ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

Research for this report began during the 18 months between Bess Truman's death and the opening of the home to the public. There was much research to be done and many planning efforts began simultaneously. Most of those involved were experiencing the house for the first time and many of our efforts overlapped. As a result this report compiles information gathered by several individuals.

Director Zobrist and staff of the Harry S. Truman Library completed the monumental task of inventorying the contents of the home. The inventory is primarily the work of Pat Kerr and Liz Safly both of whom continue to support our efforts by sharing their invaluable memories of this process.

Regional Chief of Cultural Resources Andy Ketterson provided the first Park Service presence in the home. His December 1982 photographs form the earliest comprehensive pictorial documentation for the home.

From the start, Ranger-in-Charge Tom Richter and later Superintendent Norm Reigle and staff have actively gathered information about the Trumans' life in this house and its contents. Their efforts remain on-going. The work of park curator Steve Harrison and student researcher Jim Williams contributes heavily to this report.

Historian Ron Cockrell's work forms an important background for any research on the site.

Finally, special thanks go to Margaret Truman Daniel for her support and her interest in exhibiting an accurate and meaningful picture of her family in their home at 219 North Delaware.

ADMINISTRATIVE DATA

Location and Proposed Use

The Truman home is the primary resource of the Harry S Truman National Historic Site established by Public Law 98-32 on May 23, 1983. Located at 219 North Delaware Street in Independence, Missouri, it has been identified for preservation, interpretation, and research purposes. Interpretive Objectives and Period of Interpretation

Former President Harry S Truman's habits and tastes, his immediate family, and three generations of his extended family are all represented at 219 North Delaware. The house, where Truman lived for 58 years, is a vivid three-dimensional extension of the man. It is a natural stage for interpreting Truman through the spaces he inhabited.

In addition, as the summer White House from 1945 through 1953, the home provides an opportunity to interpret aspects of the Truman presidency, like Truman's reaction to the invasion of South Korea, news of which he received at 219 North Delaware.

The furnishings plan represents the important cumulative nature of these interiors. Bess Truman died on October 18, 1982. Unlike previous periods the October 1982 house is fully documented resulting from the Truman Library inventory of the contents completed at this time. Technically, therefore, these interiors represent Bess Truman's death date, although items associated exclusively with her final illness, such as a hospital bed, have been removed. But, broadly speaking, the plan represents the several years prior to the former president's death in 1972 and Bess Truman's subsequent years as a widow.

Visitors, in fact will see the 1982 house little changed from 1953 when the Trumans returned from the White House. Immediately following the presidency and Madge Gates Wallace's death, the Trumans redecorated the house to suit their own needs and tastes, incorporating many objects from Truman's years in the Senate and as president, yet retaining much of the flavor of the Gates and Wallace occupancies. Evidence shows the Trumans made remarkably few changes following this redecoration project.

Operating Plan


219 North Delaware is open to visitors year-round (Christmas, New Year's, and Thanksgiving Days excepted) from 9 a.m. to 4:45 p.m. The home is closed Mondays after Labor Day and before Memorial Day. Guided tours are conducted every fifteen minutes.

Tours consist of eight visitors and one park interpreter, with one to two additional park rangers, as needed, stationed outside the house at the front gate.

Visitors enter the back door, proceed through the kitchen and butler's pantry to the dining room and central hall, exiting from the front door. From this route visitors can view the library, music room, and living room. Rangers are responsible for the preservation and security of the house and contents as well as providing interpretation during the tour. Additional protection is provided by shaded carpeting indicating the tour route and an electronic security system. Through the use of a stair climbing device the mobility disabled are provided full access to the tour route.

While this report provides documentation for both the first and second floors of the Truman home, visitation is limited to the first floor.

HISTORICAL DATA

Primary Sources

Two comprehensive records exist of the Trumans' 1982 house. First is a nearly complete inventory of the contents, excluding the kitchen, attic, basement, and back porch, prepared in 1981-82 by the Harry S. Truman Library. Second is a complete photographic inventory taken by the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS) in March 1983, five months after Bess Truman's death.

Before the HABS photographer arrived, some manuscript materials, like books bearing particularly valuable inscriptions, albums, scrapbooks, and appointment books, were removed to the Truman Library where they remain. In addition, Margaret Truman Daniel removed some items. At Mrs. Daniel's request and by way of cleaning up, unshelved stacks of books, particularly in the library, were likewise removed (many to a thrift store). Such objects do not appear in the HABS photographs. Most of the HABS photographs are reproduced in figures 44 through 91. They serve mainly as visual corroboration for the 1981-82 inventory which is the primary source for the furnishings plan.

With the exception of the study contents, the Truman Library inventory is not reproduced here in facsimile, but objects in the furnishings plan are keyed to that inventory.

Numerous pre-HABS interior photographs survive of 219 North Delaware, as well as of the Trumans' Connecticut Avenue residence in Washington, D.C., and are reproduced in figures 1 through 43. These photographs provide good documentation for the living room, hall, music room, library, and back porch.

An important series of color photographs on file at the park was taken in December 1982 by Regional Chief of Cultural Resources Andy Ketterson who was the first Park Service presence in the home. These

photographs are nearly as comprehensive in scope as the HABS photos and, with few exceptions, they confirm the HABS images of three months later.

Three unrelated series of color snapshots (mostly unreplicable in quality) dating between December 1980 and October 1982 are also on file at the park. These images, resulting from such occasions as an October 1982 fire inspection, provide documentation for selected areas.

Photographs of the private quarters in the Truman White House and the Blair House have been examined to identify objects used both in Washington and Independence.

An additional pictorial source is the footage from "Person to Person," filmed in May 1955 with Margaret Truman as guest moderator. This footage, of course, also offers an invaluable medium for interpretation. Still pictures from "Person to Person" are found in figures 30-33.

In 1983, the Park Service conducted extensive interviews about the home, primarily with Margaret Truman Daniel and Mrs. George P. Wallace, the Trumans' sister-in-law and immediate neighbor. In November, 1983, Smithsonian World filmed an interview with Mrs. Daniel in the house, a transcript of which has been made available to the Service. Subsequent interviews have been conducted with former Truman employees and friends.

