INTRODUCTION

Since the publication of *Preserving Historic Landscapes* by the National Park Service in 1990, the field of landscape preservation has witnessed a dramatic increase in project work and academic interest. These developments have fueled the profession, and can be measured by the increased number of books, technical publications, journal articles and conferences on the subject. However, readers are often challenged by conflicting approaches in landscape preservation literature, practice and policy, and interpretations of the *Secretary of the Interior's Standards*.

Additionally, there is a growing number of articles in allied disciplines, such as archaeology, cultural geography, anthropology, natural sciences, and computer technology which may not be known or easily obtained by landscape architects and preservation planners engaged in project work today.

Recognizing that the National Park Service mission includes "a wise use of our land, (and) preserving the environmental and cultural values of our national parks and historical places," this document has been prepared to guide the user in obtaining practical guidance to make educated decisions when researching, planning, managing and undertaking project work in cultural landscape resources.

Making Educated Decisions: A Landscape Preservation Bibliography has been conceived and designed for use by practitioners (landscape architects, horticulturists, architects, planners, archaeologists); stewards (administrators and managers of historic parks and gardens, national parks and forests, state historic preservation offices, municipalities, not-for-profit organizations, advocacy groups, professional associations); as well as educators, scholars and students.

The bibliography contains over five hundred annotated citations referenced by subject, author and geographic indices. The project database has been generated using ProCite bibliographic software, with a commitment to its continued maintenance and ultimate availability to the public in the future.

Making Educated Decisions

The bibliography includes English language publications, with a predominant focus on landscape preservation philosophy, research, preservation planning, practice, treatment, management and maintenance. These techniques are often represented in the form of illustrated case studies. In all, forty-eight states and twenty-seven countries are represented.

Literature from diverse disciplines has been included. Bibliographic entries were chosen from books, scholarly journals, technical reports, and published conference proceedings--with each citation critically evaluated for compatibility with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards. Papers from conference proceedings have been noted in a single citation. In all cases, resources cited are publicly available.

This publication does not include unpublished master's and doctoral theses, literature in languages other than English, or historical literature not involving landscape preservation. Such publications are more readily available, captured in other bibliographies, and routinely included in educational curricula. Although recent Cultural Landscape Reports are certainly of interest, they are often not readily available and have also not been included, although many citations present and discuss their methodologies and research findings.

The bibliography is organized alphabetically by author, but can be searched by subject, author, or location utilizing the indices at the back of the book.

Finally, Making Educated Decisions requires an ongoing commitment if it is to remain current. It is our hope that readers who utilize this publication will bring books and articles to our attention in the future. These can be submitted to the National Park Service Preservation Assistance Division for inclusion in the database and later updates to this publication.














Locate fixed point at the centre of the intersection of two roads.
 Assign this point a letter. (A, A', B, B', C...) A for north side A' for south side.



 Measure and record the distance from the centre line of the road to the edge of the road easement. (b) Write this, in metres, in the distance column of the inventory sheet.



 Measure from the centre line of the road to the first tree that has a minimum diameter of 35 cm. Record the tree number and the distance in the appropriate columns on the Tree Inventory' sheet.



- Measure and record, in the DBH column, the diameter of the trunk 1.3 m above the ground; using a diameter tape and recording in cm.
- Identify and record the tree species, crown vigour (using the 1-5 scale) and note the
 presence of any problems listed on the inventory sheet. The attached glossary will provide
 further detail of the categories.
- Record, in the appropriate column, the land use and type of fence adjacent to the tree. Categories are listed in the glossary.
- 7. In the notes column identify the location and size of hydro lines, the status of ditches and any other pertinent information, not covered by the other categories. For example: heart rot, tree in decline, land owner, heritage home, part of a woodlot, new plantings near by, etcetera.






