Subject: Monthly Report for September 1956

General

Weather. Weather for the month of September was near normal with a maximum temperature of 84 degrees and a minimum of 26 degrees. Moisture content was much higher than average. Precipitation was recorded on 15 days, totaling 1.25 inches, doubling the normal for the past ten years. The first snowstorm occurred on September 24, with from one to four inches on the higher elevations.

Range. Biologist Kittams spent considerable time in making photographs of browse transects enclosures and of open-range plats, also selecting exclosure sites.

Increase or Decrease in Travel. Travel for September continued its downward trend, showing a decrease of 10.8 percent.

Visitors, 137,049 against 153,567 in September 1957. Travel for the year through September was 1,409,870 as compared to 1,570,639 last year which is a decrease of 10.2 percent. Trailer travel continues to show an increase. Trailers entering the Park during September were 505; September 1957, 467. Trailer increase for the year to date is 13.1 percent. Boats brought into the Park show an increase for the year of 19.5 percent over 1957. Collection of entrance less discontinued September 30.

Inspections. Messrs. John Venesh and George Wheeler, auditors from the General Accounting Office in Denver, arrived in the Park on September 1. Mr. Vonesh will have general supervision while here. Mr. J. F. Lykins, Auditor in Charge of the General Accounting Office in Denver, and Mr. Gordon Haynes arrived September 2. Mr. Lykins will be the auditor in charge while working on National Park Service accounts. Messrs. Perry F. Lynn and Lauden C. Mannes arrived September 7 to assist present auditors. They remained until September 9. Mr. George Grewe arrived September 22. Mr. John Kurlich, GAO official from Washington, D. C., arrived September 25 and remained until October 1.

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Mr. Henry J. Viche, U. S. Forest Service, Missoula, forester in charge of Blister Rust Operations, was in the Park from September 2 through September 4.

Mr. Charles E. Kreuger, Supervisor, Major Roads Section, WODC, was in the Park September 4 and 5.

Mr. Richard W. Barnett, Landscape Architect, WODC, in September 4, working on master plans and remained throughout the month.

Mr. Francis J. Goodrich, Architect, General, Region Two, arrived September 9, departed on the 10th.

Assistant Regional Director Melbourne H. Harvey, tegion Two, was in the Park September 9 and 10.

Mr. Roy F. Wilson, Board Supervisor, Tenth U. 5. Sivil Service Region, Denver, visited the Park, September 12, to review general operations of the Local Civil Service Board to discuss problems affecting the Board.

Mr. K. H. Goslin, Architect from ODC, arrived in the Pack September 21. He remained through September 30.

Mr. Walter H. Sheffield, Landscape Architect from the Washington Office, arrived September 25 and remained through October 5.

Special Visitors. Mr. Merrill F. Small, administrative assistant to U. S. Senator Thomas H. Kuchel of California, entered the Park on September 2.

Mr. Robert F. McConnell, Counsel for Committee on Public Works, U. S. House of Representatives, Washington, D. C., arrived in the Park on Jeptember 3 for a week's stay.

A group of Turkish Foresters and a representative of the U. S. Forest Service were conducted on a trip around the Park by Chief Park Naturalist Condon on September 4 and 5.

Congressman John J. McFall of California, and his family, spent September 6 and 8 in the Park.

Mr. Jackson of the NATIONAL MOTORIST MAGAZINE was in the Park on the 7th getting pictures and material for a story.

Hon. Keith Thomson, Representative-at-large from Wyoming was in the Park on September 11.

Mr. Henry J. Viche, U. S. Forest Servica, Missoula, forester in char e of Blister Rust Operations, was in the Park from September 1 through September 4.

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Mr. Akira Suwa, Chief Volcanologist for Japan was met by Chief Park Naturalist Condon, September 14 and taken around the Park.

Mr. Ray Prohaska was in the Park from September 15 to 18. An artist for RED BOOK magazine, he was obtaining pictures and paintings for an article on Yellowstone which will appear in that magazine next Spring.

Special Activities. Mr. Guy D. Haselton, photographer from Hollywood, California, was in the Park on September 3 and remained throughout the month, making colored-motion pictures of the Geyser Basins.

