Glen Echo began in 1891 as a National Chautauqua Assembly, a center "To promote liberal and practical education, especially among the masses of the people; to teach the sciences, arts, languages, and literature; to prepare its patrons for their several pursuits and professions in life; and to fit them for the duties which devolve upon them as members of society." By 1900 Glen Echo had become an Amusement Park which served the Washington area until 1968. Since 1971, Glen Echo has again been developing the concept of arts and cultural education for everyone under National Park Service direction and with a high level of public and community involvement. It serves both the surrounding communities and visitors from across the country. Its four sessions of classes are taught year-round by well-known artists and professionals, some of whom are members of the residency programs in the park. There are concerts, demonstrations, workshops and festivals on Sundays during the warm months as a part of the Chautauqua Summer Season, one of the largest cultural programs in the Washington, D.C. area. In addition, the antique handcarved and hand-painted Dentzel carousel, saved by community effort, operates on summer weekends, and the Gallery offers changing monthly exhibitions of Glen Echo's artists.

in 1925 by the Rudolph Wurlitzer Company of North Tonawanda, New York. It was more commonly known as a Wurlitzer 165 Military Band Organ and, at the time, was the largest model in regular

With electricity as its source of energy, the carousel organ operates pneumatically continually moving suction pumps and bellows within the organ provide constant air supply to its many parts. The organ also uses music rolls (similar to those found in player pianos) which ride along a "tracker frame" to provide the music for the organ. Since the organ is equipped with two music rolls, one can operate while the other is quietly rewinding, and continuous music can be played. All together, over 250 wooden pipes help create the melodies for the 80 songs contained on each roll.

The Glen Echo Park carousel organ is considered by many to be one of the finest sounding of the 12 known surviving Wurlitzer 165 organs in this country. We are fortunate that today both the Dentzel Carousel and this beautiful organ continue to entertain thousands of visitors each year

The instruction is geared to the needs and level of development of the individual student and so the classes are composed of both beginners and advanced students. Classes in ceramics at Glen Echo Pottery afford a unique opportunity to explore the exciting medium of clay, glazing, and firing techniques. Instruction is given in an environment that is both relaxed and informal and creatively serious. The teaching philosophy at Glen Echo Pottery is to enable the students to express themselves as fully as possible in their own way and at their own pace

All sessions cover beginning through advanced wheel techniques, wedging, centering, and throwing on the potter's wheel.

A firing fee is charged according to the formula worked out. Kiln rentals are made available to local craftspersons and institutions upon request. Note there is no firing fee for the beginning wheel student.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURE

GLEN ECHO DANCE THEATER

Glen Echo Dance Theater is a non-profit corporation whose purpose is to provide a dance center offering the Washington area an excellent school of dance with a resident professional dance company and to serve as a major performing center for dance companies of the greater metropolitan area. Established in the summer of 1977 by Jan Tievsky, Artistic Director, Glen Echo Dance Theater became the resident dance company of Glen Echo Park, sponsored by the National Park Service. In the fall of 1977, the school of dance was started. The curriculum includes Modern, Jazz, Ballet, Improvisation and Dance as a Contact Sport. Glen Echo Dance Theater offers internship programs for academic credit to high school and college students.

The faculty members have performed widely throughout the metropolitan area. Performances have included those at George Washington University, St. Mary's College, Summer in the Parks, Wolf Trap, the MDA'S Choreographers Showcase and the Roundhouse Theater. They have also been performing in the school systems of Fairfax, Montgomery, and Prince George's Counties. Glen Echo Dance Theater has hosted guest choreographers from nationally known companies who have taught master classes at the studio.

THE DANCE EXCHANGE

The Dance Exchange is a unique and innovative organization. Its integrated approach to artistic development and community involvement provides a powerful model for the expansion of the arts in community life. In the fall of 1984 the Dance Exchange and its performing companies became our guest company-in-residence. To contact the Dance Exchange, call 229-8036.

The Dance Exchange Performance Company is composed of professional dancers from the Washington area. Combining dance with realistic imagery, works are defined by the spoken word, drawing upon literature, personal experience, philosophy, and political/social commentary. The company performs throughout the Washington area, most recently at Dance Place and The Pavilion (under the auspices of the Washington Performing Arts Society). In addition, the Company tours the country, presenting concerts such as its recent performance at Dance Theatre Workshop in New York City.






Refund Policy