Documenting the White House years, the Truman Papers at the Truman Library contain packing lists of objects shipped to the Independence house in January 1953. I have not, however, located shipping records for the pre-White House objects purchased in Washington during the Senatorial years.

A small collection survives at the Truman Library of invoices recording purchases for the house from 1884 through 1980, and these are found in Appendix II. Probate records for George P. and Elizabeth Gates are found in Appendix I. These estate inventories are disappointingly brief, and Wallace and Truman estate records contain no object itemization at all.

Finally, Ron Cockrell's excellent Historic Structure Report and Historic Resource Study contain thorough analyses of room use and historic occupancy at 219 North Delaware. That information is not repeated here, nor is the sequence of interior painting, wallpaper, and carpeting work so well covered in the Historic Structure Report.

Recommendations for Further Research

While excellent documentation exists for the furnishings at 219 North Delaware, needs and opportunities for additional research will continue to arise. Ongoing research will only enrich records of the site collection and of the Trumans' life in this house.

As it becomes available, all archival and documentary material removed from the house during the course of the Truman Library inventory should be examined. Bess Truman's, as well as Margaret Truman Daniel's, papers are potentially a valuable source of information about the home. Likewise, the many appointment books removed may provide useful documentation of comings and goings at 219 North Delaware. All attempts to locate additional invoices documenting purchases for the home are also worthwhile.

Time constraints have prevented thoroughly documenting the Trumans travels. Many objects in the house are souvenirs and probably could be precisely dated by a travel log. For instance, tracing the origins of the many oriental pieces in the house forms a useful research project in itself.

Questions remain about a few objects which may have been added, moved, or removed by the household staff who assisted Mrs. Truman in her final years. Answers to these questions should be pursued.

Finally, oral history is an important, ongoing program that will continue to provide new insights into the home. While many interviews have already been conducted, additional informants have been identified and should be interviewed.

Furnishing 219 North Delaware: A Summary

Documentation for the interiors of the Truman house breaks down into three periods: 1885 through the 1920s, the Gates period; the 1920s through 1953, Madge Gates Wallace's tenure as head of household and the Trumans' years in Washington, D.C.; and 1953 through 1982, the post-White House years to Bess Truman's death.

The Gates' first recorded furniture purchases date to 1884-1886. They seem to have been part and parcel of Gates' 1885 addition to the home. The Gates made several major purchases, all in Kansas City, apparently entirely outfitting a parlor and two bedrooms. They also bought lace curtains and made major carpet purchases of Brussels and rag carpets, some of which were laid wall-to-wall (Appendix II).

The Trumans retained none of this 1880s furniture in their living quarters after 1953. The Eastlake style pieces remaining in the collection are probably these Gates purchases. Most likely these pieces were put in attic storage much earlier than 1953. None appear in the earliest interior view (1905, figure 1), nor in the living and dining room photos of the 1930s (figures 2-14). An exception is the walnut drop-leaf table that has stood in the front hall at least since 1953. This may well be the walnut table bought in 1886.

The family did not reject this furniture out of any dislike for antiques. They, in fact, retained throughout the 20th century some sixteen family pieces predating the Gates' purchases by several decades. Consisting primarily of parlor pieces, a card table, and a secretary/bookcase, these pieces all date between 1840 and 1870. They probably came with the Gates from Vermont, as did the 18th-century English tall clock that George P. Gates transported with him to Independence.¹

Elizabeth Gates' 1924 estate inventory appears to include the 1880s furniture as well as several other pieces that may be this earlier furniture (Appendix I).

From the 1920s through the presidency, documented changes appear mainly in carpets and curtains. Mrs. Daniel remembers portieres framing the living room doors through the 1920s.² Central heating was installed in 1907 and the portieres were therefore retained almost two decades after they became functionally obsolete. This remained, however, a cold house even with the gravity flow central heating system.

By 1926, if not earlier, the heavy lace curtains in the living room were replaced with sheer curtains. For apparently brief periods during the 1930s and 40s, the Trumans used drapes over sheer curtains in the living room, and in 1942 the Trumans' Connecticut Avenue apartment in Washington, D.C. shows printed drapes much like those present at 219 North Delaware in 1940.

Sometime after 1926, the interior shutters were removed and replaced with roller shades (figures 2-17). Numerous interior and exterior photographs show the shades evenly pulled down to cover three-quarters of the window. Mrs. Truman's precision with the shades is well documented.³

The living room shows rugs in 1926 but wall-to-wall carpets in the 1930s and 40s. Rugs appear in the hall and dining room in the 1930s and were probably the rule in these areas until 1949 (figures 2-14).

Few furniture purchases are documented during this middle period. The Trumans bought some individual pieces, like chairs; did some upholstery work; and, upon Margaret's birth in 1924, bought child's furniture (Appendix II). But, apparently, the only major addition during this period was the Steinway baby grand piano bought for Margaret at Christmas, 1932. Years later, the former president recalled paying five dollars a month for Margaret's piano.⁴

Between Truman's election to the Senate in 1934 and his move to the White House in 1945, the family occupied seven residences in Washington, mostly apartments. All evidence indicates they filled most of their furniture needs from local Washington stores. A 1937 invoice survives for major purchases of bedroom furniture in Washington. Bess Truman was in Independence at the time, and Truman

himself initiated this purchase.⁵ While other Washington invoices have not come to light, Mrs. Daniel has identified additional pieces, some of which bear Washington, D.C., retailers' marks.⁶ Presumably, most furniture that appears in the 1942 photographs of the 4701 Connecticut Avenue residence was bought in Washington. The Trumans, however, did ship some items from Independence. For instance, the dining room chairs at 4701 Connecticut Avenue are the same chairs used at 219 North Delaware in the 1930s (figures 6, 17).

