

Two minor boat accidents occurred during June. Both involved the wash of one boat against another. In one which occurred near Pavilion Key, Deputy Sheriff Eric Wallin was called by party involved. In his report there was minor damage to one boat and no injury. The other involved sightseeing boat was a commercial fisherman passed too closely and ran over water over the passengers. On investigation it



was found that the commercial fisherman claimed he did not see boat. This could easily have been the case due to the location of the accident.

Building Fire Protection

Annual building fire inspection was made during June. Many deficient items were found which must be corrected.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal State or Local Agencies

The U.S.C.G. was taken to Indian Key Light for routine maintenance.

The National Audubon Warden, Jack Best is in the area and going to Fakahatchee Bay to watch a bird roost in that area. This of course is outside of the park and a gun permit was issued to Best.

General Publicity

Two articles appeared in Ft. Myers Press during June about the sight seeing boat tours.

A picture of rangers on patrol at Duck Rock appeared in the Saturday Evening Post.

Public Relations

Again many hours of personal contact were put in with the local people to further park neighbor relations.

Research and Observations

Dr. Craigie B. Park collaborator, spent one day in district points south of the high land areas. He found a plant which was a new record for the park on Ferguson River, Womaha's Tongue.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service

Boat Patrol 357 miles Auto Patrol 173 miles

Mr. Miller was added in taking levels of size of employee housing.

Two trips were made to Duck Rock to count bird flights and watch for shooting. About 1,000 white ibis, 200 spoonbills and many other birds are coming to Duck Rock. The Audubon Society started trips to Duck Rock on June 25th.

The last two rescues from the Gulf near Turtle Key. There were two from Sebring, Florida. They had ruined the vessel on their way-



board motor. It occurred just at dark and we were fortunate to see them on the way back from Duck Rock, the boat was towed in to Chokoloskee Island.

Two overnight and one day patrol was made to Lostman's River. Work was done on station and yard. Several keys and beaches were checked as well as commercial and sports fishermen.

On June 6 a search was started when it was thought he was lost in the vicinity of Broad River. Before search got underway it was found that he had become caught on a mud bank and came in three hours late.

An emergency message was relayed to party camped at Lostman's River via maintenance crew working there.

Seven night patrols were made to Bird Key in an effort to prevent shooting of birds. Three cases of bird shooting have occurred during June. Investigation showed that all were around noon which means that they were not shooting birds to eat, but for sport. It was determined that several boys from Chokoloskee Island had done the shooting, but no proof was gotten.

Signs were put up around Duck Rock closing area close to key to airport. Also three signs at Bird Key were reerected as they had been washed out by tides.

One night patrol was made to check on people who were turning turtles on outside keys. Two parties were contacted on beaches, but had no turtles. They were warned about sea turtles being protected and to get a permit before building fires on keys.

Another channel was marked to the outside from Chokoloskee Island by A.C. Hancock of Blue Heron Motel and Dock. It follows the real Rabbit Key pass from Chokoloskee Island and joins into channel marked by Browns. Also I talked to the U. S. C. G. about registering these markers and process has been started to do so.

On Monday June 26 I went to Miami to bring houseboat to Duck Rock. John Scudder towed boat around. We left Miami at 12 noon June 26 and arrived at Duck Rock at 12 noon on the 29th.

The Watson place on Chatham River was broken into during June. The place was left in quite a mess and a water pump was stolen. An inventory of property owned by Bradlock was taken.

Maintenance

The Barker Boat was put on Barker boat ways. The Barker was painted, new wheel installed and a generator repaired. Routine maintenance was given other boats and motors in district.

Maintenance crew repaired dock at Lostman's River. Stationed Tom

Subject: Monthly Narrative Report of Ranger Activities, July 1960

General

Weather Conditions: July started out dry and hot, with temperatures in the 90's daily occurrences. By the end of the month tropical storm Brenda cooled things off and brought welcome rains. Although the storm did not reach hurricane strength (62 mph in the Gulf District), considerable amounts of rain fell in the Park area. The water levels fell to a low of 2.70 at Taylor Slough before Brenda's rain raised it to 3.30. These levels compare with 3.26 for June 1960 and 3.65 for July of last year. Small craft warnings were displayed at Flamingo and Key Largo on two days during July.

Following is a weather summary for the Park:

Increase or Decrease in Travel: A total of 51,480 visitors entered the Park during July. This compares with 39,190 visitors for last month and 34,404 for July 1959. This is an increase of 17,076 or 49% over last July. All states except Delaware, Nevada, South Dakota, Vermont, and Wyoming were represented this month. Visitors from 21 foreign countries, one U. S. Territory, and six Canadian Provinces were also in the Park.

Special Activities: The F. B. I. Small Arms Pistol Course given at the Homestead Air Force Base was attended by the following Ranger personnel: Ass't. Chief Ranger Ralph Maxwell, District Ranger Martin Benham, Sub-district Ranger Paul Larson, and Subdistrict Ranger Robert Kasperek. Subdistrict Ranger Theodore Whitmoyer received a \$15.00 incentive award for a suggestion he submitted. The presentation took place in the Superintendent's office with members of the staff present.

Chief Ranger Richard Nelson returned from Glacier National Park where he had been escorting Florida's Governor LeRoy Collins during the recent Conference.

The Hurricane Warning Plan for Everglades National Park was revised and reissued during the month.

Miscellaneous: The thirty-seventh deer, a young buck, to be killed on the Park road since it was opened, was reported during July.

Administration

Personnel: Herbert Wolff received an appointment as GS-5 Park Ranger and reported for duty at Everglades July 27. He has been assigned to the Gulf District with headquarters at Everglades. Ranger Paul Larson accepted a promotion and transfer to Blue Ridge Parkway as a GS-8, Sub-district Ranger. His last day at work in Everglades was July 23 and he entered on duty at Roanoke July 27. Ranger James Arnott was notified that he was chosen to attend the National Park Service Training Center at Yosemite National Park, session to begin September 19.

Safety and Health: Several personal injuries occurred during the month; all were of extremely minor nature.

A quarterly inspection of emergency and first aid equipment was made and all minor defects corrected.

A new emergency Emerson resuscitator was received and sent to the Flamingo area. The Park now has two of these resuscitators, one located at Pine Island and the other at Flamingo. Instructions on the use of this instrument were given to those concerned.

Building Fire Protection: New fire fighting equipment for the Pine Island fire truck has been in the store room and will be checked out and mounted on the trucks as soon as possible.

A follow-up inspection of the building fire hazards report was made. Most corrections called for in the report have been accomplished.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Park Service equipment was used to read water gauging stations P-34, P-33, P-35, and P-38 during the month. These stations were turned over to the Geological Survey early last year. However, Rangers and Park Service equipment must be used to transport Survey men to the locations.

Protection personnel stationed at Forty Mile Bend assisted Florida Highway Patrol in handling several automobile accidents during the month. A Ranger also helped Dade County Sheriff's Office in the Miami Springs Police Department in returning three stolen bicycles to their proper owners.

Pennsylvania State University Geological Department is continuing its work in the Park after several months absence. They are working on peat deposits in and around the mouth of the Shark River.

The Research Team of the University of Miami made several trips to the Shark River Valley and Taylor Slough areas of the Park continuing their work there.

Miss Nancy VanMeter, formerly a seasonal Ranger Naturalist in the Park, is now on the staff of this Research Team.

OPERATIONS

Protection and Ranger Service: Because of lack of personnel the Entrance Station is now manned only on Sundays. This became necessary when Ranger Larson was transferred to Blue Ridge Parkway.

Three boys were cited to U. S. Commissioner Jordan and charged with entering a closed area. The Commissioner found each guilty and fined them \$10.00.

Three cases of vandalism were noted during the month; one at Paurotis Pond where garbage cans and picnic tables were thrown into the lake; the other two in the Royal Palm area where trash was strewn around.

A problem has developed at Coot Bay Pond, the site of the old ranger station, where "Shorty" the friendly alligator is causing "alligator jams." He spends most every day at the edge of the Pond attracting many visitors who insist on feeding ~~him~~ or throwing rocks at him.



Concessioners

The Everglades Park Company reports that business was good during July. All departments except sightseeing show a considerable increase over last year. The opposite is true for sightseeing at Everglades. An increase of 130% has been noted in this area.

Forest Fire Protection: One nonstatistical fire burned on Broad River Bay. About 50 acres of glades land were involved. No suppression action was taken.

The Regional Director requested three rangers from here be sent to Yellowstone National Park to fight fires. Saturday, July 23, Ralph Miele, Ralph Maxwell, and Ernie Borgman flew by commercial plane to Knoxville and were transported by the Air Force directly to Yellowstone from there.

Personnel:

Tamiami subdistrict personnel aided the Florida Highway Patrol in handling several auto accidents during the month.

Protection and Ranger Service:

Supervisory Park Ranger Ted Whitmoyer took 96 hrs of leave, and Supervisory Fire Control Aid Guardipee was on 72 hrs of leave.

Several night patrols were made early in the month in answer to anonymous phone calls received concerning deer poaching along Park roads--no irregularities were noted.

Some time was spent by the District Ranger in going over Master Plans and Mission 66 projects with Park Landscape Architect Rich Huber.

Also, in the line of further Park orientation, the writer accompanied Ranger Pilot Miele on a flight over the Park which took in the Cape Sable, Whitewater Bay and Harney-Broad River areas; later in the month the writer went with Tamiami Ranger Whitmoyer on an airboat trip to USGS stations P-35 and P-38 in the Shark River Valley and into the upper reaches of the Shark River drainage in the vicinity of Little Banana Patch.

The Tamiami Subdistrict was manned by Supervisory Fire Control Aid Guardipee during the first two weeks of the month. Whitmoyer returned from leave on July 18.

Routine boundary patrols were maintained throughout the month.

District Ranger Benham traveled to Tamiami R.S. on July 19 & 29.

Deer #37, a young buck, was hit and killed on the main Park road on July 19.

Beginning July 24 and until further notice the entrance station will be manned on Sundays only due to the current shortage of personnel in the Glades District.

Two Special Incident Reports were submitted this month, one involving 2 chickens found on the Gumbo Limbo Trail, the other on vandalism at the Royal Palm Visitor Center and entrance station area.

At the staff meeting on July 27 Supervisory Park Ranger Ted Whitmoyer received a \$15 incentive award for airboat trailer suggestions. This is the second award he has received in 2 months!

Boat Trips for Important People: Dr. Leonard C. Beadle, a Trustee of Uganda National Parks, was taken on a trip around Cape Sable and back to Flamingo through Whitewater Bay.