Superintendent Garrison and Management Assistant Joffe traveled to Dubois, Wyoming to attend a meeting with Wyoming Chamber of Commerce executives, and returned September 5.

Assistant Superintendent Gastellum departed September 5, on annual leave, for Kansas City to attend the National Convention of the National Federation of Federal Employees. At this meeting he was elected Fourth National Vice President, having previously served as the Eighth Vice President of the National Federation of Federal Employees.

The Tenth Departmental Management Program started in Washington, D. C., on September 8. Yellowstone did not have a representative at this training session.

Management Assistant Joffe went to Dickinson, North Dakota on September 9 to attend the annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest Travel Association, returning September 14. He and Stanley Joseph of Glacier National Park, were reelected as Directors from Montana.

Superintendent Garrison and funtly Child, Vice President of Yellowstone Park Company attended a group meeting in Vest Yellowstone on September 13 of the Park Cateways Association, a newly former organization. This meeting was to discuss protection against increasing facilities in the Park, advertising by concessioners, and other matters pertaining to restraint of accommodations within the Park.

Supervisory Accountant Gabbert was appointed Montana Stat.

President of the National Federation of Federal Employees at a meeting held in Great Falls, September 27, to succeed Mrs. Bernice I.

Lamey, resigned. Mr. Gabbert was holding the office of Fourth Vice

President of the State Federation of Federal Employees Unions.

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Personnel Officer Miller and Administrative Officer Anderson were in Casper, Wyoming on September 23 and 24, attending a special conference with the Civil Service Commission regarding the new promotion program.

Superintendent Garrison and Gar Helppie went to Cheyenne, Wyoming on September 23, where Mr. Garrison talked to a combined meeting of the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club.

Mr. and Mrs. Garrison, Mr. and Mrs. Gastellum, Mr. and Mrs. Joffe, Mr. and Mrs. John Nichols, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Haynes, Trev Povah and Gar Helppie attended a party in Billings on September 24 given for Yellowstone officials by the Billings Chamber of Commerce, to promote better public relations.

Superintendent Garrison lest for Salt Lake City on September 28. He addressed a group meeting of the Society of American Foresters on the subject, Our National Parks in the Dynamic Challenge of Outdoor Recreation.

Assistant Superintendent Gastellum, District Ranger Edwards, and Sub-District Ranger Packard departed on a back country inspection trip on September 28. They visited the Cold Greek, Notch Mountain boundary area, and Upper and Lower Miller area. The horseback trip covered a distance of approximately 75 miles in four days. The back country appeared in good shape and a number of wildlife species were observed. Fish resources are good.

U. S. Forest Service officials in Bozeman on September 30 and conferred with Montana State Land Commission in Helena, Montana on land matters regarding Big Hole Battlefield National Monument.

Staff meetings were held September 4 and 19.

Administration

Personnel. Robert L. Burns, Park Ranger, GS-7, reassignment to Big Hole Battlefield National Monument, effective September L. Mr. Burns has the distinction of being the first permanent employee at Big Hole Battlefield National Monument.

Mr. John W. Hughes, received conversion to Career-Conditional appointment September 2, as Park Ranger in Yellowstone. Prior to his promotion he was Park Ranger (General), GS-4, in National Bridges National Monument.

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Two members of the State Highway Patrol staff, received Deputy Park Ranger appointments, effective September 5. They will work in conjunction with Park Rangers on traffic violations and law enforcement problems on Montana highways which extend into various sections of Yellowstone National Park.

John N. Reeves, promotion to a newly established position, Forestry Aid (Timber Management, GS-7), effective September 11.

Mr. Frank L. English, reinstatement to permanent electrician position, September 15.

Miss Alice A. Kohout, Secretary (Stenography) resigned, effective September 19.

Mrs. Helen B. Tracy, promotion to Secretary (Stenography), GS-5, effective September 21.

Mr. Duane N. Graf, reassignment from Supervisory Park Ranger, GS-7, at Petrified Forest National Monument to Park Ranger, GS-7, in Yellowstone, effective September 29.

