General

Weather Thunderstorms were common during the first two-thirds of the month. Snow appeared on the higher peaks later in the month, with some frost in the lower valleys.

Enough precipitation fell to prevent fire danger from becoming critical.

A mild tornado was observed coming off Mirror Plateau on August 22. Many trees were blown down and rough lake conditions existed.

The Beartooth Highway was closed on the 28th due to snow and poor visibility.

Increase or Decrease in Travel A total of 592,606 visitors were recorded during the month, an increase of 30% above August 1961. Travel dropped during the last few days of the month due to adverse weather and opening of many schools throughout the country on August 27. On August 24, 1,610,094 visitors had entered the Park this season exceeding the all-time travel year of 1957. According to the latest figures, Park travel is 24.8 per cent ahead of last year, and the month of August to date has shown the remarkable increase of 32.9 per cent. Travel to and from the Seattle World's Fair has contributed to the record-breaking travel.

On Monday, August 20, the season's travel totalled 1,533,307, surpassing last year's total of 1,528,088. Daily travel during August through the 21st, has averaged just over 20,000 visitors per day.

Law Enforcement A total of 99 persons were tried before the U. S. Commissioner during the month, as compared to 83 persons during August 1961. Fines totaling \$1,946 were levied by the Court, of which \$130.00 were suspended.

U. S. Attorney, Robert N. Chaffin, of Cheyenne, Wyoming, was in the Park August 22-24 for the purpose of reviewing problems relating to investigation of offenses and prosecution of cases in the U. S. Commissioner's Court. Mr. Chaffin visited each of the three districts and discussed enforcement problems with Superintendent Garrison and his staff. The anticipated object of this visit is the formulation of enforcement guidelines which will provide uniform protection and safety of persons and property.

Campgrounds The campgrounds in the Park were full to overcrowded during the earlier period of the month, but with the slump in travel during the last few days, there was adequate room.

Back country use continued to be excellent. A total of 87 people visited the Thorofare area. Shoshone Lake recorded 222 people, and Heart Lake showed visits from 235 individuals. A total of 962 visitors made other hiking-fishing trips into the more remote areas.

Complaints Complaints were received at all stations about the conditions of the West Thumb-Lake road which is under construction. Many written complaints have been received concerning facilities of the Yellowstone Park Company.

Two representatives of the U. S. Geological Survey, Washington, D. C., accompanied the party on the trip to the field.

Forest Insect and Disease Control Regional Forester Gynn and Forester Myers made a reconnaissance survey of White Pine-Ribes distribution on Cook Peak on the 31st. Pure stands of *Pinus Albicaulis* were observed on the highest elevations with heavy growth of *ribes montigenum* at the base of trees and fallen logs. An old infestation of Mountain Pine Beetle killed thousands of White Bark Pine leaving a skeleton forest with an intermingling of mature White Pine still growing to carry on the task of reseeding the infestation area. Reproduction in some of these areas will go well over 1,000 trees per acre. No Blister Rust was found on either White Pine or Ribes.

Ribes eradication was completed in the Craig Pass on August 10. The work was completed in the Antelope Creek and Mt. Washburn extension units on the 24th.