Miscellaneous: Irwin Winte and his family departed for Cape Cod and Nova Scotia for his annual leave.

Administration

Personnel: District Ranger Borgman was one of three Everglades Rangers going to Yellowstone National Park to work on forest fires there.

Ranger Arnott has been notified that he was chosen to attend the NPS Training Center at Yosemite National Park, beginning Sept. 19th.

Safety and Health: Several personal injuries occurred during the month; all were of a minor nature.

The Quarterly Inspection of Emergency and First Aid Equipment was made; the several minor deficiencies have been corrected.

The district hurricane warning plan was revised and forwarded to the Chief Ranger's Office to be included in the Park plan.

An emergency resuscitator was received, and practice sessions on its use were held.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation With Other State, Federal, or Local Agencies: The Pennsylvania State University Geology Department is continuing its work in the Park after several month's absence from the area.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Two warning violations were issued for excessive speed of boats, and two warning violations were also issued for automobiles exceeding the speed limit.

Three boys were cited to the U. S. Commissioner for entering a closed area (East Cape Sable Road). Each boy was found guilty and fined \$10.

The garbage cans and picnic table at Paurotis Pond were thrown into the pond by vandals.

Two boat rescues were accomplished in the Cape Sable area during the month.



The friendly alligator at Coot Bay Pond, "Shorty," has caused some "alligator jams" and visitor safety problems at Coot Bay Pond. He spends most of the day, especially on the weekends, at the edge of the pond, attracting many visitors who insist on feeding him.

The new "Float Plan" forms have been put into use at the boat ramp, and early indications are that they will be an improvement over the old forms.

Patrol mileages for the month are as follows:

Maintenance: All boats in the district have had work done on them as well as new equipment added to them. Special attention was paid to getting such things as horns, compasses, lights, and boat hooks in proper repair. Additional work needs to be done on the lights in all the boats.

Concessioner: The Everglades Park Company reports that business was good during July. However, fewer sightseeing passengers were carried as compared with last year; fewer sightseeing trips were made this month, also.

Complaints: Several verbal complaints have been received concerning the fact that the motel swimming pool can be used by motel guests only. Another verbal complaint regarding turning off the lights in the swimming pool has been remedied; the pool lights will remain on in spite of the fact that they draw insects.

Forest Fire Protection: The fire truck was re-painted, overhauled, and all equipment tested.

The 30-day follow-up inspection of building fire hazards was held, and considerable progress had been made in the thirty day period. More work needs to be done by the Everglades Park Company.

One non-statistical fire burned at Broad River Bay; about 50 acres of glades burned. No suppression action was taken.

General

Travel for July was down 3% from June. A total of 337 persons entered park in July as compared with 3517 in June. Sightseeing boat travel was way up, but charter boat and private boat parties were way down for the month.

Special Activities

Ranger Robert Kasparek attended fire arms training school at Homestead Air Base on July 12. Ranger Kasparek received the highest score obtained by Park Service personnel. He was rated as Sharp Shooter.

Personnel

Mr. Herbert A. Wolff, Jr. reported to Everglades on Sunday July 24th. He was officially placed on pay roll as G3-453-5, position No. 7 on July 28, 1960. This is a new position in the Gulf Coast District and is the first new position in the district, his duties will be primarily the protection of Duck Rock through the middle of October.



Interpretive Activities and Developments

General Publicity

Several articles and an editorial appeared in the Collier County News about the Gulf Coast District.

Research and Observations

Bird populations at Duck Rock are continuing to increase. An estimated 63,000 to 70,000 birds are roosting there at present. An excellent observation of three sea cows playing on a mud bar was made in Lopez River on July 24.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service

Patrol Milage Boat - 710 miles Car - 172 miles

A total of 16 night patrols were made during July. Four patrols were made to Bird Key and ten nights were spent at Duck Rock. One patrol was made to Bird Key in addition to check on night poaching of birds on the Key and to check on turtle hunters. Also a patrol to try to intercept a boat suspected of hunting was made.

Work was started on installation of new boundary corners. Six large posts were installed with aid of pump purchased for this purpose. Boards were painted and saved for sign backing material to use on posts.

The house boat at Duck Rock was cleaned and repaired for use. A window was replaced in houseboat.

Bird Key was shot by bird hunters on July 4. Apparently only 6 to 8 shots were fired and no serious damage was done. This is the only report of this activity during July.

Charles Rhinehart installed Gulf Coast District Radio on July 8th. The radio works well and is a welcome addition to the district.

Dr. Craigie did an area for two days. Ranger personnel accompanied him on one of these days.

Mr. Roy Ozier was given permit for use of Pelican Key on July 12th.

Training for Mr. Wolf, new ranger, was started on July 28th.

Maintenance

Routine maintenance was accomplished on all maintenance motors. Two new 15 H.P. outboards were installed on M.F.G. and other 15 H.P. motors were put on Fibercraft.

Concessioners

After several conferences with concessioners and by ranger person el
giving information for both trips on one day, the matter of giving
information has been settled. Both concessioners are getting along
nicely at present.

Boat trip passengers showed a big increase during July. This was an
increase of 130 % over June. With 1472 passengers in July as
compared with only 640 passengers in June.

Subject: Monthly Narrative Report of Ranger Activities, August 1960

General

Weather Conditions: August weather was about average with temperatures ranging up into the 90's. Tamiami with its 96 had the highest reading for the Park with Key Largo and Flamingo recording highs of only 92. Rain was generally good and well distributed over the Park, the only exception being Everglades which recorded only 2.28". Water levels in the glades area continue to rise with the gauge at Taylor Slough reading 3.50 by the end of the month. This was lower, however, than for August 1959 when the reading was 3.62.

Following is a weather summary for the Park:

Increase or Decrease in Travel: A total of 40,582 visitors entered the Park during August. This compares with 33,163 for August 1959 and is an increase of 7,419 or 22.3%. Use of concessioner facilities also increased with accommodations being furnished to 3,286 persons compared with 1,597 for 1959. This is an increase of 1,689 or 165.2% over last year. All states with the exception of Idaho and Wyoming were represented. Visitors from five Canadian Provinces, three U. S. Territories, and 24 foreign countries visited the Park during the month.

Miscellaneous: Dade County Fire Chief L. H. Greer retired effective the first of August. The Dade Fire Department under Chief Greer has aided the Park in suppressing many fires along the east boundary. The cooperation between the Park and Greer's organization has been excellent and during the early development of the Park, Chief Greer was called upon many times for counsel. He served with the Department for 20 years, the last 15 acting as its Chief.

Administration

Personnel: John C. O'Brien received an appointment as GS-5 Park Ranger and reported to headquarters on August 31 to enter on duty September 1. He will be assigned temporarily to the Royal Palm Subdistrict.

James D. Arnott left on the 28th enroute to Yosemite National Park where he will attend the National Park Service Training Center. Arnott will take two weeks annual leave before reporting at Yosemite on September 19. John W. Mills, Jr. entered on duty at Flamingo as boat maintenanceman and mechanic. He transferred from Fort Jefferson National Monument.

Safety and Health: On the night of August 13 a one car accident involving 6 teenagers occurred about one half mile inside the Park boundary on the main Park road. A sixteen-year-old girl was killed and three others in the car were injured.

Ranger personnel participated in five boat rescues, all made necessary because of engine failure or lack of fuel.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies: Protection personnel furnished transportation to the U. S. Coast Guard on one of their routine checks of the Indian Key Light. Park Rangers accompanied the U. S. Geological Survey personnel on a trip to P-37 gauging station. Although we are no longer required to read or maintain the water gauging stations in the Park, we do furnish transportation to the Geological Service for this purpose. Rangers furnished transportation and assistance to the Geological Survey in the installation of two new water flow recording stations in the Shark and Harney Rivers. The Service also installed a new tide gauge in the Flamingo area.

The U. S. Public Health Service inspected the sewage lagoons at Flamingo and seemed very well pleased with their operation.

The University of Pennsylvania completed their summer work on the geological and chemistry of peat soils in the Shark River drainage area. They hope to be back next summer to continue this research.

OPERATIONS

Protection and Ranger Service: Four cases were heard before U. S.

Commissioner Jordan during August. One was for disorderly conduct for which the defendant was fined two days in jail. Another was for disorderly conduct and operating a motor vehicle with no license.

The defendant was found guilty, deprived of her driver's license for three months and sentenced to two days in jail. The third case involved a concession employee charged with disorderly conduct. He was found guilty, fined \$25.00 and sentenced to one day in jail. The fourth case was for speeding. Defendant was found guilty and fined \$10.00.

The automobile accident which occurred August 13 is still under investigation. At this time no formal charges have been brought against the driver.

Night patrols in the Gulf District continued during the month. Twenty-four of such patrols were made; twenty-one were to Duck Rock; two to Bird Key; and one to check on a boat that was reported to have dead birds aboard. Four night patrols were made in the Tamiami District on reports of poaching in this area. A rush trip was made to the Homestead hospital by Subdistrict Ranger Whitehouse with an expectant mother. He had plenty of time to spare with the baby arriving eight minutes after the woman was

admitted.

Commercial trout fishing pressure remained pretty steady during most of the month, but dropped somewhat toward the end. With the opening of the Florida lobster season on the 15th, commercial trapping operations in the southern part of Florida Bay became numerous.

GENERALWeather:

Although rainfall was not heavy for this time of year, still, it exceeded last year's August rainfall by more than one inch at the Royal Palm location and by two and one-half inches at Tamiami. It brought the level at Taylor Slough up somewhat over that of a month ago.

Reports were submitted to the Chief Ranger's Office.

COOPERATIVE ACTIVITIES

Cooperation with other Federal, State, or Local Agencies:

Park Rangers Benham and Whitmoyer accompanied Ed Beaumont of the U.S.G.S. in to the P-37 gauging station via airplane on August 10. This was the writers first trip into this portion of the Glades District.

On August 31, the writer sat in on a meeting at the U.S.G.S. office at Dinner Key where Messrs. Beark (Univ. of Miami), Vick (Region 1, Park Ser.), and Hartwell (U.S.G.S.) discussed the U.S.Army Corps of Engineers proposed flood control project in Conservation District No 3. The project involves construction of facilities just north of the Park which could have a far-reaching affect upon the Park itself. No doubt we will all hear much more of this before very long.

