- Nov. 24 CARDEROCK HIKE 2 p.m. Hike along the C & O Canal for about Sun. 5 miles near Carderock, returning to Cabin John Run. Meet at MacArthur Blvd. & Cornell Ave., Glen Echo, Md. (Stop 39, Cabin John car line.)
- Nov. 30 NOVEMBER HIKE 2 p.m. For the last time this season hike from Sat. the Trail Center for about 5 miles along Rock Creek's woodland trails returning to Rock Creek Trail Center just south of Military Rd. & Beach Dr. NW.

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

The events listed in the preceeding section are organized and conducted by Park Naturalists or Park Historians. There is no charge for their services and the only cost is for transportation where shown.

Meeting places may usually be reached by regular street cars and buses operated by the D. C. Transit Company. Call their Information Department (DUpont 7-7625, Ext. 572) for details.

WALKS: These leisurely walks are led by Park Naturalists who introduce the plants, animals, and geology of your parks. On some, guest experts share their knowledge and experience. Each presents a specific outdoor subject but the unexpected opportunity to observe wildlife in its natural habitat can and does enliven the trips. Trips are conducted in a variety of places in the National Capital Parks, while some are repeated at different seasons to give a more comprehensive coverage of the natural features.

All activities are conducted regardless of inclement weather and, unless otherwise noted, they start and end at the same place.

HIKES: Longer and more strenuous walking trips are scheduled during the cooler seasons. A Park Naturalist leads these trips and points out natural features along the way. In some cases the trails are steep and and rough and hikers should wear shoes and clothing that are sturdy and comfortable. Those going by chartered bus should make reservations (see ticket information under CARAVANS).

LEVEL WALKER HIKES: These hikes are conducted on the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal towpath in April, May, and June and are repeated in September, October, and November. To become a certified member of the "Society of Honorary Level Walkers" each hiker must complete all eight hikes. Ask the Park Naturalist how to earn your membership certificate.

CARAVANS: Half-day and all-day trips are made by chartered bus to nearby areas administered by the National Park Service. A Park Historian or Park Naturalist is in charge of each trip and presents interpretive talks at the destination. On some of the caravans conducted by the Park Naturalist, there will also be opportunity to hike along woodland trails.

Please make reservations, to assure that seats will be available. Call D. C. Transit Company, Chartered Coach Department, FEderal 3-5200, Ext. 653, 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday. Tickets are sold there before departure and fare includes tax.

Each person must bring his own picnic lunch and drink. On all-day trips, evening snacks may be eaten on the buses. Arrangements cannot be made to eat at restaurants and usually there is no place to buy food en route. There are short comfort stops on the longer trips. Caravans leave on schedule regardless of inclement weather.

HISTORICAL TOURS: Visits to national memorials in and about the Nation's Capital are conducted by Park Historians and provide an opportunity to become acquainted with the history and significance of Washington's public monuments. This series of walks makes available the history of several of the larger memorials and public buildings in greater detail than is usually presented in the areas themselves. The walking distance is short and the pace leisurely.

BIRD WALKS: Park Naturalists lead these walks, identifying the more common birds and explaining the fundamentals of birdwatching.



Suitable footwear is important and binoculars are helpful. Persons bringing children's groups should call the Park Naturalist (REpublic 7-1820, Ext. 2557) at least one week in advance and leadership will be provided if available.

EVENING ADVENTURES: On Tuesday and Thursday evenings during summer colorful programs planned for all ages, especially family groups, are presented by Park Naturalists. Facilities do not permit cooking in these areas but if you wish, bring a picnic supper to eat before the program.

The "Naturevan," a unique and outstanding audio-visual mobile unit, is used in this and many other outdoor events. These programs are cancelled in case of rain.

BARGE TRIPS: Mule-drawn barge trips on the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal are conducted in cooperation with Government Services, Inc. A Park Historian or Naturalist accompanies each scheduled trip to interpret the history of the Canal and natural features along the way. Trips are made regardless of inclement weather.

Tickets are on sale at the office of Government Services, Inc., 1135 21st St. NW. from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. For reservations call NAtional 8-7363. Tickets reserved by telephone will be held at the barge until 15 minutes before departure. (On weekends and holidays call NAtional 8-0037 for information.) Soft drinks, ice cream, candy, cookies, and postcards are sold on the barge. Organized groups may charter the barge on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday evenings through Government Services, Inc.

One-way passengers may leave the barge at the upper terminus, Lock 5, or embark at that point for the downstream trip. All passengers pay round-trip fare regardless of distance traveled.

June 5 to September 4 (Wednesday evenings):

Adults, 75¢; children under 12, 50¢.

6:30 p.m. leave Lock 3, 1 block south of 30th & M Sts. NW. (Barge returns to Lock 3 at 9 p.m.)