During Congressional recesses, the Trumans usually returned to Independence, storing their Washington furniture. Truman wrote to the Colonial Storage Company in Washington in 1941 complaining of the condition of several pieces stored there. Repairs were needed on a divan, a radio, and a floor lamp.⁷ While no return shipments to Independence are documented before 1945, as the Trumans prepared to enter the White House in May 1945, the New York Times reported that they would "Send Own Furniture to Missouri."⁸

The Trumans occupied the White House from May 1945 to November 1948 and from March 1952 to January 20, 1953. During the 1948 to 1952 White House renovations, they lived at Blair House. The family quarters in both places were decorated to their taste, but they included almost no Truman furniture. Photographs of the Truman White House do show many Truman-owned accessory items, largely photographs and paintings. But they do not substantiate the 1949 report in McCalls that Mrs. Truman brought many "antique pieces" to the White House.⁹

One exception is Margaret's Steinway which moved with the Trumans both to the White House and Blair House.¹⁰ In Independence the piano was tuned about once a year, beginning in 1935, by Orlando Nace. No tunings are recorded between 1942 and 1953, indicating that the piano may have been shipped to Washington before the Trumans entered the White House.¹¹

Both Mr. J.W. Jenkins, whose father sold Harry Truman the Steinway in 1932, and the piano tuner Orlando Nace, remember a loaner piano in the Independence house during the presidential years.¹²

On January 14 through 19, 1953, several USA Truck Trailers loaded with the Trumans' White House effects departed Washington for Independence. They contained Truman's papers bound for his office in the Federal Building in Kansas City, and records and gifts of state bound ultimately for the as yet unbuilt Truman Library. They also contained hundreds of boxes and crates designated for 219 North Delaware. Many of these held books, records, and clothing. Others were filled with endless small gifts to the Trumans, like clocks and radios, many of which went directly to the attic. But there were also many paintings, photographs, and accessory furnishings that the Trumans incorporated into their Independence living spaces.¹³

Portraits of all three Trumans became major features of the post-presidential house, including a 1948 portrait of Margaret Truman and a 1952 portrait of Bess Truman. Both were painted by Greta Kempton. Greta Kempton (Mrs. A.M. McNamara, b. Vienna, 1903) came to Truman's attention when he saw her work for members of his cabinet. During the presidential years, she painted a total of eight portraits for the family and Margaret Truman Daniel later commissioned her to paint her family. Greta Kempton has published a lively account of her work for the Trumans in the Missouri Historical Review.

Kempton's portrait of Bess Truman that was brought to the Independence house in 1953 is the official portrait of the former first lady. The White House commissioned a copy from the artist in 1967 as did the Truman Library in 1968.

The 1947 Kempton portrait of Harry Truman is the official portrait of the former president and remains at the White House. Bess Truman's favorite portrait of her husband was one of two painted in 1945 by Jay Wesley Jacobs and she chose that one for the Independence house.¹⁴

Margaret's piano, of course, came to Independence from the White House as did a set of bedroom furniture bought for Margaret's White House quarters. Additional furniture shipments were a desk and corner cupboard made and presented by the White House staff to the Trumans. The shipping records for this furniture have not been located.

The pre-White House furniture bought in Washington had arrived in Independence sometime after 1945, and the Trumans had laid wall-to-wall carpeting on the first floor and into the second floor hall in 1949 and 1950 (Appendix II). Much of the first floor received new wallpaper in 1952. The library was transformed in 1953. The redecoration project was essentially finished, except completing wallpaper replacements in the music room, the kitchen, and the upstairs rooms. These were mostly done by 1956.¹⁵

With the post-presidential modernization project, the house emerged from a strongly Victorian environment, characterized by rooms separated by heavy portieres, dark polished wood floors, and lace curtains, to lighter spaces all joined by single toned wall-to-wall carpeting. It is important to note that, even with their modernization project, the Trumans chose not to lighten the interior

woodwork and to maintain several pieces of 19th-century family furniture, thus preserving clear evidence of the earlier home. Featuring "Truman in Retirement" in 1955, Colliers remarked on the "Victorian" theme in the house. A decade earlier, Life had described the house as "gloomy Victorian."¹⁶ It is safe to say that all changes to the interiors throughout the Truman occupancy were conservative ones.

Christmas at the Truman Home

Christmas at 219 North Delaware is well documented. During the White House years, Truman spent every Christmas in Independence except 1947 and 1952. In "Christmas in America," an Australian journalist described the Trumans' Christmas in 1949:

As Christmas approaches, the old house is decorated from cellar to attic. By the time the President's special train from Washington pulls into the railroad station in Independence, everything is in readiness. There is a big holly wreath of waxy green leaves and vivid red berries on the front door, wreaths are in the windows, mantels are banked with evergreens, a sprig of mistletoe is tied on a chandelier, and tall red candles are placed in the candlesticks.

A tapering evergreen tree--which may be a spruce, cedar, or fir whose topmost branches brush the ceiling--sits in the bay window of the downstairs living room. Its glittering ornaments and twinkling multicolored electric lights may be seen throughout the holidays by passers-by in the street. Margaret Truman usually decorates the tree herself. She always includes among the ornaments a little silver bell and a miniature red-and-white Santa Claus which were on her first Christmas tree.¹⁷

A 1959 article about the Trumans' Christmas preparations also describes a ceiling-high tree decorated by Margaret Truman Daniel, as

well as "holiday plants and fruits" throughout the home. The guest list for Christmas dinner was to include "Mrs. Truman's brothers, George P. Wallace and Frank G. Wallace and their wives and Mr. Truman's sister, Miss Mary Jane Truman of Grandview."¹⁸

On the first Christmas following Bess Truman's death her sister-in-law and long time neighbor, May Wallace, composed a "Christmas Reminiscence of 219 North Delaware Street," which is cited here in full. Margaret Truman Daniel has confirmed the accuracy of her aunt's "Reminiscence" excepting one detail. Mrs. Daniel remembers trimming the tree before Christmas Eve.