INTERPRETIVE ACTIVITIES & DEVELOPMENT

Research and Observations:

The Tamiami Sub-district ranger accompanied Park Ranger Edwin White (Florida Bay Sub-District) into the 10-mile corner area of the Tamiami S-District in connection with the Snail Project. The trip was the 2nd into this area for Ranger Whitmoyer.

Cooperating Non-Governmental Agencies: (In addition to that on preceding Pg)

The University of Miami Research team made two trips into the Shark River Valley and two into the Taylor Slough area this month; Asst. Chief Ranger Maxwell and Supervisory Ranger Whitmoyer went along on the first Taylor Slough trip, August 6.

Sub-District Ranger Whitmoyer attended a Dade County Court session as a witness for a State Game Commission case; The defendant did not appear.

Ranger Whitmoyer aided several motorists along the Tamiami Trail, and a letter of appreciation was received from a law partner of Senator Smathers.

OPERATIONS

Protection and Ranger Service:

The entrance station returned to a Sat-Sun operating schedule as of August 6.

A Special Incident Report was submitted on the dead alligator found in the Royal Palm Visitor Center pond on August 5. Cause of death was determined to be a 22 bullet hole in the gator's head.

The writer attended only one staff meeting this month, that on Aug 10.

On August 10 Ranger Whitmoyer took the writer into the P-37 gauging station and along a portion of the southeast park boundary for further district orientation; two airboats were taken.

A serious one car accident occurred $\frac{1}{2}$ mile inside the east Park boundary along the main road on the night of August 13. The FBI and the U.S. District Attorney's office have been contacted on the case, which is still under investigation. (See Safety & Health)

The writer has accompanied Asst. Chief Ranger Maxwell on several trips into the Miami area (August 18, 24) in connection with the investigation of the above accident.

One Firearms Permit was issued during the month (Thomas J. Fenney)

The Barnes brothers began some burning activity in the Hole-in-the-Donut at month's end.

In the Tamiami Sub-district four night airboat trips were made; Whitmoyer also made the same number of trips to Miami to purchase material for the new airboat.

Maintenance:

Minor repairs were made to airboat #2301 and the engine received

The area just south of the Pine Island bar-be-cue "chickee" was cleared and made ready for the installation of more house trailers.

New drainage pipes were layed in the area adjacent to the entrance "chickee" and then covered with dirt and sand; a two foot square opening (grill type) abuts on the surface to allow for drainage off the top.

Maintenance crews have set up diesel oil and kerosene tanks in the area just west of the weather station in the Pine Island utility area; the regular pumps will be used for regular and hi-test gasoline only in the future.



Mr. Bill Mills entered on duty at Flamingo as Boat Mechanic and Maintenceman. Bill transfered from Fort Jefferson National Monument.

Safety and Health: One National Park Service employee was injured when a flying rock broke a lens of sun glasses worn by mower operator Tillman.

A letter received from a lady in Arkansas indicated a possible suite may be placed against the Everglades Park Company for an injury resulting from a fall on a wet floor in the Flamingo Gift Shop. This accident had never been reported to National Park Service Personnel.

A couple of catfish barbing injuries were investigated and reported.

Five boat rescues were made. All were necessary because of motor failure due to defective mechanism or lack of fuel. All parties were rescued without incident. Two searches were made for overdue boats that did not need assistance.

A four year old boy was reported missing by parents, but the boy was soon located after search began for him.

Building Fire Protection: The follow-up building fire hazard inspection reports were reviewed, and it was determined that another follow-up inspection will be necessary for Concessioner buildings at Flamingo.

A Building Fire Control Plan was revised ~~to~~ sent to the Chief Rangers Office for review. This plan is for building fire control in the Flamingo area.



Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with other Federal, State or Local Agencies: A US Geological Survey crew supervised by Engineer Leach installed two water flow recording stations in Shark and Harney Rivers. A tide gauge was also installed at Flamingo. Considerable assistance was given Mr. Leach to transport men and equipment.

Mr. Porges of the Public Health Service inspected the sewer lagoons at Flamingo and was very well pleased with their operation.

Cmdr. Barber, US Coast Guard, inspected concessioner sightseeing boats and also made a courtesy inspection of Park Service boats.

Dr. Spackman and Mr. Dolson of Pennsylvania State University completed their summer work on the geology and chemistry of peat soils in the Shark River drainage. They will be back next summer. Results and compilations of their findings to date will be supplied to Everglades National Park as well as some movies taken in connection with the project.

Interpretive Activities and Developments

Public Relations: The newly organized Florida Keys Outboard Club made two Sunday boat explorations into the Florida Bay section of the District. The Commodore in charge was contacted by Subdistrict Ranger Wint and helped to plan routes to see the area. Park rules and regulations were discussed and copies were distributed to members of the club.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Rangers Arnott and Whitehouse have been hard pressed to keep abreast of the Ranger workload. They were alone in the District the first part of the month. Subdistrict Ranger Wint's return from vacation relieved the pressure in the Florida Bay section of the District, but many hours of voluntary overtime were still required to handle many of the situations that arose.

Three arrests were made requiring subsequent jailing of the violators. Two drunken and disorderly women were jailed after creating a general disturbance at Flamingo. Each was sentenced to two days in jail. A Concessioner cook was jailed on the same charge and was fined \$25 by the US Commissioner.

One speeding case was tried in Commissioners court. A \$10 fine was collected.



A report of disturbance at the Marina was received after the group of four teenagers causing the disturbance had left the area. It was later learned these same four were involved in an accident at the Parachute Key Visitor Center, One sixteen year old girl was killed. Statements were taken from Marina employees regarding actions of the group at Flamingo.

Two suspicious acting teenage boys were checked out for possession of firearms or other illegal articles, but nothing could be found.

A rush trip was made to the hospital by Subdistrict Ranger Whitehouse with a lady about to have a baby. He made it in plenty of time; he had eight minutes to spare.

An abandoned boat in Harney River was investigated, and State conservation numbers were obtained from it. The Florida State Board of Conservation has been requested to furnish name of the owner.

Commercial trout fishing pressure remained pretty steady most of the month but dropped off towards the end. With the opening of the Florida Lobster (crawfish) season on the fifteenth commercial trap operations just outside the Park along the Florida Keys became numerous. Prices are high, and there are a lot of operators. Pressure has been heavy in the Park by skin divers and bully netters. Warning violations have been issued for taking of undersize crawfish and taking by illegal means. Eighteen stonecrab traps were found and destroyed off the mouth of Broad River. The "closed season" operator could not be located. A warning violation was issued for possession of two wire bait traps on a boat; one is allowed. One commercial mullet fisherman requested a permit to take black mullet for bait. The request was denied because of the regulation prohibiting sale of bait.

New registration forms were mimeographed for use at the campground registration desk and float plan sign-out at the boat launching ramp. Both seem to be an improvement over the old forms. Increased number of float plans logged is evident, and information requested has been supplied more accurately.

Subdistrict Ranger Winte was assigned to the Glades District one day on Checking Station duty.

Eight night road patrols and two night boat patrols were made. Total patrol mileages for the month were:

Maintenance: Three dragging operations were conducted in Buttonwood Creek in an attempt to find and remove submerged logs that have been hit by boats. As the banks wash out in this canal numerous trees, stumps, etc. find their way into the canal, and as most species of trees found here are very heavy they sink below the surface of the water and are carried back and forth by the current making them very hard to locate.



The new incinerator, a year old, has been put into operation. All garbage, including concessioner's, is now incinerated. NPS maintenance personnel are also collecting the concessioner's garbage.

All the new permanent signs along the Park road and at Flamingo have been erected except the ones at major intersections.

All ranger vehicles at Flamingo have been painted the new Park Service light green.

The boat dolly, under construction for some time, is now nearly completed and ready for use on the boat hoist at Flamingo.

Small turnout parking areas have been constructed at Coot Bay Pond and Mryzeks Pond.


Correct installation of the automotive hoist at the Flamingo shop has finally been made, and this unit is now ready for use.

Concessioner: Mr. Robert B. Knight and associates of the Everglades Park Company made a trip to Washington to secure approval for additional development at Flamingo. Refinancing by the Company has enabled them to plan for additional facilities.

Overall concessioner business is considerably better than a year ago. The sightseeing operation, however, continues to lag way behind in volume of business done compared to last year. Mechanical trouble with the boats and a complete absence of a dependable schedule are undoubtedly the principal reasons why this is so.

Complaints: Verbal complaints were received from a visitor when his car was hit by flying rocks from a mowing machine on the shoulder of the road. Several visitors complained because of inadequate service at the Coffee Shop.

The management of Everglades Park Company and several Company employees have voiced repeated complaints regarding the Don Sullivan charter boat operation. Reports indicate that Tommy Williams, former Everglades Park Company employee, may now be employed by Don Sullivan as a Charter Boat Captain at Flamingo.

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Increase or Decrease in Travel:

Travel for August was down by about 5% from last month. There were more boats entering the park this month, but fewer persons aboard. Also a contributing factor was the breakdown of the Ten Thousands Islands boat for the last half of the month.

The U.S.C.G. was taken to Indian Key Light for routine maintenance.



Interpretive Activities and Developments

General Publicity:

Two articles appeared in local papers. One was a write-up in the Collier County News of the arrival of Ranger Wolff and general district development. The other in the Fort Meyers Press concerned Roy Ozmer of Pelican Key.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service:

Patrol Mileage Boat 1350 Miles Car 175 Miles

Considerable time was spent on patrol to orient Ranger Wolff with the district.

Twenty-four night patrols were made during the month--twenty-one to Duck Rock, two to Bird Key, and one to check on boats reported to be bringing dead birds into the park.

Two one-day patrols were made to the Lostman's River Station. On one trip the floor and kitchen were painted. The trip made on the 24th was to investigate a reported break-in at the station. The tool shed had been broken into and 30 gallons of gasoline stolen from the dock.

Three boundary line corner posts were placed in Chokoloskee Bay and three intermediate line markers. Signs were placed on all new markers installed this month and last.

One verbal warning was issued to fishermen for having one snook slightly under-sized.

Assistance was given to one commercial fishing boat that was broken down.

The Duck Rock lifeboat was moved slightly to afford a better view of Duck Rock and to help avoid insects.

Rumors were relieved of deer being poached in the vicinity of Alligator Bay by hunters in airboats. The feasibility of making an airboat patrol of the area was discussed with the Glades District Ranger. But to date this has not been possible.

Maintenance:

Routine maintenance was accomplished on all boats and motors. In addition, a broken shaft was repaired on the Bohana boat and a pitching job done on a hole in the Fibercraft. The sedan delivery vehicle was taken to Homestead for painting and temporarily replaced with another vehicle.

