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The Programs

A History

In the 1890's Glen Echo Park was the lite of a National Chautauqua Assembly. Here on the banks of the Potomac, families camped for the summer and attended poetry readings, lectures, concerts, as well as parties, sports, and much more. In 1891 the Chautauqua Movement stated its goal in this way:

"To promote liberal and practical education, especially among the masses of the people, to teach the sciences, arts, languages, and literature; to prepare its patrons for their several pursuits and professions in life, and to fit them for the duties which devolve upon them as members of society."

Today the Creative Education Program is a living memorial to the Chautauqua Movement and shares the goals of the movement. We are trying to:

- I. Support the development of human growth and potential
- 2 Place high-quality cultural programming in a relaxed, recreational, and family setting.
- 3 Create a resource center of practical and liberal knowledge and skills made accessible to the general public.

Residents and Instructors

Instructors in the Creative I ducation Program are not salaried employees of the National Park Service. They are, rather, independent "Cooperative Agents," and the tuition fees received by the park service are paid directly to them names a \$6 registration fee per person. Fuition fees may be up to \$4 per hour per student. In addition to teaching classes, they also participate in festivals and may get involved in various other Glen I clip programs.

Creative Education Program teachers fall into two categories: Instructors and Residents. Instructors teach in multi-use classroom areas and are accepted for one year of classes at a time. Residents operate full time studio spaces at the park, Proposals for a residency space are accepted when a vacancy is advertized. One proposal is chosen from the several that are received. Residency is awarded for a two- to three-year period. Both residents and non-residents pay utilities fees.

It is also difficult for new techs to remain if they are not knowledgeable because when they are needed no one has time to teach them and when there is time to learn the more experienced technicians may ask them to wait until something more is going on! Last summer's most persistent new tech was Carla Chrambach who read about the opportunities to volunteer at Glen Feho Park in the Montgomery County Volunteer Bureau's directory of volunteer opportunities. She came to the park during the large festivals—the most exciting moments of the summer-and remained to work the whole season. 35 hours of work are recorded for her, though all of our volunteers give more hours than ever make the record. Carla had some production experience from school, but none with sound equipment. We look forward to having her back this coming summer. Carla says she has fallen for Glen Leho.

Adventure Theatre has been offering quality performances for children for 32 years and found a home at Glen Echo Park in 1970. The enormous and constant volunteer effort at Glen Echo Park is best represented by Adventure Theatre's annual 64,000 volunteer hours to produce 9 plays per year and the Thursday morning performances for pre-schoolers. Play directors are now paid, and recently the theatre has helped the production and acting crew with small expense fees. However, these productions rest on years of mostly volunteer effort. The Board continues to be a totally volunteer effort. Imagine 32 years times 64,000 hours!


