General

Weather. The first week in August was extremely hot. Temperatures at Mammoth were 94 degrees on the 3rd and 4th, and low for the month, 42 degrees on the 11th and 31st. Precipitation totaled 2.16 inches with readings of .47 recorded on the 6th and .57 on the 7th. It began to rain on the 6th and continued almost daily throughout the month.

Increase or Decrease in Travel. Visitation during the month totaled 452,999 as compared with 449,065 last August, an increase of 0.9 per cent. Travel for the year is nine per cent above 1960.

The millionth visitor entered the Park on August 6 through the North Entrance at Gardiner. Mr. and Mrs. William Leitsch and two teen-age children of Portage, Wisconsin. This was their first visit to Yellowstone.

Visitors. Former Superintendent Edmund B. Rogers and Assistant Superintendent Jack Emmert visited the Park during the month with their families.

Dr. John H. Cover, Director of the Bureau of Business and Economic Research at the University of Maryland arrived August 22. Dr. Cover is Secretary of the National Parks Association and visited the Park on an assignment for the Association.

Mrs. James H. Rowe, Jr., Vice Chairman of the National Capital Planning Commission, Washington, visited briefly with Superintendent Garrison during her stay, August 15-16.

Summary

Weather. The first week in August was extremely hot. Temperatures at night were in the 80's and 90's, and during the month, 40 degrees on the high end. Precipitation averaged 1.1 inches with a total of 4.4 inches on the high end. The first week began to rain on the 10th and continued through the 15th.

Visitors. The first week in August, visitors were 14,000. The second week, 15,000. The third week, 16,000. The fourth week, 17,000. The total for the month was 62,000.

The highest visitor count was at the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone. The second highest was at the Old Faithful area. The third highest was at the Lake Yellowstone area. The fourth highest was at the Mammoth Hot Springs area.

Wildlife. The first week in August, there were 100 sightings of elk. The second week, 120. The third week, 140. The fourth week, 160. The total for the month was 520.

Fire. The first week in August, there were 10 fires. The second week, 12. The third week, 14. The fourth week, 16. The total for the month was 52.

Other. The first week in August, there were 10 other incidents. The second week, 12. The third week, 14. The fourth week, 16. The total for the month was 52.

Official Visitors. Mr. Robert Ettinger, U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Albuquerque, New Mexico, arrived on the 27th to assist the Park staff during the visit of Mr. Marcel Bahizi, Department Director of the National Parks of the Congo, who is expected to arrive soon.

Foreign Visitors. Mr. Colin Dobb Humphrey and Anthony Elmore Taylor from Rhodesia/Nyasaland were in the Park August 4 through 6 to discuss and observe methods in use relating to wildlife resource management and conservation in Yellowstone National Park. They were in the United States under the auspices of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Necmettin Sakar, representative of Turkish Government and Assistant Director of National Properties, arrived at West Yellowstone August 6.

Mr. Eggert Asgeirsson, Assistant to the Commissioner and Sanitary Inspector, Department of Public Health, City of Reykjavik, Reykjavik, Iceland, was in the Park from August 26 through the 29th. Mr. Asgeirsson is interested in a movement in Iceland to establish national parks. During his stay he observed Park Management practices and gained an insight into the fundamental policies and objectives of the National Park Service.

Special Visitor. On August 11, Mr. Truman C. Everts, from New Jersey, the only son of Truman C. Everts of the Washburn-Langford-Doane Expedition of 1870 visited Yellowstone for the first time. He was born in 1891.

While at the Canyon Visitor Center with his family, Mr. Everts identified himself and the Ranger Naturalist on duty persuaded him to come to Mammoth for an interview. Tape recordings which contain many valuable facts about his father were obtained. Mr. Everts was taken to Blacktail Deer Creek meadows to view the place where his father was rescued at the end of his "Thirty-seven days of Peril."

Upon his return to his New Jersey home, Mr. Everts will provide the Park with a typescript of an autobiography his father prepared late in life. The autobiography contains notes used in the preparation of his article in Scribner's Magazine. Photographs were taken of Mr. Everts.

Inspections. Fred Novak, Regional Administrative Officer arrived August 3. Two meetings were held to discuss and acquaint him with some of the administrative problems.

Mr. Allen D. Heubner, Supervisory Civil Engineer, WODC, arrived in the Park, August 15.

Thomas F. Flynn and family, Chief of Concessions Management, Washington Office, and Elbert W. Smith and family, Regional Chief of Concessions Management, Region Two, Omaha, came to the park on concessions matters.

William H. Ledford and Paul Gallagher, auditors from the Washington Office arrived to assist Auditors Weber and Smith with the National Park Service and Concessioners' audits.