A convocation was held September 19 at which time Superintendent Garrison presented 10, 20 and 30 year service pins to Yellowstone employees; eight 10-year pins, four 20-year pins and two 30-year pins. William A. Wright, Assistant Supply Officer, was presented a commendable service award. He retired September 30 after more than 30 years of service, all with the National Park Service in Yellowstone. Mr. Wright also received a medal, lapel button and a lifetime pass to National Park Service areas. Mr. William C. Mardis was presented with an honor award. Thomas B. Hyde, Sanitation Engineer, received a Certificate of Completion of the 1958 Department Manager Development Program. Mr. Hyde completed this training program in Washington, D. C. in May.

In-Service Training. Three training movies concerning other National Park Service areas were shown to employees and their families on September 10.

On September 8, Park Ranger Jack Williams left Yellowstone National Park for Theodore Roosevelt National Memorial Park where he will remain until November 19 on a special assignment.

Miscellaneous. The Manmoth school and the Gardiner schools began on September 2.

Mammoth Hospital closed for the season on September 27.

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Mr. Jack Parkes resigned as Manager of the Hamilton Store at Manmoth Village on September 30. He has been affiliated with the Hamilton Stores, Inc for the past twenty years. He will be the Eastern Montana representative of the Minnesota Woolen Company.

Jackson Hole, Wyoming airport was dedicated on September 7.

On September 10, thirty-nine equipment items were sold by spot bid sale at the Storehouse for \$13,088.77, an average of \$335.01 each. This was our first effort of this sort and it went exceedingly well, taking a total of only one hour and twenty minutes to conduct. Results were much better than from the regular type bid sale.

On September 22, a check was received from the Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company for \$187,324.00 covering the entire indebtedness due from the Telephone Company in agreement with Contract No. 14-10-243-261 dated March 6, 1958 and Contract No. 14-243-261 Supplement, dated September 16, 1958. The balance of \$151,982.00 which was originally due the Government is to be used for certain underground installations to be done by the Telephone Company according to the terms of the Supplement in agreement with an understanding with the Comptroller General's Decision No. B 135758 dated July 28, 1958.

Births. A daughter, Sandra Ruth, was born to Mr. and Mrs. William W. Workman on September 15. Mr. Workman is employed as engineer in Yellowstone National Park.

A son, Douglas Francis, was born to Mr. and Mrs. Mrvin Coy, September 23. Mr. Coy is employed as fireman at the Mammoth Post Office.

Deaths. Percy Fields, 67 from Savanah, Missouri, died of a heart attack on September 4. Mr. Fields was a guest of Park Ranger Dale H. Nuss and was boating on Yellowstone Lake when he succumbed. He is the father-in-law of Jack Heaton, former seasonal Park Ranger Naturalist in Yellowstone, new with the Montana Fish & Game Department.

Robert A. Brandt, a visitor, 63, died of heart attack, September 15, near Bechler River Ranger Station.

Marriages. Mr. William R. Reed and Miss Sonja Kopland were married September 7 in the American Lutheran Church, Livingston, Montana. Mr. Reed is the son of Ralph Reed, Power Plant Operator for the National Park Service. Mr. Reed is serving in the U. S. Navy in California.

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Mr. Charles D. Troy and Miss Alice A. Kohout were married September 27 in St. Mary's Catholic Church in Livingston, Montana. Miss Kohout was employed as Secretary (Stenography) with the National Park Service.

Accidents and Public Safety. A total of 11 automobile accidents occurred during the month, 7 Minor, 3 Class A, and one involving a government vehicle.

One fire fighter and cook received a head injury when thrown from a horse on his way to the Union Falls fire on September 2.

Ivan A. Burchett, USAF, was rescued from the Canyon on September 3 when he attempted to cross the river. Three Rangers were involved in this rescue.

Cooperative Activities

Publicity. On each Thursday, the Yellowstone Weekly News was issued to keep employees, concessioners and other currently informed of Park happenings.

Press releases issued throughout the month were on election of Assistant Superintendent Gastellum to Fourth Vice President of the National Federation of Federal Employees, Villiam A. Wright and William C. Mardis convocation and sward of 10, 20 and 30 year service pins.

Pictures were sent to various newspapers on September 26 covering convocation, September 19, at which awards were made of 10, 20 and 30 years service pins, and commendable service award to William A. Wright.

Associated Press and United Press were sent story of Mammoth Fire on September 3.