Concessioners:

The Ten Thousand Island boat trip was canceled for the last half of the month due to motor break-down. The Mangrove Wilderness Trip was canceled for 2 days due to motor trouble. As a result, total boat trip passengers show a decrease. However, the Mangrove Wilderness trip increased by 13% and probably the total would have shown an increase if the Ten thousand Island trip had run all month.

Subject: Monthly Narrative Report of Ranger Activities - September, 1960

General

Weather Conditions: Weather in the form of hurricane Donna ~~hit the Park~~ and would-be hurricane Florence dominated the activities of the Protection Division during September. Donna hit the Park the night of 9/9 and the morning of the 10th. Some effect of the storm was felt over the entire Park. Donna came across the Keys then hit Florida Bay, Flamingo and thru the Gulf Coast and Everglades, ^{Florida} (City). Winds ranging from an estimated 125 at Pine Island to over 150 at Flamingo were felt. Flamingo experienced a barometer reading of 28.03", the lowest recorded in the Park. Weather records for other areas are not complete as the stations at Flamingo and Everglades were blown away and there is an interruption of five days at Key Largo. As if Donna were not enough tropical storm Florence hit the Park the following week ^{with} coming up to 6" of rain over the entire area. Thru Flamingo and Everglades this rain came as a mixed blessing helping ~~xx~~ to wash away some of the salty mud and silt deposited by Donna.

Following is a weather summary for the Park:

(Dee, see attached)

Water levels throughout the Park effected by the two storms continued to rise.

The gauge at Taylor Slough read 4.44' on 9/30. ^{considered w/ 4.12' for the gauge} This compares with 3.50' for ^{the gauge} ~~for~~ ^{in 1959} ~~Lostmans~~ and 4.12' for September 1959.

Increase or Decrease in Travel: A total of 23,012 visitors entered the Park during Sept. This is a decrease of 27% for the corresponding month in 1959 and the first decrease in visitation noted ^{for the} this year. It is agreed that Donna was the contributing factor in these figures. Persons from 38 states, two Canadian Provinces and 10 foreign countries ^{no persons} were represented.

Miscellaneous: A luncheon was held for Payroll Clerk, Joe Giordano, who resigned his position to return to his home in New York. The Park air plane was flown out of the area ahead of hurricane Donna the morning of the ^{8th} ~~5th~~ (?). The plan was to secure the plane in Ocala, Fla. However, as Donna moved across the state, it was necessary to fly on to Macan, Ga.

Administration

Personnel: After being delayed one week by hurricane Donna, District Ranger Benham left for annual leave on ^{9/22,} ~~9/19~~. A new Park Ranger, John O'Brien reported for duty 9/1. Mr. O'Brien has been assigned in the Glades District working in the Royal Palm Subdistrict. Supt. Park Ranger Robert Kasperak has been moved from the Gulf Coast District to the Glades District. During District Ranger Benham's absence he will act as District Ranger.

Health and Safety: After the hurricane all sources of drinking water in the Park were tested by the U. S. Public Health Service. In ^{all} every case ~~the~~ ^{was} ~~tested~~ out satisfactorily. ⁴ ~~for use~~

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with other Federal State or Local Agencies: Ranger Personnel have assisted the State Board of Conservation in locating and salvaging boats lost in Florida Bay as a result of the hurricane. Most of these boats belong to residents of the Florida Keys. U. S. Geological Survey inspected possible damage to their recently installed water level recording stations in the Shark and Harney Rivers. All of the stations survived with little or no damage and variable records of tidal flow were obtained during the storm. Records ~~of several~~ from several points in the Flamingo area show that tidal waters reached from 11.87 to 12.71' during the hurricane. U. S. Border Patrol has continued their frequent trips into the Park during the month.



Operations

Protection and Ranger Services: Ranger activities were geared to the protection of hurricane damaged areas in the Park. The Park road was closed ~~from~~ the Long Pine Key Campground to Flamingo for 5 days following the storm. On Sunday 9/11 visitors were allowed in the Flamingo area. However, a curfew was set up. The road was closed form 9:PM to 6 AM every night. Night patrols to maintain this curfew were maintained and during the first five days after the storm a 24 hr watch was kept on the road. ^{only} Two minor cases of vandalism were noted ~~during the month~~. Both occurred in the Royal P area of the Park. Patrol mileage was as follows:

GeneralWeather Conditions:

The main item of weather this month was Hurricane "Donna" which hit the park on the night of Friday, September 9 and the morning of September 10. It reached its fullest intensity between the hours of 1:00 a.m. to 4:00 a.m. Saturday morning in this district. Winds were estimated at close to 100 m.p.h.

Heavy rain associated with tropical storm "Florence" fell during the week following "Donna". Rain during the month has generally been good. Glades and much of the pine woods are under water. The water level at Taylor Slough is up considerably over last month. Comparative Taylor Slough readings:

Temperatures at Royal Palm were definitely cooler than at Tamiami although Tamiami had considerably more rainfall.

Increase or Decrease in Travel:

Travel was down 32% for both cars and visitors compared with last year. The hurricane probably had a good deal to do with this.

Miscellaneous:

As a result of "Donna", which spread disaster in most of the outlying areas of the park, there are some new residents in the Pine Island area.

Supervisory Ranger J. R. Whitehouse and his family are occupying quarters #35; Bob Kearny, Flamingo camp tender, and his wife are in #33; and Supervisory Ranger Bob Kasparek and his family are living in quarters #5.

Ralph Johnston, our fire control aid assigned to the 7-mile tower during the winter season, returned from his trip north just in time to meet "Donna". He is residing in his trailer at Pine Island.

Administration

Personnel:

Park Ranger Jack O'Brien reported for duty in the Glades District on September 1.

On September 14, Supervisory Ranger Bob Kasparek was re-assigned to the Glades District after having been evacuated by the hurricane from the Gulf Coast District.

Glades District Ranger Martin Benham and family went on annual leave Sept. 24 and will be away from the park until the latter part of next month. He took 40 hours annual leave during September. Supervisory Ranger Kasparek will serve as Acting District Ranger.

Safety and Health:

Subdistrict Ranger Whitmoyer took water samples from Pine Island, Royal Palm and Flamingo following the hurricane to be tested by the U. S. Public Health Service. All the water tested out O.K.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal State or Local Agencies:

The U. S. Border Patrol made frequent trips into the park during the month.

Many observations were made by Ranger Whitmoyer and F. C. A. Guardipee for the U. S. Weather Bureau during hurricane "Donna".

The USGS representative was taken to P-33 and P-34 for purposes of reading these stations.

The Tamiami Subdistrict Ranger assisted the Florida Highway Patrol in one major accident.

One trip was made into the Tamiami subdistrict by the University of Miami research team during the month.

Interpretive Activities and Development

Research and Observations:

Archie Jores was into the glades several times in connection with the snail project.

Two cases of vandalism occurred in the district during the month. During Labor Day weekend, the Royal Palm area received heavy vandalism. A potted palm was damaged, a program board pulled loose, a rock thrown through a jalousie window and soft-drink bottles broken. Two soft drink cases were thrown through the windows of the Entrance Station.

On September 24, a window screen on the entrance station was broken out and an attempt made to break through the Long Pine Key barrier. Since that time, the barrier has been attacked several times and several night patrols were made in unsuccessful attempts to apprehend violators.

Several motorists were given assistance by Subdistrict

Ranger Whitmoyer.

Two hitch-hikers and one domestic cat were removed from the park.

Much time was spent by Rangers Kasperek and O'Brien in getting acquainted with the district.

Hurricane "Donna" pre-actions consisted of making preparations as per instructions in the Park Hurricane Warning Plan.

Hurricane post-actions were as follows: A barrier gate was set up on the main park road at the Long Pine Key Campground turnoff on Saturday, Sept. 10, to control traffic in to the Flamingo area which had recieved heavy damage. Travel into the area was limited to Park Service and Everglades Park Co. personnel until the area had been secured from possible looting.

Night patrols and a night watch on this gate were maintained on Sept. 10-14, and a ranger was assigned to the gate during the daytime hours to check all vehicles going to Flamingo. Erwin Winte, Florida Bay Sub-district Ranger and Bob Kasperek, Supervisory Ranger from the Gulf Coast District assisted Glades District personnel with patrol and gate watch duties during this period.

The all night patrol was discontinued on Sept. 14 when a 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. schedule was set up; then this was cut to the regular 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. schedule on Sunday, Sept. 17 with the barrier gate remaining open during the day but being locked from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. each night.

The park was officially reopened to the public on Sunday, Sept. 17, with the entrance station being manned that day.

Fire Protection:

Work has started on equipping the fire truck, but is proceeding rather slowly.

Hurricane "Donna" Damage to the Glades District:

Damage in the Glades District resulting from the storm was light compared to that in the other two districts, though the natural features, particularly the hammocks, suffered extensive damage in the form of windthrown trees and broken-off tree trunks. The following is a summary of damage to natural features of areas observed in the Glades District:

Mahogany Hammock probably took as severe a beating as any hammock in the district. The boardwalk here is now completely impassable because of the heavy blowdown in the hammock; windthrown trees cover the area and many of the large mahogany trees have been uprooted or snapped off along their trunks. The smaller species of hardwoods seem to have withstood the strong winds better; it is not possible to assess the damage to the smaller plants and ferns, etc. but later studies will doubtless give us some of the answers.

Many of the other hammocks in the district probably fared no better than Mahogany; doubtless the smaller hammocks suffered from windthrow, and those protected by the windbreak of Long Pine Key also less. Practically all the hardwoods in every hammock seem to have lost all their leaves; each hammock has a brown, devastated look.

One of the Royal Palms at the Royal Palm area was blown over, and the Gumbo Limbo Trail h&c's become impassible as a result of "Donna"; hammocks in this area fared a little better than those further west, but damage was still considerable.

At Pine Island windthrown trees and broken limbs comprised most of the damage, which could be considered light for this area. Some of the trees can be replanted or reset, so are not lost to the area.

The damage to the physical facilities in the district was as follows: The facilities at Pine Island suffered little damage from the storm; it is felt that the pine trees here served as an effective windbreak and reduced the danger somewhat of the high winds. Water levels at Pine Island were never critical, and the area seemed to get no wetter than it would in a local cloudburst, though water flowed over the approach road to the area in several spots for a little more than a week.

The electric power and telephone at Pine Island went out about 11:00 p.m. Friday night, Sept. 9. It was not restored to service until 6 days later, as crews were busy all over following the storm.

