

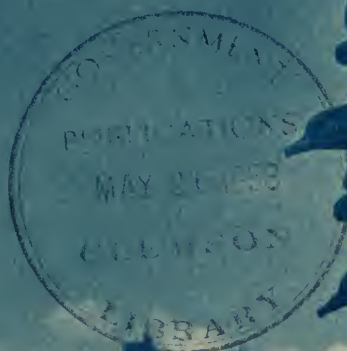

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

All events listed in this program are free except for transportation on boat and barge trips. Park Historians and Park Naturalists accompany the groups to give interpretation and answer questions.

Public transportation is available to most meeting places. Call the proper transportation company for details on how to reach each meeting place. If in the District, call D. C. Transit, DUpont 7-7625.

BARGE TRIPS: Mule-drawn barge trips on the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal are conducted in cooperation with Government Services, Inc. A Park Historian or Naturalist accompanies each scheduled trip to interpret the history of the Canal and natural features along the way. Trips are made regardless of inclement weather.

Tickets are on sale at the office of Government Services, Inc., 1135 21st St., NW. from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. For reservations call NAtional 8-7363. Tickets reserved by telephone will be held at the barge until 15 minutes before departure. (On weekends and holidays call NAtional 8-0037 for information.) Soft drinks, ice cream, candy, cookies, and postcards are sold on the barge. Organized groups may charter the barge on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday evenings through Government Services, Inc.

BIRD WALKS: The trips are led by park naturalists trained in both bird lore and techniques of bird watching. Binoculars are helpful, but not absolutely necessary.

BOAT TRIPS: Six motor boat trips aboard the *Pocahantas* are scheduled on the Anacostia and Potomac Rivers. Four trips will be led by historians on June 14, July 12, August 23, and September 13. Naturalists will conduct a trip August 2 and another September 27. All are two hours in length and leave at 10 a.m. from the float on the Potomac River at the foot of Wisconsin Avenue in Georgetown. Reservations *must* be made in advance by calling Government Services, Inc., NATIONAL 8-7363. The fare for adults is \$1.50 and for children 12 or under, 80¢.

CUSTIS-LEE MANSION: This Mansion, completed between 1804 and 1818, was known as Arlington House and became the home of General Robert E. Lee for 30 years before the Civil War. Interpretive personnel are on duty, when the house is open, to answer questions and acquaint visitors with the unique history of this Mansion. Located in Arlington National Cemetery, it is open from 9:30 a.m. until 6 p.m. from April 1st until October 1st. From October until April it closes at 4:30 p.m. Admission fee of 25¢ is charged all over 18. To arrange tours for organized groups, call Jackson 2-3000, Ext. 4102. (Call KING 9-7800, Ext. 38 for AB & W bus schedule.)

EVENING ADVENTURES: These activities are designed primarily for family groups and children. They are scheduled at various locations on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from June 24 through August 21. No seating is provided so bring a blanket to spread on the ground or a folding chair. The majority of programs feature movies projected at the *Naturevan*, a unique, mobile, audio-visual unit.

Interspersed through the season, however, are six programs titled *Fun with Nature* scheduled for 7 p.m. at Fort Hunt and at Glover-Archbold Parkway, respectively. Each of these will include a short nature walk, a lecture-demonstration and actual opportunity to have some practice in the nature hobby theme of the evening, plus an informal campfire program.

Except for the Evening Adventures at Fort Hunt, all others are cancelled in case of rain.

EXPLORING THE SKY: Members of the National Capital Astronomers bring their telescopes to these evening events and focus them on the stars, moons, and planets. They point out the constellations and tell many of the legends and mythology related to them. On cloudy evenings, illustrated talks on astronomy are substituted. If raining at the scheduled time, the event is cancelled.

Astronomy events are held in Fort Reno Park, north of the intersection of 40th & Chesapeake Sts., NW.

FORT WASHINGTON, MD.: The fort, whose history dates from 1808 to the present, is open to the public and on the reservation there are excellent sites for picnics. Historical exhibits may be seen at the sally port entrance to the old fort between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays from May 3 through Labor Day. The fort may be reached via Nichols Ave. and South Capitol St., SE, to Indian Head Road (Maryland State Route 224). Turn right 5½ miles below the District line, and follow directional signs to the parking lot for the old fort. There is no admission fee. Special arrangements for organized groups to tour the fort may be made by calling REpublic 7-1820, Ext. 2565.