Religious and Chapel Use. The Latter-Day Saints services were terminated at Manmoth on September 7, and on September 14 throughout the Park. The student Ministry Program was terminated on September 28. Protestant services were held throughout the month.

Museum Activities and Exhibits. Museum activities in the Park were all terminated during the month. The Mammoth Museum remained open on September 30.

Research and Observation. Cames Battlefield, near Kilgore, Idaho, is being studied in connection with the Big Hole Historical Research Program.

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Concessioners. Superintendent Garrison met with the concessioners on September 3--those attending in addition to Park Service personnel, were: Messrs. Nichols and Child of the Yellowstone Park Company, Messrs. Povah and Helppie of Hamilton Stores, Inc., and Mr. and Mrs. Haynes of Haynes Inc. May he was the service of the service of Hamilton Stores, Inc., and Mrs. Haynes of Haynes Inc.

Operations of the concessioners were closed by the end of the month except at Mannoth and Old Faithful.

Maintenance. Regular maintenance, sealing of 15.9 miles, and guardrail work continued. The Lake lodge road project was completed September 12 except for sealing.

Construction. The Nielsen Construction Company of St. Anthony, Idaho were awarded the contract for residential buildings, wash house, utility building and horse bern at Lake, \$220,137.76.

The Hartwell Construction Company of Idaho Falls, Idaho, water, sewer and electrical systems, government employee trailer area, Mammoth, \$40,030.50.

Vaughn Landscaping and Tree Service, Twin Falls, Idaho, fine grading and planting (por.) at Lake, \$15,000.

Operation "Red Shacks" was almost completed in the Canyon area this month. Every "Red Shack", tent-frame and pit privy was hauled from the Government utility area and piled in the old borrow pit for burning. The employee old trailer court was obliterated and is being restored to its natural condition. Howard Crane has supervised this entire operation which represents the most concentrated and thorough clean-up job to be accomplished in Yellowstone during the past twenty years.

Complaints. Six complaint letters were received, four regarding services and accommodations and two about road conditions.

Protection and Ranger Service. Rangers are re-stocking the patrol cabins for winter use.

Law Enforcement. A total of eight violation cases were heard before the U.S. Commissioner, including petty theft, liquor violations, disorderly conduct and speeding.

Taggart Construction Company was burgalarized on September 1 and \$800 in pay checks were stolen. The thief was apprehended by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The Smith Construction Company was relieved of tools and other light equipment valued at \$500. Investigation continuing.

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Building Fire Protection. Building No. 92 was completely destroyed by fire on September 3. This building was used as a storage shed and contents were inventoried at \$64,854.19.

Forest Fire Protection. Forest fire fighting in the South District and Bechler River Sub-District curtailed other ranger activities. Four Class A, one Class B and three Class C forest fires were reported, found and suppressed during September.

The parachute loft was closed and the plane released on September 16.

Forest Insects. Blister Rust Control work was suspended September 1, the crews were drafted for fire fighting. A total of 10,660 acres were worked this season.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities. BEAR. Bear injuries to persons through September total 36, property damage totals 110, compared to 91 and 117, respectively, for the same period last year.

BIRDS. Forty to 50 Grinnell's Water Thrushes were observed in the Upper Nez Perce Creek area on September 25. This bird is not listed on the Yellowstone Park check list.

BIGHORN SHEEP. Five were observed on Mt. Washburn on September 7.

BISON. One herd of 300 bison was observed from the air on September 11 in Hayden Valley. A small herd of 30 was observed in the Upper Nex Perce Creek; a herd of 35 was seen in Lamar Valley, and a few bison were observed in the South District.

DEER. Deer have been seen frequently at lower elevations.

fall. No large herds have been observed.

GRIZZLY BEARS. Thirty-one observed in Trout Creek dump area on September 7, eleven were this year's cubs, seven were observed in Rabbit Creek dump area on September 16.

MOOSE. Moose were observed during the first two weeks of the month, but very infrequently during the last half of the month.

SWAMS. An aerial swam census was conducted by Biologist Kittams and Acting Forester Edwards on the 11th. The total count for Yellowstone National Park was 82 awans, 64 adults and 18 cygnets.

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