One of my fondest memories of the "Big House" at the Trumans is the way the big living room looked on Christmas morning. Margaret always insisted that the Christmas tree be tall enough to reach the ceiling--a nine foot one at that! It was Uncle George's job to fix the tree support for the tree and wire it to the big old air shaft in the west end of the room--where between bay windows it could be seen on Delaware Street. The tree trimming took place on Christmas Eve when all gathered to help. Actually my husband, George, and Margaret did the real trimming with much comment from the sidelines. We each had a chair on which were placed the gifts from other members of the family. Vietta Garr--the faithful family cook--came to join us bringing the usual gift for Marg, a bag of "chocolate kisses." Soon the room was a mass of tissue paper and ribbons--cries of "thank you so much" and "just what I wanted" filled the air. When Marg was about 8 years old, she wanted an electric train, as she had seen one at the Kansas City cousin's home. But instead, she got a grand piano--Harry Truman's idea of the perfect gift. George and I always went to my folks for Christmas dinner--the Southern's on Park Avenue--but came back late in the evening for a "pick up" supper with the Wallaces'. Mrs. Truman's death last October leaves me the only one of our generation who enjoyed the beauty and Christmas hospitality of this home. So, we move with the times, and I hope the many, many people who enjoy 219 North Delaware as a museum will remember the gracious hospitality of the lovely old home.

Photographs of the family Christmas tree survive for 1926, 1937, 1938, 1944, 1945, and 1957 (figures 2, 3, 5, 8, 13, 14, 31, and 32). All show a short-needle tree traditionally hung with ornaments and tinsel. The trees varied in size--the 1945 tree was huge--but always stood at the west end of the living room.

Photographs of the front door reveal the same consistency in the wreath, all green with large pine cones and a single large bow.²⁰

Additional documented decorations are: a creche and evergreen boughs on the front hall table (1938); a large poinsettia on the floor in the north window of the music room (1948); and an artificial Christmas topiary on a glass table in the east library window (1971) (figures 9, 20, and 42).

Snapshots from June 1981 and October 1982 show Christmas ornaments that apparently were displayed year round. These include an artificial Christmas tree under a glass dome and a set of tumbling angels on the living room mantel; and a gilded angel on the music room mantel.²¹

FURNISHINGS PLAN AND EVIDENCE OF ORIGINAL FURNISHINGS

The following charts form the room-by-room exhibit plan for the Truman home, as well as presenting extant documentation for each piece in the home. The plan follows the 1981-82 Truman Library inventory, relying on other sources for areas, like the kitchen and porch, in which the Truman Library inventory is incomplete.

To accommodate visitor circulation a few items, like the entrance hall rugs, do not appear in their historic location. The historic location of these rugs is noted under their suggested new location.

Ninety-five percent of the Truman home collection remains on-site while approximately five percent has been removed, mostly to temporary storage at the Truman Library. These charts include the visible items that have been removed and that should ultimately be placed back on exhibit in the home, or replaced with reproductions.

SPECIAL INSTALLATION, MAINTENANCE AND PROTECTION RECOMMENDATIONS
(Diana R. Pardue)

This section contains instructions on maintaining a safe environment for the museum objects in the Truman home, performing necessary collection maintenance, and maintaining adequate security. See Part D for potential sources of assistance in implementing this section.

A. THE ENVIRONMENT

Maintaining a stable environment within the home is crucial for long-term preservation of the historic furnishings. Part D contains a list of elements destructive to historic furnishings (Agents of Deterioration), and includes recommended levels to sustain a proper museum environment.

1. Temperature/Humidity

The home has a gas furnace which produces forced hot air heat through metal floor and wall registers in all of the furnished rooms. Temperature and humidity readings should continue to be taken on a regular, long-term basis. A recording hygrothermograph should be used continuously, placed on each floor, and out of reach of curious visitors, but in rooms containing historic furnishings. These weekly hygrothermograph charts can be used to identify problem areas and justify any changes to the existing climate control equipment. In addition, a log should be kept of visitation, weather, window washing, and other factors affecting the relative humidity.

An average internal relative humidity of 55% (+3%) should be maintained year round. Recognizing the difficulty of such precise control and taking into consideration the needs of the historic structure, an ac-

ceptable alternative is 35% or higher relative humidity in the winter and 60% or lower in the summer. Such a broad range in relative humidity is acceptable only if the change from the wintertime low to the summertime high, and back again, is slow and regular and the monthly relative humidity varies no more than 3%.

Ideally the inside temperature should be about 70°F (21°C) when the house is open to the public. However, an acceptable temperature for winter is 70°F (21°C), and for summer, 75°F (23°C). Above 70°F (21°C), good ventilation is needed to minimize pockets of stagnant humid air. Rapid changes in temperature must be avoided. Fluctuations in temperature are not as serious as fluctuations in relative humidity. However, extremes in temperature that could result in the freezing or softening of objects should be avoided.

(Manual for Museums, pp. 67-69; Conserve O Grams 3/6, 3/7)

2. Light

Light has the potential to be the most damaging agent to sensitive organic materials. It causes a chemical breakdown of molecular bonds in materials causing embrittlement. It also fades many pigments and dyes. Like dust and pollutants, there are no safe levels of light and ideally it should be eliminated entirely. However, the need to view and examine objects demands exposure to light. The only reasonable solution is to achieve minimum exposure. There are recommended levels of light that should not be exceeded if deterioration is to be reduced.

The maximum intensity of light ideally should not exceed 150 lux. The proportion of ultraviolet light to the total light should not exceed

75 uW/lumen (microwatts per lumen). This is important because ultraviolet light is the most chemically damaging segment of the light spectrum.

Some sample light readings were taken in February 1984. These readings were taken on a cloudy day around 11:30 a.m. None of the lights in the house were on and the window shades were lowered three-quarters of the way down.

Ultraviolet light filters need to be installed on all windows in the furnished rooms to eliminate most of the ultraviolet light. Window shades and curtains are now being used to block some of the direct sunlight from entering the furnished rooms. The curator should devel-

op a schedule of raising and lowering the appropriate shades in the morning, noon, and at closing time to limit the amount of sunlight in the rooms. Light readings (both lux and ultraviolet) need to be taken by the curator on a yearly basis to make sure the levels are within the recommended range. These readings can be taken with a lux light meter and an ultraviolet light monitor. These instruments can be loaned to the curator by the Regional Curator or the Curatorial Services Branch, Preservation Assistance Division, WASO. These offices can also assist the park in purchasing the monitoring equipment.