The new Park Headquarters and Visitor Center buildings came through the hurricane in good shape; one small cinder-block section of wall under the main roof of the Visitor Center gave way. However, this did not affect the rest of the building.

No damage was suffered at Royal Palm Visitor Center, the Long Pine Key Lookout, or the Trails at Anhinga, Pinelands, or Pahayokee.

During the height of the hurricane high water levels in the glades along the main park road deposited debris in long piles for miles along the road, but there was no damage to roads.

Damage to the Tamiami Subdistrict was limited to severe tree damage, loss of the radio tower and associated Weather Bureau instruments, loss of half the generator roof, and broken sash and windows in the bunkhouse. The patrol station at Coffee Pot Hammock had some slight roof damage, while the outhouse at Seven-Mile Tower was uprooted.



Subject: Monthly Narrative Report, Mangrove District, for September, 1960

General

Weather Conditions: Hurricane "Donna" swept across Florida Bay, smashed into Flamingo and continued on up the West Coast. Weather instruments were destroyed by the storm and observations at Flamingo could not be made after the 9 th. Another tropical disturbance followed "Donna" and dumped a considerable amount of rain. The greatest amount of precipitation ever recorded for any particular month was reported at Miami. Unfortunately records are not complete for Key Largo or Flamingo. Weather instruments were replaced at Key Largo, and only five days observations were not obtained. Insufficient observations were made at Flamingo to complete a monthly weather summary.

Increase or Decrease in Travel: The road to Flamingo was closed for ^{eight} ~~nine~~ days due to the hurricane and accounted for a reduction in travel to about one third of normal. Boat travel was correspondingly reduced because of the adverse weather conditions.

The Calusa Outboard Club of Fort Meyers rendezvoused at Flamingo with 24 boats the first weekend of the month.

Administration

Safety and Health: One minor personal injury was investigated; an emergency trip was made to the hospital in Homestead with a lady suffering from an acute anti biotic reaction and one Concessioner employee was hospitalized with an allergy reaction to acid contaminated mud deposited over the Flamingo area by the hurricane.

A boat capsized and was lost by a visitor. Attempts to locate and salvage it were unsuccessful. "Donna" finally deposited it far back in the mangroves behind Middle Cape.

Mr. Arthur Erwin of Islamorada rode out the hurricane in Florida Bay on his disabled boat and was not located until four days after the storm at Roscoe Key where his boat had become grounded. Mr. Erwin was the only known person in the District to have suffered any major discomfort from the hurricane.

Several people with boats sought protection from the storm in the back country waterways.

Cooperative Activities: Almost all of Supervisory Ranger Winte's time since the storm has been spent with officers of the State Board of Conservation locating and salvaging boats in Florida Bay lost by Keys residents.

US Geological Survey Engineers inspected damage to their water level recording stations in the District. All survived with little damage, and valuable records were obtained. Elevations of several high water marks at Flamingo were determined to range from plus 11.37 to 12.71 feet.

Supervisory Ranger Winte assisted local agencies on the Upper Keys immediately after the storm to restore order and help hurricane victims.


Operations

Maintenance:

Protection and Ranger Service: Almost all operations have been concerned with preparations for the hurricane and subsequent cleaning up and salvage. Slow progress has been made on the tremendous job to be done with the limited manpower available. The first reconstruction project has been the beginning of a new roof on the Visitor Center.

^{tent} Overnight camping at Long Pine Key is still light with 45 campers and 21 persons in trailers for a total of 66 campers.

Eight states, Arizona, Hawaii, Idaho, Maine, Nevada, N. Dakota, Oklahoma, and Wyoming were not represented this month. There were 14 foreign countries, 2 U. S. territories and 4 Canadian Provinces represented in the park.

Miscellaneous:

Saul Schiffman, roving seasonal naturalist, is the first member of the seasonal staff that has taken up residence at Pine Island. Temporarily, he is quartered in the bunkhouse.

Administration

Personnel:

All Park Headquarters personnel vacated the old Homestead office building and moved into the new headquarters offices at Parachute Key early in the month; also the Park Engineer moved out of the shop office to the new building at about the same time.

District Ranger Benham and family returned from annual leave on October 20. He was on 120 hours leave during the month.

Safety and Health:

Mark A. Davis, Boy Scout, took sick ~~from asthma~~ at Royal Palm on Oct. 15. His father was notified and came in to take him out.

Fire Prevention Week (Oct. 9-15) was observed in the Glades District by the display of posters pointing up fire safety, placed at strategic spots throughout the district. On Oct. 12, a demonstration on fire extinguisher use was given to some of the park wives.

Building Fire Protection:

Mechanical difficulties in the pumping system of the fire truck have prevented its being put into service by this date. Supervisory Fire Control Aid Guardipee and Shop Foreman Parker have been giving time to this project.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies:

Two trips were made by the University of Miami into the Shark River valley and two trips into the Taylor Slough area.

The U. S. Weather Bureau repair man checked remaining station weather equipment at Tamiami and sent a new thermometer box to be installed, replacing the old one.

The Tamiami subdistrict ranger was summoned to appear before a Dade County Court as a witness in a State deer poaching case, but the defendant did not appear.

Several auto accidents during the month were attended by the Tamiami subdistrict ranger and first aid was administered pending arrival of State Highway patrolmen.

Various parking and storage facilities at Tamiami have been extended to U. S. Corps of Engineers property while the survey work along the Tamiami Trail continues. This courtesy has been violated to some extent by carelessness on the part of the Corps personnel. In addition, a discouraging amount of trespass into park lands by unauthorized glades buggy travel resulted in high level contacts with the Corps to lay out Park policy. A Special Use Permit was issued them on Oct. 31.

On October 6, Acting District Ranger Kasperek went in to stations P-37 and P-38 via airboat, with Ranger Whitmoyer and the U.S.G.S. man.

Dr. Reark of the University of Miami Research Team and his assistants were in the Royal Palm subdistrict on Oct. 1 and 8 in connection with their aquatic studies.

Interpretive Activities and Developments

Interpretive Facilities:

The boardwalk at Mahogany Hammock and the Gumbo Limbo Trail at Royal Palm were cleared of down trees and debris resulting from hurricane "Donna". Both trails are now open again to the public.

Deer #38 was hit and killed on the main park road about 1/4 miles southwest of the Pa-hay-okee turnoff on October 1.

On October 5, the Glades District Ranger's office was moved from the west end of the Fire-Cache building to the larger office in the shop building. Glades ranger personnel are now sharing this office with Graham Liles, Maintenance Supervisor. Supervisory Fire Control Aid Guardipee moved his office out of the Fire Cache into the office formerly occupied by ranger personnel.

Acting District Ranger Kasperek and Park Ranger O'Brien have been doing night patrol work over weekends throughout the month to keep vandalism down and as a check on any illegal activities. Several minor cases were handled with written warnings.

About the middle of the month the house trailers, which had been moved into Long Pine Key Campground prior to the hurricane, were taken back to the Flamingo area.

On Oct. 16, Ranger Kasperek pulled a car out of the ditch 1 1/2 miles below Sisal Hammock. Apparently the driver, Mr. Arne Herman Johansen (1520 N. 25th Ave., Hollywood, Fla.) had swerved to miss a bird on the road and ended up in the ditch. There was no damage to car or driver.

Glades ranger personnel posted the Long Pine Key Road and

the boundary west beyond Iori's camp on Oct. 24-25 in anticipation of deer hunting season which begins next month.

A start was made on taking inventory of equipment in the Royal Palm Sub-District at month's end.

The Tamiami Sub-district Ranger made three late airboat patrols during the month. Ranger O'Brien went along on one of them.

Ranger Whitmoyer made several trips to Miami in order to conclude purchases for the new airboat. Mr. Peterson has finished the welding of the trailer frame and sides, bulkhead and stern are being shaped.

A 12-ton load of fill was distributed at the Tamiami station. High water has forced the use of boardwalks around the grounds.

The Tamiami Subdistrict Ranger installed a two-way radio in airboat 11-2301. Tests in communication proved to be highly successful throughout the subdistrict.

Three Burning Permits were issued in October--2 to a Scout group and 1 to the Barnes brothers.

General

Weather Conditions: Mild weather characterized by many warm sunny days prevailed. Rainfall amounted to a little above normal occurring mostly in intense showers. This rainfall resulted in a massed mosquito invasion, the first major concentration since the hurricane.

Small craft warnings were ordered the last day of the month but could not be displayed at Flamingo because of hurricane damage to the flagpole.

Increase or Decrease in Travel: Boat travel originating from the Keys increased considerably over last month and 38% over the same period last year. Fishermen have apparently been trying to make up for time lost because of the hurricane last month. Fishing is beginning to improve. All types of travel at Flamingo continue to be much below normal due to the complete lack of facilities for visitors.

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Special Activities: An exhaustive survey of equipment lost and damaged during hurricane Donna was completed for review by the Park Board of Survey.

A possible boat route through East Cape Canal to the back side of Cape Sable beach was scouted out and determined to be feasible for a small skiff. Several hundred yards of dredging would be necessary before larger sightseeing craft could navigate a shallow creek that terminates approximately 200 yards behind the beach.

Boat Trips for Important People: Supervisory Ranger Whitehouse and Park Pilot Miele escorted a party of State Department guests to Oyster Key and Snake Bight. A tremendous show of white pelicans and other bird life impressed the party very favorably.

Miscellaneous: A contract was awarded for purchase of a new house trailer to be used as residence for Ranger Whitehouse who lost his former home in the hurricane.

Ranger Whitehouse and Caretaker Kearney submitted inventories and costs of personal property lost in hurricane Donna.

Administration

Personnel: Mr. Nyles Lyter entered on duty in the district the 24th as caretaker.

Safety and Health: A family of five overdue at Jewfish Creek Fishing Camp spent the night in Blackwater Sound. They were located by Coast Guard copter and rescued by Ranger Winte.

The body of Mrs. "Buck" Grundy was found on Club Key in Florida Bay by Ranger Winte. Mrs Grundy was a victim of hurricane Donna. Her body was identified by Coroner Rawlins of Monroe County, Florida. Mr. Jack Watson, US Fish and Wildlife Agent and officers of the Monroe County Sheriff's Office assisted in removing the body to Tavernier. Mr. Grundy is a prominent realtor residing on Lower Matecumbe Key.

Search by plane and boat was made when Capt. Lou Watson and his charter party failed to return to port. They were located and Don Sullivan, owner of the boat, went to the rescue.