HIKES: Hikes are those longer, more difficult walks scheduled for November. Sturdy shoes and warm field clothing should be worn on these trips. Some of these trips are cookouts. Come prepared with your own food and eating utensils. Interpretation is carried out on these trips and questions are welcomed.

HISTORICAL TOURS: Visits to national memorials in and about the Nation's Capital are conducted by Park Historians and provide an opportunity to become acquainted with the history and significance of Washington's public monuments. This series of walks makes available the history of several of the larger memorials and public buildings in greater detail than is usually presented in the areas themselves. The walking distance is short and the pace leisurely.

HISTORICAL TOURS WITH CAMERAS: Catching history with a camera should be an interesting experience for those who wish to take their own pictures. Fort Washington provides challenges to historical photographers. These tours will be conducted by a Park Historian assisted by a guest photographer. Each person is responsible for his own equipment.

KENILWORTH AQUATIC GARDENS: Here, in a number of verdant riverside pools, grow hardy and tropical waterlilies and lotus. Native flowers, birds, and aquatic animals lend variety and excitement to the quiet pools and marshy fringe. Wild iris begin their colorful display by mid-May to be followed by the hardy waterlilies that come into bloom in early June. By mid-July lotus and tropical varieties make a show with their varied colors which last into October. The gardens are at their best in the mornings.

A Park Naturalist conducts interpretive flower and bird walks around the pools and through the adjoining marsh-land each weekend beginning June 1 and continuing through September 14; for hours consult each month's Events.

To reach Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens by auto, follow Kenilworth Ave. northbound to Quarles St. exit, bear right, cross Eastern Ave. overpass, turn left to Douglas St., then right on Douglas St. to parking area and office. Bus passengers, take route U-2, alighting at Kenilworth Ave. & Polk St., NE., use pedestrian overpass and walk west on Douglas St. to parking area and office.

MUSIC FROM THE PAST: Each Sunday throughout the year from 3 until 4 p.m., there is a recital of music at the Custis-Lee Mansion. Original sheet music is played on a piano of the period. Visitors are invited to sit on the portico or go through the Mansion during the music hour. The Custis-Lee Mansion is located in Arlington National Cemetery. (Call KIng 9-7800, Ext. 38, for AB & W bus schedule.)

ROCK CREEK NATURE CENTER: This center brings a new approach in translating nature's ways in the great outdoors. In an attractive natural setting, children and adults alike spend absorbing and adventure-packed hours learning about plants, rocks, insects, birds, and other wild animals that live in the surrounding woodland.

Exhibits, unique visual devices, and working demonstrations show the amazing ways of insects, animals, and plants. Live reptiles, a glass-sided beehive, sound recordings of insect and animal calls stimulate intense outdoor interests and hobbies.

As Park Naturalists interpret, nature becomes vividly real — alive! The outdoors takes on a new meaning and with this clearer understanding a keener appreciation comes to both the child and parent.

Organized groups may visit the Nature Center during the week by appointment. Saturday and Sunday afternoon all are invited to share in the exciting programs. A colorful brochure giving Nature Center details and the season's program is available upon request. Follow signs from Porter St. and Williamsburg La., NW. (just north of the National Zoological Park). For information and appointments, call REpublic 7-1820, Ext. 2557.

SYLVAN THEATRE: Each Friday night during June, July, and August a distinguished outdoor program is held in the Sylvan Theatre on the Washington Monument grounds. Each opens with a half-hour concert or dance presentation followed by an illustrated talk of approximately an hour by a guest speaker.

The Sylvan Theatre may be reached from street cars on 14th St. marked "Bur. Engraving." Ample parking space for automobiles is available on the Monument grounds roadways and along the westbound lane of Independence Ave.

If weather is unfavorable, the program will be held in the Commerce Department Auditorium on 14th St. between Constitution Ave. and E St., NW. A sign on the Sylvan Theatre stage and at the Commerce Building entrance will announce change of location. If in doubt, call the United States Park Police (REpublic 7-1820, Ext. 3161) after 6:30 p.m. on the program date.

THEODORE ROOSEVELT ISLAND: This island, accessible only by boat, is preserved as a memorial to President Theodore Roosevelt. A Park Naturalist is on duty during the hours the ferry operates. He leads nature walks starting at the orientation station, where exhibits explain the Island's significance and story.

Three and a half miles of foot trails lead through woods and beside one of the few unspoiled marshes in the Washington region. These varied habitats contain a wealth of flowers, trees, birds, and other animals.