Lighting fixtures in these rooms should be used only when necessary, and turned off when visitors are not present. Only incandescent lighting with low watt bulbs (under 100 watts) should be used.

(Manual for Museums, p. 69; Conserve O Grams 3/3, 3/5)

3. Dust and Air Pollution

Dust and pollutants are agents of deterioration and are known to harm objects. Dust particles are a microscopic abrasive that can wear away surface detail. Dust also acts as a catalyst promoting damage caused by pollutants. This occurs when dust attracts moisture and gaseous pollutants, such as sulfur dioxide and hydrogen sulfide (found in nearly all ambient air) and forms acidic solutions that attack both organic and inorganic materials. There are no acceptable levels of pollution and dust. These should be eliminated as far as practically possible.

Prevention is better than treatment; good housekeeping should keep dust off objects. To keep dust levels to a minimum, windows should be open only when absolutely necessary and window screens should always be used. Weather stripping will prevent additional dust from entering

through the doors and coating objects. Should additional measures be necessary to control dust, source information will be provided by the Curatorial Services Branch, Preservation Assistance Division, WASO, on high efficiency air purifiers. They use high efficiency air filters that filter out particles as small as one micron (1/25,000 of an inch). This device will remove all particulate pollutants and dust from the air and, when used with optional activated charcoal filters, will remove the reactive gaseous pollutants.

(Manual for Museums, pp. 69-70; Conserve O Gram 7/8)

4. Insects/Rodents

Insects and rodents can cause extensive damage to organic materials. Dermestid beetles, powder-post beetles, and silverfish are a few of the pests that actively devour wool, wood, and cellulose materials. Rodents can destroy paper and wood objects in the process of nest building. Evidence of insects was not apparent in the furnished rooms of the home. Insect and rodent inspections should occur weekly, and appropriate actions should be taken where needed. To prevent or to minimize insect and rodent activity, food and drinks should not be allowed in the home, and it should be cleaned on a regular basis using a housekeeping schedule.

(Manual for Museums, pp. 65; 69-77; Conserve O Grams 3/9, 3/10)

5. Fire

The home now has a smoke detection system and fire extinguishers (ABC). A new smoke and heat detection system is being planned for installation. In addition, the park should invite the responsible fire department to visit and inspect the house, to become aware of particular problems which should be considered regarding the furnishings and the historic structure. This visit should take place twice a year.

An emergency action plan should be prepared for implementation in the event of natural disasters, fire, civil unrest, and bomb threats. It should delineate responsibilities of park employees to minimize danger to life and property. The staff must be made aware in advance of actions designed to save the more valuable museum objects. A plan for the safe evacuation of visitors and staff must be posted.

Fire drills held on a regular basis are one of the best ways to ensure the proper response to an emergency. Thinking out responses ahead of time makes dealing with the real emergency much easier.

Good housekeeping can be the most important single factor in the prevention of fire. No smoking should be allowed in the furnished rooms of the home.

(Manual for Museums, pp. 77; 292-297; Conserve O Gram 2/4)

6. Security

Protection of the furnishings will be provided by visitor barriers (optional), mechanical intrusion systems, and park employees. Two park employees conduct each house tour. Guards are on duty 24 hours, working 8-hour shifts. Tour groups should never exceed ten people, except during special programs when more employees can be stationed throughout the home. Visitors should never be left unattended in any of the furnished rooms.

Security devices can extend the eyes and ears of the park staff, especially when the park is closed. These devices depend on transmitting a message to a receiver who acts with speed and effectiveness.

The Regional Curator has been working with the park staff to develop a good security system in the home. This security system, when installed, should be tested periodically. Local authorities should be made aware of the existence and value of the furnishings, as well as who to notify in an after-hour's emergency.

Park employees must insist that visitors do not touch the furnishings. Only park employees with curatorial duties should handle the historic furnishings and then as little as possible, and only with clean hands. Metal objects should not be handled without clean cotton gloves.

Small objects should be protected from unnecessary handling or theft by placing them out of reach of visitors, or securing them to large objects. Reproduction objects should be used in place of historic objects if proper protection cannot be provided and displayed objects are necessary. However, reproduction objects should not be regarded as expendable to the extent that they are given absolutely no protection or care.

Park employees should conduct walk-through examinations and visual inventories several times daily. An inspection schedule should be created and a log kept of this daily examination. Missing or damaged objects should be reported immediately to the Superintendent, and Incident Reports completed.

The museum records system is an additional security device. An up-to-date system contains object locations and good physical descriptions. Location files, part of the records system, should be established, using salmon-colored catalog cards (Form 10-254A). Each card should contain the object name, location (room, where in room), a brief description, catalog number, and accession number. These cards

should be kept in the house and organized by room, type of object (chair, table, painting, etc.), and numerical sequence by catalog number.

Photographs showing object placement should be available for each room. Depending on the size, rooms can be photographed in sections of four or more, and labeled A, B, C, etc. These photographs can be kept on Print File Cards (Form 10-30), and filed by room.

(Manual for Museums, pp. 77-82; 78-297; Conserve O Gram 2/4)

7. Specific Conservation Considerations

- a. Objects should never be placed directly next to the hot air vents; the heat can dry out wood, textiles, leathers, and paper objects. Relocating objects is the best solution; occasionally the vent can be closed.
- b. When placing objects such as lamps, books, and other small objects on other materials (textiles, finished wood surfaces, paper, or leather), protective barriers should be placed between the objects to prevent the transfer of corrosion or chemicals, and to evenly distribute weight. Suitable protective barriers are: acid-free cardboard; museum mat board (100% rag); or polyethylene foam.
- c. Pages of open books should be turned weekly to avoid excess damage to any two pages or to the spine of the book.
- d. Exposed bookcases can be covered with plexiglas to prevent theft and to minimize dust. Using UF3 plexiglas will also reduce ultraviolet light hitting the books.

e. Coats or other textiles should be hung on either padded wooden hangers or padded pegs. Polyethylene foam or cotton batting, covered with cotton muslin, forms good padding. This padding should be designed to hold the shape of the object and, where possible, the object should be alternated with like objects for display. Only very strong textiles in good condition can bear the strain of hanging.

f. All framed paper materials (such as prints and photographs) should be matted with 100% rag board and framed according to Conserve O Gram 13/1. Photographs should be matted with 100% rag board that has not been buffered.

g. Rugs or other carpeting should not be placed directly on the floor. Cotton sheeting should be used as a barrier between the rug and the floor.

h. Some of the furnishings may need conservation treatment. The furnishings should be surveyed by the appropriate conservators to determine which objects need conservation treatment. The curator should then use the survey recommendations to develop a conservation schedule.

i. Objects should never be stored in drawers, cabinets, and closets; instead they should be stored correctly in a museum storage area.