Alternate septic tank sewer installations were put into use at all Flamingo facilities possible until the primary sewer system can be reactivated.

A three mile per hour speed limit sign was reerected at the Flamingo boat basins in an effort to curb speeding of boats in the congested area.

Areas of construction at Flamingo were closed to public use as a personal injury preventative measure.



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The quarterly inspection of emergency and first aid equipment in the district was made, and items lost or used during and after the hurricane are being replaced as quickly as they can be obtained.

The emergence of mosquito masses necessitated the reactivation of mosquito fogging operations the last part of the month.

Building Fire Protection: Inspection and operation of the Flamingo Fire Truck was accomplished. Two new fire extinguishers were secured from Pine Island to replace damaged ones on boats.

/ A small fire (contractor's tar pot) was investigated and reported.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with other Federal State or Local Agencies: Supervisory Ranger Winte has spent considerable time in cooperation with agents of the State Board of Conservation retrieving boats lost in Florida Bay during hurricane Donna. The boats were returned to owners on the Keys as they were retrieved. This valuable public relations service has been publicized in the local papers.

Two boat trips were made to Shark and Harney Rivers with Engineer Leach and men and equipment of the US Geological Survey to record water flow data.

A special use permit was issued to Lorac Service Corporation to erect radio tower and equipment near the water stand pipe at Flamingo. This equipment is used in connection with locating prospective oil well sites in the Gulf of Mexico.

US Coast Guard craft have been in and out of the District all month making repairs to aids to navigation.

The US Weather Bureau has supplied complete replacements of weather recording instruments and equipment for the weather station at Flamingo. This equipment has been in use most of the month.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: Preoccupation with restoration projects at Flamingo and liaison with contractors left little time for usual ranger activities. Three verbal warnings were issued for speeding on the Park road, and a fisherman was warned not to use set lines. Several persons were warned regarding boat speed in the basins at Flamingo.

Commercial fishing has been restricted almost entirely to pompano fishing off Cape Sable. Stone crab operations began after the season's opening.



and some fair catches have been made off the Gulf Coast but catches in Florida Bay have been very light. Seventeen permits have been issued to date.

The Duck Rock floating Ranger Station was moved to Flamingo for a paint job before this houseboat is returned to the Department of Agriculture. It was borrowed for the summer season.

Two concessioner employees suspected of illicit sexual relations were contacted and advised to abide by accepted social custom in such matters. They forthwith left the area.

Capt. Lou Watson and Don Sullivan continue to operate chartering service at Flamingo, although Sullivan does not now keep his boat at Flamingo but trailers it down for each charter party. Mr. Watson has concentrated more on guiding service aboard private boats in the last month.

Several night and late evening patrols were made. Patrol mileages for the month were:

Maintenance: The principal maintenance activities continued to be concerned with clean-up and post hurricane restoration at Flamingo. At least temporary restoration of all utilities have been made. Road shoulders have been cleaned of debris; building sites have been prepared for reconstruction by contractors; some debris has been cleaned from primary waterways; trees have been replanted; the mangrove trail was opened and the never ending battle with Flamingo mud continues to be waged. A trip was made to Lostman's River Patrol Station to repair the roof there.

All boats except the Frowler have been reconditioned and will be back in top notch condition when the CHEKIKI, the last one to be finished, is returned from Martin Boats, Inc. The Frowler will be surveyed.

Park Service and concessioner contractors have begun work on several projects. Reconstruction of the NPS Visitor Center is complete except for a small amount of electrical work and painting. The floor and ceiling have yet to be replaced in the museum. A contract has been awarded for reconstruction of the remainder of Park Service facilities at Flamingo.

Electrical and painting contractors have moved house trailer residences into the utility area for the duration of their contracts.

Concessioners: The Everglades Park Company and their insurance company have evidently arrived at a satisfactory settlement, and the concessioner is now concentrating all efforts on rebuilding facilities at Flamingo damaged by hurricane Donna. All will be restored to their original condition except the marina. Some modifications and remodeling are planned there. Work has begun on the Motel, Visitor Center, Service Station and Marina. A sixty day completion date was specified with the awarding of the contract.



A hurricane sometimes with the wind. The old Company bridge sitting on the canal bank for these past many years was reported to have collapsed into a conflagration and it burned to the ground. Some say it may have been due to delayed action from a lightning bolt out of hurricane Donna.

The International Tank Company employee force has been reduced to a skeleton force until operations resume again. No concessioner business was transacted during the month.

Complaints: Several verbal complaints were received. Two principal causes were prominent. Some people complained that they were let in before Flamingo was completely flattened by the hurricane. They thought it a gross misrepresentation to think that a few buildings actually survived structurally unchanged. Others complained they were not advised that weather facilities were not available at Flamingo. A sign stating that no facilities are available is posted at the entrance to the Park.

General

Weather Conditions: Summer ended with the first week in the month, thereafter near perfect fall weather prevailed. A high of 89 degrees and a low of 57 degrees were recorded in the Park. Rainfall was comparatively light, and fell during the first week of the month. Water levels at Taylor Slough fell ~~rapidly~~ rapidly, and read 3.87 feet by November 30. This compares with 4.16 feet and 4.21 feet for November 1959. Most of the pinelands are now ~~dry~~ dry and farming activities along the east boundary ^{are} in full swing. Small craft ~~w~~ warnings were not displayed by any of the stations during the month.

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Health and Safety: Protection personnel were alerted for overdue or stranded boats on six occasions. Operation, Protection and Ranger Service:

Rangers Winte and Whitmoyer exchanged jobs., with Ranger Winte and family moving to 40-Mile Bend Ranger Station and the Whitmoyses occupying the Key Largo Station. Deer hunting season opened the 19th of the month. Patrol activity has been stepped up to meet the increasing hunting pressure along the Park boundaries. A total of 154 permits were issued to carry firearms across Park land to privately owned land in the Hole in the Doughnut and 8 permits were issued to haul glades buggies and airboats across park lands. The Park Entrance Station remained open during the first week of the season from 4 a.m. until 9 p.m. Night patrol both in the Royal Palm and Tamiami areas contacted many hunters. Six men were taken before the U. S. Commissioners court and charged with the possession of ~~wildfire~~ firearms in the Park. The Commissioner found one man guilty suspended the fine and the other five not guilty. Even though the men were found hunting in the Park the Commissioner felt there was "no intent" hence the decision of "not guilty." Patrol mileage for the month ~~xxxxx~~ was as follows:

On Friday Messrs. John B. Cabot, Supervising Architect, and John C. Lamb, General Supervising Architect arrived to estimate storm damage at Flamingo in Everglades National Park. On Monday they were joined by Ross F. Sweeny, Supervising General Engineer. Each of these three men are from the Eastern Office, Division of Design and Construction, National Park Service, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

They have inspected the damage done by the hurricane at both Flamingo and Everglades, Fla. and will aid Superintendent Warren F. Hamilton in the technical planning for the rebuilding.

It is anticipated that most of the visitor use areas and facilities will be back in operation for the coming winter season although some may be operating on only a limited basis.

With the main Park road open all the way to Flamingo, and personnel on duty daily at the Royal Palm Visitor Center, it is felt a good beginning has been made for all possible use of the Park by visitors now in Florida, and all speed possible is being put into rebuilding plans for the more heavily damaged portions with an eye toward full winter visitor use.

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The early trips are taken into the Snake Bight area where the bird show is ~~not~~ quite spectacular. Later they hope to again operate in the old Homestead Canal making the trip by boat to 'Gater lake.

The District Ranger attended a Board-of-Survey meeting on November 2nd and a Sign Committee meeting on the 7th.

On November 6, Rangers O'Brien and Whitmoyer rescued a fishing party of Lewis Means and W. Randell whose airboat had sunk in Big Boy Lake. The men were forced to stay in the glades(mangroves) over night.

Several airboat patrols were made in the Tamiami sub-district, including 7 night patrols. Several hunters in airboats and weasels were contacted near the Park boundary. Four warning citations were issued to hunters in the Tamiami area. Two of these violators had been apprehended by State Wildlife Officer Carter.

Hunting season began on November 19. The entrance station was manned during early morning hours on weekends. Hunting and fire patrols were made in the Hole-in-the-Donut. 154 persons were issued 149 permits to carry firearms across park land into the Hole. 8 glades buggy and airboat permits were issued for the same purpose. Estimated number of deer killed during the first 11 days of the season would be 12-15.

Mr. Douglas Sunday was arrested for possession of firearms in the Park on November 20. He appeared before the U.S. Commissioner on November 21, was found guilty and sentence suspended.

On November 26 Philip H. Bannister, Mike Vollmer, Henry Bush and James Archer Smith III were apprehended on park property with firearms in their possession. On November 29 the Commissioner found them not guilty by reason of "no intent to break the law".

Park Ranger O'Brien was assigned to the Tamiami Sub-district on November 18 to assist Erwin Winte during the hunting season in that area.

The Annual Fire School and Administrative Conference was held in the Glades District November 14-18. Personnel from all districts in the Park participated, as well as representatives from the Regional and Washington offices.

At Long Pine Key Campground numbers were painted at each campsite during the month to facilitate operations and campground counting.

Fire roads in the controlled burning area were cleared of fallen trees by month's end.

Forest Fire Protection:

The Long Pine Key Tower was manned on November 24. On that day also the East Boundary and Long Pine Key patrols began.



Protection and Ranger Service: Two written warnings and several verbal warnings were issued for entering a closed area. All violators were prospective campers at the now closed Flamingo Campground.

Several road patrols were made to Nine Mile Bend to check on fishing activity there and to curb littering of the roadside by the fishermen.

Many boat owners on the Keys are still inquiring about boats lost during hurricane Donna. Some claim foul play on the part of salvagers immediately after the storm.

Several inquiries have been made to determine legal ownership of the vessel LIL II sunk in boat basin # 2 at Flamingo during hurricane Donna. This boat must be removed before repairs can be made to the pier it is tied to and before the basin can be redredged.

Visitors have not been able to get gasoline at Flamingo, and calls to help motorists and boaters out of gas have increased considerably because of it.

Permission was granted Gilbert's Fish Camp to trim mangroves along highway # 1 in accordance with previous restrictions imposed for clearing of right away.

Firerange permits were issued at the Key Largo Ranger Station several times the first week of hunting season. They were issued to Keys hunters who hunt in the hole-in-the-donut.

