General

Weather. April had many clear warm days and no great amount of precipitation. A high of 74 degrees was recorded at Mammoth on April 19. The low reported was -7 degree at Lake on April 8. Two inches of snow fell at Mammoth and eight inches fell at Lake on April 28.

The warm weather caused the streams to rise and by the end of the month the Yellowstone River was quite high and roily.

Increase or decrease in travel. A total of 3,101 people entered the Park during the month, as compared to 3,807 for April, 1961.

The road from West Yellowstone to Old Faithful and to Mammoth was opened unofficially to public travel on April 21.

Inspections. Ralph Lipscomb, Assistant Chief of Maintenance, Washington Office, arrived April 14 to inspect maintenance problems in the Park.

Fred F. Dickinson, Soil Conservationist, Region Two Office, was in Yellowstone looking over the erosion condition created by the Northern Yellowstone elk herd. He departed the 20th with Mr. Lipscomb.

Elbert Smith, Chief, Concessions Management, Region Two, arrived the 23rd for a week's stay, reviewing concessions activities.

Special Activities. April 2, at 2:00 p.m., a briefing meeting of all personnel assigned to assist with the census was held at headquarters. Representatives of Sportsman's clubs and conservation organizations had been invited to participate.

Summary

During the month of April, 1902, the weather was generally favorable, with a few light snows and a few light rains. The temperature was in the 40's and 50's, and the wind was light and variable. The snow cover was in good condition, and the trails were well maintained.

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Darrell Cloyd and Lawrence Waymire, seasonal employees, attended a sewage plant operator school at the University of Colorado, Boulder, Colorado, April 2-6.

Elk census of the Northern Yellowstone elk herd was taken April 3 and 4. A total of 5,725 elk were counted. The census was conducted by the National Park Service in cooperation with the Montana Fish and Game Department.

Two helicopters were rented from the Johnson Flying Service of Missoula. A pilot and two observers rode in each of the helicopters on each flight. One observer was a National Park Service employee and the other a representative of a conservation group or sportsman club. Guest observers were from the National Wildlife Federation, Montana Wildlife Federation, Wildlife Management Institute, National Audubon Society, Skyline Sportsman's Association, United Sportsmen's Association of Montana.

Park Service Officials counted 3,147 elk on winter range outside the Park in the area adjacent to and north of Gardiner, Montana, and 2,578 animals were counted inside the Park.

The weather was excellent and the helicopters performed beyond expectation.

Park Historian Haines presented a talk on "Yellowstone's Prehistory", to the Archeological Society in Billings, Montana on April 10.

The Regional Maintenance Conference at Wind Cave National Park, South Dakota, April 9-13 was attended by Landscape Architect Frank E. Mattson, Construction & Maintenance Superintendent (Roadways) Arthur N. Minish, Civil Engineer George H. Gallagher, Foreman IV, Maintenance William E. Foster, and Foreman III, Maintenance, Donald K. Herne.

On April 11-13 South District Ranger Howard H. Chapman, accompanied Park Personnel Officer Miller and Region Two Assistant Personnel Officer Carl Wikstrom to Montana State College and Montana State University to contact students interested in careers in the National Park Service.

On April 12, at the request of the citizens of Red Lodge, Montana, Superintendent Garrison, Assistant Superintendent Nelson and Park Engineer Rowe visited Red Lodge for the purpose of explaining the 1962 season maintenance, construction plans and operation of the Beartooth Highway. In attendance were representatives of the U. S. Forest Service, Bureau of Public Roads and concessioners. Responsibility of the Montana Highway Commission for the easterly Montana section was discussed, emergency conditions, such as slides, blizzards, etc. Plans will be drafted by the Park and another meeting held sometime in May.

A tape recorded on the scene describing the trip, the range and the views of some of the participants was made by station KBBM of Bozeman, Montana, this was used on programs in Bozeman and Missoula. Considerable comment was received by these stations, most of it favorable to Yellowstone National Park.

Associate Superintendent Castellum and Chief Ranger Dick traveled to Ashton, Idaho on April 17 to present the Park Service's summer program to civic groups.

Management Assistant Hadley attended a meeting in Helena, April 19, sponsored by the Governor's economic council to discuss the tourist industry in Montana. Featured speaker at the luncheon was Voigt Gilmore, Director of the United States Travel Service.

The annual ranger conference began April 23 and continued throughout the week.

Chief Park Naturalist McIntyre and Management Assistant Hadley attended the Northwest Section of Wildlife Society Conference at Missoula, Montana, April 27. White Blister Rust Control. Forestry Technician Reeves attended a joint U. S. Forest Service-Park Service meeting in Glacier National Park on April 29, on the antibiotic program for control of Blister Rust disease.

Inspections. Supervisory Auditor W. G. Grabow, L. C. Maness and E. D. McCartney, auditors from the General Accounting Office, Denver, are here to audit the Finance Office accounts.

Wildlife and Fish Cultural Activities. BISON. Ten dead bison have been located to date, six in the Lake Sub-District, one at Mary Bay and three in Hayden Valley.

ELK. Census of the Northern Yellowstone elk herd was taken April 3-4. The census was conducted by the National Park Service in cooperation with the Montana Fish and Game Department.

A total of 14 dead elk were tagged on the Rescue Creek between Blacktail and Gardiner. Thirty-nine additional elk carcasses were tagged in the Tower Fall Sub-District. Most of the carcasses were covered with ticks.