B. COLLECTION MAINTENANCE AND HOUSEKEEPING SCHEDULE

The Superintendent is responsible for the collection; all collection maintenance, as well as cleaning materials, must be approved by the

Superintendent. The curator should be responsible for collection maintenance and should receive curatorial training.

General Rules for Handling Objects

1. Be aware that all objects should be treated respectfully. Haste makes for bumped, scratched, and broken objects; always schedule enough time to complete the task. Be thorough, but remember that over cleaning may be as harmful as no cleaning. Be gentle rather than enthusiastic.
2. Fingerprints leave deposits of dust, water, and oils where pockets of corrosion develop on metal objects. Always wear clean white gloves when handling metal objects (silver, brass, copper, steel, iron) and leather objects. When the gloves become soiled, rinse them in Ivory™--do not use any bleach. Always have clean, dry hands when handling other types of materials.
3. When moving any object, support that piece. Carry only items that can rest securely in both hands, and carry only one thing at a time. Never lift anything by its handle, spout, ears, rim, or any other protruding part. Support it from below at the base and at the side. Moving large pieces of furniture requires two people so that mishandling by tugging, pulling, and sliding is avoided. When several objects are moved that are small enough to fit in a container (box, basket), pad each object (along with the container). Do not stack objects on top of each other. Do not allow parts of objects to protrude from the container while in transport. The loaded container must be light enough to be carried easily.

4. Moving objects displayed above fireplaces on high shelves, or over tables requires two people, using a ladder. One person should ascend the ladder, and using both hands, carefully transfer the object to the person on the ground. Lids or any removable parts should be firmly affixed or removed before moving.

5. Carry chairs by their seat rails; large upholstered chairs should be carried by two people. In most cases, tables should be supported by the skirt.

6. Plan ahead. Know where you are taking an object, what obstacles are on the way, and have the pathway cleared and padded if necessary.

7. If something breaks, report it to the Superintendent. Save all fragments and keep them together.

General Recommendations for Developing A Housekeeping Program

1. A suggested housekeeping schedule is included at the end of this section as well as recommendations on how to dust and clean different types of materials. This information should be useful to the curatorial staff as a beginning point, from which a more specific housekeeping program can be developed by the curator. Part C includes a suggested Housekeeping Program outline and Analysis of Space checklist; these materials can be used by the park staff to develop the housekeeping program for the Truman home. This program should take into consideration local object needs and cleaning frequencies as well as any seasonal variations that occur. Information needs to be gathered over the period of a year (to include the seasonal variations) as to the types and quantities of materials in the furnished rooms, what

objects need dusting/cleaning, and how often. This information can then be used to determine how many work years are needed for specific housekeeping tasks and housekeeping at the Truman home in general, what supplies and equipment are needed on a yearly basis and their costs.

One method of accomplishing this task is to use an inspection schedule and log book mentioned earlier in this section under A (6) Security. The type of information to record would include any particular observations concerning dust, dirt, or insect/rodent infestations, time of day, the date, and any extenuating circumstances such as weather, larger than normal visitation or construction in the area. The Regional Curator should work with the park staff in establishing this process.

2. Discretion and sensitivity must be used in creating and following any housekeeping program. Dusting and cleaning objects should be based on the need and the condition of the object. The frequency of dusting and cleaning can vary from site to site and room to room within a building. Factors to consider when determining frequency are the location of the object in the house and within the room (is it close to an exterior door?), the seasons of the year, and level of visitation. Judgment on frequency of dusting/cleaning should rest with the park curator, working closely with the Regional Curator. The less handling an object receives, the longer it will probably survive.

3. When dusting, the dust should be removed--not just pushed around. When some objects are dusted with a dry cloth or artist's brush, use a vacuum cleaner to pick up the dust that is removed from the object into the air. Vacuuming is the best method of dusting, but

a variety of suctions should be used, depending on the stability and age of the object or surface. Some vacuum cleaners are made so that their suction can be lowered. A voltage regulator can also be used to lower the suction. Portable hand vacuums are useful because they have a lower suction than regular vacuum cleaners. A plastic mesh screen should also be used on fragile surfaces to relieve strain. Metal, glass, and ceramic objects on mantels, high shelves, or tables should be dusted in an area removed from the furnished area. When clean, they can be returned to their exhibit location. Be very careful when handling these objects--moving can require two people.

4. During seasons with low visitation levels, the daily, weekly, and monthly tasks can be done with less frequency. Biannual tasks should be done in the early spring and at the beginning of winter. Annual and biennial tasks should be done during winter months.

Specific Recommendations

Ceramics and Glass

Once a year, ceramic and glass objects should be examined to see if additional cleaning is needed. Clean these objects according to the directions in Conserve 0 Gram 8/2. Do not immerse unglazed portions of earthenware in liquid. Instead, wipe these sections with a damp cloth or artist's brush.

Marble

1. Dusting: Marble materials should be dusted regularly with a vacuum cleaner or untreated cotton cloth.

2. Cleaning: If dusting is done regularly, cleaning will not be needed on a scheduled basis. Damp wipe the marble with a clean sponge and dry it with a soft cotton cloth. Since water can dissolve marble, it is recommended that the pH of the water be adjusted so that it is slightly basic by the addition of nondetergent household ammonia. A traditional technique for preparing water for use in cleaning marble is also still recommended. Clean crushed marble is placed into distilled water and left for at least 24 hours in a covered plastic bucket. This produces water saturated with the dissolvable or soluble components of marble. This saturated solution used in cleaning will not harm your marble. For more information on cleaning marble, see Manual for Museums, pp. 242-243.

