Glen Echo Park

Glen Echo began in 1891 as a National Chautauqua Assembly, a center "To promote liberal and practical education, especially among the masses of the people; to teach the sciences, arts, languages, and literature; to prepare its patrons for their several pursuits and professions in life; and to fit them for the duties which devolve upon them as members of society." By 1900 Glen Echo had become an Amusement Park which served the Washington area until 1968. Since 1971, Glen Echo has again been developing the concept of arts and cultural education for everyone under National Park Service direction and with a high level of public and community involvement. It serves both the surrounding communities and visitors from across the country. Its four sessions of classes are taught year-round by well-known artists and professionals, some of whom are members of the residency programs in the park. There are concerts, demonstrations, workshops and festivals on Sundays during the warm months as a part of the Chautauqua Summer Season, one of the largest cultural programs in the Washington, D.C. area. In addition, the antique hand-carved and hand-painted Dentzel carousel, saved by community effort, operates on summer weekends, and the Gallery offers changing monthly exhibitions of Glen Echo's artists.

I came to ride the Dentzel Carousel in 1978 because my son, Max Hurley, was operating it. When I entered the park I was heart-broken seeing how different it looked from what I remembered it in the forties, fifties, and early sixties.

I was remembering the different rides—the fun house and the laughing lady. Most of all of how I enjoyed the Spanish Ballroom and dancing to the "Big Bands" of that era.

In the forties, Glen Echo Park was the place for the servicemen to meet girls for a day and evening of fun. Then in the fifties and sixties, I took my children to the Crystal Pool and the rides. Anyway, these are pleasant memories.

Now that I am eashier at the Dentzel Carousel during the season, I am enjoying other pleasures. I have the opportunity to meet people of all walks of life. Many of the older adults love to reminisce with me about the days when the park was an amusement park.

And then there are the children and the handicapped that come back year after year for the carousel ride. What a delight to have people come to Glen Echo Park for a bit of relaxation and fun.

Oh! I must not forget the Wurlitzer Band Organ that hrings many hours of listening pleasure (a little loud, yes) hut still enjoyable

A History

In the 1890's Gien Echo Park was the site of a National Chautauqua Assen, iv H. in t. k. he Potomac families camped for the summer and attended poetry readings, lettere inner as well as parties, spor s, and much more. In 1891 the Chautauqua Movement stitted its real in h. va.

- 2 Place high-quality cultural programming in a relaxed, recreational, and f in a setting
- 3 Create a resource center of practical and liberal knowledge and skills made accessible to the general public

Residents and Instructors

In tructors in the Creative Education Program are not salaried employees of the National Park Scivice They are, rather, independent "Cooperative Agents," and the tuition fees received by the park service are paid directly to them minus a \$6 registration fee per person. Tuttion fees may be up a \$4 per hour per fudent. In addition to teaching classes, they also participate in festivals and may be a vivice in various other Glen Echo programs.

Creative I ducation Program teachers fall into two categories. Instructors and Residents his roctors teach in multi-use classroom areas and are accepted for one year of classes at a time. Residents operate full time studio spaces at the park. Proposals for a residency space are accepted with a vicinity of directived. One proposal is chosen from the several that are received. The instruction is geared to the needs and level of development of the individual student and so the classes are composed of both beginners and advanced students. Classes in ceramics at Glen Echo Pottery afford a unique opportunity to explore the exciting medium of clay, glazing, and firing techniques. Instruction is given in an environment that is both relaxed and informal and creatively serious. The teaching philosophy at Glen Echo Pottery is to enable the students to express themselves as fully as possible in their own way and at their own pace.

All sessions cover beginning through advanced wheel techniques: wedging, centering, & throwing on the potter's wheel.

A firing fee is charged according to the formula worked out. Kiln rentals are made available to local craftspersons and institutions upon request. Note: there is no firing fee for the beginning wheel student.

HOW TO REGISTER

Classes are limited to between 7 and 22 students, and each person has access to a potter's wheel. Missed classes can be made up during the present session, but will not be credited to following sessions. If you wish to cancel your registration before the 1st meeting, your money will be returned. After the 1st meeting, tuition minus one class's pro-rated fee and registration fee will be returned. After the second meeting of the class, no tuition will be returned. We realize that unforseen emergencies can arise, in which case we will consider credit toward a new session.

Procedure For Registration

Pre-registration is urged for all classes to insure yourself a place. 