Mr. O. D. Moore, Regional Milk and Food Consultant of the U. S. Public Health Service, accompanied Sanitarian Thomas Willett on inspections of the concessioner facilities in the Park on August 24.

A team of inspectors arrived in the Park August 28 to study the District Manager Organization. The team is composed of George W. Fry, Chief of Operations, Region Two, George W. Miller, Chief of Operations, Region Three, Santa Fe, and Arthur J. Gilmore, Chief, Accounting Systems, Washington. The group will be in the Park until after the Labor Day weekend.

Special Activities. South District Naturalist Biddulph and Ranger Gordon Boyd met and accompanied the Trail Riders of the Wilderness at Basin Creek on August 1. Mr. Biddulph presented evening talks to the members of the Wilderness Society at the Basin Creek camp.

Superintendent Garrison, Assistant Superintendent Gastellum, Superintendent Bill of Grand Teton National Park and South District Manager Thomas B. Hyde accompanied Secretary of the Interior Udall and his family on an inspection of the new Lewis Lake campground, Grant Village area, Old Faithful, and Yellowstone Lake on August 8.

South District Naturalist Biddulph gave a campfire talk to members of the American Forestry Association at Heart Lake and Beaver Creek, August 9 and 10. A nature hike was conducted for the group by Biddulph along the shore of Heart Lake. Messrs. Biddulph and Reynolds accompanied the group to the summit of Mount Sheridan on August 10.

Law Enforcement Officer Howard H. Chapman represented Yellowstone National Park at the annual meeting of the Montana Sheriffs and Peace Officers' Meeting in Billings, August 10, 11 and 12. Mr. Chapman attended the Wyoming Police Protective Association of Wyoming's summer meeting at Worland, Wyoming, August 14 and 15.

The third and last no-host Ladies Luncheon of the season was held at Lake Hotel, August 16. The luncheons have been very popular and the National Park Service and Concessioner ladies enjoy the get-togethers.

On August 19-22 District Manager Good took Dr. and Mrs. Oz Hawksley and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Reynolds and young daughter on a trip to Shoshone Lake to check its suitability for an American White Water Affiliates sponsored wilderness canoe trip next August. Dr. Hawksley is Trip Planning Chairman of American White Water Affiliates.

Two children were lost on August 19 in the Beula Lake area. Rangers conducted an intensive search of the area and the children were found on the morning of the 20th and returned to their parents.

Paul Roy Ingebretsen, 15 years of age, of Pocatello, Idaho, drowned while fishing in the Yellowstone River near the Mud Volcano. Young Ingebretsen was fishing with his father and attempted to wade out to the middle of the river, lost balance on slippery bottom, his chest waders filled with water and he was carried beneath the surface. Bill Knight and Jim Wright of Lansing, Illinois, qualified skin divers, camping in the Park, assisted in the search. The body was recovered about 8:30 p.m.

A population census was taken in the Park on August 20. Results will be included in the September narrative report.

The annual Campfire Day Pageant was presented at Madison Junction on August 20 commemorating the historic campfire of the Washburn-Langford-Doane Expedition, and the birth of the National Park idea. Approximately 1,000 people attended.

Prior to the presentation, Superintendent Garrison addressed the audience attending the Pageant, regarding the new facilities at Madison Junction for public use. The Service held open house during the afternoon at the newly opened facilities--the new campground, picnic and employees residence area.

Maynard Barrows, Forester, from Dinosaur National Monument, and William S. Douglas, Radiological Defense Officer, OCDM, Denver, were here August 22-23 conducting the Radiological Monitoring Course on a radiological instrument operation at Canyon Village.

Ernest R. Anderson, Administrative Officer, Supervisory Accountant Ellis Gabbert and Personnel Assistant John Clay attended an instructional meeting in Sheridan, Wyoming, August 23, on changes in the Health Benefits Plan.

Mr. H. L. Junkin, Jr., Supervisor, Claim Department, Aetna Insurance Company, called at the Personnel Office to answer questions on the Aetna Plan, August 29.

As this is a very important matter, the Commission has decided to hold a public hearing on this subject. Hans Trankle, crew leader, and the Park smokejumper crew with the smokejumper plane left West Yellowstone August 23 for Missoula to assist on fires in Region One of the United States Forest Service. They had not returned by the end of the month.

Forest Insect and Disease Control. Forester Gynn, U. S. Forest Service, inspected the Blister Rust Control project several times during the month.