Textiles

1. Vacuuming: Fibers should be tested initially for stability. Turn the suction down to the lowest level. Carefully vacuum a small unnoticeable section of the textile, holding the plastic mesh screen over the textile to eliminate strain. Then check the area vacuumed for loose fiber ends. If none are visible, continue vacuuming the textile using the brush attachment. Use the plastic mesh screen on all fragile areas to eliminate strain.

Vacuum upholstered furniture using the upholstery attachment and the plastic mesh screen. Place the screen against the upholstery and vacuum over it. Work dust out of corners, pleats, and tufts with a clean brush attachment.

2. Cleaning: Reproduction textiles can be dry-cleaned by a dependable dry cleaner, once a year or as needed. Historic textiles should be cleaned by a professional textile conservator. If there is

a question as to whether a textile can be cleaned by the curatorial staff, consult with the Regional Curator or the Textile Conservator in the Division of Conservation.

3. Rugs: Rugs used for visitor access or new rugs can be vacuumed and cleaned more frequently than historic rugs. When vacuuming historic rugs which are well-worn, the plastic mesh screen should be used as well as a low suction to relieve strain.

Metals

1. Brass, copper, and silver objects should be polished and lacquered to avoid polishing every year. A coat of lacquer should last a long time (around 10 years); inspect objects yearly for tarnished spots, indicating that the lacquer needs replacing.

Lacquering can be done on contract. Contact the Regional Curator for assistance with this project. The Metals Conservator, Division of Conservation, can also be consulted for additional assistance.

2. Iron objects can develop rust and corrosion. If this occurs, the room environment should be monitored (using a hygrothermograph) to see if the humidity has been too high. Adjustments should be made to lower the humidity to acceptable levels, possibly by using dehumidifiers.

3. Cast and wrought iron fireplace equipment can be polished with stove blacking.

4. Excessively dirty metal objects can be washed. Do not wash objects with sections made of other materials, such as bone or wood.

If dusting is done regularly, washing should not be necessary. Washing should never occur on a regular basis.

Washing Procedure: Wash in warm water and non-ionic detergent; rinse in clear water and dry completely with a soft clean cloth.

5. Pewter should be polished only when absolutely necessary; a light coat of microcrystalline wax is usually sufficient. Wash only if the object is very dirty; this dirt buildup should not occur if the objects are dusted regularly. Do not wash on a scheduled basis.

Washing Procedure: Wash in denatured alcohol; rinse well in distilled water and dry with a clean cloth.

Fireplaces

Cleaning Procedure:

Equipment: Soft, clean cloths, pail of clear water, gloves, sponge.

Procedure: Vacuum clean. Damp wipe the hearth with a sponge dipped in clear water. Dry with a soft, clean cloth.

For more detailed information on fireplaces, see Manual for Museums, pp. 241-244.

Maintenance Staff Projects Accomplished in Consultation with the Housekeeper

Floors

Monthly Cleaning: The linoleum and tile floors can be damp mopped and buffed. Buffing removes lightly imbedded dirt and restores the waxy gloss. When dirt has been moderately ground into the wax, buffing should follow damp mopping.

Cleaning Procedure:

Damp Mopping: Equipment--Clean string mop, mop bucket (avoid bucket that shows signs of rusting), and wringer.

Procedure: Fill bucket half full with cold water. Vacuum thoroughly before mopping. Wet mop in cold water and wring it nearly dry. Mop floor in long continuous side-to-side strokes. Reverse direction every fourth stroke. Rinse and wring mop frequently. Change water as soon as it gets dirty. Try to avoid slapping strands of mop against furniture, rugs, or baseboards. When finished, wash mop, bucket, and wringer.

Buffing: Equipment--Electric floor polisher, clean buffing brushes, or pads.

Procedure: Vacuum floor thoroughly first. Attach buffer to floor polisher head. Guide polisher from side to side, in parallel paths, until entire floor is buffed. Avoid hitting furnishings with polishing machine. Clean pads or brushes when finished.

For more detailed information on caring for floors, see the Manual for Museums, pp. 222-231.

Windows

Biannual Cleaning: The windows should be washed inside and out. No liquid should run onto the wooden framework. Care must be taken not to damage any ultraviolet filtering materials that should be on the interior of the glass.

Cleaning Procedure:

Equipment: Two people, ladder, chamois, pail, sponge, cleaning solution (Conserve O Gram 8/2).

Procedure: Dust window panes and surrounding framework. Dampen sponge in cleaning solution and use overlapping strokes to wash each pane. Remove dirty water from the pane with chamois. Change water when it becomes dirty.

For more detailed information on cleaning windows, see Manual for Museums, pp. 238-239.

Ventilation System

Biannual Cleaning: Contact the maintenance staff for cleaning the heating equipment.

Housekeeping Schedule

Daily

1. Vacuum floors and baseboards. Do the first floor one day, second floor the next day.
2. Dust the stairway balusters and railing with a clean cotton cloth sprayed with Endust™. Alternate floors as above.
3. Damp wipe surfaces extensively handled by visitors (room barriers, entrance and exit door handles, and stair railings).
4. Vacuum modern carpeting used by visitors.

Weekly

1. Dust wood furniture with a clean cotton cloth sprayed with Endust™. Dust all parts of the piece including the out-of-the-way places. Use a soft cotton swab if necessary (Conserve O Gram 7/8).

2. Dust ceramic, glass, paper, and other small objects on display using a clean dry cotton cloth. Use an artist's brush on intricately decorated objects and art objects. Do the first floor one week, the second floor the next week.
3. Vacuum leather materials, books, and lamp shades, using a gentle suction and the plastic screen on fragile materials. Wear clean cotton gloves. Do alternate floors as above.
4. Dust metal objects, using a clean, dry cotton cloth. Always wear clean cotton gloves. Do alternate floors as above.
5. Clean soiled gloves in Ivory™; rinse and dry.
6. Vacuum hearths, mantels, and fireplaces.
7. Wind the clocks.
8. Check for evidence of insects and rodents (see Manual for Museums, pp. 71-77 and Conserve O Gram 3/10). Renew traps as needed.