The ferry operates from the float on the Potomac River at the foot of Wisconsin Ave. in Georgetown on each Saturday and Sunday from May 31 through October 26 — 1 until 4:30 p.m. with additional service as shown in each month's Events. There is no charge for the ferry.

WALKS: Park Naturalists lead a variety of nature walks which emphasize rocks, plants, animals and natural processes in the National Capital Parks. Guest leaders occasionally give of their time and experience on special walks.

All activities are conducted rain or shine. Come prepared.

WATERGATE: Concerts are given at 8:30 p.m. from June 8 through August 29 with the United States Marine Band playing on Sunday evenings; the United States Army Band playing on Tuesday evenings; the United States Navy Band playing on Thursday evenings; and the United States Air Force Symphony Orchestra playing on Friday evenings. The *Watergate* is located on the Potomac River near the Lincoln Memorial, just north of the Arlington Memorial Bridge. Parking is available on nearby streets and park drives. Potomac Park buses furnish public transportation. Concerts are cancelled in case of rain. Admission is free.

RELATED INFORMATION

COURSES FOR CHILDREN OR ADULTS:

CONSERVATION ROUNDUP: A week's experience in outdoor living for young people 12 through 16 years, is held in late August. Advance registration is required.

FIELD LEADERSHIP COURSE IN BIRD STUDY: Beginner's course in field bird study and training techniques for youth leadership is conducted by Park Naturalists for nine Saturdays from late February through April.

JUNIOR NATURALIST TRAINING COURSE: Park Naturalists conduct a nature course for 5th, 6th, and 7th graders that begins in mid-March and continues through April.

TRAINING COURSE IN OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP: Training for persons interested in nature leadership and techniques on camp counselling are given on Saturdays (four six-hour sessions) during May.

DAY CAMPS: Nature activities are of first importance in D. C. Recreation Department Day Camps where Park Naturalists cooperate with camp leaders to bring thrilling outdoor adventures. Children wishing to attend these free camps may telephone the D. C. Recreation Department (ADams 4-2050) for information and applications.

GREAT FALLS MUSEUM: The Historical and Natural History Museums are open daily from June through Labor Day and on Saturdays and Sundays, weather permitting, for the remainder of the year. The Natural History Wayside Exhibit is open daily except Tuesdays and Wednesdays from late June through Labor Day. By arranging in advance with the Park Naturalist or Park Historian, parties of 15 or more may take short walks to the falls or along the canal towpath to learn firsthand the interpretive story of nature and history. JEFFERSON MEMORIAL: Reflection on the life of Thomas Jefferson in this memorial is a rewarding experience. Open daily from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m. Special group visits can be arranged by calling REpublic 7-1820, Ext. 2546.

LINCOLN MUSEUM AND THE HOUSE WHERE LINCOLN DIED: The Ford Theater and the Petersen House across the street were made famous in an April night of terror which claimed a President's life. The theater is now a museum dedicated to a study of Lincoln's life. The house across the street is maintained in much the same condition that it was the night Lincoln died there. The museum is open from 9 a.m. until 9 p.m. The house is open from 9 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. For group arrangements call REpublic 7-1820, Ext. 2565. Admission fee is 10¢, all under 19 admitted free.

PIERCE MILL: The present structure is believed to have been built about 1820. It has been restored to operation and those who wish may purchase its water-ground flour and meal. The mill is located in Rock Creek Park at the intersection of Beach Dr. and Tilden St. It is open to the public from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday, and 1 until 5 p.m. on Sunday. There is no admission fee. For group arrangements with the miller, call NAtional 8-7363.

SCHOOL ASSEMBLY TALKS: Illustrated talks explaining the historical and natural features of National Capital Parks are presented from October through March by Park Historians and Park Naturalists. These are planned to complement the school curriculum and may be requested by any school within an eight-mile radius of the White House. An announcement of these talks is issued in early September.

SPRING HIKES: Early spring hikes are scheduled on March weekends.

WASHINGTON MONUMENT: This monument was constructed between 1848 and 1884. The state memorial stones are focal points of interest for those who take the stairway. An excellent view of the city which Washington helped to plan is the reward of all who reach the top. Open daily 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Ascent may be made by elevator or by stairway. Elevator charge 10¢; there is no charge for those under 19. For special group arrangements, call REpublic 7-1820, Ext. 2565.