Maintenance: The principal activities of the maintenance personnel at Flamingo continue to be concerned with restoration of facilities to pre-hurricane condition. Tables, benches and fire places at the campground have all been replaced. Some of the mounds in the campground have been reduced in elevation and the garbage can racks have been repaired. Six house trailers have been moved into the NPS Trailer Park and hooked up to utilities. Remote control radio sets were rigged, but lack of power has prevented completion of the job.



Avant Construction Company began work on restoration of restrooms in Campground and Picnic Ground, equipment storage building and shop at Flamingo. The boat ramp shelter is also part of their contract.

Painters, plasterers, carpenters, window men and floor men have progressed slowly but by the end of the month were nearly complete at the Visitor Center. Water soaked walls necessitated halting of work by painters several times.

Several contractors have been in the area preparing bids on painting flagpoles, painting water tank, replacing gas tanks, dredging boat basins and Flamingo Channel, etc.

John Scudder contracted to haul a barge load of supplies to Lostman's River and a four man crew began work on restoration of the station and dock.

Bear Lake and Snake Bight roads were cleared of debris.

Water heaters and a wash machine were installed at the on-job quarters.

Concessioner: The National Audubon Society began winter operations in the Park ~~xxx~~ with two trips a week to Snake Bight.

Good progress has been made by contractors restoring concessioner facilities, and a target date of December 15 has been set for completion.

No facilities what so ever have been offered to the public by the concessioner.

Inter County Telephone Company has begun restoration of telephone communication at Flamingo.

GeneralWeather Conditions

The near-perfect weather of the month was marred only slightly by ~~our~~ ^{winter} first cool spell of the year. Temperatures dropped to a low of 38 degrees at Royal Palm and reached a high of 85 degrees at the same station. Small craft warnings were displayed ^{by} four days during the month.

Rainfall was light ^{wind} and water levels in the Pine Land and Taylor Slough areas where falling rapidly by the end of the month. The gauge at Taylor Slough read 3.00 feet as compared with November's reading of 3.87 feet and a reading of 3.35 feet for December 1959.

Farming on the higher Glade lands along the East Boundary and ~~The~~ "Hole-In- The-Donought" followed the receding water. To date the weather for tomatoes, beans, and squash has been ideal, and if it continues it would appear that by the end of February all cleared land in the area will be under cultivation.

Increase and ~~Decrease~~ in Travel

For the fourth consecutive month visitation to Everglades National Park dropped slightly. A total of 48,852 visitors entered the Park during the month, ~~this~~ ^{ed} is a decrease of about 1% over December 1959 (53,836). Travel for the year however, reached a new high of 579,215 persons. This compares with 1959's total of 500,193 visitors and is an increase of 16%.

Travel started out slowly, ^{ed} increasing at a rapid rate, ^{and} reaching a high during Christmas week. Flamingo concessions opened ^{ed} for the first time after Hurricane "Donna" on the 15th. By the end of the month over night accommodations made available by the company were filled to capacity. Camping in the Park held at a high level, ^{ed} and ^{ed} with the Flamingo Camp-ground still closed the Long Pine Key area was taxed beyond its greatest capacity. Several nights the over-flow camping area included ^{more} ~~or~~ camping groups than ^{ed} the main grounds.

Safety And Health:

Sub-district Ranger Kasperek attended a Safety Committee meeting on Dec 23 in place of the district ranger. An inspection of the new Headquarters Visitor Center, entrance station area, and Flamingo area was made

New traffic control signs have been placed in the new visitor center area to facilitate the movement of vehicles over the new network of side roads here.

Fire Control Aid Dan Angel has improvised several wooden traction splints for use in the Glades District patrol vehicles. They should be a good substitute for the standard type traction splint, of which we have none.

Christmas morning was marred in the park by a serious one-car accident which occurred about 1 mile south of the Flamingo water-pumping station road, along the main park road. The driver apparently lost control of his car which ended up upside down in the mud and water at the edge of the glades. Both boys in the car were injured seriously, one being on the critical list for a time. Mangrove District personnel investigated the accident (which occurred in the Glades District) and have prepared the reports.

Building Fire Protection:

The final kinks in the exhaust system of the Pine Island fire truck were worked out by the shop crew. The drafting and pumping systems are now working satisfactorily and the truck is ready for use.

The fire hydrants at the new Headquarters-Visitor Center were checked, and it was possible to attach hose, but with some difficulty. Either the metal boxes surrounding the hydrants will have to be replaced by larger ones, or an extension piece will have to be affixed to the hydrant opening to bring it up above ground level.

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Sanitation:

Rotten hose at the LPK Campground water tank was replaced by pipe to expedite the drawing of water by campers.

The water in the new entrance station is not chlorinated and not intended for drinking purposes, although rangers working here have been drinking the water without ill affects. Nevertheless, a water jug will be used at this station for drinking purposes.

COOPERATIVE ACTIVITIES

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies:

The Univ. of Miami Research Team made two trips into the Shark R. Valley and one into the Taylor Slough area.

Park Service airboats were used to read P-33, 34, 37, & 38 water gauging stations during the month.

Tamiami personnel assisted the Florida Highway Patrol by giving first aid to an accident victim & directing traffic. Accident occurred at night about 200 yards west of the ranger station.

Persons discharging firearms along Trail and Loop Road Park boundaries were warned that state law prohibits same. This cooperative assistance to State Wildlife officers also assists the Park along road boundaries, as firearms are frequently discharged across park land.

On the weekend of Dec 18-19 a concentrated effort was made by State Wildlife officers to contact hunters along the west sub-district boundary where hunting pressure was heavy. Ranger Winte was taken in the state helicopter and received information where glade buggy trespass by hunters into the Park had taken place. These locations were inaccessible by airboat.

INTERPRETIVE ACTIVITIES & DEVELOPMENTS

Interpretive Facilities:

Placement of the large, new, interest point signs was completed by maintenance crews during the month - at Mahogany Hammock, Pa-Ha-Okee, & Royal Palm turnoffs.

New interpretive exhibits at the Pa-Hay-Okee Overlook interest point were installed. This area was in bad need of interpretation, and these new exhibits definitely fill the need and add interest to the trail.

Interpretive Services:

The information desk in the new Headquarters Visitor Center was activated on December 23 by temporary Ranger Naturalist Emily Divinyi. This service has helped somewhat to speed up the operation at the new entrance station.

Public Relations:

Sub-district Ranger Kasperek spent some time discussing the work of park rangers with Oscar Garner, a Homestead High School student.

Public Relations - Cont'd.

Fire Control Aids Dan Angel and George Lennington assisted in fighting some minor fires in the pinelands east of the park during the month.

Assistance was given to hunters in the Tamiami sub-district in finding and returning two lost dogs.

Research & Observations:

Sub-district Ranger Winte noticed signs of wild pig in the park on a tree island in the Shark River Valley on Dec 26. This is the first positive indication that an undetermined number of wild pigs are in the Park. It is known that some lands adjacent to the park have wild pigs.

Ranger Winte has also seen a number of otter on tree islands in the Shark R. Valley and reports that the skeletons & shells of snakes & turtles killed this year are being found. He indicates that reptile populations are diminished during years when otter are plentiful.

Deer #39, a doe, was hit and killed about 2 miles west of the Pinelands Trail on Dec 2.

On Dec 3 a traffic counter was placed at the turnoff (Farm Rd) into the "Hole". Monthly metered counts of travel on this road are now being made.

Farm activity in the "Hole" has picked up considerably since the end of November; Iori, Hayes, Barnes, etc have all been actively engaged in burning, plowing, disking, and planting.

The writer traveled to Tamiami on Dec 5 and 26 to consult with Ranger Winte, inspect the area, assist with transportation of personnel, and to transmit mail & supplies.

Hunting season continued throughout the month, and a total of 143 firearms permits were issued, 6 glades buggy, and 6 airboat permits.

On December 21 the old entrance Station "chickee" was removed from the main park road and retired to the boneyard. (They tell me this was the end of an era!)

On this date also the new station, located about ¼ mile further west, was put into operation; it is equipped with both telephone and radio, the latter to be replaced soon by a new remote set. The phone number at the new station is CI 7-6211, ext.58.

Park Rangers Copas and Oelrich are alternating the entrance station assignment every two weeks with the afternoon-evening road patrol duty.

A traffic counter was relocated on the approach to the new entrance station on Dec 21.

A new schedule for road patrolling was put into effect with the week beginning Dec 18; an early morning patrol from 6:30 AM to 3 PM, and an afternoon-late evening patrol from 2 PM to 11 PM.

As of Dec 1, a 14-day camping limit for the Park has been in force at LPK Campground. An accurate check system on camper-stays is being worked out by Sub-district Ranger Kasperek.

Rangers Kasperek and O'Brien did some boundary posting and checking by airboat early in the month in the area south & east of the Old Ingraham Rd.

On December 26 the writer traveled to Tamiami to assist with transportation of General & Mrs Thomas White & Colonel McPherson to the 7-mile Tower for the start of their airboat trip to Rookery Branch.

The writer attended staff meetings on Dec 14 & 28.

On Dec 21 Supv. Fire Control Aid Guardipee attended a Sign Committee meeting in lieu of the District Ranger.

At Tamiami day and night patrols were maintained throughout the month. Many contacts were made with hunters, motorists, officials.

An inventory of semi-expendable property was made by Tamiami personnel.

The patrol cabin at Coffee-Pot was made more tenable, and hammock brush and fallen trees were cleared from around the cabin.

Boundary signs were straightened and reset where needed, when accessible by airboat.

Maintenance:

The fire equipment at Pine Island has been receiving preventative maintenance by fire control aids throughout the month.

The anemometer from the LPK Tower was brought in to the fire cache and is undergoing repairs at present.

Fire Control Aids Hite and Exum have been turning out new signs from the "sign shop" for the Headquarters, Flamingo, and Everglades City areas, most of which have already been erected. They have also been busy repainting many of the old park signs with the new colors - brown & green.

A surplus "weasel" (tracked vehicle) was obtained from Homestead AFB about the middle of the month; very little servicing was required, and it has been operational at speeds up to 30 mph.

On Dec 8 four surplus 14-ft fibreglass skiffs were obtained from the Airbase. The skiffs, which need some repair, are being kept temporarily at Pine Island and will be assigned to the other districts at a later date.

On Dec 13 the 1/2 ton Chevrolet pickup (I-59656, East Boundary Patrol) was taken in to Bird Chevrolet for repairs to the right rear fender; it was returned to service on Dec 15.

On the 22nd the 3/4 ton Ford Pickup (I-42585) was taken to Tamiami and the Dodge pickup in use there brought back to Pine Island for repairs.