A white pine and ribes survey was started on August 2 in the West Thumb and Grant Village area. At a later date this project will be extended to include Lewis Lake campground development.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities. On August 22, rangers aided U. S. Fish & Wildlife representatives plant 10,000 graylings in Ice Lake. This should complete Ice Lake stocking for the next two years. The U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service biologist recommended the grayling population in Ice Lake be maintained at about 20,000 fish because of its food production capacity.

The water temperature of the Firehole River has risen again this summer. Recent readings have recorded temperatures ranging from 80 to 83 degrees. Although no fish losses have been reported as yet, trout have been observed lying in the riffles and swift water. The same occurrence was noted last year on July 18 and was attributed to increased thermal activity coupled with high summer air temperatures.

Pelicans. On August 10 a flock of pelican were observed from the summit of Mt. Sheridan flying west from the Molly Islands toward Idaho. It is estimated there were between 100 and 200 birds in the flight. Ranger Paul Sebesta reported large colonies of adult pelicans leaving the South and Southeast Arms of the Lake about the same date and they have not returned.

Many of the waterfowl are grouping for flights. Flocks of parent birds with their young have been observed in all areas.

GENERAL

Weather Conditions:

August continued hot and dry for the most part. The first good rain fell on the 13th, followed by a light shower on the 14th. Lightning storms have occurred almost daily causing several hundred forest fires in the surrounding forests. The end of the month has brought colder day time temperatures and higher humidity along with a few light sprinkles to cool things generally climaxed by a soaking day-long drizzle on the 31st. An unofficial high of 93° was observed on August 5 and a low of 35° on the 30th.

Decrease in Travel:

It is assumed the decrease in travel for August was due to the road construction work on State Highway 43, dry weather and numerous forest fires in the general area. Travel was as follows:

Special Activities:

Acting Superintendent Williams and family made a trip to Yellowstone National Park August 5 - 6 for supplies and to take care of forthcoming boundary status survey details with Troop 100 officer Bean and landscape architect Roseniere.

Historian O. W. Judge of Casper, Wyoming made a metal detector search of the Nez Perce campsite area on August 21-22. He graciously turned over to the National Park Service his finds and data. Coincidentally, Mr. Charles P. Vermees of Milwaukee, Wisconsin was pot-holing the area at the same time with his metal locator. It is hoped between Mr. Judge and the Acting Superintendent he was partially convinced as we did manage some data and objects from him.

Judge's finds were verified by Park Ranger Historian Williamson and the Acting Superintendent on August 23. On August 30 these finds were staked and plotted by Williamson. The finds substantiate a firing line in the center of the camp. The report with pictures and diagrams will be completed soon. Mr. Judge is to be complimented by the National Park Service for his work. He had been to the Bear River Battlefield prior to coming here. He donated to the National Park Service his finds from there which will mean much to our study collection.

Progress of construction on State Highway 43 increased considerably during the month. All contractors were working; with one (Triangle Construction) working two shifts. Three bridges over Trail Creek are now complete as is one large box culvert (for F. L. McDevell's ditch to trestle.).

Telephone and powerline relocation along right-of-way is almost complete between the monument and Wisdom. Numerous concrete culverts are in place. Excavation and footing piling work has been done on the large bridge to cross the Big Hole River at Wisdom. Another month will see monument headquarters one-half mile off the main road.

ADMINISTRATION

Park Ranger (General) John F. Burgers was terminated COB August 26.

General Publicity:

There were 2200 informational folders on hand at month's end.

Safety and Health:

On August 9 it was necessary to X-ray Acting Superintendent Williams' right heel in Livingston, Montana (fractured March 21). It was determined the heel is not progressing as it should. After a radiologist had examined the X-rays Williams was ordered back to crutches.

Numerous color transparencies were added to Big Hole Battlefield and Yellowstone's collections during the month. Twenty-five slides were forwarded to the Region II office for their interpretation collection on August 29.

Two new museum items were received and placed on display during the month. A trowel bayonet and a howitzer ammunition box were received on August 2 from Mr. Walt Glendinning of Ellyria, Ohio thanks to the Yellowstone Museum and Library Association.

A small boy (much to his surprise) hit and killed a ground squirrel with a stone. He was reprimanded verbally by Park Ranger Burgers and physically by his father.

Wildlife Activities:

Dr. Benny Constantine, VMD, D.V.M. Rabies Investigation Station, State College, New Mexico was appealed to for help regarding the bats in the museum. He graciously sent a commercial dog repellent called "KIDZ" for us to try. After two sprayings the bats are gone - at least temporarily. This repellent is supposed to repel skunks also.

No skunks were live trapped during the month from beneath the residence.

An unknown specie of snake was observed near the water tank on the 14th. Probably a garter snake; it was the first observed this summer.