Monthly

1. Vacuum window frames, shades, curtains, and lighting fixtures.
2. Clean any plexiglas, using a non-static cleanser and a clean, dry cotton cloth.
3. Vacuum upholstery on historic furniture, using gentle suction and a clean upholstery attachment. Fragile areas should be vacuumed

through a plastic mesh screen to decrease strain. Always vacuum in the direction of the nap if the material has a nap.

4. Vacuum historic carpets and oriental rugs, using the upholstery attachment in the direction of the nap and a plastic screen where necessary.

5. Dust picture frames (including the tops), using a lens brush.

6. Glass on mirrors and pictures may be damp wiped (if needed), using a sponge dipped in glass cleaner (Conserve O Gram 8/2) and squeezed almost dry. Do not let the moisture get on the frame or under the glass.

7. Refold folded textiles along different lines to reduce stress.

8. Spot clean walls with a clean, water damp cloth, and dry.

9. Vacuum tops of doors, bookcases, and other ledges in reach of the floor.

10. Damp mop/buff the linoleum and tile floors.

11. Examine furnishings to determine if any active deterioration is occurring and if specialized conservation treatment is needed.

Semi-Annual

1. Vacuum ceiling and other high wall areas requiring ladders.

2. Wash and dry windows.

Annual

1. Check metal objects for corrosion, rust, or tarnish; treat if necessary.
2. Check ceramic and glass objects to determine if washing is necessary (Conserve O Gram 8/2).
3. Clean woodwork by wiping with a clean, damp cloth and dry immediately.
4. Clean hearth, mantel, and fireplace (only if necessary).

Biannual

1. Clean and wax finished wood furniture (not gilt or painted furniture) (Conserve O Grams 7/2, 7/3).
2. Damp wipe and dry painted wood and raw wood objects, using a clean cloth with water (Conserve O Gram 7/2).
3. Clean exposed wood floors by stripping, waxing, and buffing (Conserve O Gram 7/4).

D. AGENTS OF DETERIORATION

Proper care of a museum collection consists of reducing the rate of deterioration to a minimum by housing the collection in a safe environment. A safe environment will prolong the life of an object and minimize conservation treatment. Prevention is always better than treatment.

The Manual for Museums includes a chapter on caring for a collection. The sections on agents of deterioration (pp. 67-82) and climate control (pp. 83-91) should be read carefully. Another good source to become familiar with is The Museum Environment by Garry Thomson. It contains useful information on lighting, humidity, and air pollution.

Damaging conditions are:

Too much or too little humidity

40%-60% is an ideal range for most materials; metals and photographs do best at 30%-40%. At very low levels, organic materials dry out and become brittle; at high levels, mold will develop and metal will begin to corrode. Rapid and wide variations can cause dangerous expansion and contraction of some materials. Manual for Museums, pp. 67-68, 83-89.

Too much or too little temperature

60°-70°F (16°-21°C) is the recommended range. The greatest danger lies in the variation of temperatures. High temperatures will accelerate deterioration. Manual for Museums, pp. 68-69, 83-86, 89.

Ultraviolet light should be filtered out. The length of time an object is exposed to light is equally important. Use light only when necessary. Manual for Museums, pp. 69, 86, 90-91.

Chemical Air Pollution

Common air pollutants include industrial fumes, motor vehicle exhausts, and salts from the ocean. Materials such as unseasoned woods, paints containing lithopone (in the pigment), unpainted hardboard, acidic papers and plastics also release harmful vapors. These materials should be avoided in construction of exhibit cases or storage equipment. Manual for Museums, pp. 70, 91.

Dust

It acts as an abrasive, provides surface for moisture condensation and will soil the surface of objects. Once an object is covered with dust, the removal process can accelerate wear and increase the possibility of physical damage. Manual for Museums, pp. 69-70, 91.

Mold (Also called Mildew)

This growth possibly destroys more objects than anything else. Growth is more likely and noticeable on organic objects in an atmosphere of more than 65% RH and 60°F. Look for velvety patches or areas of discoloration. Avoid warm, damp environments. Manual for Museums, pp. 70-71, 39.

Insects

The most common insects to watch are powder-post beetles, clothes moths, silverfish, dermestid beetles, and cockroaches. Their damage is rapid and irreversible. Manual for Museums, pp. 71-76.

Rodents

In a very short time these animals can destroy a collection by their eating and nest-making. Watch for droppings, signs of gnawing, and the rodents themselves.

Fire

A fire can wipe out an entire collection very quickly. Keep flammables in special fire-resistant containers. Work out a fire emergency action plan with staff and local fire-fighting organizations. Manual for Museums, p. 77.

Humans

Human hazards to the collection are careless handling (by visitors and staff), vandalism, and theft. The security of the collection depends primarily upon the staff. Manual for Museums, pp. 77-82.

E. SOURCES OF ASSISTANCE

Persons responsible for the care and protection of museum objects should be familiar with Ralph Lewis' Manual for Museums (National Park Service, GPO, 1976), the Conserve O Gram series, and the NPS Museum Handbook. Section in the Manual for Museums which are particularly useful for implementing these recommendations are Chapter 4, "Caring for a Collection," pp. 61-112; Chapter 11, "Housekeeping," pp. 204-259; and Chapter 12, "Protection," pp. 260-298.




Figure 21. President Truman delivering speech from the Living Room of 219 North Delaware, on election eve, November 1, 1948.




Figure 32. Bess and Harry S Truman in the Music Room of




Figure 38. Harry S Truman with Laura Hall and John Ross





Figure 51. Living Room, March, 1983.




Figure 55. Music Room, March, 1983.




Figure 63. Dining Room, March, 1983.




Figure 65. Library, March, 1983.




Figure 69. Kitchen, March, 1983.
