Following is the report of activities for Yellowstone National Park during the month of November 1957:

General

Weather Conditions. Weather for the month of November was generally moderate during the first half of the month but colder temperatures and frequent light snow storms prevailed during the last half. All roads were closed to public travel on the 13th due to heavy snowfall except the Cooke City and West Entrance roads. Minimum temperature recorded during the month was -27° at Old Faithful on the 21st while the maximum temperature was 49° at Mammoth on the 10th. The maximum snow depth for the month was 26 inches at Old Faithful with 1.69 inches precipitation. The headquarters area reported a precipitation of 1.07 inches.

Snow surveys will be conducted by the winterkeepers at Canyon and Lake for the Soil Conservation Service. Wind readings will be taken at Lake to assist the Snow Removal Survey Team this winter.

Range. The critical range had a snowfall of 2-3 inches but the high temperatures during the month melted the snow so that the range was bare at the end of the month. Snow depths on the non-critical range varied from 3-6 inches. Snow was soft and light. Most of the critical range in the Gallatin area was snow-free.

Travel. Travel for the month was determined by self registry and actual count. Total visitors entering the park was 1,972 in 578 vehicles. This compares with 933 visitors and 284 vehicles during November of last year. For the calendar year through November 30, travel amounted to 1,595,669 visitors compared to 1,457,196 visitors for the same period last year--an increase of 9.5%.

Summary

General Conditions. Weather for the month of November
was generally moderate but on the 13th and 14th the weather was
rather disagreeable and stormy. Light snow began falling
during the last half. All roads were closed on public travel
on the 13th due to heavy weather. During the 14th and 15th
the weather cleared. Between September 1st and the 15th
we have had 17.5 inches of rain. The weather was clear for the
rest of the month. The road was closed for the last
month was 12 miles at the 13th and 14th. The road was

Roads. The critical roads had a snowfall on 13th and 14th
but the high temperatures during the week saved the road on 15th.
The road was open at the end of the month. The road was open

Summary. During the month the weather was moderate to mild
with occasional snow. Road closures during the month were
1,372 in the National Park. This compares with 1,000 closures and 200
vehicles during November of last year. For the calendar year
through November 15, travel amounted to 1,100,000 vehicle miles
over the 1,600 miles of the road system. The road was open
1,600 miles.

Special Visitors. Phil Mohlbrandt, Region III Engineer, and former Yellowstone employee, visited during the month.

Walter Berlet, wildlife photographer from Casper, Wyoming, was in during the month to take pictures.

Inspections. FBI Special Agents Mason Melvin, Bozeman, Montana and Claude Gambel, Butte, Montana, and Park County Deputy Sheriff Dan Bigelow, Gardiner, Montana, were in the park during the month on law enforcement matters.

John J. Arovels, Counter Intelligence Special Agent, from Billings, Montana, was in the park on the 20th. He conducted character investigations at Canyon.

Kenneth Evans, of the Civil Service Commission Office, Billings, Montana, was in the park November 25 on personnel matters.

Allen Heubner, Highway Engineer, WDC, assigned in Yellowstone for the season returned to his headquarters in San Francisco the 22nd.

Cooperative Activities

General Publicity. Press releases issued during the month were on contract award for new residences, road closing, fishing violations, reorganization of Yellowstone Park Company and on the coins collected from the pools within the park.

On each Thursday, Yellowstone's Weekly News was issued to keep employees, concessioners and others currently informed of park happenings.

Religious Services and Chapel Use. The Yellowstone National Park Chapel was used for regular church school services each Sunday at 9:00 a.m. Protestant services, conducted by Rev. Jack A. Jennings, were held each Sunday at 10:00 a.m.

Museum Activities and Exhibits. An exhibit portraying Yellowstone from the Indian era through the fur traders and trappers; the Army administration; the Canyon Village and MISSION 66 is on display in the Yellowstone Park School. This exhibit was used at the ladies luncheon during the PARK DEVELOPMENT Conference held in September.

Three plans for wayside exhibits are being prepared--the incident of the Helena Party being attacked by the Nez Perce Indians; the story of the large mammals of Hayden Valley and a thermal exhibit.

Research and Observation. Park Naturalist Marler is concentrating his efforts on the thermal research and devoting most of his time to the special problems in the Lower Geyser Basin.

Bohemian Waxwings have been observed in large flocks around the headquarters area during the latter part of the month. Hepburn's Rosy Finches and some flocks of Black Rosy Finches were also seen during the month.

Natural History Association. Mrs. Bertha Wharton has been engaged as Clerk of the Association, succeeding Mrs. Connie Norris.

The September-October issue of Yellowstone Park Nature Notes was completed during the month and mailed on November 26.

The regular meeting of the Executive Committee of the Government Employees was held November 11.

Business and Policy Matters - The first committee meeting during the week.

Organizational Activities

General Policy - Three minutes passed during the week. There was no report from the Executive Committee, and no action was taken on any of the matters presented.

Maintenance. Snowplowing was generally discontinued on November 1 but in connection with the bison reduction program some plowing was done to Old Faithful and Lake the 20th and 21st. Other maintenance operations included sanding and snow fence repair.

Complaints. One complaint letter was handled in regard to unsatisfactory room conditions at Old Faithful.

Protection and Ranger Service. Inspection trips were made in the interior of the park during the month. Activity during the month consisted of winter assignment moves, boundary and road patrols, patrols to determine location of elk and bison herds, and other incidentals relative to winter operations.

Forest Fire Protection. The 1957 inclusions for the Fire Atlas comprised of personnel location maps, fire occurrence maps and fire-weather charts have been prepared and are ready for transmittal to the Director and Regional Director Offices.

All fire equipment from the field has been brought in and stored at the headquarters area.

Building Fire Protection. The individual building fire hazard inspections were started November 26 in the Mammoth area. New Building Fire Personnel Organization crews were made up, effective November 1.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities. BEAR. Three black and seven grizzly bears were observed during the month. A report was prepared on the tests of GEFRO as a bear repellent. The chemical exhibited only a slight deterring effect and generally was not effective.

BISON. A herd of approximately 200 were observed in Hayden Valley and small herds were observed in the northern section of the park.

DEER. The deer season adjacent to the park closed on November 24 with a very light harvest.

ELK. The plan for management of the Northern Yellowstone Elk herd was distributed within the Service and to the press and others interested.

Approximately 480 elk were seen near the east fork of Crystal Creek. They appeared to be going to lower elevations but on the whole the downward movement during November was slow.

FOX. A fox was observed one half mile east of Lava Creek on November 12.

SHEEP. Eight Bighorn sheep were seen on the lower west slopes of Abiathar Peak on the 25th.

SWAN. Six swan were seen at various times on the Madison River. Forty were observed in Mary's Bay and nearby waters with eight cygnets.

Design and Construction

Construction. Active construction projects include the following:

Site preparation for the new housing at Mammoth has progressed well and most of the fill material is in place. About 85% of the 6" water line was in place for this job. The actual construction will begin next spring.

The five range plots are nearly completed for study on the northern Yellowstone range.

The power line to Dunsen is finished except for installation of dampeners on the long span which will be accomplished as soon as materials are available.

332.23, Water, Sewer and Power (per.) Mammoth Residential Area--Water--30% complete; Sewer--15% complete and Power--5% complete. Work on the water line will continue for two weeks, weather permitting, while the sewer and power lines will be completed next spring.

521.5, Route 3, Grading and Base Surfacing, West Entrance to Madison Junction and Madison River Bridge and Approaches, is 8% complete while the clearing is 75% complete.

Other construction projects have been suspended until spring, the inclement weather forcing most operations to close down.