Chevrolet Interceptor (I-42622) was re-assigned temporarily for use at Tamiami.

General

Weather Conditions: Pre winter weather with little rainfall was typical. Two cold fronts extended far enough South to cast a chill on the southern atmosphere.

Facilities for flying small craft warnings at Flamingo were inoperative, but warnings were ordered by the Weather Bureau four days of the month.

Increase or Decrease in Travel: The usual flood of visitors appeared for the Christmas vacation and helped to account for an approximate 32% increase in visitor day use over last month. Compared to the same month last year visitor days decreased 39% due to the closed campground at Flamingo and Concessioner facilities closed until the 15 th.



Two special groups visited Flamingo. The Florida Science Group visited from New York. This group is composed of Junior Highschool students. Many ornithologists gathered for the annual Christmas bird count.

Special Activities: Operations from offices in the Flamingo Visitor Center were resumed; local telephone and radio communications were reactivated.

A new 55 ft. house trailer was delivered to Flamingo to replace the Subdistrict ranger residence destroyed by hurricane Donna.

The District Ranger attended the dedication of the Pennycamp Coral Reef Preserve.

Boat Trips for Important People: General White, his wife and Col. McPherson fished and explored the Rookery Branch, Shark River and Cape Sable areas. The District Ranger acted in the role of official guide the two days they were out.

Assistant Chief Ranger Maxwell escorted Congressman Jensen and Mr. Wilhelm on a sightseeing and fishing excursion to Shark River.

Administration


Personnel: Seasonal Naturalist Sigafos joined the District Staff on the ninth. Ranger Arnott returned to duty after attending the Frank Pinsky session of the N.P.S. Training School in Yosemite National Park. Bill Mills was reassigned to the Flamingo Maintenance Staff after a short assignment in the Pine Island shop.

Safety and Health: Assistance was rendered to disabled boats on two occasions. Both boats were commercial fishing craft.

Two automobile accidents were investigated. Each involved only one car. Two teenage boys were seriously hurt when one car turned over at a high rate of speed. No injuries resulted from the other accident.

Reported injury to a passenger on the sightseeing boat Plymco's VI was investigated. A doctor examined the reportedly injured female and determined a bump on the head had no connection with the girl's gastrointestinal disorder.

A rough draft of a search and rescue plan was prepared for use in water rescue operations.



The Park Safety Committee met at Flamingo.

Park Engineer Wolf's son fell from the second floor of the Flamingo Visitor Center to the ground level but sustained no injuries.

Three minor first aid cases were attended.

Building Fire Protection: A fire extinguisher training session was conducted by N.P.S. personnel for Concessioner employees at the Marina. The 40 gallon foam extinguisher located at the Marina was recharged.

All fire extinguishers damaged by hurricane Daina were reconditioned and returned to Flamingo.

Cooperative Activities

Cooperation with other Federal, State or Local Agencies: Supervisory Ranger Whitmoyer assisted local committeemen in setting up displays and booths at Harris Park, Tavernier preparatory to the dedication of the Perrycamp Coral Reef Preserve.

An advance party headed by Dr. Marshall, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service spent four days in the District surveying possibilities of conducting water research studies.

A preliminary search for triangulation stations was made by U.S. Coast and Geodetic personnel. A comprehensive survey is scheduled to begin in January.

The U.S. Geological Survey added more equipment to their stations on the Shark and Harney Rivers. Recording salinity gauges were installed.

Durbin Tall, University of Miami Marine Lab. reported very good data obtained from barnacle and oyster studies in the District.

Lt. Drinkwater, U.S. Coast Guard inspected Concessioner sightseeing boats. He also advised on the exact specifications of the law governing licensing of boat operators.

The cotton pickers began moving their equipment to campsite west of Flamingo.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service: The work load increased with the increase of traffic through the Christmas vacation. Visitor contacts, road patrols, boat patrols and basin patrols were needed much more than time available to do them. Many new Company employees were fingerprinted.

Commercial fishermen moved into Sandy Key in numbers approaching prehurricane proportions. Pompano fishing and stone crabbing have been the principal activities. Pompano fishermen have requested permission to rebuild net racks

and some have rebuilt racks without permits. A few stone crabbers have been working the west coast.

Opening of concessioner facilities at Flamingo necessitated some readjustment of bad habits developed during the reconstruction phase. Proper parking habits, correct approach to visitors, possession of pets, etc. were emphasized with the reopening.

A \$25 fine was imposed by the U. S. Commissioner for reckless driving. Warning violations were issued for boat speed in a no wake area, stealing sand, exceeding limit on fresh water fish and possession of spear gun and firearm.

Shooting of firearms was reported in Snake Bight by a visitor. Several boats were searched but firearms could not be found. Lapse of time between violation and report limited chance of apprehension.

Weekly boat-a-cades were resumed on the seventeenth.

The Everglades Park Company reported theft of a rental skiff. Investigation proved that an employee had mistakenly borrowed the wrong skiff.

Two death messages were relayed to persons located in the Flamingo area, one to a concessioner employee and one to a visitor.

Captain Lou Watson continues to operate chartering service with Don Sullivan's boat very regularly.

Closed area signs were posted at Porjoe and West Keys.

Unusually good fishing has been experienced by visitors nearly all month. Snake Bight has been particularly good. Bass fishing has improved considerably with the lowering of water levels. Several patrols have been made to Nine Mile Bend to check on fresh water catches.

Five night road patrols were made. Total patrol mileages for the month were:

Maintenance: Traffic control signs destroyed by the hurricane were replaced prior to opening of concessioner facilities at Flamingo. New informational signs were erected at road junctions to Marina and boat trailer parking area at Flamingo.

Boat maintenance consisted of reinstallation of fuel line in the Osceola, tune up of Chikika and installation of new gas tanks in the MTG.

All reconstruction projects at Flamingo were completed except work contracted by Avant Construction Company and painting of flagpoles and water tank.

Transportation of men and equipment were provided for rehabilitation of the Lostman's River Patrol Station.

Radio repairman Rhinehart has spent considerable time on radio maintenance, but radio efficiency remains poor. Supervisory Ranger Whitaker replaced the radio antenna at the Key Largo Ranger Station.

In addition to continued cleanup effort of miscellaneous personnel responsible that has been spent in routine operational tasks and reconstruction of latrine, latrine and fireplace in the Flamingo Campground. All campfires were graded and treated with sand and lime.

Parade route and lanes at Flamingo were painted and resurfaced.

Successors: December 19th, detailed the reopening of all concessioner facilities. Much work remained to be done at the time, but the opening proceeded smoothly, and all facilities except signposting were functioning well by the end of the month. Little more than Bathroom Break trips have been offered to the signposting visitor interested in such trips. All facilities were rebuilt as before except the Marina. Modifications at the Marina consisted of installation of a lunch counter and addition of air conditioning.

Loss of telephone communication has hampered operations and added to traffic on the Park Service radio net.

Clean up of contractor debris has been a big project.

The third week of December provided us with chilly weather with some frost reaching the general of Everglades. The rest of the month has been warm with typical Florida winter weather.

Increase or Decrease in Travel

December brought a large increase in travel to the Gulf Coast District. Our winter season has gotten under way with a large influx of out of state visitors during the last two weeks of the month. With the boat tours in operation and some advertising out many are stopping at Everglades for boat tours, fishing, etc. Commercial and sports fishing are also increasing.

December showed a gain of 7 % over November. 4174 persons in December as compared to 3914 persons in November.

Cooperation with Other Federal, State, or Local Agencies

Ranger Woldff took three men from the Fish and Wildlife Service on a trip up Turner River on Dec. 6. They were looking over the area in preparation for a study to precede the work to be done on Conservation Area #3.

On Dec. 13 Mr. Odgers of the U.S.C.G.S was taken on a trip to Alligator Bay to locate three survey markers which will be used in the survey and construction of dikes on Conservation Area #3. Steel towers are to be erected on these three sites as well as on Onion Key.

State County or Municipal Legislation

There is a movement of some power in the City of Everglades to unincorporate the town. If this should happen it would have a great effect on park property within the city as there would be no zoning laws except county in effect.

Interpretive Activities and Developments

General Publicity

An article appeared in the Miami Herald about the Watson Place on Chatham River. A large part of the article concerned the sugar operation that had been there. Some of the statements the reported inserted into the article were unfavorable for the park.

Several articles have appeared in the Ft. Myers Press and the Collier County News about the reopening of the boat trips into the park.

Public Relations

The public relations are at a rather low point in the Everglades area due to the delay in starting of construction of park housing. Questions are asked every day about when we are going to start as it is felt that new construction in the town will give other people an incentive to build and fix up the town.

Research and Observations

Mr. Griffin, Reg. Arch. was taken on a trip to several Indian mounds in the area on Dec. 13. He was shown a collection of pottery and artifacts which has been made from various keys on the outside by ranger personnel. He stated that is was an excellent start and many fine pieces of pottery had been found. Some Spanish as well as Indian has also been found.

Some of the pieces are the largest he has ever seen form this area. These are to be cataloged when Mr. Griffin begins his archeo logical studies in this area.

Operations

Protection and Ranger Service

Boat Patrol 770 miles

Auto Patrol 197 miles

Many routine patrols were made into back country areas. One overnight patrol and four day patrols were made to Lostman's River.

Areas where buildings net racks, etc. were constructed beFore the storm were checked and no new construction has been attempted.

One patrol to Lostman's River was stopped due to damage to motor caused by hitting a log. During winter low tides this ~~xxx~~ is a constant hazard since the hurricane and is very hard on equipment, but no remedy has been found to prevent such accidents.

Three stops were made on outside keys on routing patrols to check for Indian artifacts.

Signs were erected outside of building and on office door of new office location.

Maintenance

The maintenance crew finsihed rehabilitation of Lostman's Patrol Station. The dock was rebuilt, new generator and water pump installed, water system repaired and store house built on dock.

The M.F. G. boat was hauled for a complete maintenance job. Bottom was scrapped and cleaned, new fastenings were installed on windshield, floor boards painted and bilges cleaned.

One outboard motor was repaired by ranger personnel at Pine Island Shop. Several new parts were installed. This was done by rangers due to the extreme need of getting the motor back in service the same day.

Concessioners

The sight seeing boat tours were resumed on Dec. 15. Travel began picking up on the 20th and both trips are carrying many people.

Approval has been given by district ranger for several signs to be erected by the concessioners. There is some conflict between the two over signs, it is hoped that this can be stopped as I'm sure the city will not give permission to erect too many signs.