EXPLORING THE SKY: Members of the National Capital Astronomers bring their telescopes to these evening events and focus them on the stars, moon, and planets. They point out the constellations and tell many of the legends and mythology related to them. On cloudy evenings, illustrated talks on astronomy are substituted. If raining at the scheduled time, the event is cancelled.

Astronomy events are held in Fort Reno Park, north of the intersection of 40th & Chesapeake Sts. NW.

THEODORE ROOSEVELT ISLAND: This island, accessible only by boat, is preserved as a memorial to President Theodore Roosevelt. A Park Naturalist is on duty during the hours the ferry operates. He leads nature walks starting at the orientation station, where exhibits explain the Island's significance and story.

Three and a half miles of foot trails lead through woods and beside one of the few unspoiled marshes in the Washington region. These varied habitats contain a wealth of flowers, trees, birds, and other animals.

The ferry operates from the landing at the foot of Wisconsin Ave. near K St. NW. on each Saturday and Sunday from May 26th through October 27th -- 1 to 4:30 p.m. with additional service as shown in each month's Events. Round-trip ferry fare is 25ϕ for adults, 15ϕ for children under 12.

KENILWORTH AQUATIC GAR-DENS: Here, in a number of verdant riverside pools, grow hardy and tropical waterlilies and lotus. Native flowers, birds, and aquatic animals lend variety and excitement to the quiet pools and marshy fringe. Wild iris begin their color-



ful display by mid-May to be followed by the hardy waterlilies that come into bloom in early June. By mid-July lotus and tropical varieties make a show with their varied colors which last into October. The gardens are at their best in the morning.

A Park Naturalist conducts interpretive flower and bird walks around the pools and through the adjoining marsh-land each weekend beginning May 26th and continuing through September 15th; for hours consult each month's Events.

To reach Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens, follow Kenilworth Ave. to Douglas St. NE., go west on Douglas St. to parking area and office.

RELATED INFORMATION

SPRING HIKES: Early spring hikes are scheduled on March weekends.


FIELD LEADERSHIP COURSE IN BIRD STUDY: Beginner's course in field bird study and training techniques for youth leadership is conducted by Park Naturalists for nine Saturdays from late February through April.

JUNIOR NATURALIST TRAINING COURSE: Park Naturalists conduct a nature course for 5th, 6th, and 7th graders that begins in mid-March and continues through April.

TRAINING COURSE IN OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP: Training for persons interested in nature leadership and techniques on camp counselling are given on Saturdays (four six-hour sessions) during May.

CONSERVATION ROUNDUP: A week's experience in outdoor living for young people 12 through 16 years, is held in late August. Advance registration is required.

SCHOOL ASSEMBLY TALKS: Illustrated talks explaining the historical and natural features of National Capital Parks are presented from October through March by Park Historians and Park Naturalists. These are planned to complement the school curriculum and may be requested by any school within an eight-mile radius of The White House. An announcement of these talks is issued in early September.

HISTORICAL TALKS: The historical story is told every hour and half-hour at Custis—Lee Mansion and Lincoln Museum each Saturday and Sunday from June through Labor Day. Groups and organizations desiring special guide and lecture service at Lincoln Museum (Ford's Theatre), House Where Lincoln Died (Old Petersen House), Custis—Lee Mansion, Washington Monument, Jefferson Memorial, and Lincoln Memorial should telephone the Park Historian, REpublic 7—1820, Ext. 2565.

FORT WASHINGTON, MD.: Historical exhibits may be seen at the sally port entrance to the old fort between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays from May through Labor Day.

GREAT FALLS MUSEUM. The Historical and Natural History Museums are open daily from June through Labor Day and on Saturdays and Sundays, weather permitting, for the remainder of the year. The Natural History Wayside Exhibit is open daily except Tuesdays and Wednesdays from late June through Labor Day. By arranging in advance with the Park Naturalist, parties of 15 or more may take short walks to the Falls or along the Canal towpath to learn firsthand the interpretive story of nature and history. Make advance arrangements by calling REpublic 7-1820, Ext. 2557.

DAY CAMPS: Nature activities are of first importance in D. C. Recreation Department Day Camps where Park Naturalists cooperate with camp leaders to bring thrilling outdoor adventures. Children wishing to attend these free camps may telephone the D. C. Recreation Department (ADams 4-2050) for information and applications.

ROCK CREEK NATURE CENTER

The Rock Creek Nature Center brings a new approach in translating nature's ways in the great outdoors. In an attractive natural setting, children and adults alike spend absorbing and adventure-packed hours learning about plants, rocks, insects, birds, and other wild animals that live in the surrounding woodland.

Exhibits, unique visual devices, and working demonstrations show the amazing ways of insects, animals, and plants. Live reptiles, a glasssided beehive, sound recordings of insect and animal calls stimulate intense outdoor interests and hobbies.

Organized groups may visit the Nature Center during the week by appointment. Saturday and Sunday afternoon all are invited to share in the exciting programs.
